Zoning Committee approves street closing, power station site

If the City Trustees accept the recommendations of the new Carrizozo Zoning and Planning Committee, two of the town's big problems may be solved.

The committee met with Bill Mershon, Otero County Electric Co-op System Engineer, Tuesday night to discuss the placement of an additional sub-station in the town.

The Chamber of Commerce, the school, the Recreation Center and a number of business have for some time expressed concern about the power deficiency in the town.

During peak power use periods the existing sub-station is inadequate for the town's needs which has caused damage to electrical equipment as well as inconvenience to citizens.

Mershon said that the Co-op was aware of the problem and Carrizozo was a top priority project. The proposed new sub-station will be located at the corner of B Avenue and 8th Street. The structure will be 20 feet high and 18 by 12 feet in area.

Committee members asked Mershon if it would be possible to put the sub-station in either the proposed industrial park or in some other non-residential area.

Four main points of concern were expressed over the planned location: safety, TV interference, humming noise and appearance.

Mershon said that the Co-op had agreed to bring the main 25,000 volt line into town, around the southwest, underground. He said the sub-station would be fenced with an "unclimbable" 10 foot chainlink which met the strictest safety standards. He said there would be no television interference in the neighborhood and that any noise would not be audible from 25 to 40 feet. Further he said that at the existing station, behind the Four Winds, the noise was not audible at the fence line.

Mershon told the committee that the Co-op had agreed to landscape the station with trees and perhaps other shrubs provided the city would water the plants.

As to the feasibility of locating the sub-station further from town, the engineer said there were several reasons it would be impractical: 1. There would be a loss of power coming into town which would defeat the purpose of the additional sub-station. 2. The proposed location has existing four-way power lines. 3. It is close to heavy electrical users who are now having problems. 5. Other locations would probably mean bringing the main 25,000 volt line overhead which would create more problems for the city in appearance. 6. A location not on a four-way power line would require construction of more unsightly overhead lines and a considerable increase in cost.

Mershon explained that the town operates on 2500 volts at the present. The sub-stations convert the 25,000 volt main line down to the town's 2500 volts. With the construction of the additional sub-station the Co-op plans to boost the town's voltage up to 4160 volts.

He said that without the additional station, the only way to make the power step-up would be to shut off all electricity for 18 to 18 hours.

After considerable discussion the committee voted to recommend to the City Trustees construction of the sub-station at the proposed location. The committee's resolution in effect,

said that while it would be preferable from a beautification position to have the sub-station in another area, the urgency of the power needs and the agreement by the Co-op to put in an underground cable and to landscape the station led the committee to recommend that the Co-op be urged to proceed on the highest priority with the construction. Further, the committee asked the city to make arrangements to provide water for the proposed landscaping.

The motion carried unanimously. School Superintendent Jim Steinepreis appeared before the committee with a request from the School Board to close the portion of D Avenue between 8th Street and 10 Street and that the property revert back to the school.

Steinepreis said that a dangerous situation existed with students crossing the street many times a day. "Even though bus service is provided to students outside the legal distance, many parents still drive their children to school. Many students drive their own cars, and some ex-students use the through street before, at noon, and after school. The buses and parents can unload students at the intersection of 8th and D Avenue, or 10th and D Avenue."

He said the request had first come from the students and had been discussed by the teachers and administration. The Board sent a resolution to the city on March 28, 1973 requesting the closing but had received no reply.

If the street is closed, the school plans to put a permanent barrier with a walk for student crossing at approximately mid-point. The area gained would be used for teacher and student parking and would be controlled by the school. He said further with the planned construction of administrative offices and a storage facility, the closing would make possible a delivery area to the storage building without creating any danger to the students using the street.

The committee unanimously voted to recommend the street closing to the City Trustees and expressed the idea that such action was long overdue.

In other action the committee approved an application of Arnold Boyce for the placement of two mobile homes on Birch south of 14th between Aspen and G Street. The zoning ordinance permits mobile homes in that area. Boyce has agreed to follow the section of the ordinance which requires tie downs and skirting.

Attending the meeting were Chairman Tom Ward, Jackie Spencer, Clara Snow, Albert Roberts, Fred English and Romona Ortiz.



Discusses handing over rec facilities

Town takes cemetery management.

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees agreed to assume management of Evergreen Cemetery. City Attorney Archie Witham was requested to work out the details. The decision came at the request of the Carrizozo Evergreen Cemetery Association which has done an outstanding job of improvement and up-keep in the past years.

At the same time the trustees discussed the possibility of putting the town's recreational facilities into a separate non-profit corporation. No decision was made and a request was made for advice from the town recreation committee.

Ed Jones appeared before the group urging action on the number of dogs running loose and untaged. The trustees agreed that strict enforcement of the dog ordinance is necessary and that immediate action will be taken.

Jones also requested that the town remove the Lone Star sign on Highway 380 and E Avenue when the sign was erected it was on private property but since then the city has acquired the land. City Attorney Witham was instructed to investigate the proper course of action.

It was reported that the new city hall is 99 percent complete but landscaping remains to be done and no date has been set for moving to the building.

In other action, the trustees decided that the lots which the town has taken over because of paving leins will soon be put up for sale at a public auction. At the suggestion of Mayor Bill Payne the trustees voted to sell the lots for as little as 10 percent down with three years to pay the balance. The sale will be advertised and the lots marked.

City hall reports that Edmond Davis, who recently moved to Carrizozo after retiring from the Armed Forces, will be the new special policeman under Marshall Choncho Morales. George Vega will serve as emergency relief policeman.

New gas well site changed

Natural gas speculation in the area is continuing with the announcement of a new site planned north of Alamogordo.

The projected new well is 20 miles southeast of the Houston Oil & Minerals No. 1 Leavelling south of Three Rivers, which still is being tested.

Crews of Lofland Bros., Farmington oil and gas well drilling contractors, are to be moving equipment onto the new location and will start rigging up as soon as the site is cleared.

The rig originally was scheduled to spud in on a site near the old Three Rivers rodeo arena on the former Tom Ryan ranch by the middle of this month. That site had been designated as the No. 1 Leavell.

However, Houston Oil & Mineral reported that test well has been suspended temporarily and the Lofland rig ordered to the location 20 miles south.

Location of the newest site staked in the gas exploration is the NE 1/4, Section 2, Township 15 South, Range 10 East, on state land. Earlier, a drilling site had been designated in the NW 1/4 of 2-15-10e, and site clearing had started. That location was almost a mile west of the new site, but in the same section.

F. L. (Bob) Boyce, Alamogordo contractor, is clearing the site for the new deep test.

Bill Gressett, New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission district office chief at Artesia, said official paper work had been received on the proposed No. 1 Leavell well earlier this week, but his office had been asked verbally in a long distance telephone conversation to hold up processing that application.

Reason for delaying the test well on the Leavell site at the Three Rivers rodeo arena was not given.

Company officials continue to keep a tight security on results of tests being run in the No. 1 Leavelling, which was punched to a depth of 9,350 feet by Lofland Bros. crews.

Unofficial reports ate that four levels are being tested in the No. 1 Leavelling which was spudded in mid-March.

Man wanted for murder, found dead in motel

Manuel Rodriguez, 40, of Denver Colorado, was found dead in a local motel room. Death was attributed by Deputy Medical Examiner Ray Clark as caused by a self-inflicted gun-shot wound in the chest.

Rodriguez was wanted by the Police Department in Denver, Colorado on a charge of murder. Sheriff Leandro Vega reported that Denver police contacted a law enforcement agency here on a tip that Rodriguez had called his ex-wife in Denver asking for money.

Also Denver police warned that this subject was armed and dangerous, that he had shot and killed his present wife in Denver, Friday and had made threats that he would not be taken alive and would shoot it out with the police.

At 11:00 p.m. Sunday, local law enforcement officers led by Sheriff Leandro Vega proceeded to the local motel to make the arrest. The officers found the door locked and no response. The motel door was forced open and Rodriguez was found dead in bed, with a fully loaded .25 automatic pistol nearby. Sheriff Vega reported that he had contacted homicide detectives in Denver and had reported to them the death of Manuel Rodriguez, who they wanted for murder.

Vega stated that the detectives had informed him that Rodriguez was a car salesman for Burk Chevrolet Company of Inglewood, Colorado. He had a good record in Colorado before, but had been having family problems for a couple of weeks which finally climaxed in the shooting death of his wife.

Rodriguez was taken to the Clarke's Chapel of Roses Mortuary. Arrangements are being made to return his body to Denver for burial.

The commissioners also appointed Carol Ramey as acting County Manager for 90 days. Jim Steinepreis, Alton Whittaker, Johnson Stearns and Bob Stearns appeared at the meeting in behalf of the hospital and the school to request a trade of land between the hospital and the school. Steinepreis explained that the land which adjoins the hospital and school was needed for new construction. The hospital board has agreed that the hospital would also benefit from the exchange which will be on an equal value basis. The commissioners gave approval pending appraisals.

In other action the County approved partial payment for the new Lincoln water system and accepted a Peace Officers liability insurance plan.

The entry fee of \$20.00 will be jack-potted among the 2nd, 3rd and 4th place winners. Also a large trophy presented by the Security Bank of Ruidoso will be presented to the winner. This is a traveling trophy.

Awards will be presented on Sunday afternoon before the Sunday afternoon performance of the Billy the Kid Pageant, August 4th, 1974.

A Teaspoon of Tips on Roses
 Watch your roses, they may need iron. You may have a rose bush with leaves that are almost white and some leaves that are turning yellow. Iron produces the green color of the leaf. When plants cannot obtain iron, they fail to manufacture chlorophyll, iron chlorosis can be controlled with an application of supplemental soluble iron, made when the symptoms appear.

Some use iron sulfate (sometimes called copers) and iron chelates. These are more soluble. The roses are lovely now so give them a little boost!!!

Spread over dough and roll length-wise into a roll. Cut into rolls and let rise until double, then cook at 375 degrees about 25 min. When they are done ice them with powdered sugar.

Here are some more hints that children enjoy: 1. When making popcorn balls, form them around a lollipop for double-treat.


2. For checkered toast use your waffle iron. 3. Use leftover cake frosting for graham cracker sandwiches.

National Forests lift restrictions

Southwestern Regional Forester Wm. D. Hurst announced that smoking and campfire restrictions on National Forests in New Mexico were lifted last week, with one exception.

The only National Forest area where the restrictions remain in effect is the Carson National Forest west of the Rio Grande, including the Canjilon, El Rito, Jicarilla and Tres Piedras Ranger Districts which were not sufficiently moistened by recent rains, Hurst said.

The restrictions limit smoking and campfires to developed camp and picnic grounds.

In Arizona, Hurst said, the Coronado National Forest in the south was reopened to normal use. Campfire and smoking restrictions remain in effect for the Apache-Sitgreaves and Kaibab National Forests. The closure order for the Coconino, Prescott and Tonto National Forests will continue until the fire danger is reduced by rain.

Scattered showers over New Mexico and parts of Arizona brought some relief from one of the longest and most damaging forest fire seasons in Southwestern history. Hurst urged continued caution with fire in all forest and range lands noting that the danger, while reduced, would remain for some time.
