# Town can have industrial park

Mayor Bill Payne outlined developments over the past month pointing toward the establishment of an industrial park in Carrizozo for town council members meeting Tuesday night, plus a few visitors.

The work of establishing an industrial park in Carrizozo has been going on for several years. First proposed location was in the railroad-highway 'Y' just east of the overpass. Payne said that at that time 80 percent of cost was available in form of a grant but the entire project was based on industry coming to town. No industry came, the project died.

Later Scott Industries set up a manufacturing plant in Carrizozo, making portable electric welders, barrel dollies, parts for bus air conditioning and other products. After Scott's first plant was established in former town building, they acquired equipment from a rather large machine shop which was brought to Carrizozo and placed in an adjoining building.

More recently Scott has completed their line of 125 amp welders and are tooling up for a new design, a much simplified 135 amp welder.

The intent of Scott Industries, as expressed to council members, is to expand their manufacturing into larger quarters as speedily as possible. Last year the town sold Scott five acres of land in the airport area, now the site of proposed new industrial park.

Mayor Payne said that a renewed effort towards getting an industrial park for Carrizozo has been in progress the past month. Engineer Tom Ward was asked to prepare plans for 24-acre industrial park, part of 40-acres zoned for industry in the airport. A part of this planning includes updating the airport with fuel tank and parking for vehicles.

The EDA, an agency of the Department of Commerce, has approved funding up to 60 percent of the project expected to cost \$200,000, this funding amounting to \$120,000. The town has an oral commitment from Four Corners Agency for up to \$40,000.

The funding above leaves amount of \$44,000 for the town to get up. Mayor Payne said it was obvious that the town could not come up with this amount of money. It used to be that 'in kind' contributions, like the town supplying labor and materials, would take care of a municipalities part, this is not acceptable any more.

The \$200,000 would provide for water, sewer, paving, curb and gutter in the 24-acre industrial park, plus the airport work. This concluded the Mayor's preliminary statement.

Ruth Armstrong, president of the Carrizozo Industrial Development Corp., and Eleanor Payton, secretary, were present at the meeting. Mrs. Armstrong told the council of her corporation's part in the project. Said Mrs. Armstrong, we've worked three or more years to see this done. Now federal money is real scarce and Carrizozo is the only town in the southwest district scheduled to receive any development money. The EDA and State Planning people think Carrizozo 'is on the ball' and worth of the federal money that has been allocated.

We have \$3,800 of our own money, plus a commitment from the A. N. Spencer family of \$35,000 for construction of building to house an industry. We would prefer to see the town raise the \$44,000 and the Development Corp. build a building which could be rented, and the rent money in turn be used for further industrial development.

Right now is the time, said Mrs. Armstrong. It seems a shame to lose a \$200,000 project when towns all around us would be glad to get this grant money. The town is either -- going ahead, or going backwards.

Mary Rich spoke up saying that the town could vote on general obligation bonds to finance the project. "I have four applications of interest in my office, from industries, which hinge on an industrial park. I think the people of Carrizozo would vote for such a bond issue, said Mrs. Rich. Mayor Payne said he thought the industrial park would be worth the gamble.

Eleanor Payton said that anyone interested in the future of Carrizozo ought to want the industrial park.

There was talk of people in unpaved areas of town resenting the fact that the industrial park would have paving. Mrs. Rich stated that she was receiving more calls for mobile, home parking space in the unpaved areas than elsewhere.

Councilman C. D. May said he thought we ought to feel out the people.

Councilman Penter wanted to know what the bond issue would cost a person. No answer to that question, but the amount would be real small is was concluded.

Roy Harman said he would like to have the park, wanted the town to remain solvent.

Willis Hill said he wanted the town to stay small. Councilman James Silva told Willis that "You and I won't be around when the town gets big".

Archie Witham commented that small businesses come and go in town because there are not enough people to keep them alive.

It was determined that the council would hold a special meeting next Tuesday, October 15, to discuss the industrial park again and invite people in to express their views on this project and the future of Carrizozo.

Other business of the council included looking at rug bids. Four received, bid from Alamogordo firm accepted, 195 square yards installed by October 22 for amount of \$1833.00.

Willis Hill said that the ownership of ambulance needs to be determined to clarify fire department records. Ambulance was purchased with \$12,000 grant to the fire department, plus \$2,000 of department money. Town apparently has the right to say who may operate the ambulance but Willis wanted ruling from the council. There was a stipulation that ambulance service be free to all firemen and their dependents. Situation came up at football game where dependent was not served.

Plains Electric people were in to ask for town's blessing on their proposed 115,000 KV power line to run from Willard to Tularosa. It will pass Carrizozo on the east. Plan approved by council.

Albert Roberts presented drawing for change at railroad crossing at south edge of town. Quite a little work involved, town will need to acquire two small pieces of land, Atty. Witham will contact the highway department.

Three big beer signs around town were supposed to be down three weeks ago.

Two occupation licenses approved, office supply firm in Roswell and The Corral Motel.

Mary Chavez resigned from Planning and Zoning Commission, Ed Lawson appointed to this board.

Albert Roberts plans to fence property recently bought at town auction, no problem. Jack Heffer wants some road work. Town uses this road, will fix.

May asked that money from auction be earmarked for street sealing and sweeper. So ordered.

Witham suggested that the town increase water deposits for protection against default on water bills. Council agreed to go from \$10 to \$20 on residential, \$15 to \$30 on commercial, and double meter hookup cost from \$50 to \$100.

Witham told council that a cemetery map is needed to show ownership and where people are buried. Tom Ward will prepare such a map for sum of \$100.

## Commissioners buy \$40,000 crusher

Lincoln County Commissioners Paul Pacheco, Bud Payne and Bill Hart handled a lot of routine business, one of the more important items being purchase of a rock crusher on bid of \$40,000 from the Ribble Co. The crusher will probably start work in Gavalin Canyon area.

Carrizozo School Supt. Jim Steinepreis was in to review the land exchange between school and hospital. No action here.

Kelley Stephenson brought in agreement concerning road through his ranch to Water Canyon. The commission will discuss this with DA Norman Bloom before taking any action.

Plans for garage for new ambulance were discussed at length. The commission decided to go ahead with the project after some revision of

the plans. The garage will be attached to the hospital fronting 8th Street and construction will match the hospital. Bids will be called when plans are revised.

They accepted a quit claim deed for land that was to be used for fire station at Lincoln, the station was located in other end of town and now the county is returning the land to the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission.

An amount of \$3,494 in federal money has been received from the Traffic Safety Commission. Money will be used to buy vehicle for sheriff department and used by Deputy David Wheeler at Corona.

First thing after lunch, Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Ortiz were in to protest handling of property tax payments at treasurer office. Some payments made, credit not given and interest charged, Mr. Ortiz stated. Commission asked for copies of papers which will be checked by auditor at end of year and credit extended if due.

Roland Walsh, hospital administrator at Ruidoso, told the commission that a heliport was well along at the Ruidoso hospital. This arrangement will work much better than having to transport patients to the airport for loading aboard a helicopter.

The commissioners asked Walsh to contact the Presbyterian hospital group about setting up a meeting to discuss their taking over the Carrizozo hospital. This meeting should take place October 21 with Carrizozo hospital board.

Chuck Rominger discussed new tax form to be used next year. The assessor will not go out in the field in 1975. Forms will be sent to all property owners in the county which they can change if necessary, or just file away if their property listing are correct. The brand inspector is reporting on all cattle sales which will be of help to the appraisal office.

County Appraiser Ralph Garcia discussed his work with the commission. He is looking for an assistant, with one applicant coming in this week.

Road Supt. Jack LaMay discussed accident on the job claim of Alfred Trujillo. Commission decided this is problem for insurance companies.

Bob Shafer was in to thank the commissioners for good bridge job at Coyote.

Clerk Barbara Lovelace and acting County Manager Carol Reamy attended the meeting.







# ... on the Grizzlies' Trail

Saturday Oct. 12 Carrizozo at Tularosa

As Yoggie would say, "You're not out of it until you're out of it"??? Sounds a little dumb but makes a lot of sense. And that is what the Carrizozo Grizzlies should remember for the remainder of the season, after losing their fifth game of the season last Friday afternoon at Zuni. Although the Grizzlies are winless this year the games they have planned this year have really meant nothing as far as getting to the play-offs this year.

The only games which have anything to do with reaching the play-offs are, Reserve, which will be a home game, in the next to the last game, and with the Capitan Tigers in the last game of the season. ZoZo could end up with a 2-7 regular season record, get into play-offs, win two more games and win state, with a 4-7 overall record. Getting a little ahead of myself there, but it could happen.

A 2-7 mark can be pretty deceiving really, because it does not show the kind of schedule which the local team has had to face. Which includes four 'AA' teams and one 'AAA' school. Not many 'A' schools are going to beat a 'AA' school very often, much less a 'AAA' team like NMMI from Roswell. Taking that into consideration plus the officiating (which has been pretty sorry in the games I have seen) that our team has had to go along with this year, it's not too hard to understand why the Grizzlies are 0-5.

Getting back to last Friday's game, which Carrizozo lost by score of 13-8, Coach Webb says his team played the best game of the season, and beat Zuni everywhere but on the scoreboard. The Grizzlies put some offense together and gained close to 300 yards in the Zuni game, but 140 yards of penalties kept them from putting anymore than 8 points on the scoreboard. Most of those yards on penalties were on bad calls by refs, which killed several Grizzly drives which could have added to their point total and which could have won the game for them. As it was the only touchdown scored by Carrizozo was by the defense. Clifford Sombrano recovering a Zuni fumble in the end zone and adding the two-point conversion, making the score 13-8 at that point in the fourth quarter. Carrizozo had a chance to pull it out in last quarter after driving to the Zuni ten yard-line with 2:00 min. left on the clock, but a fumble on third down at that point snuffed out any chance the Grizzlies had. Michael Vega probably had his best game over Friday, gaining 130 yards on offense on 13 carries and two pass receptions. Ernie Beltran had another steady game gaining 97 yards on only 10 carries, 9.7 yards per carry average, not bad! Only real bad break of the game going against the Grizzlies (in which the referees were not involved) was in the first quarter when Carrizozo punting against a very strong wind from their own 30 yard line, had the punt blown back all the way back into their own end-zone, where the punter (Ernie) fielded his own punt and returned it back to his own 7 yard line. Add a penalty to that which moves the ball to 3 and its not hard to see how Zuni scored their first TD. Other Zuni score came on an 82 yard run in the third quarter.

Seems to me that the Grizzlies had too many things going against them last Friday, even before the start of the game. (1) Having to get up probably around 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning, leave around 5:00 a.m. drive all the way to Zuni and having to play at 1:30 that same afternoon. Too bad the school can't put a little more money into the football program and provide enough money for at least an overnight trip, especially for a trip that far. Seems like if the school could afford it in the early 60's when I was in school that the school could afford to make some kind of accommodations for the Grizzly team at least once a year, now After all, win or lose, those boys are what people pay to see when we have a home game. Maybe out of line saying something like that but seems to me that some of that money being made at the gate should go toward making a football season more enjoyable to the players which have to put out all year long. (2) It was Zuni's homecoming game, and that always seems to get the home team up for that game. (3) A Zuni football player who died from a football injury in practice the week before had this game dedicated to him, which was appropriate enough, but which helped Zuni get charged-up even more. (4) Plus four referees (they probably don't deserve to be called that) which no way were going to let Zuni lose this game. Enough said!!!!!!







A JOINT RESOLUTION  
PROPOSING TO AMEND  
THE CONSTITUTION OF  
NEW MEXICO BY  
REPEALING ARTICLE 4,  
SECTION 10 AND ADOPTING  
A NEW ARTICLE 4; SECTION  
10, PERTAINING TO COM-  
PENSATION OF  
LEGISLATORS.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE  
LEGISLATURE OF THE  
STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 4, Section 10 and adopting a new Article 4, Section 10 to read: "A. A permanent commission to consist of nine members is created, which shall be known as the 'legislative compensation commission'. Three members shall be appointed by the governor, two members appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, two members appointed by the president pro tempore of the senate and two members appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.

B. No one shall be appointed to the commission who is a legislator, officer or employee of the state or any department, agency or political subdivision thereof, or who is an officer or employee of any agency or institution to which any state funds are appropriated. Commission members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing officials.

C. Members of the legislature shall receive compensation, expenses and allowances as fixed by law which compensation, expenses, and allowances shall not exceed that established by a majority vote of the legislative compensation commission.

D. The commission, before June 30 immediately following the ratification of this amendment and every fourth year thereafter, shall review and fix the maximum rates of compensation, expenses and allowances paid members of the legislature. In setting maximum compensation, expenses and allowances for members of the legislature, the commission may establish different rates applicable to sessions, and to interim periods between sessions, and may establish a maximum rate for members of the legislature who are officers different from that established for other members. Maximum rates established by the commission shall be filed with the secretary of state and become effective on the first

day of July following their establishment.

E. The commission shall elect one of its members chairman and a majority of the members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Commission members shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred while performing the duties imposed by this section as provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

For the purposes of this section a "Vietnam conflict veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces from New Mexico and who has been awarded a Vietnam campaign medal for service in the armed forces of this country in Vietnam during the period from August 5, 1964 to the official termination date of the Vietnam conflict as designated by executive order of the president of the United States. The state may also establish by law a program of loans to students of the healing arts, as defined by law, for residents of the state who, in return for the payment of educational expenses, contract with the state to practice their profession for a period of years after graduation within areas of the state designated by law."
