Fishing Derby Next Sunday

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring what should be a day of fun for all youngsters ages from toddlers up to 14. There will be lots of prizes and a lake full of fish.
The first fishing derby ever held near Carrizozo will be held at the Recreation Area lake, just completed in the early summer and since stocked several times with trout.

Presbyterian Group Looking at Hospital

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, board of directors and Lincoln County Commissioners met with Roland Walsh, representing Presbyterian Hospitals Monday afternoon to explore the possibility of the Presbyterian organization taking over operation of the Carrizozo Hospital.

Mr. Walsh explained some of the ways in which Presbyterian administers the hospitals they have undertaken and said that he thought the day of the small hospital operation was over.
After listening to Mr. Walsh, chairman of the hospital board, Mrs. A. N. Spencer asked that Mr. Walsh arrange to have representatives from Presbyterian Hospital meet with the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital administrator, conduct a survey and advise Carrizozo hospital people of the feasibility of taking over the hospital.
Commissioner Bill Hart suggested that the hospital board do everything in its power to provide adequate information. It was the thinking of the board that a move in this direction, by Presbyterian, would be most beneficial to the area as a whole, and would provide more adequate medical services than are presently available.

Mrs. A. N. Spencer tendered her resignation as chairman of the board, effective immediately, saying she felt she has served long enough and that new blood was needed. Mrs. Alton Whitaker, hospital administrator, tendered her resignation, effective in two weeks.



Mining in Lincoln County took a new twist last weekend when Henry Vega, Ruben Chavez and Truman Spencer went out in shaky raft on lake at Recreation Area in search of golf balls. Wind was calm, water was clear and using a long-handled dip net, they recovered 304 golf balls in the two days. Bud Payne has been mining the smaller lake and doing equally well with a drag net. Near as we can tell they are "finders-keepers", balls graded as to value then split between the finders.

Standard Time Returns Sunday

Washington - Ten straight months of Daylight Saving Time will end Sunday when the nation goes on standard time for the four winter months.

Under the new legislation the nation will stay on standard time until 2 a.m. Sunday, February 23, 1975.

The nation will set back its clocks one hour at 2 a.m. Sunday, the result of congressional action that ended the nation's experiment with year-round daylight time.

The year-round daylight time experiment was designed to save fuel during the country's energy shortage. The Senate Commerce Committee reported the experiment resulted in about 100,000 barrels of oil per day being saved during the first four months of 1974.

However, that committee said such savings "must be balanced against a majority of the public's distaste for the observance of Daylight Saving Time" during the winter.

The Department of Transportation agreed that some fuel was saved during the winter months but said longer daylight hours may have increased gasoline consumption in March and April by up to one per cent.

The change will not affect eastern Indiana, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, The Virgin Islands and American Samoa, all of which remained on standard time during the experiment.



Lifelong resident of Lincoln County. My family consists of my husband, Rito, six children ALL of which attend the Carrizozo Schools.

I am seeking my second term as your County Assessor.

The County Assessor is responsible and has the authority for the evaluation of all property subject to valuation for property taxation purposes in the County.

The duties of the assessor are many. Our routine practices are: First the preparation of property tax schedules, picking up all Deed transfers recorded in the Clerk's office and making the necessary changes in our office. Then we prepare the tax roll and then the tax notices which in turn we hand them to the County Treasurer for collection of taxes.

We had in the year 1974 a total of 12,435 taxpayers in Lincoln County is the Appraisal. The Appraisal Department has really worked hard completing this project and also keeping it up. The Net assessed value for the year 1973 was \$34,182,510 and for the year 1974 the value went up to \$36,746,531. That means a total assessed valuation of \$2,564,021.

My experience in this office area, as apt time help I worked a total of 6 years. I was Deputy Assessor for 4 years for Marian Schlarb and I was elected as your County Assessor for the past years. I have attended the Appraisal Schools in the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque, and have gone to all the special workshops the Property Appraisal Department have conducted in various places.

I cannot contact every individual personally as I would like to, because of the duties of my office. As of now, we are getting the taxroll ready so that we will be able to meet the deadline on November 1.

I certainly will appreciate your vote and support in the forthcoming General Election November 5.









Mike Renfro rushed for 93 yards bringing his total to 711 yards for seven games.



Drillers to return in spring

A vice president for Houston Oil & Minerals Co. says of the three gas test wells drilled in Three Rivers area, one produced natural gas, one was a dry hole and the third could not be completed due to cave-ins. John Walters, vice president for exploration with the Houston, Tex.-based company, said present plans call for the return of drilling crews to the Tularosa Basin area "probably in the summer of next year." There is some talk of resumption of exploration drilling in late spring. Summarizing the company's exploration in the area to date, Walters noted that the first gas test well was drilled south of Three Rivers near the old Albert Fall ranch house. He said the well tested at 200,000 cubic feet of gas per day from the 8,000-foot level of the 9,400-foot well. The second test site was located south and east of Tularosa at the edge of the Sacramento Mountain foothills. Walters noted the well was punched to the 4,600-foot level but was dubbed a dry hole. Difficulties with underground caverns causing cave-ins at the third site, about half way between Three Rivers and Tularosa, caused the test to be terminated at the 600-foot level, he said. Walters added that reports within the oil industry indicated that Exxon Corp. has taken an interest in oil or gas exploration in the Tularosa Basin. Indications from the oil fraternity are that the huge oil conglomerate has acquired several oil and gas leases in the area through a subsidiary company. Other companies also have leased in the area in recent months.

LEGAL NOTICE
To be voted on at the General Election to be held November 5, 1974

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 AND ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10, PERTAINING TO COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 4, Section 10 and adopting a new Article 4, Section 10 to read: "A. A permanent commission to consist of nine members is created, which shall be known as the "legislative compensation commission". Three members shall be appointed by the governor, two members appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, two members appointed by the president pro tempore of the senate and two members appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.

B. No one shall be appointed to the commission who is a legislator, officer or employee of the state or any department, agency or political subdivision thereof, or who is an officer or employee to which any state funds are appropriated. Commission members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing officials.

C. Members of the legislature shall receive compensation, expenses and allowances as fixed by law which compensation, expenses and allowances shall not exceed that established by a majority vote of the legislative compensation commission. D. The commission, before June 30 immediately following the ratification of this amendment and every fourth year thereafter, shall review and fix the maximum rates of compensation, expenses and allowances paid members of the legislature. In setting maximum compensation, expenses and allowances for members of the legislature, the commission may establish different rates applicable to sessions, and to interim periods between sessions, and may establish a maximum rate for members of the legislature who are officers different from that established for other members. Maximum rates established by the commission shall be filed with the secretary of state and become effective on the first

day of July following their establishment.

E. The commission shall elect one of its members chairman and a majority of the members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Commission members shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred while performing the duties imposed by this section as provided by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BARRING THE LEVYING OF ANY TAX OR ASSESSMENT BY ANY POLITICAL SUBDIVISION WHOSE ENABLING LEGISLATION DOES NOT PROVIDE FOR AN ELECTED GOVERNING AUTHORITY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 8 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new section to read: "No tax or assessment of any kind shall be levied by any political subdivision whose enabling legislation does not provide for an elected governing authority. This section does not prohibit the levying or collection of a tax or special assessment by an initial appointed governing authority where the appointed governing authority will be replaced by an elected one within six years of the date the appointed authority takes office. The provisions of this section shall not be effective until July 1, 1976."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be presented to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

Rabies Quarantine Imposed

Stray animals will be rounded up and impounded under a rabies quarantine imposed on Lincoln and Otero counties by the district health officer in Roswell.

The quarantine was issued late Thursday after a documented case of rabies in a domestic animal was confirmed in Lincoln County.

The case of rabies was confirmed in a cat that bit a veterinarian's assistant Tuesday.

The cat was found in Carrizo Canyon area near Ruidoso and was confirmed to have rabies on Tuesday. The cat apparently had been involved in a fight with stray dogs.

A spokesman for the Lincoln County Humane

Society here said the assistant was bitten by the cat while attempting to rescue the animal from several dogs. She is being treated in Roswell.

Quarantine was imposed by Dr. David L. Michaels of Roswell, district six health officer, after consultation with Dr. Victor Zalma of Santa Fe, director of the State Health Agency.

All dogs and cats must be kept under strict observation and restrained at all times. Law enforcement agencies have the authority to round up stray animals and impound them.

If, after a reasonable effort, the dog or cat cannot be apprehended, the peace officer may kill the animal and properly dispose of it.

There have been no cases of a domestic animal with rabies in Otero County, however, due to the close proximity to both Lincoln and Dona Ana Counties, quarantine has been placed in effect.
