

New light on history at Lincoln seminar

A seminar, planned and conducted by a group of local residents and held in the old schoolhouse in Lincoln, covered some of the highlights of Lincoln County history and especially the history of Lincoln Town on five successive evenings, May 27 through the 31st.

The first two evenings, given over to the discussion of those factors leading up to and including the Lincoln County War were led by Prof. David Townsend and his colleagues, Pete Hendrickson and Lonnie Jarrett of the History Department of New Mexico State University in Alamogordo.

Townsend traces history

Prof. Townsend led off with a discussion of those factors which led eventually to the Lincoln County war tracing back to the time of the early Pueblo Cliff Dwellers circa 1200 AD, told of their final extinction due to the raids of the Apache and Comanche Tribes. According to the early maps of trails in New Mexico, no trails led across what is now known as Lincoln County. It was

Money trip to Santa Fe June 21

School board looks at insurance, sex, budget

Meeting without the board president Tuesday night, Carrizozo school board went through an agenda covering a wide range of items. Ziggy Lessau, president, has indicated that he will be leaving Carrizozo, in such case the board could appoint to fill the vacancy or leave it unfilled.

Carrizozo school's request for capital outlay funds did not make it at the last session of the school capital outlay group in Santa Fe. Supt. Jim Steinepreis read letter to the board stating that Carrizozo's request for \$151,000 capital outlay money would be considered on June 26. This money is needed to complete the planned construction program at the school. School officials will attend.

Insurance for athletes was discussed at length. All students participating in athletics, both boys and girls, are required to have insurance. It can be part of the family policy, or individual. The school's intent is to provide some sort of insurance for students who have none. For about \$26 a year the student gets coverage that meets requirements -- and does little more than that for the student should he/she sustain an injury. For \$55 the coverage gets better. Pool will be taken ahead of start of school and make decision then, possibly giving student-parent a choice.

Lincoln County health nurse has made request for sex education in school. Some literature was read about such education in other schools, no decision made and the board will consider this request further.

Several line items of the budget, to be finalized in August, were discussed. The school received letter dated May 29 stating that an amount of \$19,422 from Federal Vocational Funds had been approved to be used in both Carrizozo and Capitan schools. Vocational coordinator Oliver Lamb will be employed again, his second year, to work with both schools. An amount of \$8,500 will be available to finance student work activities.

Pupil enrollment summary from the budget: 1971-72 402, 72-73 417, 73-74 404, estimate for 74-75 is 400, half in grades 1-6, half in grades 7-12.

Assessed valuation per pupil in district is \$12,719, statewide average is \$10,101. District tax rate per \$1,000 assessed valuation is \$14.37, total state average is \$16.06. Total expenditures in 74-75 school year budgeted at \$446,046.

Ruidoso school finances a career education mobile unit which will also serve Carrizozo again this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Fidel Sosa, teachers at Hagerman last year, were offered contracts Mr. Sosa will teach Spanish and World History, coach track and assist with football and basketball. Mrs. Sosa will teach math in mid school.

Coaching assignments were announced: Bill MacVeigh, head basketball coach, assist in football and track; Levon Webb, head football coach, assist with track, and jr. hi. basketball.

Comprehensive plan is adopted

Parts I and II of the Comprehensive Plan previously presented by the Town Planning and Zoning Commission were approved last night by the Carrizozo City Council with one change included. Vernon Petty asked that "that portion of Lava Vista Subdivision which is bound on the South and West by Lava Loop Road and on the North by U. S. Highway 380 be changed from residential to C-2 Tourist Oriented and Community Commercial. Structures presently on the above described property will be removed or remodeled to comply with the C-2 building code."

Before the plan was approved, the question was raised as to just how binding the Plan would be. Fred English, member of the Planning Commission, told the Council it should be taken as a guide line and proposals taken one at a time. "It can't be accomplished in 30 days!" Tom Ward, Chairman of the City Planning Commission said: "As problems come up they should be taken to the Planning Commission first and then to the Council. I would urge that this ordinance be accepted. Carrizozo needs it..." The town council also adopted the Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Planning and Zoning Commissions.

Jim Cantrell of Scott Industries, Al Ward of Aerodyne Inc and Tom Ward presented to the Council a map to show how the expansion of Scott Industries, adjacent to the Airport, would benefit both the airport and the industry. Proximity to the air terminal should bring added business to the terminal as well as to Scott Industries.

Roy Harmon stated "I suggest we all go out there and take a look at it before making any decision." Mayor Bill Payne, called a recess and as it was still light enough to "take a look", Tom Ward, C. D. May and Roy Harmon drove out to

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
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Water meeting at Hondo

WATER: Adjudication of the water in the Hondo Basin will be discussed at the meeting in the Hondo School on June 20, at 7:30 p.m. This meeting will concern the irrigated land in the Ruidoso, Bonito and Hondo Valleys.

Richard Simms attorney for the State Engineers office will explain how the adjudication will affect the water users. He will also explain what the land owner can do if he does not agree with the adjudication of his water use.

Although the water in the Hondo Basin has been used for over 100 years, the water use in this area has not been adjudicated before.

All landowners with irrigated land in the Hondo, Bonito and Ruidoso Watershed are urged to attend this meeting. Also tell your neighbors about this important meeting.

This meeting is open to everyone on a non-discrimination basis regardless of race, color, or national origin.

Insects are starting to show up in damaging numbers in many areas of Lincoln County. Elm leaf beetles are skeletonizing the elm leaves in many areas of the county. Web worms have been reported. Webworms grow in colonies by spinning a web in the tree. They then eat all the leaves in this web.

Both these insect pests can be controlled with Diazanone or Sevin.



Starting off with a brief account of the early trading routes, he cited the expedition led by Gaspar Castano de Sosa in 1590-91. It took this group of about 160, nine months to travel from Mexico north up the Pecos to the Pueblo country and nine months to return. 300 years later, with the coming of the railroads, the picture had changed. Freight could be hauled up the Hondo Valley to Lincoln from the freight depot in Roswell.

He commented also on the reduction of feudal lawlessness due in part to the railroads, as well as to better communication by wireless.

Mr. Penfield's father, J. M. Penfield took over the Tunstall store in Lincoln in 1900. The warehouse attached to the west end of the building stored the wool and hides taken often in exchange for goods. It was also used for a dance hall. In the back of the building stood the "coffin shed."

In those days, the head of a mercantile business was often the County Clerk. J. M. Penfield, John Dolan and Henry Lutz all held this post. Taxes collected could be used to invest in any profitable personal venture, as long as the original tax monies were turned in by the end of the year. The county clerk's salary was 5 percent of the total tax collected. "It was important, to be important." Mining shares in the 1890's, particularly at White Oaks proved to be one of the best ways of investing the taxpayers' money to profit the County Clerk. Between May and August in 1892, the Old Abe totaled \$26,400 in dividends. Mr. Penfield's comment on anyone getting a "feeling" for gold mining today is to: "just sit down until the feeling passes."

He later passed out a copy of an old inventory of the Penfield store and listed a few items which stirred up a buzz of comments. Among them: women's gaiters—whatever is a gaiter? You know, those things that cover half the leg and button up with a button hook; a lengthy assortment of chamber pots; 25 boxes of tobacco weighing 20 lbs. each, and three spittoons; 68 bottles of castor oil; 12 pair of striped pants. "All that tobacco and only three spittoons?" Somebody asked "How is it so much merchandise is still in the store?" Mr. Penfield replied, "It didn't sell!"

Someone asked where the original log houses of Ft. Stanton might have been located, before the stone buildings on the present site were started in 1868. According to Edward Penfield and Fred Pfingsten they may have been located by Government Springs along the Bonito about 3 miles from the present site. In 1862 it was these log buildings which were set afire by Carlton when he evacuated the fort.

Ruth Penfield shows map

Ruth Penfield started off with an 1881 map showing the boundaries of Lincoln County, the largest county in the United States taking in 27,000 square miles. Most of it was public domain available for grazing and with deposits of silver, gold, lead, iron and coal. The first railroad reached Santa Fe in 1880. It passed through Las Vegas and from there the stage coach ran three times a week to Lincoln, taking a week to make the trip.

Population was sparse. The 1880 census listed Fort Stanton at 118; Lincoln, 628; South Fork (Indian Agency) 196; White Oaks 288 (2 years later it grew to 1,000) and Roswell 350. The "dismemberment" of Lincoln County started in 1889 when the legislature passed an act creating Chavez and Eddy counties.

Pat Garrett, law officer, who finally caught up with Billy the Kid, had dreams of an empire along the Pecos River. He sought out a cattleman, Charles B. Eddy in 1888 who later brought in John James Hagerman who had made a fortune in the iron mines of Michigan and Wisconsin. Garrett's dreams of irrigation along the Pecos were later developed by the U. S. Reclamation Bureau. The railroad, completed, "went nowhere and ended nowhere." Hagerman lost 2 1/2 million dollars. He and Eddy fell out and later Hagerman extended the railroad to Amarillo, Texas.

Eddy, born promoter, obtained funds to finance the El Paso and Northeastern line which was to run from El Paso to White Oaks. In August 1899 the "whistle of the iron horse" reached Carrizozo. In the meantime, however, coal fields had opened up near what is now the Village of Captain in Coalinga. The village swarmed with miners brought in from Pittsburgh, Pa. Eddy ran his tracks up through the Indian Divide to transport coal and turned a deaf ear to the pleas of the gold miners in White Oaks. The coal mines shut down in about three years due to faults and dikes that made the mining too costly. From then until 1934, the train carried supplies to Capitan. According to Ruth Penfield's uncle, a railroad engineer: "It wasn't very good—not fit to be tied by a cowboy." Edward Penfield described the passenger car hooked to the end of the train: "It was of wood, not in very good condition, with a little gold molding and with iron grill work. It had Pritch lamps with mantles and coal-burning stove." This car was taken off in the 1920's. Parts of the old roadbed can still be seen along the highway. The railroad finally extended on up to Tucumcari and was later known as the Southern Pacific.

Emil Fritz died in Germany in 1874 leaving a life insurance policy in the care of McSween, who deposited the funds in his own account in a Kansas City bank. The ensuing litigations led to the strife between the two factions. Fighting continued between 1877 and 1879. Tunstall and McSween were both killed along with others on both sides. Murphy died, a sick man, in Santa Fe in Oct. 1878.

Billy the Kid worked on the Tunstall Ranch and fought along with McSween after the ambush and murder of Tunstall. Lonnie Jarrett commented on Billy as the Robin Hood of Lincoln County. Who was He? Was he an important figure in the Lincoln County War? Did he kill 21 men? Why did he become a legendary figure?

One account states he was born in New York City in 1859. According to Archivist Leon Metz of the Univ. of Texas in El Paso, his mother, married to a man named Antrim, moved to Silver City, N. M. in 1873. She died in 1874. Henry Antrim, alias Billy the Kid was jailed for stealing from a Chinese laundry, but escaped to Arizona. He turned up in Lincoln County in 1877.

According to Lonnie Jarrett, both "fakelore and folklore" have grown up around the "Kid." Fakelore has been concocted by individuals for profit, ex: "Authentic Life of Billy the Kid" by Pat Garrett and Ash Upson. Folklore, passed on by word of mouth has turned him into a western hero—no drinking or profanity, outwits opponents, leads a charmed life, never known to desert a friend, and always the victim of social injustice.

Peter Hendrickson brought with him a collection of old firearms. He said that before the Civil War all guns had large bores. To load with powder was a cumbersome procedure and it was often best to carry two. When the Colt 45 developed during the war, it revolutionized not only the industry but the entire country. The "little" man was no longer little with a Colt slung at his hip and a belt full of cartridges. Another handy feature was that bullets fitting the Colt could also fit the new rifles.

Penfield tells of trading

Edward Penfield of Lincoln and his sister, Ruth conducted the third evening of the Seminar.

A long list of vegetables and some spices followed, many of which may be found growing wild, including lambs quarters. Fields of oregano grow just south of Corona along the highway.

Early houses called Jacals

The early houses of the Spanish settler, or Jacals, were made from poles cut from the Piñon trees with the bark left on. These stood upright, close together and firmly entrenched in the ground. A cedar post with a crotch at each corner held the crossbeam for the roof. The roof was crisscrossed with willow sticks and covered with layers of adobe that had to be replaced each year. The sides of the Jacal were chinked with mud mixed with sticks. Over that went a layer of Soqueta Pesado or heavy mud mixed with straw. Inside the walls were plastered with fine mud then whitewashed with Yesso made from limestone, crushed baked, pounded to a powder and mixed with Poliadras or boiled flour paste.

The houses usually had only one window, high in the wall, and one or two doors. The fireplace was in the corner by the door. Beds were made of hides, pallets on the floor. Beds were served on the floor. For lighting they used candles, made by pouring the tallow into holes in the ground. All work was done by the whole community lending a helping hand. Most of the money earned came from selling wool and pelts. Some of the men and boys earned \$15 a month herding sheep or goats. It took the whole family a week to trek to the salt flats near Willard to bring home a year's supply.

These early houses clustered close about the Torreon in Lincoln and along the valley close to the Bonito where the remains of more than one Torreon have been found. A high rock wall surrounded the Torreon in Lincoln, where livestock were herded during an Indian raid. The community was Catholic and on feast days and Sundays nobody worked except to feed the stock. Velorios were held in the home on feast days, during Lent, and during wakes. These lasted through the night and devotions centered around the Rosary. A statue of the Virgin Mary was carried from house to house and each family pinned a small trinket to her white dress. There were a number of Penitentes in Lincoln and three Moradas or secret chapels, now gone. At death they were laid out on a door and covered with a sheet instead of being buried in a coffin.

Courtship was formal. The father of the boy paid a visit to the father of the girl. At the end of eight days, if the offer was not accepted, the hopeful groom-to-be received a wagonload of pumpkins—or the boy could work eight days for the father of the girl and if rejected, receive a load of pumpkins.

Slides show old houses

The Seminars wound up with Walter Henn, artist and resident of Lincoln showing a series of slides of many of the old historic houses. The slides were taken by Richard Federici, photographer for the State Planning Office in Santa Fe.

First shown was a slide of the pageant grounds, built in the late 1940's. Before the grounds were in existence the pageant was held in the street with the action taking place in front of the houses involved. Peter Hurd, artist from San Patricio was the first Billy the Kid. According to Walter Henn, the folk pageant of Billy the Kid is one of only two known to be still given in the United States, with descendants of the characters involved acting out the parts.

Slides of the old courthouse showed that one window to the left of the front entrance had apparently been filled in when the vault was moved to its present location. Contrary to popular belief, no stairs led up to the balcony over the entrance until 1881. Fred Pfingsten remembered the courthouse as a school. He attended there in the eighth grade.

The school next to the courthouse was built in 1930 and the first schoolhouse, now the community church, was built in the 1880's. Rafaelita Fryon's home is said to have been used as the first Union Hall, and Bessie Garcia's was one of

Lincoln County News, June 13, 1974, Page 7 the 29 houses where Billy "reportedly" had his leg irons removed. Edward Penfield's home, east of the Tunstall store was formerly owned by Lawyer Cockrell and the Penfields have lived there since 1900.

The Tunstall store, built in 1877 also housed the bank, the law office, and Tunstall's living quarters. In 1878, Dr. Ealy, his wife, two children and a school teacher, Susan Gates, lived in the east end. The front room was used as a school. Behind the store lie the graves of McSween, Tunstall and the two Shield children. Also Pete Huff, poisoned during the War. Just where these graves are actually located is a question of debate.

The Ellis Store built in 1850, later purchased by Dr. Laws became a hospital. TB patients were housed in about 30 small cabins. A few of these are still in use about Lincoln. The building in the rear was a nurses' residence.

Also shown was a reconstructed drawing of the old Pit Careel, the first jail in Lincoln, used in 1877. It was actually a pit with a small structure built over it. It was feared that during a flood the pit would fill up and was abandoned in 1878.

Walter Henn stated that Col. Dudley bivouaced his soldiers across from the Mantanyo's house and not where the state marker now stands. "The marker should be moved." And "What's that water tower?" a frequent question, from visitors! The Torreon, 1840-1850 and reconstructed in the 1930's was built of stone. It originally was plastered with adobe and used as a refuge from Indian raids.

Dr. Neal had a drugstore and office in the Watson home. Fred Pfingsten well remembered his first small pox shot given by Dr. Neal! He also remembered having been sent with a message to see old Mr. Vorwerk at the east end of town. He was busy buttering some good biscuits with white butter. Fred asked him how come his butter was white while most butter was yellow. "Well," replied Mr. Vorwerk, "I get my butter from a whitefaced cow!"

Church of San Juan de Bautista was started in 1884 by Father John Garnier. Villagers donated worktime, and materials with very little cash. The bell, cast in St. Louis, Mo. was carried by wagon from Las Vegas. John Dolan paid the bill.

The Convento next to the church, possibly predates the 1860's. It housed the priest, was used as a community center, court house, law offices and other functions of the county government. During a "baille" or dance, Dec. 20, 1873, four men were killed during the Horrell brother's raid.

The Wortley Hotel, erected early 1870's to house workers on the Big Store, was known as Sam Wortley's mess. This is where Deputy Bob Olinger on April 28, 1881 was interrupted at his midday meal by shots coming from the courthouse and ran to his death at the hands of Billy the Kid. It burned in the 1930's but was purchased by the state and restored in 1960.

La Paloma Bar was built by Rocco Emilio in 1890, and later occupied by his son Rosario, who was convicted of murder and sentenced to hang at Lincoln, March 1907. He escaped and was never recaptured.

The Bank Exchange Saloon in the late 1800's had been run by George Curry. Curry went on to be a Spanish War Veteran, Territorial Governor of New Mexico and Congressman. He spent his last years in Lincoln as state historian and curator of the museum.

The houses above mentioned are only a few of those shown on the slides. If anyone is interested in viewing the slides, contact Ralph Dunlap at the Extension office in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

John Athy, program director of the KRWG-FM radio station in Las Cruces and teacher of Radio Journalism taped the entire series of five evenings. These tapes will be available and he may be contacted at P. O. Box 3 J, Las Cruces, N. M.

The seminars led to a tour and orientation program for visitors to Lincoln during the summer months. The slides, with a running commentary and some background of Lincoln also a brochure will be offered.

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

the airport. On their return, the plan was accepted by all members of the Council, with the exception of Earl Fenter who abstained. Fenter felt that the curve on the map, providing road access already in use, should be straightened out. Alternative routes will have to be provided as additional heavy traffic on the present route will cause hazardous conditions for High School Students crossing to the athletic field.

Clara Snow, then asked that every effort be made as soon as possible to clean the trash, now caught in the lane on the East side of Evergreen Cemetery - 40 feet deep - It is an alarming fire hazard! Mayor Bill Payne stated that this would be cleared up.

To put it mildly - sewage disposal problems along 3rd street between avenues D and E are in an "awful" mess. Eight houses on lots 80 x 100 feet line the block. Each connect with a four inch pipeline which in turn connects with the city sewer on B ave. If the plumbing stops up in one of the houses down the line, all the houses up the line get the backed-up sewage bubbling into showers, sinks and toilets. The one who calls the plumber, foots the bill.

Three residents presented complaints to the Council: Jim Gibson, Alfred Hoff and Ralph Baroz. Vernon Petty showed a map with pipelines drawn as they now exist. It was approved by the Council that an eight inch line, connecting with the city sewage line on B ave, be installed along the frontage of the eight houses. It will be mandatory that each resident connect with this line.

Bud Payne stated that equipment needed for the new ambulance had not been supplied. Atty. Archie Witham will check into this. He also brought up the drainage problem on Drexel street. This was referred to the town's engineer, Tom Ward.

R. A. Cox was asked to submit a bill for approval of the Council involving the well casing in a water well drilled June 1922 at the East end of town. A bill for \$186.00 to pay for a ditch, extending the city water lines was approved for Mr. Ed. Jones.

At a special meeting of the City Council on June 4 the proposed budget presented by Mary Ellen Payne for the Summer Recreation program, sponsored by the Lincoln County Extension Service was approved in the amount of \$350.50. Councilman Earl Fenter also recommended, with the Board's approval that the city sell to Scott Industries the proposed land by the airport, for \$350.50 and that this money be used for the summer recreation program. The council concurred. Lincoln Engineering

represented by Tom Ward was appointed by the Council as Town Engineer.

Council members present at last night's meeting were: Mayor Bill Payne, C. D. May, Roy Harmon, Willie Silva, Earl Fenter and Clerk, Viola Fenter. Also present was City Manager, Johnny Johnson and three members of the City Planning Commission: Tom Ward, Chairman, Fred English and Clara Snow.



ROUND THE CAPITOL

by FRED BUCKLES

RUIDOSO -- Primary elections set the stage for a slambang campaign for governor between Republican Joe Skeen and Democrat Jerry Apodaca in the main event Nov. 5.

Lincoln County rancher Skeen of Picacho won 29 of the 32 counties enroute to a convincing 2-1 victory over his nearest rival, Albuquerque attorney Jack Eastham, and two other opponents.

The vote was Skeen, 28,050; Eastham, 14,663; James Lindberg Hughes, 4,958, and Walter Bruce, 3,142.

Sen Apodaca of Las Cruces won nine counties but he showed general strength throughout New Mexico. Apodaca compiled 44,606 votes to 34,368 for Sen Tibo Chavez, Belen, 25,079 for Sen. Odis Echold, Clovis; 23,750 for ex-State Rep. Bob Mayfield; Albuquerque, 12,648 for Albuquerquean Drew Cloud and 6,819 for Santa Fean Pagan Witt.

Santa Fean Tony Anaya edged Frederick B. (Ted) Howden of Belen for the Democratic attorney general nomination in an upset, 61,725 to 59,524. In the Democratic State Corporation Commission primary Charles Rudolph of Santa Fe ousted incumbent John Abraham of Santa Fe easily.

Espanola accountant Max Sanchez shaded Santa Fean Earl Davidson, in a close race for the Democratic state auditor nomination, 58,388 to 55,599.

Ernestine Evans of Santa Fe won renomination easily for Secretary of state in the Democratic primary over Betty McDaniel Lujan of Santa Fe. Edward M. (Ted) Murphy, the Bernalillo County assessor, won the Democratic nomination for state treasurer over two opponents.

Phil Lucero of Espanola, a Land Office attorney, was nominated by Democrats for state land commissioner over two opponents.

Sen. Bob Ferguson of Artesia easily won the Democratic lieutenant governor nomination in a 5-man field. Republicans nominated Rep. Virgil Rhodes of Albuquerque for lieutenant governor.

Views of Sens. Apodaca and Ferguson are poles apart. But Ferguson will help Apodaca in Southern New Mexico to reduce Skeen's strength. Apodaca is moderate-liberal; Ferguson is conservative.

Skeen is conservative. Rhodes is moderate-conservative. Skeen challenged Apodaca to a series of debates on campaign issues. Apodaca will probably debate Skeen but arrangements will be made later.

Skeen will move primary campaign Jim Lee into a research assignment in the general election drive. Lee will look into environmental, land use planning and water resource evaluation for Skeen. A general election campaign manager for Skeen had not been picked.

Apodaca will retain Chris Brown as campaign manager and Richard de Uriarte as public relations director. He may add staffers.

Election results damaged Gov. Bruce King's prestige. Gov. King supported Sen. Tibo Chavez heavily. Besides, Bruce's brother, Rep. Don King, was upset by Ricardo Montoya in a Democratic primary for renomination in House District 45 (Santa Fe-Sandoval).

Chavez lost Santa Fe County, Gov. King's home, to Sen. Apodaca by a wide margin.

Bob Mayfield was a surprisingly strong fourth in the primary. Sen. Echols ran third but Mayfield was off Echols' heels. Echols said he will not seek a leadership post in the 1975 Senate. Odis is co-whip for majority Democrats now. His Senate seat is not at stake this year.

Apodaca will resign his Senate seat after Jan. 1 if he is elected as governor. The general election campaign pits two aggressive, energetic campaigners in Apodaca and Skeen with strong convictions. The general election will offer voters a clear choice between Apodaca's liberalism and Skeen's conservatism.

Watergate is likely to play a minor role in the general election campaign for governor. For U. S. House seats Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon '33, is the Democratic nominee in District 1 against incumbent Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque.

Rep. Harold Ruhnelt, Lovington Democrat, will be heavily favored over Donald Trubey, 34, of Portales, and Eastern New Mexico University professor. Ruhnelt will be seeking his third term. Trubey is a conservative Republican in his first race.

Senate President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike) Smalley of Deming won renomination in the Democratic primary over Frank Luchini, Truth or Consequences electrical contractor.

Smalley is unopposed in the general election. Sen. Smalley, an attorney, carried Luna and Hidalgo Counties but lost Sierra County to Luchini. Skeen beat Eastham in Socorro County. Chavez edged Jerry in Socorro County.

Lt. Gov. Mondragon reported campaign

contributions. They included: Herman Tabe, Belen, \$260; Mr. and Mrs. Willie Campos, Santa Rosa, \$100; Mr. and Mrs. Steve Gonzales, Los Lunas, \$120; J. B. Martinez, Taos, \$155; Martin Vargas, Taos, \$150; Craig Vincent, San Cristobal, \$100; and Celso Tafuya Jr., Truchas, \$100. Mondragon contributions to May 13 totaled \$19,803. Expenditures amounted to \$19,985.

Mondragon is a Guadalupe County native. He attended Santa Rosa Schools.

Ruidoso's economy is favorable. The handle at Ruidoso Downs for the first 10 days of racing was up 20 per cent plus from \$2,109,255 to \$2,540,512. The Ruidoso population jumped from 2,216 in 1970 to about 3,800 at present, up 71.5 per cent. Building permits, water connections, gasoline tax and gross receipts tax collections are up substantial.

TAOS -- Democrats face a rugged task uniting for the general election campaign after a grueling, 6-man governor primary fight.

Albuquerquean Drew Cloud, a governor candidate, said in mid-May at Las Cruces in the heat of the battle: "The Democratic Party is badly split right now. The primary winner will have a tremendous job to pull the party back together without personality clashes and vindictiveness."

Drew successfully steered the Democratic Party to victory in 1970 as state chairman. He said he could restore unity better than other governor contenders. Cloud said: "I conducted a positive campaign. I did not criticize other candidates. I believe they are friends of mine."

Behind a pledge of clean campaigning taken at the State Democratic Party convention in Albuquerque, some governor candidates sharply criticized their primary opponents with questionable tactics.

A final weekend campaign rally at Taos attracted 70 voters and four Republican governor candidates: James Lindberg Hughes, Joe Skeen, Walter Bruce and Hamilton Rogers.

Hughes said he is the only non-politician in the field. Skeen said more vocational and bilingual education is needed. Bruce told ward and precinct GOP officials: "You are probably more important politicians than those sitting up here" at the speaker's table.

Rogers said: "I'm supporting the President. I don't think the President has done anything wrong." Rogers' comment sparked heavy applause. Speaking for Jack Eastham, Bill Cortez said a change is needed in the state Democratic administration. Cortez said Eastham is well-qualified with long legislative experience to be governor.

Taos County GOP Chairman Rudy Pacheco presided at the Saturday rally.

Lincoln County rancher Skeen of Picacho reported \$98,239 in campaign contributions to May 30 -- \$88,074 cash and \$10,164 in-kind.

Among major cash contributions to the Skeen campaign were Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Edwards, Lincoln County, \$250; Mr. and Mrs. Dean Fite, Socorro County, \$200; and James Butler, Curry County, \$200.

A Skeen Lincoln County dinner raised \$4,569. In-kind contributions included \$500 for billboards from Richard Zanelli, Albuquerque.

Skeen ended his primary election campaigning Monday with tours of Clovis and Roswell. He expected to carry Curry and Chavez Counties.

Mrs. Leyla Torres, Skeen Socorro County chairman, disputed Eastham's pre-election claim he would win Socorro County over Skeen with 600 votes. Mrs. Torres said: "I don't think Holm Bursum will be able to pull it off this time."

Bankers Holm Bursum Jr. and Holm Bursum III of Socorro backed Eastham strongly in the GOP governor primary. Mrs. Torres indicated Eastham would be defeated by Skeen in Socorro County. Her husband, Steve Torres, is a New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology board of regents member. She said Torres was not allied with the Skeen campaign.

The State Highway Department might save taxpayers much money by adjusting upward its right-of-way acquisition offers. In at least five Hidalgo County, Interstate 10 right-of-way acquisitions the Highway Department offered property owners far less than the owners said they would accept.

The cases landed in district court condemnation suits. Judgments awarded landowners much more than property owners were willing previously to accept in most cases.

The Highway Department acquired property owned by Franklin Hood, Ed Bowman, City of Lordsburg, Hidalgo Area Development Corp. and the Blas-Noche Estate.

The Highway Department will open bids June 21 on a 13.2 mile overlay in Hidalgo County from the Grant-Hidalgo County line southwest on NM-90. A 2-lane overlay of plant mix bituminous pavement is specified.

Governor-running Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, reported his campaign raised \$156,481 and spent \$155,492 to May 30. Sen. Apodaca said 2,083 persons donated an average of \$10.70 to his campaign in the April 15-May 30 period.
