

# Many choice lots for auction of municipal property

The first public auction of municipal owned real estate ever to be held in Carrizozo, New Mexico will take place on September 14 at 1:30 p.m. in Spencer Park.

On this Saturday a total of 32 separate parcels of land will be offered for sale, some of which tie in nicely with adjoining lots, but all will be offered separately with no minimum bid required on any offering with only one exception.

There is a small house, said to be in sound condition, on Lots 2 and 3, in Block 5 of O.P. Addition. A minimum bid of \$1500 is asked on this property, located across to the north of the courthouse.

All of the offering were acquired by the town

through default of payment on paving liens. All property sales will be made free of any incumbrance, and all have paving on one or more sides.

Most of these lots are located between "E" Avenue and US380 highway, and most in a good residential area of the town. Lot 12, Block 33 is across the street north of Laabs Field, on corner of 8th and "C" Avenue, a nice, clean property in the school area.

Of considerable interest will be the several properties with frontage on US 380. All of Blocks 22 and 53 are for sale, US380 cuts diagonally through these blocks so the buyer will get highway frontage on both sides. Block 53 is a

beautiful site at 5th and "G". Block 22 is in Boulevard Addition with approximately 500 feet of highway frontage.

Some buyer could get property on all four corners at the intersection of 6th Street and "F" Avenue. These items include Lots 1 and 2 in Block 49, Lot 12 in Block 48, Lot 7 in Block 15, Lots 4-6 in Block 14.

Another unusual offering will be the corner lot across from Blakely Studio and back of Petty residence. This corner includes three lots on "E" Avenue and 11th Street. Lot 28, Block 3, Lot 12, Block 3 and S100 of Block 49. All three in the O.P. Addition.

Lots of wide open space on "E" Avenue will be

sold. Lots 1-2-3-4 in Block 48 lie just across street from Chapel and Payton Property. The W 1/2 of Block 55 is corner lot on "E" and 5th west of Charley Castillo home. Lot 5, Block 11 in Boulevard Addition runs 50X150 feet, along "E" Avenue and adjoins W 1/2 of Block 55. Lot 5 in Block 12 on "E" is north of Drexel Boulevard, a street that has never been opened.

Lots 29 and 30 in Block 4 are north of courthouse next to Jimmy-Lucero residence.

Lots 1 and 2 on corner of "H" and 8th adjoin Block 14 near Recreation Center.

Lot 10, Block 48 and Lot 3 of Harkey Replat are side by side in center of block on "F" Avenue between two houses.

Lot 1, Block 50 is real nice corner lot next to Fred Vega Home.

Lots 1 and 12 in Block 51 are across from Spencer Park on 6th Street and "H" Avenue with approximately 60 feet of frontage on US 380.

The Lincoln County Hospital Auxiliary has received official word from the National Health Service Corps that this area has been designated as a "critical medical shortage area"; that the population to be served for medical purposes is 4,773. As a result of this designation, we are now eligible to file application with the National Health Service Corps for the services of a second physician to establish a private practice in this community to service the designated area; thereby relieving our present physician Dr. Amy S. Barton, whose practice has proved to be quite large and covering an extensive area.

Application requesting the assistance of the National Health Service Corps must be in Dallas by September 9, 1974. The application should include letters pledging support of a second physician from organizations and individuals in our area. A coupon is attached for your convenience - just sign and return it by September 7 adding your support to this effort.

It was suggested by the NHSC that an organization be formed to funnel all information to and from the NHSC. No present organization in the area can be used since other organizations are not totally involved in the search for a second doctor for the community. (While Rotary, the Chamber of Commerce and the Hospital Auxiliary to name a few, have worked on the project, they also are doing other projects).

This matter is being consummated at the present time, and we are, therefore, soliciting membership, to be marked by an "X" and your signature.

## Art show for three days

Citizens Bank of Carrizozo will host an all gallery show from Galeri ad Alamo of La Trasteria Art Center of Alamogordo, Sunday from 2 to 4 and Monday and Tuesday, September 9-10 during baking hours.

Featured artists will be Kenneth Wyatt of Tullia and Ramon Rice of Santa Fe.

Wyatt is an artist, evangelist, after-dinner speaker, poet, and humorist, collected by family members of the entertainment world, and many Congressmen. Painter of the West, the working cowboy and the Quarter Horse as they are today, 1974. ## Irrigation project doubles O-Bar-O Ranch carrying capacity

Art Kudner of Grasonville, Maryland is the son of former owner of O-Bar-O Ranch. A few years ago Mr. Judner bought this ranch property out near the Nogal turnoff and more recently has done a lot of water exploration and installed two irrigation systems.

He told the News last week that the 450 acres or more under irrigation have doubled the livestock carrying capacity of the ranch. Also the irrigated crops have had a very favorable effect on cost per cow unit.

In a manner of speaking, the irrigation project has drought proofed the livestock operation some what. Normal rainfall in this area is 15 inches a year. They will put another 11 inches, or what is necessary depending on the rainfall, on the land bringing total up to 26 inches from natural and irrigated sources.

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# Our Community Reflects 1973 - 74 Chamber of Commerce Accomplishments



## LETTER TO:

Members of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce (and to the individuals, organizations - public and private - and institutions which, taken in whole, make up the entire Carrizozo community.

## FROM:

The Board of Directors (and the members) of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce.

## SOME BACKGROUND:

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is youthful, having been reorganized in its present entity approximately one year ago with 64 members. Despite this youthfulness, the Chamber has a list of accomplished projects, a list of projects nearing fruition, and a list of proposed projects either in planning or initial stages of which a much larger and older organization might be proud.



## PRIORITY TASK TOLD:

The new Chamber attacked first priority to a cleanup of Carrizozo. It was determined that this could not be accomplished without helping those charged with the legal responsibilities for enforcing cleanup standards to acquire the tools with which to work. The Chamber, accordingly:

1. Undertook a block-by-block, lot-by-lot survey of the Town of Carrizozo, the aim here, obviously, was to determine not only where to start but what standards to apply: which properties constituted nuisances, dangers, hazards to safety, health, sanitation? Which were rundown as to need demolition? Which could be repaired and restored? and the like.

2. This survey accomplished, the Chamber presented its results to the Town Board of Trustees as a basis upon which they might build the necessary legislation. It was accepted on that basis. The Board of Trustees agreed and is currently laying the legal groundwork to implement a set of standards from which - in future - unsightly and unsafe situations will be eliminated before they can begin. Some results of this activity are already apparent: some property owners, as a result of the campaign already underway, have chosen not to wait for ordered cleanup but to do this on their own motion. For this of course, the Chamber is grateful and recommends this as a course of action for others.

3. The Chamber threw its combined weight behind a proposition passed by Carrizozo Trustees which is tied to the whole program of washing Carrizozo's physical face: it backed the adoption by the trustees of Phases II and III of a long-range Comprehensive City Plan - to the end that future development will meet reasonable standards of appearance and safety.

4. From the above activities came the creation of a Town Planning and Zoning Commission - and the passage of a zoning ordinance. These developments will protect property values and help, also, in making available federal and state funds for a number of community-wide projects already begun or contemplated.

(The Chamber understands that none of these things could have taken place without the free-given cooperation of Carrizozo elected officials, businesses, organizations, and individuals. For this cooperation so generously extended, the Chamber extends its collective gratitude.)

some skilled and semi-skilled personnel would be available. This, of course, would help take up the unemployment slack here at home, making it possible for Carrizozo residents to have the benefit of new jobs created by the industrial acquisition programs of the Chamber.

## TOURISM:

Despite the relatively high income Carrizozo earns from tourism, this area of endeavor represents an untapped lode of income. The Chamber, therefore, undertook a project coordinated with other organizations - a "Welcome Hunters" program, hopefully to be an annual affair. Incoming hunters were met at highway stations with coffee and doughnuts, information and the like. The Chamber awarded a rifle for the biggest deer rack brought in and in a raffle awarded a sleeping bag. From this admittedly modest beginning the Chamber hopes to build until hunters from all over the region pick Carrizozo for a base.

The Chamber is undertaking to expand those tourist-drawing facilities Carrizozo already possesses. For example, the Chamber is in the middle of working for the establishment of a Water Canyon Recreational Area.

And the Chamber cooperated with the opening of the Carrizozo Golf Course and Park. The Chamber also provided the various state organizations concerned with tourism all possible information on Carrizozo-Lincoln County so that, for the first time, this area has received its share of state and national publicity.

Despite the longtime existence of Oktoberfest, Carrizozo has never been adequately represented. This year, for the first time, Oktoberfest will include at least seven Carrizozo-based events.

1. September 28-29 - a Golf Tourney, sponsored by the Country Club.
2. October 5 - a Fiddler's contest, sponsored by the Carrizozo Association of Performing Arts (CAPA).
3. October 12 - Old Folk Dancing by Guidadanos Majores de San Jose, Sponsored by CAPA.

7. October 27 - a Childrens Fishing Derby at Carrizozo Park Lake, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

a number of other events are in planning and likely will be added to those already scheduled. Much has already been done by way of tourist publicity locally-generated. Articles and stories have appeared in local, regional, state and national publications as well as on radio and television. This is a continuing program of the Chamber.

One major concomitant of the attraction of tourists is the attraction also of permanent residents. The Chamber the past year has answered hundreds of inquiries from persons who, having visited the community briefly, wish now to move permanently into our area.

(In these regards, the Chamber wishes to thank the Lincoln County News for its generous assistance in reporting of Chamber activities.

(And it wishes to jointly thank the News and the Citizens State Bank for a cooperative project of providing the News to visitors.)

The Chamber was also pleased to be able to contribute its funds to the erection of an area informational signboard at Carrizozo Airport. Spider Park was cleaned up this year - and the Chamber thanks members of the Future Farmers of America who did that work.

The Chamber has a standing request before Lincoln County Commissioners for the creation - by the county - of an attractive mid-town park on the bare land adjacent to the Lincoln County Courthouse.

## GENERAL:

For the first time in many years, the "children" of Carrizozo this year were able to attend a circus. The Chamber is happy about this venture on two important grounds: it was entertaining and it was financially successful.

Money from this affair went to help the Hospital Auxiliary and more will be spent on other community-wide projects.

Finally, the Chamber pledges to work with all civic, governmental and service bodies and organizations on any and all projects of community-wide importance.

## THE FUTURE:

For the coming year, the Chamber will continue to place the highest emphasis on cleanup and beautification of Carrizozo: this is a must project!

The Chamber will also devote a high-priority effort to helping new businesses and industries to come to Carrizozo - and in this regard earnestly solicits the help of every Carrizozo citizen.

The Chamber also, recognizes that a hospital is a vital necessity to all, pledges its fullest cooperation to Dr. Amy Barton, the Hospital Board, and the Hospital Auxiliary in locating an additional physician, and to the soonest-possible reopening of the hospital.



FIRST GAME: AT RUIDOSO SEPT 6TH

With only one more day of practice left (Wednesday), as of Tuesday, Coach Levon Webb says he is disappointed and dissatisfied with the progress, hustle and mental attitude of his football team during this week.

The grizzly squad started the week by traveling to Alamogordo, and getting wiped-out by a bunch of hustling, hard-hitting sophomores. After viewing film on Alamo scrimmage, it became apparent that if more initiative is not shown by the Grizzly line the squad as a whole will not be able to give anybody on their schedule much of a game this season, for several reasons. The defense was sluggish, and slow, both afoot and mentally. The line was getting moved out by Alamo offensive-line; the line was not attacking, but waiting for opponents to make initial contact; the line was slow in getting to scrimmage-line and getting down into position; the line and the whole team as a whole was very slow in reading their keys, which are taught to them in practice. I have no idea whether these were simple mental errors, or whether it is just a case where the Grizzly players do not care enough about what kind of season they have, and doing things as they want, or doing things like their coach is trying to teach them.

The hitting on defense was poor, with alot of arm tackling going on, which isn't going to wear many opposing back down. The team as a unit could easily get caught completely out of position on a quick-snap.

On offense much the same thing was happening. Line was standing straight-up too much; line not staying with their block after initial contact.

Backfield all in all doing a fair job, but line not holding their blocks long enough to give them much room to do any running, or giving QB enough time to find his receivers. Coach Webb says his players are capable of doing what is necessary to have a good team, but in order to do that, the line will have to fire off the scrimmage line much quicker, and low enough so as to move the defensive people back. All ten men not carrying the ball will have to play from the snap of the ball to when the whistle sounds signifying the end of the play. All blockers, backs and linemen, will have to block, hold their blocks, and look for somebody to hit. Knock some people down and keep them down; and give their backs enough room to maneuver.

On Monday not much work was done because of bad weather, practice had to be held inside of gym. On Tuesday weather was good, but not practice according to Coach Webb. Team reacting much the same as they did in Alamo scrimmage, not playing good fundamental football.

After viewing film on both Tularosa and Alamo scrimmages, Coach Webb said that he hoped his players would learn from their mistakes after they were pointed out to them by him and Asst. Coach McVeigh. "If we play like we did against Tullie, it will be a close game Friday," he said. "If we play like we played against Alamo, we'll get beat by 40 points". He said the Grizzlies would run mostly out of the wish-bone formation, with alot of options. Not much to report on Ruidoso Warriors except that they run a multiple offense, with a tight T backfield; good line, with their top player probable being their fullback (Poole).

The starting offense for the Grizzlies on Friday night will be as follows:

Raymond Beltran at quarter-back; Ricky Vega, right-halfback; Tony Samora, fullback; Ernie Beltran, left halfback; Bobby Beltran splitend; Leo Samora, tight-end.

Nat Palomarez and Gary Lindsey, tackles; Clifford Sombrano and Bobby Shaffee, guards; Dickie Portillo, center.

Personal feeling is that Grizzly players have

more character than what they have been showing and are able to play good, smart, tough football with anybody. But they must learn that winning is only achieved by playing together, that means all 25 players which make up the team; by listening and doing things like the coach says, and trying to out-think the opposing players, not your own coach. The young players (which is most of them) will have to learn, that it has to hurt most to win, and the best kind of hurt during a game is when you hit hard, hit hard on every play, and when you hit FIRST!

The good feeling on the inside of you after winning a game or losing a close, tough-game more than makes up for the little bit of pain you suffer on the outside. Let's hope the Grizzlies are willing to sacrifice a little on Friday night in Ruidoso. I'm looking for a close game. Good Luck Grizzlies and Coach Webb.



## \$32 Million For Cleaner Air

### Kennecott's Acid Plant Model To Be Shown at State Fair

In a major effort to remove sulfur dioxide and dust particles from smelter stack emissions to meet State and Federal ambient air regulations, a new acid plant has been constructed by Kennecott's Chino Mines Division in southwestern New Mexico.


The completed project, including acid plant, electrostatic precipitator, in-plant facilities and railroad cars to ship acid, will cost approximately \$32 million.

A large model of the acid plant will be on display at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque September 11 to 22.

In brief, the plant captures sulfur-bearing vapors from molten copper and transforms them into sulfuric acid. The highly complicated process involves use of coolers and scrubbers, heat exchangers, mist precipitators and a catalytic converter.

The plant was specifically designed to control sulfur oxide emissions from smelter copper converters to meet air regulations.

An acid plant model, as depicted by this airbrushed photograph, will be on display in the New Exhibit Building at the State Fair. The actual model also serves as a training aid for employees responsible for operating the plant.
