Valley boxes decide two close races

Skeen scores big, Elliott leads Democrats

The June 4 primary election in Lincoln County did not spring any big surprises but it may have brought some new political talent to voter attention.

From the very first precinct to be counted, Carrizozo 4, Governor Candidate Joe Skeen of Picacho went out in front to stay and pile up a 778 vote total compared to 93 for his closest competitor John Eastham. Skeen scored 109 votes at Hondo, Commissioner Paul Pacheco 106 in that precinct.

New Mexico's best governor race in many years is now set for Nove ber. Jerry Apodoca, the Democratic winner, will match talents with Skeen, both organized good primary campaigns, ran a clean, hard campaign, and both will be going all-out in short order to line up a winning margin in the general election.

Two county races remained close down to the last box. Warren Tucker and Veta Allen had been running neck-and-neck for county treasurer office. Tucker carried five precincts, Allen seven. San Patricio was next to last in a gave Tucker ten more votes than Allen, 31 to 21. One more box to go which was Hondo and if the Valley had followed San Patricio Tucker could have won. Instead Hondo precinct gave Allen 52 votes to 30 for Tucker and the race was over, Allen winning 367 to 348.

The first district commissioner race was equally close down to counting of San Patricio and Hondo. Don Stark won at Corona, all three precincts in Ruidoso and tied in Angus, but none of these by real big margins. The race changed drastically with San Patricio giving Paul Pacheco a 54-17 margin, then Pacheco really

stacked up a big win in Hondo winning 106 to 25 in that one precinct. Final count Pacheco 395, Stark 360.

Democratic voters gave their best vote to Sheriff Candidate Bill Elliott, where they cast 792 votes under Elliott's name. Magistrate Austin Pritchett, champion vote getter for many years received 739 votes and no other Democrat got over the 700 mark.

Lincoln County Democrats voted for a state-wide loser in the governor race, in fact they put three candidates ahead of winner Jerry Apodoca who received 151 votes while giving 300 to Mayfield, 247 to Tibo Chavez, and 217 to Odis Echols. Robert Ferguson, state winner on Democratic ticket went way out in front in Lincoln with 472 votes.

John Thompson scored a good win in the probate judge race, topping off a four-way race with 345 votes, next closest was George White with 285, then Ramon Luna 249 and Amelita Jenkins 155. Thompson will oppose Republican Kenneth Nosker in the general election.

County Republicans followed the state in electing Virgil Rhodes as their lieutenant governor candidate with 437 votes to 264 for Juan Raigoza.

There will be a choice of candidates in Senate District 39. Incumbent John Conway scored 497 votes running unopposed while Democrat Rolla Buck piled up 649 votes, also unopposed.

James Sanchez, candidate for state representative, actually won in Lincoln County voting by small margin over incumbent John Bigbee of Encino. Torrance County voting should take up that slack, being Bigbee's backyard, and put him John back in the state house. D. W. Rawhouse is the Democratic winner in State Rep. District 50.

Maurice Hobson, Republican and Page Carter, Democrat, will battle it out in State Rep. District 52. Both got free passage in the primary. John Mershon, Democrat for State Rep. in District 51, had no primary opposition, and none in the general.

There will be two county commission races in the general election, Paul Pacheco R. vs. Roman D. in First District and W. A. Hart D. vs. Michael Hernandez R. in the third district.

Pennies ***** From heaven, pickle jars, socks

One of the most patriotic acts Americans of all ages can perform today is emptying the family piggy bank, according to Johnson Stearns, President, Citizen State Bank in Carrizozo.

Stearns said the nation faces a penny shortage that costs taxpayers millions because people are withholding some 30 billion pennies from circulation.

Jody going to NMSU

Jody Ventura, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ventura of Carrizozo, will attend New Mexico State University this fall on a work study program with the Cooperative Extension Service in Lincoln County. This means that nearly half of the 62 billion pennies the U. S. Mint has produced in the last 15 years are in hiding. The Mint is still producing one-cent coins at a rate of 35 million a day, added, yet there still aren't enough pennies to go around in many areas of the nation.

Stearns urged that families start gathering those pennies that are hiding in pickle jars, old socks and piggy banks and bring them into the bank so the nation can get Mr. Lincoln back among the people where he belongs.

June has been declared Penny Redemption month by the Mint in an effort to cure this artificial shortage, Stearns said.

"For every \$25 worth of pennies cashed in at the bank, the U. S. Treasury is going to award an Exceptional Public Service certificate to the individual or group responsible," Stearns said.

Polly's Bulletin Board

I finally found a recipe for whole-wheat bread that uses 100 percent whole wheat. It takes only a dab of all purpose flour for kneading purposes. 100 percent whole wheat bread is delicious toasted in slices with butter and jelly. It was 'loaf at first sight.'

- 100 per cent whole-wheat Bread
- | | |
|--------------------|----------------------------|
| 2 c. milk | 2 pkg. yeast |
| 1/2 c. brown sugar | 7 1/2 c. whole wheat flour |
| 1/4 margarine | All purpose flour |
| 1 C. warm water | 3 tablespoons margarine |

- Heat milk until bubbles form around the edge of pan. Add sugar, salt and 1/2 cup margarine; stir until margarine melts; cool to luke-warm.
- Sprinkle yeast over warm water in large bowl, stirring until dissolved. Then stir in milk mixture.
- Add 4 cups wheat flour, beat vigorously with wooden spoon until smooth. Gradually add remaining wheat flour, mixing in last of it with hands until dough is stiff enough to leave sides of bowl.
- Knead with all purpose flour until dough is smooth and elastic (5 min).

(5) Place in greased bowl, bring greased side of dough up. Cover, until double. (1 hour).
(6) Divide in half, let rest covered (10 min) Roll each half into 9 X 8 inch rectangle. Roll up, press ends, pinch.
(7) Place seam down side by side in 9 X 5 X 2 3/4" loaf pan. Brush surface with 3 tablespoons margarine.
(8) Rise 1 hour
(9) Bake at 400 degrees for 35-40 minutes. (cover with foil after 25 minutes if too brown)

Whole-wheat Bread cut into finger sized pieces (dried or toasted) that baby can hold are good for him and handy to offer him. If whole-wheat bread is well liked you don't have to bother with cereal at all unless it is convenient.







Mrs. Skillern was present and told how Mr. Stokes had saved her life when she was fifteen years old.

Livestock inspec changes

The New Mexico Livestock Board in an effort to conserve gasoline, curtail the high cost of travel and provide a more orderly movement of livestock to New Mexico Auction Markets, has announced a change in brand inspection requirements for livestock destined for New Mexico Markets.

Effective June 1, 1974 any livestock owner who desires to send cattle or sheep to a New Mexico Market may do so by contacting the Livestock Inspector or a designated agent within the brand district of origin. The Inspector or agent will issue a certificate authorizing the shipment of the livestock intended for sale. The shipper may then load at his convenience without the usual inspection and transport the animals to the Market where they will be inspected upon arrival.

Proof of ownership to all animals must be furnished to the inspector at the Market. Otherwise the animals or proceeds may be withheld.
