## Property sale brings \$14,520 total money

The Town of Carrizozo probably has the best auctioneering team, for the money that could be obtained anywhere around for its property sale Saturday. Mayor Bill Payne did the auctioneering and Town Atty. Archie Witham clerked the sale, with Utility Supt. Johnny Johnson helping to keep track of the properties.

The sale went well, bringing in a total of \$14,520.00. Not a big crowd present at the Recreation Center, but most people present were interested bidders. The Town has paid the paving liens which were defaulted by property owners, some \$16,000 to \$17,000. Mayor Bill Payne said the Town was extremely happy with the outcome of the sale.

The bidding got real spirited on some property items, James Beall of Ruidoso decided he wanted the one house and lots offered for sale, Lots 2-3 in Block 5, and spent \$2,150 before the bidding stopped.

Lot 1 in Block 48, corner lot across from Chapel, didn't look all that choice what with paving on only one side, but it brought \$650.00 from Bryan Boykin, with other people helping him spend his money.

The two complete blocks with frontage on both sides of US390 had plenty of bidders. All of Block 53 went to \$1,000.00 before being knocked down to the Prehm brothers. Ed Jones had to top that figure before he got all of Block 22 for \$1,230.00.

Most of the lots were sold free of taxes. Albert Roberts got the fifty-footer plus seven feet back of his house for \$250.00 but has taxes in amount of \$261.34.

## Corona rancher killed in plane crash

Holt Lovelace, rancher east of Corona, died instantly when his light airplane crashed in heavy fog on the Walker Ranch not far from the Lovelace headquarters Monday, September 16.

Last Saturday Holt was working with New Mexico Mounted Patrol in Albuquerque with Charley Jones, Bud Bagley, and Don Stark that we know of. He had served the County four years as commissioner, working with Jones and Stark.

Don Stark, contacted in Albuquerque, said the County has lost a real good man. He had lots of integrity, good ideas for the best of Lincoln County and was a wonderful asset to this area.

Bud Bagley has known Holt for about 25 years. Bud's younger brother George and Holt were in school together at Corona and later at N. M. State. Holt was a wonderful friend of the Corona community. We'll sure miss him, as a friend, and when there is work to be done, said Bud.

Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. has worked with Holt during the years he was on the county commission. Lee said, "we've really lost a good man."

Holt was born in El Paso on October 22, 1935 and grew up on the Lovelace home ranch near Corona. He became an outstanding rancher

following the death of his grandfather, his uncle, and then his father, leaving Holt to tend to a large spread of ranch country.

He attended college at N. M. State and Eastern at Portales after graduation from high school.

Holt was prominent in New Mexico politics, winning election as county commissioner two terms in Lincoln County. He was appointed to serve as chairman of the New Mexico Law Enforcement Commission in the southeast district, and more recently was appointed to serve on the U. S. Border Commission.

Survivors include his wife Judith Oliver Lovelace; two daughters, Lynn and Wynn and one son Noel; a sister Roe and mother Frances. Funeral service was held at the Harding, Orr & McDaniel Funeral Home in El Paso Wednesday with Masonic Lodge in charge. Burial in El Paso. The family has asked that persons wishing to remember Holt do so in the form of contributions to a Lovelace Scholarship Fund at Corona School. Betty Donahue, Box 67, Corona 88318, is in charge of this fund.

Sheriff Vega reported that Mrs. Lovelace drove to Vaughn to telephone the Horning Ranch because phone service was out at Corona. Horning got in his plane and started searching. At almost this same time two search planes arrived from Albuquerque and John Bigbee plane from Encino. The downed plane was found around 8:30 a.m. Lovelace was pronounced dead at the scene by District Attorney Norman Bloom who traveled to the crash scene with Sheriff Leandro Vega.

The body was removed from the wreckage at 1:00 p.m., after release was obtained from FAA, and taken to Lincoln Station landing strip by Corona Volunteer ambulance crew, then flown to Albuquerque for examination by state medical examiner.

## Former Carrizozo Coach Bernie Laabs in Hall of Fame

STEVENS POINT-Two athletic standouts from bygone years-Bill Kuse of Rt. 4, Green Bay and Bernard Laabs of Carrizozo, N.M.-will be inducted into the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point Hall of Fame at homecoming

activities Saturday, Oct. 19.

The hall of fame recognition will be sponsored by fellow S-Club members (club members have earned a letter in sports), celebrating the 42nd anniversary of that organization in conjunction with homecoming. With all 800 members invited, the reunion will be the first of its kind in S-Club history.

Kuse and Laabs both were all around athletes. Laabs played basketball and football at Stevens Point when the university was called Central State Teachers College and was football captain of its 1925-26 team.

Laabs illustrious coaching career spans 41 years and involves the sports of football, basketball and baseball on the high school level, and three years as coach of the semi-professional Wausau Muskies.

Laabs is known for an ability of building athletic programs for small schools. His 'hi-lite' years were at Mosinee where his teams compiled six basketball championships in seven years, and at Carrizozo, N.M., where in 10 years his football teams were state champions five consecutive years and a state runner-up one other year.

In 1964 the community of Carrizozo, named the schools new athletic complex 'Laabs Field.' Laabs was named New Mexico's Coach of the Year in 1961, '63, '64.

Laabs, a native of Wausau, and Kuse, originally from Medford, will be among the 11 alumni already elected to the University's Athletic Hall of Fame founded in 1969. Induction into the hall is considered the highest honor bestowed upon an alumnus athlete from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

**Nancy Hunter at State Fair**



# Many flags mar game

The Capitan Tiger 'Express Balloon' was punctured slightly Friday night as the Alamogordo Sophomore team stopped the Tigers 14-6. The offense that had scored 71 points the previous week could only get 6 points on the board.

The game was marred by many flags thrown by the officials. The fact, by unofficial count, an official emptied his back pocket twenty-four times, with each side being the victim almost an equal number of times. A total of four football players were ejected from the game - two from each side.

Game captains were John Lucero and Kenny Cummins.

Alamo opened the game by kicking to Capitan. The Tigers could not muster a first down and were forced to punt after three plays. At this point the Tiger defense took over, which is almost the same group that also plays offense. Defensive starters were ends Benjie Trujillo and Pat Griego. Guards were John Lucero and Ricky Richardson. The linemen were John Taylor, Frankie Montoya and Ricky Phillips. Cornerbacks were Kenny Cummins and Wayne Water. And, the defensive halfbacks were Mike Renfro and Mike Beltran.

Alamo began their offensive play from the 30 yard line and were not stopped until they reached the end zone. The touchdown was made on a four yard run through the Capitan defense. The conversion attempt failed.

On the ensuing kick-off, Montoya returned the ball to the twenty-eight yard line. From there, the Tigers were able to get a drive going, helped along by two penalties against the Tigers of Alamo. Capitan stayed on the ground during this drive with Renfro and Montoya making most of the yardage. Disaster struck at the 10 yard line as Capitan fumbled and Alamo recovered.

The Tiger defense held this time and Alamo punted to the Tigers. However, the Capitan offense was again stymied. The offensive line could not contain the Alamo defensive line on passing occasions. The quarterback Kenny Cummins got sacked for a 12 yard loss as Alamo came crashing through on a 3rd and 3 situation.

At this point, the punting of Montoya bailed the Tigers out. Montoya sent a low punt downfield that could have resulted in a big run back. The Alamo safety elected not to field the ball and it

rolled dead on the Alamo 5 yard line. On a fourth and inches try by Alamo, it looked like Capitan had held and would take over at the Alamo 14 yard line. Instead the official marked the forward progress of the ball just over the 15 yard line. This gave Alamo the first down and they kept possession of the ball, although they did not score a TD on this possession.

In the last forty seconds of the first half the two teams threw back to back interceptions. The half ended with Beltran making the first of his three interceptions of the night. The score at halftime was 6-0 in favor of the Tigers from Alamo.

Capitan opened the second half by kicking off to Alamo. On the kick off, Alamo fumbled at the 30 yard line and Trujillo recovered for Capitan. The Capitan offense could not take advantage of the break. A field goal attempt was blocked and Alamo once again had possession of the football; this time at the 16 yard line.

The defense rose to the occasion and forced Alamo to punt again after just three plays. Capitan took over near midfield after the punt return. After a two yard gain by Montoya a penalty for illegal motion sent Capitan back 5 yards. The next play was a screen pass from K. Cummins to Montoya. Montoya caught the pass near midfield and made a beautiful run to the end zone. He ran over several defenders who tried to stop him but this was one of the more determined runs of the entire evening. All was for naught as back at the line of scrimmage there was a piece of red marring the green turf. Capitan was guilty of illegal procedure and instead of 50 yards forward and 6 points, it was 5 yards backward for the Tigers.

The loss was apparently too much for the Tigers and they were soon forced to punt. There was a fine run back of the punt put a penalty, this time against Alamogordo, put the ball on the Alamo 15 yard line.

On this series of downs, Alamo threw the long bomb down field. They had been trying to catch the Capitan's defenders napping and this time they succeeded. The Alamo player was finally stopped at the 5 yard line by a tremendous effort by Beltran. Beltran came all the way across the field to finally catch the ball carrier and momentarily stall the touchdown.

With the help of a half the distance to the goal line penalty the Tigers from Alamo scored. The two point conversion was good, making the score 14-0.

Before the quarter ended Beltran intercepted an Alamo pass, but the ball was fumbled to Alamo on the very next play. Alamo then proceeded to fumble the ball, which was recovered by Beltran. The third quarter ended with the score still at 14-0. The Tigers couldn't take advantage of the interception or the fumble recovery.

Finally in the fourth period another recovered fumble, this time by Henry 'Ace' Griego of the Tigers, led to the score by Capitan. ## Beautiful drive thru mountains

I had a very happy experience this past Friday. I accompanied Mr. English to Cloudcroft via Ruidoso thru Jct. Hwy 24. That beautiful drive. We enjoyed a delicious dinner at noon at the Cloudcroft Lodge.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Petty and family manage the Lodge. We had a delightful visit with Mrs. Petty and daughter. Ralph was in Canada on a fishing trip with friends.

They are successful there just as they were in Ruidoso. We miss them so much but certainly are happy for them.

There was convention going there of District Attorneys. There was an immense crowd. Hardly a parking space.

It was good to see that business. After dinner we drove to Sunspot, N.M. 18 miles from Cloudcroft.

Sacramento Peak's new solar telescope is something to be long remembered. United States Air Force Sacramento Peak Observatory Vacuum Tower Telescope was dedicated October 15, 1969.

Sacramento Peak Observatory is located in the Lincoln National Forest at an elevation of 9200 feet above sea level. At that altitude they are above 30 percent of the earth's atmosphere. The dry air of the southwest and the isolation from any major sources of air pollution make that an excellent observing site. Sixty-three adults and thirty-three children make their home there. The children are bussed to school in Cloudcroft. There are lovely homes and it is a very beautiful location. They shop in Alamogordo.

We were met by a very charming administrative officer, Miss Barbara Jeanne Branum. Her smiles and sweet personality guided us thru. She is a Lincoln County girl and was reared in Carrizozo. She desires more of her Lincoln County friends to visit Sunspot. You should too for you can learn lots and it does give better

understanding and knowledge.

The average annual rainfall is 16 inches coming mostly in July and August. The average snowfall is 72 inches. The temperature rarely goes above 85 degree or below zero.

There is wonderful highway all the way. Beautiful scenery. We were delighted to have seen one deer and her fawn. Hoped to see turkey but they stayed out of sight. The quaken Aspens stood so stately so many feet high.

Friday was a very cloudy day therefore we could not see the pictures from the sun, but there was much more to be observed.

First we signed in and then the tour began. In the telescope explanations of its origin, etc. It is 136 feet above the ground and 221 feet below the ground. A 40 foot diameter movable floor which hold all kinds of powerful instruments is suspended near the top of the tower by a mercury bearing which is hung on three bolts each only three inches in diameter.

There are many stair steps to the top though we did not go. An elevator takes only employees and it takes 20 minutes to reach the top.

We listened to explanations. Which were deep but enjoyable. There are two mirrors at the top that directs sunlight down the tube, which may be seen running vertically down the center of the observing room to 180 feet below the observing floor where it strikes a 64 inch concave mirror and is reflected back up and out at five ports on the observing level so that five different experiments may go on at the same time.

Sacramento Peak Observatory is one of 11 laboratories of the Air Force Research Cambridge Research Laboratories in Massachusetts. It represents a major investment in solar astronomy by the U. S. Air Force. They study the solar flares and possible methods for predicting them. These flares, high explosions on the surface of the sun, release into space x-rays, visible light, and high speed atomic particles. These effect the earth and its environment, causing radio interference, magnetic storms and the Aurora or Northern light, interfering with the operation of satellites and endangering the safety of Astronauts in space. They are striving to understand the flares by investigating all related phenomena on the sun. All of the instruments there are designed to study the sun.

I entered another building in which I was introduced to two very nice young scientists busy at work with their assembling a large telescope which soon will go to Hawaii.

Natures wild flowers are growing where nature desires. It is a beautiful setting. Such nice smiling employees gives one a happy feeling to have been able to have met them. It was such a word while trip.

Barbara Jeanne said you can see El Paso at night and Tularosa but a mountain hides Alamogordo. When the sunshines one can see many miles in all directions.

Miss Branum has been there four years and I wish her many more years success and happiness there in as she certain does enjoy her duties as it does radiate.

The telescope is an investment of \$3,000,000. The entire investment of the set up of all is \$15,000,000.



**Cowbells promote better understanding of livestock**

Canyon Cowbells have been writing many letters in an effort to bring about more effective communication between the livestock producer and the consumer, and to give government officials and legislators a better understanding of the industry. Mrs. John Nalda announced that Senator Pete Domenici and Senator Joseph Montoya had each referred on the floor of the Senate to letters which they had received from Mrs. Nalda on behalf of Canyon Cowbells. There letters dealt with the mounting difficulties faced by ranchers, such as the grave economic conditions which producers and feeders are experiencing; and the possible disastrous consequences of a law suit brought against the BLM and the Secretary of Interior involving grazing rights. Senators Domenici and Montoya requested and were granted permission that the Cowbelle letters be printed in the Congressional Record.

Canyon president Judy Lovelace read letters she had written to Senators Domenici and Montoya on behalf of the organization voicing opposition to the bill which would create and all-powerful Consumer Protection Agency. She also read a letter to Representative Thomas Foley of the Committee on Agriculture strongly urging that beef import quotas be reimposed. Members voted to donate \$25.00 to the Lincoln County Fair Queen to help cover her expenses while she represents Lincoln County.
