# Golf tournament for everyone next weekend

beautiful day about to dawn on the new golf course, site of the first annual Carrizo Mountain Classic October 26-27.

Joe Light, director of the Carrizo Mountain Classic golf tournament to be held in Carrizozo October 26-27, said that the green & black tournament bills had been mailed to golf courses, Rotary Clubs, and Chambers of Commerce all over the southern part of New Mexico.

This first annual affair is sponsored by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce with help from Carrizozo Lions Club members, Rotarians and other civic groups are invited to join in the fun, maybe plan an activity of their own during the weekend.

The tournament starts Saturday around 8:00 or 9:00 a.m., depending some on the number of flights that day. The way this tournament will be run off amounts to maybe six or more tournaments of flighted play. Each golfer will be assigned to a flight with golfers of approximately the same handicap and is designed particularly

for local golfers. There will be a separate prize fund for each of the handicapped flights and the open championship (scratch) flight. Golfers with no established handicap are welcome in the tournament.

There will be 36 holes of medal play, where golfers compete on total score for 18 holes and 36-hole medal score. The championship flight is open to anyone, golfers compete on scratch basis, no handicap involved.

When play is concluded Saturday there will be a barbecue dinner and dance at the country club, for all golfers and the public is invited to come to these events. Breakfast will be served to the golfers, and public, starting at 8:00 a.m. Sunday and running to 11:00 a.m. At the conclusion of play Sunday awards and presentations will be made at the ninth hole.

The entry deadline is October 25. Entries may be made by mail or direct at the golf course.

## Archbishop Robert Fortune Sanchez plans Visit to Saint Rita Church

Archbishop Robert Fortune Sanchez of Santa Fe will arrive in Carrizozo about 10:30 a.m. Saturday, October 19. There will be a procession from the rectory to Saint Rita Catholic Church at 11:00 where Archbishop Sanchez will preside at Mass.

There will be a reception for Archbishop Sanchez at the parish hall starting at 12:00 noon. Lunch will be at the rectory at 1:00 p.m. with Rev. E. deBaerst, Sabino Vidaurri, S. M. Ortiz, Mayor Bill Payne and Floyd Siegrist as special guests representing the Carrizozo community. Archbishop Sanchez is expected to depart for Roswell around 2:30 p.m.

The Episcopal Ordination and Installation of Robert Fortune Sanchez at Tenth Archbishop of Santa Fe took place July 25 of this year. This event was cause for popular rejoicing as well as

a most historical landmark. This was the first time in New Mexico's civic religious history of 376 years that a native son has been chosen as her spiritual shepherd. It was also the first time in New Mexico diocesan history of 124 years that a native priest was named to succeed in a line started by the justly famed John Baptist Lamy, first Bishop and Archbishop of Santa Fe.

Archbishop Sanchez, first taste of parish life was the nearly 10,000 sq. miles of St. Joseph Parish in Mosquero and holy family in Roy. In 1971 father Sanchez was named pastor of San Filippine church by Archbishop Peter Davis.

His fellow priests have recognized his vast leader qualities by electing him the Rep. of region X, the southwest, to the national federation of priests' councils from 1972-73, and president of the Archdiocesan Priest Senate in

1973. Archbishop Davis appointed him vicar general on May 1, 1974.

In his fourteen and one half years as a priest, Father Sanchez has made service, pastoral care, and dedication to the needs of people, his life.

This is his past; his future.

## More graze in sight, but not on area forest land

Following is report of forest permittee meeting held in Alamogordo recently. Stan Green wrote the report.

The statement, "There will be more livestock grazing allotment for cattle and sheep in the future on our national forests," was tempered for Forest Service permittees Thursday night by the added statement, "the additional grazing will probably be done on forests other than those in New Mexico and Arizona."

The windup statements of the evening were made by Bill Fallis, range management director, Albuquerque Regional Office, before 23 permittees and FS personnel attending the annual permittee meeting in Alamogordo. They were there from the Lincoln, Cibola, Santa Fe, Gila and Carson National Forests.

Charles Walker, Sixteen Springs Canyon rancher and chairman of the Lincoln grazing advisory board, chaired the meeting which included a pre-banquet gettogether, the banquet and business meeting.

Permittees and FS personnel from the five national forests are in attendance at the two-day meeting which will end this evening following an inspection tour of the group to the Weed-Sacramento areas to witness some of the results of grass planting and water-drainage protection being implemented following the disastrous Spring Canyon Fire that burned 11,570 acres and caused an estimated \$25,494,489 in damage.

Walker said he thought it would help relations between the FS and the permittees if logging operations were announced a year or so before they began and that each permittee along with his district ranger made a survey of the fences then, during the logging and afterwards. "We get a lot of arguments on this matter," Walker noted. "I think we should consider rewriting the handbook."

Joe Atkinson of Mountainair represented the Cibola permittees, and said post cutters were causing a lot of problems on their allotments.

Phil Reynolds, president of West Side Grazing Association on the Carson said, "Our biggest problem is that some years back the FS built a lot of fences and maintained them. Then, they started telling the permittees they should build the fences and the FS would maintain them. Now the FS tells us that it is up to us to build the fences and to maintain them too"

Hewound up by saying fencing involves a lot of money and that the cattle grower is in a tight spot.

"Why, I went over to the country store the other night and bought myself a pair of cowboy boots. Have them on right now and they cost me more than one of my calves will bring tomorrow."

Roberto Martinez of the Carson said, "There is more money being released for recreation than there is for us. We catlemen are going to go in the red this year."

Herman Montoya of the Santa Fe, "We have a lot of trouble with people coming into our places after pinon nuts and leaving the gates open. We have a lot of pinons and that sure is a problem."

Ray Swigart who is on the FS staff of the Gila, said he thought the Forest Service has lost a lot of its abilities through the years.

The forest supervisors had an opportunity for rebuttal.

Jack Crellin, department of the forest supervisor for the Carson, said, "The only way we can ever solve any of our problems is to get together like this and hash them out."

He added some 75,000 acres in the Carson would be closed to off-road traffic and said the two meetings held in Tres Piedras and in Albuquerque pulled only 15 to the first and a mere four at Albuquerque.

"When sportsmen get up there Oct. 5 the stuff will probably hit the fan," he said.

replanting grass and trees) but the Grazing Association there is working with us pretty good."

Ray Swigart, range and wildlife staff officer for the Gila, said it is almost impossible to look a year or two ahead on timber sales. He added that one of their big problems is with week-end prospectors who are coming onto the forests with bulldozers and ripping up areas and then getting out before they are caught.

"We are not bothered by the big companies such as Kennecott but the others are giving us a fit."

John Hafterson, supervisor of the Lincoln, said his staff is in the process of overhauling timber management on the Lincoln and is instituting an in-depth study of logging practices.

Fallis of the regional FS office was asked to comment on a remark made recently by Charlie Lee, president of the New Mexico Cattlegrowers Association, about the fact there were fewer cattle on the forests today than in the past and that this cut was hurting the economy of New Mexico.

The FS man said, "I don't question at all the fact that agriculture and cattle growing is the biggest industry in the state; but land can support only so many head of something, be it cattle, sheep or goats."

"Then there is a law we in the Forest Service have to abide by which says we will manage the lands without impairment to that land."

He was quick to point out that there are many variables that enter into the picture today, but was just as quick in a denial that the FS is trying to get rid of the livestock on the forests.

He did say, "Now, this figure is from the top of my head and may not be correct, but as I recall there were 4.7 million head of cattle on National Forests 40 years ago compared to about 2 million today."

# on the Grizzlies' Trail

The Carrizozo Grizzlies finally put it together and scratched out a 12-8 victory over the Tularosa JV's for their first victory of the season.

Although the 12-8 score indicates the game as being close, that was not the case last Saturday at Tularosa. With the Grizzlies getting good performances out of the trio of Ernie Beltran (gaining 95 yds.), Michael Vega (gaining 90 yds.), and Tony Samora (gaining 89 yds.), the local team was able to control the ball for most of the game; Although 145 yds. of penalties kept the offense from scoring any more than the two TD's that they did. The two Grizzly touchdowns were scored by half-backs Ernie Beltran and Michael Vega.

The defense of the Grizzly squad, not to be outshone by the offense, also came up with a fine effort. With the only Tularosa score coming after the Wildcats recovered a Grizzly fumble 10 yds. from the end-zone and taking it across four plays later.

In fact the Grizzly defense so totally dominated their part of the game, that they held the Tularosa team to a grand total of 6 yds. Having especially good games on defense for the Grizzly squad were: Michael Vega, with 10 un-assisted tackles to his credit, and who defensive coach Bill MacVeigh says spent a lot of time in the Tularosa back-field; Corner-back Leo Samora, who was credited with 4 un-assisted tackles; Dickie Portillo, playing a strong game at line-backer and coming up with interception of Wildcat pass; Ray Hernandez, freshman, who also came up with pass interception, knocked three others down. As the Demon quarter-back is probably the best player on the team. The head-coach of the visiting Demons by the way is Gerald Burns, who coached at Carrizozo a few years back.

With their first win under their belt, and the extra added incentive of this being their Homecoming game for this season, the Grizzly team could surprise some people and make it plenty tough for the visitors from Dexter; A large turn-out by local fans for the Grizzly team wouldn't hurt matters any.

The Grizzly team will be going into Friday's game with a few minor injuries to Tony Samora (fb), Ray Beltran (qb), Michael Vega (hb), and Nat Palomarez (l), plus Ricky Vega who suffered a broken collar-bone in the Tularosa game. All except Ricky Vega will probably be ready for

action by Friday, with Palomarez seeing limited action, if any at all, because of badly sprained ankle.

Freshmen Michael English and Billy Shafer will be starting their first games on Friday at defensive-guard and defensive-tackle respectively, with another freshman Paul Samora probably seeing some action at defensive-guard too. Clifford Sambrano will be starting his first game as linebacker where he will team-up with Dickie Portillo and Jimmy Samora. Other players starting at new positions this week will be Tommy Lueras at defensive-guard and Rick Edwards at defensive-tackle.

Result of game between Capitan and Reserve on Saturday should give us some idea on how good Reserve really is. Reserve reportedly not expecting too much trouble in beating Capitan.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE  
LEGISLATURE OF THE

Section 1. It is proposed to  
amend the constitution of New  
Mexico by repealing Article 4,  
Section 10 and adopting a new  
Article 4, Section 10 to read:

"A. A permanent com-  
mission to consist of nine  
members is created, which  
shall be known as the  
"legislative compensation  
commission". Three mem-  
bers shall be appointed by the  
governor, two members ap-  
pointed by the Chief Justice of  
the Supreme Court, two  
members appointed by the  
president pro tempore of the  
senate and two members  
appointed by the speaker of the  
house of representatives.

B. No one shall be ap-  
pointed to the commission who  
is a legislator, officer or  
employee of the state or any  
department, agency or  
political subdivision thereof,

ployee of any agency or in-

serve at the pleasure of the  
appointing officials.

C. Members of the  
legislature shall receive  
compensation, expenses and

compensation commission.

D. The commission,  
before June 30 immediately  
following the ratification of  
this amendment and every  
fourth year thereafter, shall  
review and fix the maximum

members of the legislature. In  
setting maximum com-  
pensation, expenses and  
allowances for members of the  
legislature, the commission  
may establish different rates

Another new teacher for Capitan is Miss Susan Smith. Her hometown is Roswell, N.M. and her parents still reside there. She graduated from Goddard High School in Roswell.

This past May, she graduated from New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. She did her student teaching in Farmington, N.M. where N.M. State has a branch school Her major is Elementary Education and her minor is social science.

Her assignment in the Capitan schools is the Language Arts Developmental Program in the elementary school. Emphasis will be on remedial reading.

She is happy about being in Capitan and is looking forward to getting in some snow skiing this winter.

The steering committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met in Ruidoso Downs, October 2. Chairman Bill Gage presided.

The State Forestry representative, Ray Polasky reported on the Capitan Park and the Smokey Bear monument. There will be a permanent monument in Capitan for the remains of the bear upon his death. There will be a park

developed (BOR - \$18,000 and \$50,000 in forestry funds). This will possibly be a State Park in 2 to 2-1/2 years. Many departments will be involved.

Bill Hart, Lincoln County Commissioner, spoke of Holt Lovelace's death and the detrimental impact on this district. A tribute to his efforts and dedication was given. Silent prayer was given to his memory. Mr. Hart asked for recommendations for replacement for Mr. Lovelace's position. This job is on the Border Commission, which is making better working relations between the United States and Mexico. Mr. Hart or Mr. Abercrombie will take names of anyone suggested for this job.

Mr. Merritt gave the Executive Committee report as follows:

Project proposals recommended for acceptance were: Otero County wishes help with a feasibility study on flood control on Dry Canyon. Mr. Merritt moved, Mr. Scribner seconded and it carried.

Otero County wants help on a flood water plan for Boles Acres. Mr. Merritt moved, Doc Dean seconded, and it carried.

Project measure progress included: Brass Caps: Bob Scribner reported that the survey will cost \$400 a mile. A source of funding will have to be found. The USGS will give an estimate on how much it will cost to give the area.


Capitan Cemetery: SCS has completed the plan and it has been presented to the Women's Club. They are working on the type of fencing wanted and the funding.



**School building work stalled**

Construction work on the new \$244,567.00 gym and vocational complex for Carrizozo School has stopped, apparently due to bankruptcy of the contractor: Supt. Jim Steinepreis said he had not received notice in writing, but had got the word orally, and knew that the workers were not on the job Thursday and Friday.

This action put the burden of completion of the project on the bonding company which is the Balboa Insurance Co. of Newport Beach, Ca. Duke City Insurance in Albuquerque made the check on the contractor and might have some liability to Balboa.

Three options that are open to the bonding company are:

1) Let the contractor, Eldorado Corp., of Albuquerque, complete the work under supervision of the bonding company.

2) Bonding Company to secure new contractor.

3) Bonding company ask the school to rebid the job.

The school has already paid \$41,077 to the contractor, for ninety percent of the work complete up to September 30. Quite a little material under this payment has not been used. The construction work was due to be complete in 270 calendar days, including Saturdays and Sundays; from August 13 which was the date of bid letting. Penalty of \$100 per day sets in after the 270 days run out, again the obligation of the bonding company.

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The Eldorado Corp. was a licensed contractor in the State of New Mexico, the license intended to protect the consumer or buyer, and the purpose of a bonding company is also protection for the people putting up the construction money.

Probably there will be some fast action on solving this problem but as of Tuesday Supt. Steinepreis did not know what was to be done.
