As eventually happens when bad problems are left untended, the innocent suffer which was the case in Carrizozo Monday.

The Nat Chavez Family of mother and three young children started from their house for town. Just outside their front door, Gabriel age six stopped to pet a large German Shepherd dog which was not too friendly. The dog jumped him and clawed him in the eye.

The boy was taken immediately, about 10:00 a.m., to Dr. Amy Barton at the clinic in Carrizozo. Dr. Barton determined that the boy needed special help and sent the Chavez family to Alamogordo. There a doctor made arrangements for them to see an eye surgeon in

Las Cruces.

The family drove to Las Cruces and Gabriel had eye surgery Monday night. Wednesday the doctor was expected to tell the folks how much damage there may be.

Gabriel will be in the hospital in Las Cruces the rest of the week at least. He will start to school in the second grade if he recovers in time.

Word received at the News was that the owners of this dog had already been contacted by the police prior to this incident.

## Clarification of duties needed -- Council rehires Johnny Johnson

At a special meeting of Carrizozo town council last Thursday, Johnny Johnson was rehired as public work superintendent (not town manager) after being relieved of his duties by the same council on July 17.

The position filled by Johnson has commonly been called that of town manager and thought of in that light by a great many people in town - such is not the case.

Johnson's official title is "public works superintendent" and his duties are as follows (in brief): From Chapter 10 of Carrizozo Municipal Code: The public works superintendent shall have charge of the superintending of all public works as follows:

(A) Streets and alleys: He shall supervise the grading, surfacing, repairs and maintenance of all streets and alleys.

(B) Sewers: He shall supervise the installation and maintenance of all sewer lines in the town.

(C) Water: He shall supervise the installation and maintenance of all water mains and water services.

(D) Equipment: He shall have charge of and supervise the repairs and up-keep of all public works equipment.

(E) Employment and supervision: He may employ, with the consent of the Mayor and the Board, such help as is needed to carry on the work of the Town, such help to be directly under his supervision.

(F) Other duties: The superintendent shall be responsible for accomplishment of such other work of the Town including health and sanitation which the Mayor may from time to time assign to him.

(G) To make reports: The superintendent shall present to the Board at its regular meeting each month a written report of the public work accomplished the preceding month and also, as far as can be forseen, public work planned for the current month. (1959 Code.)

## Mayor actually in charge

Article 14-10-6 of New Mexico Statutes actually assigns the duties of running the town to the Mayor as follows:

Mayor - has authority to appoint, supervise and discharge employees

A. Subject to the approval of a majority of all members of the governing body, the mayor shall:

(1) Appoint all officers and employees except those holding elective office.

(2) Designate an employee to perform any





## Subscription fund for hospital

A determined group of Lincoln County citizens are staging a last ditch battle to keep the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo open.

At a County Commissioners meeting last week the room was packed with folks seeking a solution to the problems of financing the hospital.

Two major problems are (1) an additional doctor to assist Dr. Amy Barton with the medical problems of this large end of the county, and (2) funds to make up for a projected deficit in September.

It is felt that an additional doctor, who could do minor surgery and obsterics, would put the hospital budget in the black.

A steady recruiting program for such a doctor is underway and has had some response.

In the meantime several proposals have been made. The most promising seems to be a voluntary monthly subscription to a fund to be participated in by every family in the area. It is indicated that a number of citizens would be willing to do more than their share on such a program.

Big problem is a deadline set by the County Commissioners and the hospital board. The hospital is able to hold its own through the month of August but come September, unless the financial problems look ovable, it is felt that the hospital will probably be limited in operation, only an emergency room facility.

Along with the Hospital Auxiliary, The Chamber of Commerce, Service Organizations,

SCMRA meets here

The South Central Mountain Resource Area met at the Carrizozo Recreation Center Tuesday at 1:00 with Chairman Bill Gage presiding. Dan Wright gave the invocation and Mayor Bill Payne welcomed the group to Carrizozo.

Mr. Gage introduced guest speaker Tom Keyse, Executive Secretary of the State Natural Resource Commission. Mr. Keyse outlined the commission's duties. He stated that in addition to being the administrative and coordinating leadership body, they are charged with the research and conservation development of all waters. The State Committee develops and assists the local Districts with a comprehensive plan for natural resources. They secure and maintain assistance with both state and federal agencies and assist in land use planning.

He mentioned that the Executive Secretary can sit in on the water quality control committee. He noted that a member of the State Committee has been chosen a commissioner on the Coal Surface Mining Commission which is quite an honor because all other commissioners are with state and federal agencies.

Mr. Keyse said that one of the Commission's future objectives is to maintain their work with land use planning. Presently they have a contract with a photographer-public relations man to package a booklet on land use planning for the interest of the public. Two members of the SCMRA, Lewis Merritt and Bob Bell, serve on the State Committee.

Marion Strong, State Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, was introduced and gave a brief summary of the RC&D movement.

Stan Green, Alamogordo Daily News, was presented a plaque from the SCMRA for his loyal support to the organization. Also Bill Gallacher, Robert Bell, Bill Gage, Howard Abercrombie, Lewis Merritt, and Doc Dean were presented "Aide de Camp" certificates from Governor Bruce King. The Governor's office also sent new U.S. and state flags to replace those lost in the forest fire at Weed, N.M.

Six new projects were accepted by the Steering Committee. All will benefit this area. One concerns a water resource study for the town of Carrizozo. Another concerns improving the county road to the Nogal Mesa Camp meeting. A request for an overall plan to study the Nogal Canyon area was submitted by the Lincoln County Commissioners.

The next meeting will be held in Ruidoso September 30th.
