4-4-4 Makes Zozo school an educational oddity

General observations made by Harry Wugalter, chief of public school finance, at Carrizozo budget hearing last week tell how this school came up with a good chunk of operating money.

The Carrizozo school district's original outlook under the new formula was rather black. It appeared that the district's organizational structure as listed in the State Department of Education publication was 6-6 plan. Under the 6-6 organizational plan the district would have been bracketed as a "save harmless" district. However, the district brought to our attention that back in 1971 the superintendent request that the district's educational organization be changed to a 4-4-4 and as per a later dated August 1971 from Frank Ready, who was then serving as the acting director of elementary and secondary education, the 4-4-4 plan was honored.

Therefore, based upon the aforementioned communication this organizational plan was

noted for the record by the state department of education on March 12, 1974. This change made a great difference in the district's financial status and added 168,745 educational units due to school sparsity with a dollar value of \$104,031.00 or 26 percent of the total state equalization guarantee allocation.

"We met in the county commission room in the Lincoln County courthouse, Carrizozo and had a fair turnout. We were pleased that the county treasurer attended. Though the district does not use LPG for heat or fuel, the proposed expenditure for 1974-75 reflects an increase of 188 percent for natural gas. This is due to an estimated increase in natural gas of from .0009 to .0016, or a 75 percent increase. The other reasons seem to be greater usage due to more new school buildings.

The district passed a \$325,000 bond issue in November of 1973; however due to the district's assessed valuation, the board has only been able to sell \$250,000 and intends to sell another \$40,000 in 1975 as more bonding capacity becomes available.

The district is building a new gymnasium, or identified as a vocational-gym complex, and the district will use \$23,968 of recurring revenue for building construction and will add items such as folding bleachers (\$15,000 worth) scoreboard, basketball goals, as the work progresses.

The 1974-75 net change in personnel is plus 0.8:110.4:1. The vocational programs were discussed and the board of education apparently did not elect to pick up the vocational contractor who was underwritten during the current school year with state vocational dollars (\$11,286) and he supervises the vocational program for Carrizozo and Capitan. The district placed a major emphasis upon salaries and approved an average 19 percent increase for teachers and 18 percent for superintendent and administrators.

The district has an estimated 1-17.17 district-wide pupil teacher ratio and its largest per pupil ratio is for grade 2, 1 to 24. The district's proposed expenditure for school supplies of \$21.81 per pupil is the highest we have found

during our 50 school budget hearings and we suggest the superintendent review this item. The district's financial status is excellent and it is likely that for 1974-75 the district should have enough recurring revenue not obligated for non-recurring items of capital outlay to permit subsequent increases in operational expenditures. The net per pupil expenditure will increase by 21.7 percent, or \$193 per pupil. The new formula helps this district.

Carrizozo school district has total valuation of \$5,240,347. Total district and county revenue amounts to \$62,804. Total state revenue of \$433,263 and the grand total budget for the 1974-75 school year in Carrizozo is \$515,696.00.

Wugalter commented that enrollment level between grades 1-6 and 7-12 in Carrizozo was unusual. Grades 1-6 have 50 percent and grades 7-12 50 percent, when many schools are dropping in grade enrollment.

The 1973 assessed valuation per pupil in Zozo district is \$12,719, state wide average is \$10,101. Percent of valuation is non-corporate 50 percent and corporate 50 percent. District tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation is \$14.37, total state average is \$16.06.

Minimum hourly wage paid by the district is \$2.00. Substitute teachers with high school degree are paid 15 per day, college grad \$18 per day. Fourteen of 28 certified personnel receive increments in addition to regular salary. Class sponsor \$400, annual sponsor \$100, cheerleader sponsor \$300, music \$500, vocational \$4,287, counselors \$375, coaching (male) \$3,550, coaching (female) \$1,800, plus others.

Board will pay 60 percent of health and accident insurance, an increase from 50 percent. Board has been paying teachers for days off to look for another job, Wugalter advised against this. Ten days of sick leave are granted, cumulative to 60 total, Professional leave 2 days.

Estimated cost of sports for boys \$10,638, for girls \$5,127 in 1973-74. In 1974-75 this will change to about \$13,721 for boys and \$7,721 for girls.

Projected average daily membership for grades 1-4 is 120, grades 5-8 is 153, and grades 9-12 is 139, total projected ADM is 412.

Eat, drink or wear cotton --

Lots of changes in cotton product

Carrizozo Rotarians and their wives enjoyed an interesting talk on new developments using cotton, at the Recreation Center Thursday. The speaker was Jim O'Neal, Extension cotton marketing and utilization specialist at NMSU, Las Cruces.

Cottonseed has not generally been used for human consumption due to a pigment in the seed called gossypol. Cotton breeders have produced some varieties of cotton that have gossypol-free seed and since that time the demands for cottonseed flour has exceeded the supply.

The first commercial cottonseed flour mill in the world has been constructed in Lubbock. The entire production, estimated at 25 tons per day, will be handled by a marketing firm in Iowa. This seems like a lot of flour per day but is really just a drop in the bucket of world demand. At present no cottonseed flour is available for home use.

The background of demand for cottonseed flour stems from its high protein content. There is presently a world-wide protein shortage, and protein is used in more than 300 food products.

Mr. O'Neal passed some cottonseed, without hulls, around for sampling, and with just a little salt added the seeds would be real tasty. He said that it is estimated that least 10,000 people a day die in the world from malnutrition, mostly for lack of sufficient protein.

Concentrate from gossypol-free cottonseed has been used in soft drinks, and such drinks will be available soon for use in school lunch programs with two or three percent protein added. Cottonseed protein is also used as an additive with meat products. Soon you can have a backyard cookout of "Cottonburgers" using lower cut meat protein-enriched.

Right now researchers are doing lots of things with cotton cloth that is flame-retardant, used in children's sleepwear and also for elderly. This same material will come in used for mattress ticking, rugs and drapes. Lots of research is being done to develop a "easy-care, durable-press materials. We now have 100 per cent cotton shirting, all-cotton sheets, and a durable-press fabric made from a 50-50 blend.

It appears, according to O'Neal, that increased research and commercial production of cotton products which permit "eating, drinking, and wearing cotton" has cotton well on the way to recovering ground this product lost when synthetic fibers came into wide-spread use.

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Woman's Club shows the way
**"Working together" makes
 lot of things besides money!**

In 1967 The Carrizozo Cemetery was in such a deplorable state the Carrizozo Woman's Club with the cooperation of other civic clubs decided to improve it. It was overgrown with weeds; there was no fence and cattle were allowed to roam the grounds. There was an open hand dug well sixty feet deep that collected filth and was an extreme safety hazard.

First thing to be done was to get the Town to fill the well. Donations were taken to build a fence. This was completed in 1969. The boys from Sierra Blanca Boys Camp, a branch of Springer Correctional school for boys, came down and under supervision dug up the Sage Brush that

was so tall you couldn't see the graves. For Memorial Day 1972, we again got the boys from Sierra Blanca to come down and rake trash and do general clean up, there were several truck loads of trash and the Town of Carrizozo hauled this off for us. Lunches were made by members of the Woman's Club for the boys who worked. With donations 150 Russian Olive Trees were ordered through the Soil Conservation; these were planted with volunteer help. There was an old cement tank at one end of the cemetery that was a eyesore. Soil Conservation moved this for us; we paid for the gasoline used in moving it. This left space for what is now a pretty little

corner park. Under the supervision of the Woman's Club leadership a cemetery organization was formed; each burial lot owner pays a small yearly due, to be used for the upkeep of the Cemetery. The need for an entrance sign was presented to the Woman's Club and they appropriated \$375 to have sign made. One of the members traded an old pump she owned to have the sign erected with beautiful rock work. Members of our Club made a satin quilt and raffled it off to raise money to pay for an underground watering system. We went all over the county selling tickets and made \$311. This money paid for the material for the watering system; Soil Conservation volunteered the labor.

When Ex-Governor Bullock advertised free trees from his experimental farm; we asked for 100. Our Town Park Supervisor brought the trees to us on a trip he made to get trees for the town park. Volunteers planted these trees. Among the volunteers were members of the FFA Club from Carrizozo High School; they also, planted bulbs, perennial flowers and grass.

They pruned all the trees that needed it. Their sponsor wanted them to have the experience in addition to helping the Civic organizations. We made an agreement with the school that each senior class would accept the responsibility of clean-up and maintenance of the Carrizozo Cemetery on a yearly basis. For this work they will receive \$300 per year. With this money they

Lincoln County News, May 30, 1974, Page 6 are able to take their senior trip. To this date they have done a wonderful job. At this time we have material bought to put in 1,000 more feet of underground watering. Our plan for the future is to continue the upkeep and improvement of our beautiful cemetery.

Nine-day deer season state-wide in 1975

SANTA FE, N.M. - The State Game Commission adopted two major deer season changes during its big game seasons meeting Friday in Santa Fe, adopting shorter seasons in moves to reduce hunting pressure.

After some debate, the commission upheld the decision it made last year establishing a 16-day deer season for 1974 with a nine-day season in the southwest only, and eliminating the separate north-south opening dates.

Nine-day seasons will be in effect state-wide in 1975, according to the regulations adopted Friday.

The 1974 season will open state-wide on Nov. 9 and run through Nov. 24 in the northern and southeast quadrant of the state and through Nov. 17 in the southwest quadrant, where nine-day seasons have been in effect for several years.

The 1975 nine-day season will open in all quadrants on the second Saturday of November and run through the third Sunday.






