Two Teachers Resign

New gym bid call August 6

Carrizozo school board waited a bit Tuesday night so Ray Wells could attend opening of town council meeting and then started down a lengthy agenda. Quorum present, President Ziggy Lessau absent, minutes approved, visitors including Mr. and Mrs. Walt Wilson, Mary Ellen Payne, Dan Ware, Oliver Lamb, Paul Payton, Joe Stout recognized.

Supt. Jim Steinepreis said that expenditures for 1973-74 fiscal year just ended were \$425,710, with cash balance of \$36,000 which was transferred to the new year and will be used for capital improvement on the new construction program.

Lunch program had cash balance of \$2,084.01. Activity program had cash balance of \$2280.05, started the year with \$3715.12 and spent \$1542.48.

Supt. Steinepreis had just returned from Santa Fe where he had presented plans for new gym to the State Dept. of Education. There were some questions, none serious. Such as, amount of space in dressing rooms - sufficient; could showers be moved - no; enough storage - probably not but areas in old gym can be used; are water heaters adequate - yes.

Mechanical equipment for the new gym will all be on top including furnaces and fans, piping will also be up above, none under concrete. All systems operate in stages, meaning that one furnace can be turned on low, instead of all going on-and-off for short periods of time. There is no true cooling in the new gym, only plenty of fans to move large amounts of air. Cooling could be added. Rest room facilities on both sides of football field can be used during games, in both new and old buildings.

Board discussed need for outdoor lighting, will ask that poles and lights be installed in new gym area.

Supt. Steinepreis asked architect Joe Stout - where are we with money on the new building, \$239,049.00 available from bonds voted by the district. Stout had no precise answer to this question, bids on the new gym will be called August 6, 1974, and result of this bidding will answer a lot of questions for the school district building program. Stout said he would propose alternates, on frame and truss work, and other items that would give the board some options when bids are opened. Stout thinks bids should come within money available.

New building will have 12,000 square feet, final floor size 150 x 80, making a 96 x 78 room, and 88 x 50 gym floor. Board talked about wood vs. synthetic floor. They will go see new synthetic floor at Weed, which received favorable com-

ment, especially for multiple use building. Architecture of new buildings will tie in with existing structures. Gym will have four cross-court goals, two rectangular glass maincourt goals, all of which fold up, five-row bleachers will fold up, 500 to 550 seating capacity.

The actual completion of design of vocational building, and administration - storage building will not be completed until after August 6 when the amount of money, including \$151,000 capital outlay money, is available.

Dan Ware asked for larger classroom in vocational building, this will be settled after cost of gym is determined.

Resolution passed to include \$19,422 (federal money received for vocational coordinator) in the budget, also to transfer cash balance to new year, and also to put the new \$151,000 in general building fund.

Ruidoso school board, after considerable argument it was reported, has passed up making use \$41,700.00 mobile unit and teacher which would spend nine weeks in each of four Lincoln County schools. The mobile unit and accompanying instruction is for purpose of supplementing require subjects now being taught, showing the need of the subjects as part of vocational programs. Capitan, Carrizozo and Hondo want the program, Corona and, or Tularosa will be asked to make up the fourth school.

Mary L. Maracchini, 4th grade teacher tendered resignation because her husband is being moved to Gallup. Winnie Wilmore, 5th grade teacher, is getting married and will live in Amarillo, she resigned. Two teachers are expected in this weekend, both with masters degrees, for the openings.

Land swap with hospital discussed, school has 75 x 130 piece, hospital 63' x 210' from hydrant to pump. Bob Stearns and Supt. Steinepreis will meet with hospital board.

Board turned down use of school room and piano for private teaching. Gilbert Archuleta notified that he should not drive school vehicles because of citations received.

School still wants to close portion of "D" Avenue between 9th and 10th Streets, also would like to open 9th Street between "D" and "E" Avenues. This closing was first brought up in February 1973, resolution sent to town requesting closing in March 1973. No action resulted. Now the school is presenting request to Carrizozo Planning and Zoning Committee.

Board members present were Ray Wells, Nat Palomarez, Wesley Lindsay and Bob Stearns.

Hickman Released on his own Recognizance

Warren Hickman, 71, of Ruidoso, entered a plea of innocence Monday to charges of involuntary manslaughter in connection with the shooting deaths of two men he said were burglarizing his home.

Hickman entered the plea before Magistrate Judge Austin Pritchett and was released on his own recognizance. Richard Parsons, Hickman's attorney, said a preliminary hearing should be set soon.

Hickman told sheriff's deputies the two men he shot came at him and that he believed they had been struggling with his wife.

The dead men were identified as Thomas Sanders 28, of Mesilla Park, and David Anthony Schlitz 21, of Tempe, Arizona. Officers have a warrant for the arrest of a third man identified as James Lowell Carmichael 23, of Mesa, Arizona.

Hickman said he had been in a basement woodworking shop when he heard noises upstairs. He said he went up and got a .45 caliber automatic. Hickman said the men were removing items from the house. He said one of the men approached him and he fired at him. The second man moved in his direction, and he shot him, a third man ran out of the house.

Smokey's resting place assured

The Forests Sub-committee of House of Representatives today approved legislation sponsored by Congressman Harold Runnels directing that Smokey Bear, the U.S. Forest Service's fire prevention symbol, be returned to his Capitan birthplace at the time of his death. Runnels observing that Capitan is adjacent to the area where the bear was found as an injured cub during the 1950 Lincoln National Forest fire, said his legislation represents "A sincere desire on the part of the citizens of Capitan to see the establishment of a permanent memorial at the community-Smokey-Bear-museum-park."

Runnels, noting Forest service concern, assured the sub-committee members that it was not the "intention of the officials of Capitan to jeopardize the future fire prevention efforts of the U. S. Forest Service."

Runnels also noted that the Forest Service has already adopted another New Mexico bear "Smokey Junior", who is waiting in the wings at Washington National Zoo to assume the symbolic role in the Forest Service's fire prevention program.

The congressman pointed out that Capitan was not asking for any federal funds in the project,

but would establish a memorial as a community project.

Assistant Sec. of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell, in a letter to the sub-committee said the Forest Service had no objection to the legislation, but requested the "Flexibility to work with the people of Capitan" on the project.

He said, "We understand the pride and concern of the people of Capitan for the role New Mexico has played in the history and success of the Smokey Bear campaign. We wish to add our resources and ability in highlighting this history."

Dessie Sawyer's new home Excites the imagination

Dessie Sawyer will spend the first night in her new home tonight. She says that by supertime this evening everything better be ready to go "or else." The way everybody was scurrying around yesterday, you could tell she means it, too.

Rex Allen will be Dessie's first house guest. He is due in tomorrow afternoon, and will stay over for the Saturday doin's which will close out the March of Dimes drive this year.

Rex's band will play for the dance at the Tatum community building, which cranks up at 9 Saturday night.

Dessie's house opening is going to rival a Hollywood premier for glittering personalities. All the big political brass will be there. Harold Runnels and Bruce King are definitely coming.

Methodist Bishop Alsie Carleton will be in to bless the house at 3 o'clock. Dessie is halfway expecting Stanley Marcus, one of America's most prestigious retailers, to drop in. Over the years the Dallas entrepreneur has sold Dessie a boatload, and waits on her personally.

Glenn Werhan says that in 27 years of both commercial and residential building, he's never encountered anything so challenging as Dessie's house, sometimes referred to as New Mexico's Astrodome (because of its vaulting, skylighted ceiling).

"It tested my ability," he confesses. "With all my experience, I needed it." The house has been under construction for 13 months, and as the tempo increased, so have Glenn's personal responsibilities. "I have worked here night and day seven days a week

for the last three months," he says. "I haven't bid a thing (else) for months."

Such a gorgeous home out on the prairies of Southeastern New Mexico always excites the public curiosity, and invariably the guessing begins as to how much it costs.

Dessie says, "It's nobody's business how much it cost." This doesn't stop the guessing, however, and those in the building trade say the guesses should start at a quarter million and go up.

There are more than 12,000 square feet under the roof. The red claytile alone has 16,000 board feet of lumber (1x3's) to rest on. "That's probably more lumber than you have in your entire house," Glenn points out.

The house is not only thing that excites the imagination. The landscaping is magnificent. Bluegrass lawn has been rolled out like carpet, peered off in huge rolls from a grass farm near Moriarty. Adult trees are all over the place, and the house looks like it's been there for 10 years.

There are a lot of familiar faces around the place as the work winds up. Dessie has done her best to use local firms, and they have all done their best. She is delighted with the results, and considers building the house a team project among friends.

Dessie knows that she has one of the most elegant homes in the state. When we suggested this to her, she snapped back a correction: "It's THE nicest one," and then pointed out that she had already been in most of the other big homes in New Mexico.

Dessie is really proud of her "Rancho Chiquito."

Mattie Kelley made music live in Carrizozo

The recent death of Mattie Isabelle Kelley, May 22, was the last of a family that had meant much to Carrizozo since the early 1900's. In 1915 she married Thomas E. Kelley, a mortician in Carrizozo who was also in the hardware business with his father and brothers, Kelley & Sons. The two made their home in Carrizozo where Mrs. Kelley taught music until 1970 when, because of illness, she went to Albuquerque to live with her daughter.

She enjoyed working with and being with young people, and her recitals were the entertainment event of the year. She would spend weeks rehearsing, and they would consist of choruses, dancing, and skits, as well as piano solos to appeal to all tastes.

Mrs. Kelley was organist for the First Baptist Church, the Western Star, and the Carrizozo Women's Club, even though almost totally blind in later years and continued in this capacity until moving to Albuquerque. She also took a very active part in music for the Nogal Mesa Camp

Meeting, which she often attended with all four of her grand children.

Martha Isabelle Thompson was born to Alfred Reid Thompson and Elizabeth Hallman Thompson May 26, 1892 in Johnson County, Texas, the seventh of ten children. She attended Willie Denton College in Joshua, Texas, Landon Conservatory of Music in Dallas, Texas, and Texas Christian University in Fortworth, Texas, majoring in music. She taught music in Alvarado, Texas and in Canyon, Texas and was one of the founders of West Texas University in Canyon.

Her grand children, Kelley, Cynthia, Marcia, and Charles were very special to her as were her great grandchildren, Stephan and Eric Corbett, Matasha and Jason Ning, and Eleana Gordon.

Mrs. Kelley lived with her one daughter, Ruth Corbett in Albuquerque until her death. Funeral services were held May 25 in Carrizozo at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Milford Misener and Rev. Bill Miller officiating. Comel Chapter No. 29, Order of the Eastern Star, officiated at the graveside services in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mattie Kelley was such a lively person, such a fine and helpful friend to all who knew her -- one of those few people who cannot be replaced in the lives of the Carrizozo Community.

Lincoln County assessed valuation, according to the proposed county budget, this year jumped from \$47,005,464 to \$48,600,000, but it was pointed out that a figure of \$47,619,828 would be a much more reliable figure since a reduction in corporate assessment of almost a million dollars and the loss of assessments from personal property and inventory, due to a change in state statutes, amounted to almost two million.

Exemptions for head-of-family and veterans amounted to \$1,419,147, therefore the county is fortunate that it has remained on an even keel with last year's assessed valuation. Many counties throughout the state are reported to have lost ground on property valuation with the removal of assessments for personal property and inventory.

It has been noted that figures in the proposed budget will probably be changed considerably by the State Department of Finance and Administration at the county budget hearing this week. Remember that evaluation figures for the county are on a basis of 33 1/3 per cent of true market value.

The total county budget estimate for 1974-75 shows an increase of about 15 1/2 per cent from \$505,878 last year to \$584,680 for the coming fiscal year.

Various departments (except those with fixed budgets run as follows (percentages are rounded): Administration; 9 percent increase from \$43,500 to \$47,425. Maintenance and Operating of Buildings and Grounds: 8 percent increase from \$27,660 to \$29,896. Recording and filing (Clerk): 18 1/2 percent increase from \$30,276 to \$35,969. Property Assessments: (including two new employees required by state) 14 percent increase from \$69,912 to \$79,758. Collections (Treasurer): 17 percent increase from \$25,728 to \$30,214. Law Enforcement (Sheriff's Department): 16.5 percent increase from \$88,292 to \$102,971.

A whopping increase of 45 percent was shown in the County Road Fund from \$311,736 to \$454,000. The line item Capitol Outlay accounted for almost \$100,000 of the estimate. A total of \$240,000 was carried over from the 1973-74 budget to the new year.

Total improvements and new land placed on tax rolls for 1974 amounted to \$9,270,951 with the 33 1/3 percent valuation coming to \$3,090,317.

Mill levy for the county will remain the same as last year but with 3/4 mills being added for county hospitals.

It was noted that the county still has three years to pay on a loan from the state for the reappraisal completed last year and that state law required the county to go on to a computer system by 1976. The county will not buy the computers but will lease time from an established firm for use of the computer.

Lincoln County now has a total of 15,000 taxpayers.

The county budget hearing, with the State Department of Finance and Administration, will be held at the Lincoln County Courthouse Friday, June 28 at 9:00 a.m. The meeting is open to the public.
