Half Million dollar recreation area dedication Saturday

Starting with the signing of a contract January 11, 1972, between the Town of Carrizozo and New Mexico State Planning Office, work on a beautiful eighty-acre recreation area has gone forward to produce one of the most beautiful and green areas of the southwest in month of June 1974. Normal rains of July and August will only serve to improve the appearance of the area.

The Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and Finance, under the Land and Water Conservation Act of 1965 provided federal funds in the amount of \$240,000.00, which was administered through the State Planning Office.

The A. N. Spencer family of Carrizozo put up an initial \$240,000.00 to match the federal funds and has added to that amount during the past two years. Former Mayor Johnson Stearns guided much of the beginning work on this project. It was first proposed in 1968 but turned down at that time. In 1972 Mayor Stearns, Councilmen Duff May, Joe Ventura, Vernon Petty and Joe Ortiz got going again and the project was accepted.

Joe Light, manager of the Carrizozo Recreation Center who gets around the country a lot on both golf and bowling trips says - "I expect the golf course to do more for the potential of growth in Carrizozo than all the other facilities and recreation features put together".

All that beautiful grass (seaside bent on greens, Marion and Kentucky bluegrass, red fescue and seaside bent) is watered from three wells, one pumping a steady 230 gallons per minute, another 100 and another 50. One good well, 220 gallon producer, needs pump repairs.

More trees to plant

Area Superintendent Henry Vega said he has 500 fir trees in a nursery on the Area grounds,

Dedication tournament is special

Not every golfer gets to help break in a \$500,000.00 golf course. Local and visiting golfers will have that opportunity Saturday and Sunday in Carrizozo. The tournament is a two-man best-ball handicap affair. Draw for partners and pairings will be made Saturday and nine holes played that day, eighteen on Sunday. Hard to tell now how the pairings will work out and how the new course will respond to the golfing action.

The course has been handicapped and is expected to get tougher as plantings around the course develop. One the trees get bigger, shot placement will become extremely important.

No. 1 hole (314 yards) is par 4 with 3 handicap. There is a slight dogleg right by the big lake so wild shots here are for the catfish. This one of the easiest holes on the course. Golfers Ruben Chavez, Joe Light and Charlie Castillo say this is an easy course if you can hit the ball straight - but real tough for those who let their ball stray into the roughs, which are extremely rough.

No. 2 hole (554 yards) is par 5 with 4 handicap. There are no traps, only slight dogleg right, so two good shots and two putts ought to hole out. No. 3 (357 yards) is par 4 and 7 handicap. Three has a sharp dogleg left. Requires a good 225-yard tee shot. If you can make that, a nine-iron will put you in good putting position.

No. 4 (167 yards) is par 3 and 8 handicap. Lots of nice big greens, all straight away and no problems except what you make.

No. 5 (542 yards) is par 5 and 5 handicap. This hole can be tough. Will take three good shots around a dogleg left to put you in putting distance. Getting in the rough can make this one bad for the score.

No. 6 (359 yards) is par 4 and 3 handicap. Water problems will surely bother a lot of golfers here. First shot is very important to get your ball up to break of dogleg so you will be in position to shoot over the lake.

No. 7 (160 yards) is par 3 and 2 handicap. Again you have to shoot over edge of the lake, needing about a 140-yard shot to clear the water, either that or a cautious approach and take a 4 or 5 for the hole.

No. 8 (400 yards) is par 4 and 6 handicap. It's mostly straight away. Two good shots puts you in putting distance, maybe.

No. 9 (466 yards) is par 4 and 1 handicap. It's the toughest hole on the course. If you can't reach the dogleg in one shot, 250 to 275 yards, you got problems. Once around the dogleg, the rest is easy enough.

Entry fee for the tournament is \$10.00 which gets you a ball, tickets to the bargeeque and dance besides paying your green fee. Probably be a shotgun start for the tournament, meaning that four players will start on Hole One, same on Two and on down the line, putting 36 players in action at one time.

Green fees will be \$1.75 on weekdays, \$2.00 on weekends and holidays, golf carts \$4 for 9 holes, one or two people, \$7.50 for 18 holes.

which will be planted this fall to fill out where some have died. Greens on the golf course will be opened for the first time Thursday and local golfers are invited to try them out.

Watering is being done at night now, Rusty Leslie starting up the sprinklers around 7:00 p.m. and running to midnight. Other helpers at the course include Martine Vega and Mike Montano. Two school boys Lee Vega and Robert Ventura for the summer - plus a lot of unpaid but professional advice and help from Ruben Chavez.

Big day Saturday

Dedication Day, Saturday, June 29, will start at 9:00 a.m. when the grounds open. All people attending this event are invited to register at table set up outside the control house for door prizes to be given during the day. All golfers will register at this same table.

The dedication ceremonies will take place in the parking area adjacent to the control house. Seems to be no way to avoid parking problems on this day. The drive up to Country Club needs to be kept open and most of the parking area will be used for the dedication so people will need to park up and down US 380.

The Alamogordo High School Band, directed by Harold Van Winkle, will arrive in Carrizozo around 9:30 a.m. and this fifty-piece band will perform for dedication visitors starting at 10:30 a.m. or a little earlier.

At 10:00 a.m. a sky diving exhibition is scheduled, plus a golf exhibition by visiting professional golfers. Right now it is known that two prominent lady golfers will be here, Nancy Lopez of Roswell and Nancy Aaronson of El Paso.

Ceremonies start at 11:00

Dedication ceremonies will start promptly at 11:00 a.m. with playing of Star Spangled Banner by the visiting band, followed by flag salute and prayer of dedication by Rev. E. DeBaenst, pastor of Santa Rita Church in Carrizozo.

Johnson Stearns will be master of ceremonies for the occasion. He will welcome all the guests and distinguished visitors. Two governor candidates are expected, Joe Skeen and wife Mary from Picacho and Jerry Apodaca from Las Cruces. Other political figures expected include Mrs. Bruce King, David King, Maurice Hobson, John Conway, Rolla Buck, John Bigbee and Cecil Daniel. Tom Mann, engineer for the project, will be on hand.

A special recognition will be extended to Bill Gallacher, Sabino Vidaurri and Mae Shafer, all of Carrizozo. These three are the only charter members left in Carrizozo Country Club, now life member of the club.

TV coverage expected

Live television coverage is expected with help from Robert Hoffman of Bank Securities who is flying in cameramen from Channel 13. Mark Sloan will be at the controls of the bank plane.

Alvie L. "Unk" Cosper of Nogal has a barbecue pit dug out north of the Country Club and will fill it with about six quarters of beef Friday night and start cooking up a meal for the crowd to be served out of the patio at the club right after the dedication.

Afternoon festivities start at 1:30 p.m. People who want to ride in an airplane should go to the airport where the bank plane will be taking people up. Proceeds from this activity will be split between Carrizozo Hospital Auxiliary and New Mexico Boys Ranch.

At the start of planning for the golf tournament it was thought that since there were so few lady golfers in Carrizozo, that the tournament would be just for men. This situation may be subject to change but for sure - there will be a golf clinic for ladies starting at 1:30 with visiting pros doing the instructing.

20 acres bought back



The South Central Mountain Resource Area will hold their annual meeting at the Holiday Inn in Alamogordo June 27th at 1:00 p.m.



Water rights discussed

Water adjudication and what it means to the water users in the Hondo, Bonito and Ruidoso Valley was discussed by Richard Sims, attorney for the State Engineers Office in Santa Fe.

Mr. Sims discussed water rights and adjudication for over two hours with the 125 people attending the meeting at Hondo. He said that the water in the area has never been legally adjudicated and this will be the largest adjudication ever done in New Mexico. They are presently adjudicating 3000 parcels in the Taos area. The Hondo Basin is expected to have over 5,000 parcels.

Water users in the Bonito area will be receiving summons from the State Engineers Office within a month. This summons will give the number of acres the engineers office feel that the water user is entitled to and the acre feet of water that can be used. If the water user does not agree with this adjudication proposal he should then contact the State Engineers Office. Plans are to have a representative of the State Engineers Office located in the Hondo area. If the water user agrees with the adjudication proposal, he signs and returns it to the State Engineer.

Mr. Sims said that it would take several years for the adjudication to be completed.

Bernard F. Pfingsten Dies

Bernard F. Pfingsten, born at Nogal Mesa April 22, 1902, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed C. Pfingsten, died June 17, 1974.

He spent his early years in Lincoln County and drove the first consolidated school bus route from the Nogal Mesa school to Capitan, starting in 1924.

Later he worked for the late Wm. Ferguson in road construction, moving to El Paso January 7 of 1927. He had lived there 47 years.

He spent 27 months in the Armed Forces in W. W. II. He retired from Vowell Construction Co. in 1966 because of disability and had been in failing health since.

He was married to Winnie Gentry on Nov. 20, 1930. He is survived by his wife, Winnie; two sisters, Emma Armstrong and Pearl Kendrick of Tucumcari; brothers, C. C. of Nogal, W. R. of Tucumcari and Jack of Newberg, Oregon besides several nieces and nephews.

He was a charter member of Coronado Masonic Lodge 1406 A.F. & A.M. and a member of El Maida Shrine, member of El Paso Country Club, Optimist Club, St. Marks United Methodist Church.

Graveside services were held at Ft. Bliss National Cemetery at 11:00 a.m. June 19. Reverend Dick Clemmer officiated.






one of vpry few people left, who remembers the start of Carrizozo Country Club.

They acquired the old Gumm homestead which was an adobe, remodeled it for a club house. Some land known as Coyote Spring was bought and made into a five-green golf course.

The greens were green when it rained, which it did most years, not always but by mid-summer things did, and do now, start greening up around these parts. Was sold in Calcutta at Amarillo tournament for \$35, the buyer got the shakes and sold Bill to brother Harry Gallacher for \$100.00 Bill really repaid his brother by winning \$3850.00 in the Calcutta payoff, this was about 1936.



Supplemental security checks

"On June 1, many local residents will receive their monthly supplemental security income checks. This is the federal program which replaced the aid to the aged, blind, and disabled which was formerly operated by the states." Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative stated today.

"People getting these supplemental security income payments should promptly notify the social security office of changes in their other income. Increases or decreases in other income may affect the amount of monthly supplemental security income payments," Mrs. Graves said. "People getting supplemental security income checks should report changes or expected changes in their wages, self-employment earnings, pension payments, and other income from any source except general increases in social security benefits."

Changes can be reported by contacting any social security office.

People getting supplemental security income checks should also promptly report change of address, marriage, separation, and any other circumstance that might affect their payments, according to Mrs. Graves.
