Allocate revenue sharing money

Three towns of Lincoln County had no apparent trouble dispensing with various sums of general revenue sharing money for the fifth entitlement period, July 1, 1974 through June 30, 1975.

Capitan received \$3,706,000 and will spend the entire amount on pipe for water system. The planned use report is signed by J. T. Hohnston, Mayor and published in this issue of the News.

Mayor Kennan Fuller of Corona has signed their report, amount received is \$5,159,000 which will be used, \$4,159,000 for public transportation and \$1,000,000 for social service for aged or poor.

The Town of Carrizozo will receive \$20,106,000 and has two ready-made places to use the money. \$10,003 will go for salaries, leaving \$10,003,000 which will be used in payment for equipment and construction of the new town hall.

General revenue sharing provides federal funds directly to local and state governments.

Lincoln County was the big winner in general revenue sharing with total money allotted for the period July 1, 1974 through June 30, 1975 of \$131,142,000 for capital expenditures and \$22,000,000 for operating and maintenance.

The capital fund has been allocated under general heading of public safety \$29,400,00, environmental protection \$5,000,00, multipurpose and general govt. \$21,742,00, and road equipment and court house improvement \$75,000,00.

Under operating-maintenance \$3,000,00 goes for public safety, \$1,000,00 for environmental protection and \$18,000,00 for health.

Oil tests over, results still mystery

A two man crew was acidizing the Houston Oil & Minerals No. 1 Lewelling deep test well near Three Rivers last week. Speculation continued to run high on the well.

No results of the 9,358-foot deep test were available from Houston Oil & Minerals, nor from the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission, with who results of all oil and gas wells must be filed when completed.

It was known that crews had perforated and run tests in several zones. John Walters, company geologist in the firm's Houston office, said late last week that tests were being run and that no information would be released until tests were completed.

When a well is completed, the owner files with the Oil Conservation Commission the results of the drilling and tests; and if it is a producer, then production allowables are set. Pete Porter, director of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission said. Also, if it is a dry-hole, permission to cap off or plug the hole is required. Request for such permission had not been filed with the district commission office in Artesia, prior to noon today, said Bill Gressett, in charge of that office, nor with the state commission in Santa Fe.

Neither had results of the tests been filed.

Application was made to put down an oil wildcat well. However, in this general area, oil men agree "below 7,000 or 8,000 feet you never know what you might get, if anything." It could be either oil or gas, if a producer is hit. Houston Oil & Minerals has not divulged even that information, and New Mexico Oil-Gas Commission spokesmen said they did not know what sort of tests were being run, for oil or gas.

However, the request for perforations and testing at different levels "indicates something."

A 200-foot cement plug was run from 8,700 feet to 8,900 feet, it was noted, with 5 1/2-inch casing set to the 8,700 foot level.

"There was some cause to set casing and do this testing," one observer commented.

The Loffland Brothers giant rotary drilling rig was taken down and moved to Jemez Springs, and a testing rig was set up on the Three Rivers well site. The testing rig is now gone.

Dick Stamets, technical support chief for the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission, said once the well is completed, the results must be filed with that office. Alamogordo Daily News.

Little folks do big things

The Carrizozo HERO (Home Economics child development, taught by Larue Wetzel, finished the school year with all class members feeling like they had a big hand in helping some little folks accomplish big things. The average mental age in the kindergarten class (as measured by the Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test) was raised by 22 months during this school year. Both Mrs. Wetzel and the Child Development class members felt that this great improvement was possible because of the one-to-one ratio of adult (high school students) to Kindergarten. Every high school student in the course worked in the Kindergarten one hour a day and studied theory of child development during the class period.

They also had a twelve-week period when they brought in pre-schoolers of about 3 and 4 years of age. A few of the students worked some in grade 3. Thus, they were able to get a broader understanding of developmental stages and needs of children.

The term paper for the course consisted of making complete plans for a day-care center. Two of the class members have plans to open up such a center in Carrizozo in the near future. Since they have already had experience in planning learning activities of many different kinds for pre-schoolers, they should be in a position to help some working mothers in caring for their children.

Newscaster loves work

Paul Harvey recently visited Lincoln County and his following radio broadcasts gave our county a lot of good publicity. This article tells some interesting things about Mr. Harvey.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Paul Harvey, the newscaster with the pipe organ voice, is the biggest radio-television personality in Chicago with one of the largest nationwide followings in the news business.

His life-style can be described in a single word — work.

He and his wife, Lynne (whom he calls Angel), have even converted 2 of the 4 floors of their home into office for 7 employees for Harvey's many activities.

In addition to his two daily broadcasts for ABC radio, 5 daily telecasts for syndication in more than 100 cities and 3-times-a-week newspaper column, Harvey writes books and all his own news copy.

Travels for speeches
He is a tall, impressively handsome man with a booming voice that speaks up for that majority of Americans who live between the communications centers of New York and Hollywood.

Privately, he is more reflective than he appears. He travels around the country averaging 3 speaking engagements a week for a variety of civic groups, service organizations and universities.

He often speaks of Angel, to whom he has been married 34 years, and their only son, Paul — a

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concert pianist — during his broadcasts.

Home is very close to his work in River Forest. The first floor consists of offices, as does the 4th floor. The 2nd and 3rd floors are living quarters. In the basement he has rigged up a workshop for his hobby of miniature radio-controlled airplanes.

The 18-room house is colorfully and imaginatively decorated, thanks to Harvey with French provincial pieces. Her bedroom is a study in silver and pink. Paul's has the masculine touch.

He has a dish of oatmeal by himself before dawn, and is at his desk in downtown Chicago before the rest of the world is astir. After a busy day he is home for an early dinner with Angel and young Paul at 5 o'clock. By 8:30 he is in bed asleep.

Harvey has deep religious convictions and counts Billy Graham among his friends. But he is very careful not to become closely associated with men and women who make news for fear of impairing his objectivity.

Harvey is a man of strong convictions and an abiding patriotism. He presented a square mile of his Arizona ranch land to the National Park Service to be reserved for public use in its primitive state.

He takes pride in being the largest one man news network in the world. And his voice thunders in indignation as he reports the news. It comes across as gospel.

School cooks make money

The Carrizozo HERO (Home Economics Related Occupations) course in FOOD SPECIALTY finished the school year with a whopping \$435.00 profit for the class members. This is only the second year for the class and every member made at least some profit during the term in which there were five groups set up as business enterprises.

The Phyllis Dillar Cooking School of three made the most with a profit of \$56.00 for each member. Nancy Dross, Carol Harkey, and Lynn Steinepreis. AT&T Bakers were second with \$45.00 each for Tommy Luercas, Artie Ortiz, and Theresa Siegrist. AGE and Co. Albert Baca, Gilbert Sambrano, Eddie Herrera and Colleen Leach made \$20.00 apiece. During the second semester each "business" was established with a manager, an accountant, and a sanitation engineer on a monthly basis. Jobs were rotated so that every member worked at each job at least one month. The manager's job was to decide on the products to sell, do the buying, and plan the work. The accountant kept records of cash, income, expenses, and accounts payable. The duties of the sanitation engineer were to keep utensils, cupboards, stoves, and floors clean.

They prepared their products and sold them to pupils at school, and filled orders from people in the community. Among the products sold were various kinds of pies, cookies, decorated cakes, pizzas, and burritos. The pizzas and burritos were great favorites with school pupils. Decorated cakes and pies were ordered most by townspeople.

Profits for each business were determined on the basis of their bookkeeping records. Each business had a combination journal and ledger

so that their records could be kept according to double-entry bookkeeping procedures.

Student evaluations indicated clearly that lack of cooperation within the business was the chief deterrent to earning substantial profits. Perhaps excellent learning took place on those groups that did not turn a pretty profit if they finished the year with the knowledge that people must work well together order to be successful on their job.

Sewing and Button Boxes

Measure the sides of a coffee can, up to where the lid will fit.

Fruit Trees Need Iron Good Fruit is not harvested from trees suffering from malnutrition. The quality and color of fruit is dependent upon the condition of the tree and its foliage. Nitrogen applied in late winter and early spring promotes strong vigorous growth, luxuriant leaves, and heavy fruit set. In alkaline soils, certain mineral elements become tied up to the extent they are not available to plants. When this happens, leaves turn yellow -- a condition called "chlorosis."

Chlorotic leaves are unable to function properly and the amount of carbohydrates

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manufactured is reduced, thus reducing the size, quality, and even the color of the fruit. The mineral most commonly deficient under these conditions is iron. Iron-induced chlorosis affects the new growth, turning the leaf tissues yellow while the veins of the leaf remains dark green. Applications of iron sulfate or one of the

iron chelates is necessary to restore the color and vigor to the leaves. These materials may be added to the soil around the plant, or may be applied to the foliage in the form of a spray. In highly alkaline soils, or soils containing large amounts of caliche or other forms of limestone, soil applications may be effective.

Some applications of iron sulfate (commonly called "copperas") to fruit trees should be at the rate of one-half pound per inch diameter of trunk, measured one foot above the ground level. Work the material into the soil surface and water thoroughly. The iron chelates are more effective than iron sulfate; therefore, the rate of application may be reduced to one-fourth pound per inch of trunk diameter. In most soils, leaves will begin to regain their green color in 10 to 14 days.

Some trees fail to respond to soil applications of iron, and only foliar applications are effective. Spray the foliage thoroughly with a solution of one tablespoonful of iron chelate (powder) per gallon of water. It will increase the wetting ability of the spray. Leaves will usually begin to green up within five days following application. It is very important to start the iron applications at first symptoms of yellowing.

FmHA Provides Repair Loans

The Farmers Home Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has initiated a program to further encourage the use of existing housing and provide better homes for low-income rural families through low interest home improvement loans. The agency can now provide "interest credits" to reduce the effective interest rate on loans made to rehabilitate or repair a dwelling that a borrower already owns, and either lives in or will live in once it is brought up to standard. Loans of up to \$7,000 will be made for repairs that will improve and modernize substandard dwellings, so as to provide adequate homes in rural areas. Terms for repayment of the loan may be as long as 25 years. To be eligible for a FmHA home improvement loan with interest credit, the housing located in Chaves or Lincoln County must be outside the city of Roswell. The loans are designed especially for low-income families. Under this program, interest credits can reduce the effective interest rate paid by the borrower to 1 percent if the adjusted family income is less than \$3,000. If the adjusted family income is more than \$3,000 but less than \$5,000, the interest rate will be 2 percent.



ROUND THE CAPITOL

by FRED BUCKLES SANTA FE - State surpluses and reserves will total a huge \$85.1 million June 30 and the legislature should cut taxes sharply next January.

The projected giant balances June 30: Unappropriated general fund cash surplus, \$35 million; general operations reserves, \$20 million; school reserves, \$5 million; permanent severance tax fund principal, \$24.3 million, and severance tax fund interest, \$836,000.

In a new estimate of unappropriated general fund cash surplus State Finance Director Robert Kirkpatrick boosted the balance a big \$14.3 million from \$20.7 million, projected in mid-February after the legislature adjourned, to \$35 million.

Favored areas of tax cuts are: More income tax relief; removal of the state gross receipts (sales) tax from medical bills and increased exemptions from the property tax.

The 1974 Legislature cut general income taxes and provided other income tax relief for single persons and low income brackets. But the sharp upward trend of state tax collections is continuing. The state is not a profit-making business. More tax cuts are in order.

State general fund collections for the 11-month, July-May span of the current fiscal year were up a big \$40 million or 14 per cent over the same fiscal 1972-73 span. May receipts alone totaled \$30.3 million.

Interest received on state deposits, reflecting galloping inflation, was up a huge \$2.8 per cent alone, from \$3.4 million to \$6.2 million for July-May over the same span of fiscal 1972-73.

A Legislative Finance Committee staff report said Curry, DeBaca, Sierra, Union and Roosevelt Counties bought all their highway equipment from Rust Tractor Co., Albuquerque, from July, 1972, through May this year.

The LFC report said Taos, Valencia, Socorro, Rio Arriba and Santa Fe Counties bought all their highway equipment in the same period from Leonard Motor Co., Albuquerque. Harold E. Leonard, head of the firm, is a former state highway commissioner.

The staff report cited various purchase methods used. Design of specifications so that only one bidder could meet requirements; declaring an emergency so that the bidding requirement was eliminated; purchasing on state price agreements.

The LFC report said Leonard Motor Co. accounted for 39.3 per cent of all highway equipment purchases in the period from 22 counties. Rust Tractor Co. accounted for 32.2 per cent, the report said.

Together sales by the two firms totaled almost \$3 million of \$4.1 million spent by the counties for highway equipment in the span.

LFC research analyst David Harris said at least 13 heavy equipment dealers are in business in New Mexico. Border Machinery Co., Albuquerque, accounted for 15.1 per cent of highway equipment purchases.

Harris and LFC members said many apparent

state purchasing law violations stemmed from county officials' ignorance of statutes and procedures.

Sen. C. B. Trujillo, 42, D-Taos, says he is a candidate for Senate majority leader. The top post is being vacated by Sen. Tibbo Chavez, D-Beleh, an unsuccessful Democrat-governor primary candidate.

Gnat, Janice have "fire" visitors

A grass fire set off by lightning last Friday threatened the Gnatkowski home in Ancho. About 5:00 p.m. the Ronnie Eldridges spotted a column of smoke rising over by the ranch. They called to find that Gnat and Janice were in Albuquerque and Pete, alone in the house hadn't seen the smoke. He alerted the fire department in Corona, threw sacks and shovels in the pick-up and took off.

The fire burned its way around the base of a small hill nearby then headed across the pasture toward the house. By that time every available man in Corona turned up along with heavy equipment from the Lovelace Ranch and from the Lincoln Station of the El Paso National Gas Works. They checked the fire within a half mile of the house but not until it had burned nearly three sections, and some of it on the Wilson and Foster land.

Gnat and Janice turned up at 8:00 p.m., surprised at the stream of cars heading for Corona

Fires in all directions

The Lincoln County area is dry and there have been a lot of fires. Luckily none have gotten completely out of control, and so far as is known, the fires have been started by lightning.

Fire on White Sands Missile Range last Friday was one of the worst. It apparently started out west of Red Canyon and burned back to the former Renfro ranch.

Also on the 14th of June, fire on Gallacher Ranch, another in Copeland Canyon, and over the past weekend fires were reported on the Gnatkowski Ranch east of Jack's Peak, east of Corona near the Lincoln-Chaves County line, a fire on Willow Mountain on the 13th, and a fire five miles north of Capitan. The Dimmit Bonds had a fire in the Red-Lake area north of Carrizozo.

Two young people leave us

Two tragic deaths occurred in the past week which have shocked many Carrizozo people who had known these young people and thought the world of them.

On the evening of June 12 Johnny Roberts, son of Marvin Roberts and Maxine Wiesch, took his own life by asphyxiation at the home of his mother in Albuquerque.

Sunday morning Mrs. Greg Duggar was found shot to death in her pickup truck near Mayhill in what sheriff's deputies termed an apparent suicide. Mrs. Duggar reportedly was shot in the forehead with a .22 caliber rifle.

She was last seen alive at a bar in Mayhill with her husband. Time of death was fixed as between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. Saturday. Funeral services were held Tuesday at Cloudfroth with burial at South Park Cemetery in Roswell. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Brumbelow Jr., live in Ft. Worth.

Marvin Roberts was Ford dealer in Carrizozo for many years. Johnny, the son of Marvin and Maxine, graduated from Carrizozo High School with the class of 1965 and moved to Albuquerque with his mother shortly after. His father now resides in Belen.

According to friends of Johnny, he was doing odd-job sort of work around Albuquerque in recent years. Burial was last Thursday in Albuquerque. Johnny is survived by father, mother, half-brother Buddy, and also a half-sister.

The next day, Gnat up most of the night watching for further flare-ups, was out to fix 150 fence posts left charred and swinging. Janice was out to fix up some way to feed at least five lambs at one time out of some 16 left to fend for themselves by ewes who due to the drought can barely feed themselves. . . but she took time out to feed an infant skunk -- not her idea -- from a medicine bottle and no small chore. "You know" she said -- struggling to get the waif to take the tiny nipple -- "the people in Corona are wonderful. If anyone gets in trouble, they are all right there!"
