### Kidnapping of girls happened north of Carrizozo

Three convicts, who escaped from state prison in Colorado made it to Lincoln County, New Mexico along about 5:00 p.m. Friday driving a camper pickup.

At this time two girls from Alamogordo, Betty Jane Tucker 23, and Janice Lafever 22, were driving up US54 to Albuquerque. The convicts passed them, turned around and caught up with the girls' Datsun, forced it to stop by firing one shot.

According to Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr., the Datsun and pickup were driven up the George Straley road, off US54, and the

Datsun left there while the convicts and girls went on through Carrizozo, to Roswell, to Lovington and on into Texas.

Lee Straley called the sheriff department Sunday morning about an abandoned car, Deputy Sheriff Dave Wheeler and State Police Officer Albert Clous of Corona went to make the investigation. They dusted the car for finger prints, found ammunition and prison sweater in the Datsun which was brought to Carrizozo by Means Motor and later impounded by the FBI.

The convicts, according to published reports, were on a trip of murder and revenge. They shot

and killed T. L. Baker, a rancher at Rotan, Texas who had testified against them, the girls still along at this time and fearing for their lives. Later they shot and killed a woman, for the same reason as the Baker killing.

The girls were let out of the camper at Graham, Texas and walked to nearby motel where they called police. Report Tuesday was that the men had been caught near Stephenville, one killed. Sheriff Vega, said the possibilities exist that kidnapping charges against the remaining two could be filed in Lincoln County.

United Trinity Methodist Church in Carrizozo put on a full weekend of activities for dedication of its church three years ago and like them so well that the barbeque event has been continued. This time a trip to White Oaks is planned with people who know the territory like Bill Gallacher and Roy Harman as guides.

Methodist churches in Capitan and Carrizozo join in for the special activities. Bishop Carleton will preach in Capitan at 9:00 a.m. Sunday and again in Carrizozo at 11:15. The usual starting time in Carrizozo has been moved up 15 minutes to allow the Bishop more time in Capitan.

Following the 11:15 worship service, Capitan and Carrizozo congregations will put on a potluck dinner with all guest at church invited to stay and eat.

The new district superintendent, Dr. Richard Whitman and wife of El Paso will be among the special guests present.

Saturday evening, August 31, all Methodists and friends of this church are invited to a cowboy barbeque at the Valley of Fires Park. In past years this has been a most joyful occasion with beautiful weather, wonderful food, and lots of time for visiting -- no formal program planned.

Men of the church are doing the barbeque, women are providing slaw, rolls, beans, chili, coffee, lemonade, and other items.

### Maggie Jump has a green thumb

When you step through the front gate of Maggie Jump's place you are in a land of lush vegetation and beautiful flowers. Except for paths every square foot of her 40 ft. lot is filled with vegetables and flowers in a lovely mixture. The front gate is flanked on one side with a hazel nut tree--on the other side is an olive tree and there are olives on its branches. There is also a fig tree with figs beginning to ripen.

Shasta daisies, Gladiolas, Gardenias, Zinnias, tubs filled with blooming Nasturtiums, Tobacco plant, Asters, Marigolds and Roses are all in bloom now. She has a hedge of roses in front of which she has planted tomatoes to keep aphids and mildew off the roses. The tomato vines have taken over but the roses are blooming under the tomato vines.

On one side of her porch growing up a wire trellis are seedless grape vines. On the north porch post an old teakettle is hanging filled with purple and rose peonias that are cascading

down the sides. Sunflowers, some as tall as 8 ft., with huge flower heads are along her north fence.

In the vegetable line she has a row of corn along the south border, several varieties of squash, zuni beans 18 inches long, pumpkins, (one huge one weighing over 60 lbs), canteloupe, and tomatoes by the truck load. You name it--she has it!

Maggie says she talks to her plants and gives them a lot of tender, loving care. She carried on foot about 250 buckets of good dirt from a neighboring lot to improve the soil. And all her efforts have paid off. She has canned over 200 quarts of fruits and vegetables and in this day of food shortages that is really something.

### Richardson land title upheld by New Mexico Supreme Court

A case tried in the 12th Judicial District Court, with Judge George Zimmerman presiding, last year had to do with Cleo Duggar contesting title to land formerly owned by Jiggs Sidwell and bought from Sidwell by Phil Richardson. Mrs. Duggar contended that Richardson and his predecessor did not have sufficient description in their deed.

Carrizozo Atty. Bill Payne represented Richardson. The District Court found in favor of Richardson. The case was appealed to the N. M. Supreme Court which ruled last Friday that Richardson had good title, that a surveyor could look at the deed and go out and find property lines on the ground. The substance of the legal action is to give Richardson clear title to his recent purchase.

FIRST GAME: AT RUIDOSO SEPT 6TH

Eight more days and counting. For us football fanatics in Carrizozo that is when football season will once again come to town (besides that which reaches us via TV of course).

By football, I mean Grizzly football, which is of course the best football around. If anybody wants to argue that point, they can go back to 1960 and total up the number of wins and Championships in the last 14 years. They would come up with a record that will be unbeatable in high school football (regardless of last year).

With eight more days before the first game of the season, head-coach Levon Webb is down to a 25 man squad; but is optimistic about the coming season and well pleased by progress being shown by his team.

Coach Webb says he won't know how good this strategy will work until the first couple of games of the season, which are Ruidoso September 6 (there), and NMMI September 13 (here).

Sure hope all the hard work coach Webb and his assistantcoaches, coach McVeigh and coach Sosa, and most of all the Grizzly squad have put in pays of in a good season for our local team.

A case in the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo took all of Tuesday and the jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the amount of \$7,000.

The case stemmed from a contract entered into by Ralph Gordon with Jean Shipley dba Sullivan Construction Co. of Ruidoso. At about that time Gordon allegedly gave the \$7,000 to Dan Sullivan who was to build a cabin for Gordon. Shipley was a partner in the construction company.

Contract was made in July 1973. Only work ever done was foundation for the cabin. Attorneys for Shipley attempted to prove she was not a partner in the construction company, jury thought she was. Sullivan reportedly had no money so Gordon sued Shipley for breach of contract.

**HOSPITALITY FOR OUR BIRDS:**  
There are lots of Hummingbird feeds hanging around Nogal - and it has been great fun watching them. The prime food is sunflower seeds. Birdseed has become a big business. Around Washington, D.C. alone, more than 5 thousand tons is fed every year. Don't feed birds salted peanuts, it kills them. Some reputable students of nature discourage winter bird feeding, and say in effect that it corrupts the native self-reliance of wildlife, that a natural diet is better, that is if they can find a natural diet. Most experts believe that winter feeding permits more birds to escape starvation during the critical coldest months when natural food is likely to run low. Roger Torý Peterson says that feeders saved at least a million birds in Britain during the cold and snow. Other professionals, including those in federal and state fish and wildlife agencies, recommend winter feedings. The time to start feeding is now - if you don't have a feeder start out with bread - and a little suet - this will bring all kinds to your door. You will get a little squirrel or two. It's fun to give it a try, some of you Nogal children.





Behrens in 1927, spent considerable time and money here in excavation work in a fruitless attempt to locate J. H. Tunstall's burial site.

This item was written up in the Lincoln County

News, in 1927, by John A. Holey who was editor at that time.

The two cousins are returning to the home of Charles Behren in Lindsay, Calif. Charles is a producer of oranges for Sunkist. Afterwards, Hilary Tunstall-Behrens will return to London. I noticed coming up the road that Mr. and Mrs. Baker have done some plastering on their house. It really looks nice.





# Notice and Warning

The Town of Carrizozo Ordinance concerning dogs, among other things, provides:

1. Annual Rabies Inoculation,
2. Annual Town License,




