Ortiz and Light win first flight

Silva wins championship

Skies were overcast part of the day, some rain rain on Carrizozo Recreation Area golf course Saturday afternoon along with cold wind, but for the most part playing conditions were good for

the first Annual Carrizozo Mountain Classic golf tournament played October 26-27 at Carrizozo. There were two other tournaments in the area last weekend, and lots of people do not yet know that Carrizozo has such a fine golf course, which kept attendance down this first year. Also, the tournament will probably be moved up a week or two in October for the next round in 1975.

James Silva of Socorro, son-in-law of mailman Louie Padilla, getting his three-stroke advantage on the first nine holes of play when he shaded Kino Ortiz 34-37. On the second nine holes Saturday Silva shot a 36 and Ortiz a 35 to cut the first day advantage to two strokes.

On Sunday Silva gained a stroke on the 3rd hole, Ortiz got it back on the 4th, Silva one ahead on the 6th and Ortiz made the 7th hole in 2 to get back even. The 8th and 9th holes of the first nine were played even. On the back nine it was much the same with Ortiz firing a 40 and Silva a 39 to complete the championship flight, Kino Ortiz in 150 and James Silva in 147.

The first flight of medal play included David Bunch 154, George Martinez 150, Sally Ortiz 148, Johnson Stearns 165, Nat Palomarez 162, Nick Serna 157, Bill Cole 172, Joe Light 148, C.D. May 159, Jim Unruh 151 and Lewis Hyatt 167.

The winners, S. M. Ortiz and Joe Light, played consistent golf, Ortiz going with 17 stroke handicap and Light 8 strokes. Sally had nine-hole rounds of 47, 46, 45 and 44 while Light was playing tight golf going the first nine in 40, then 41, 44 and 39.

There was fine food for the golfers Saturday and Sunday noon, with Ung Cosper as barbeque chef, helped by Henry Vega and Ruben Chavez, the barbeque was real popular.

We've asked around town, have not won. If any person has pictures of inside of any newspaper office in the county during its early years - would be good thing to get them in this volume.

Election districts change, candidates change, political parties come to life while others stagnate, new influences enter politics - but the function of the democratic process of electing leaders for County, State and Nation is as exciting as always.

Few people have told us they are disgusted and do not intend to vote, we offer them no sympathy in the outcome of the November 5, 1974 or any other election. When asked, point-blank, what governor candidate they are going to vote for - a great many people remain silent or say "no comment". Such an answer is fair enough because voting is a private and individual thing.

We heard much comment that Skeen is going great in the northeast heights, that Apodaca will split the Hondo Valley of Lincoln County, and our intent this day, October 26-27, is not so much to predict winners beyond governor in the coming election as to go back several years in files of the Lincoln County News, check the precincts and vote totals and see if any conclusions surface from such a review.

In November 1958 Democrats won five county offices and have not done that well since. There were 4050 registered voters and 2654 (66 percent) voted. Democrat John Burroughs was in the governor seat by narrow margin of around 2,000 votes state-wide over incumbent Ed Mechem - Mechem carried Lincoln County 1452 to 1153 for Burroughs.

Of the 14 precincts in Lincoln County, Burroughs carried Greentree, Nogal by one vote, Bonito, Carrizozo 14B by 8 votes, Ancho and two Ruidoso precincts. That's seven precincts giving the Democratic governor a majority.

In 1962 it was Jack Cambell and Mack Easley vs. Ed Mechem and Jack Dillon for governor and lieutenant governor. The Campbell team won the governor race state-wide - but not in Lincoln County where the Republican team received 1654 votes to 1349 for the Democrats.

Offices in the Lincoln County courthouse split rather even in 1962 with Republicans taking sheriff, clerk, probate judge, one commission post, and the office of state representative. Democrats had treasurer, assessor offices and two commission posts.

The Republican governor candidate went rather big that year in Lincoln County winning Hondo, Picacho, Capitan by one vote, Greentree, Nogal, Corona, Carrizozo A and B, Ancho and San Patricio, leaving the Democrat for governor Lincoln, Bonito and two Ruidoso precincts.

The Republican governor carried by tally of 1654 to 1349 in Lincoln County. He lost in state.

Lead story in the News, issue of November 10, 1966 said that "Lincoln County elected republicans straight across the board". Republicans wound up winning clerk, sheriff, assessor offices and all three commissioners were Republicans. Joe Skeen won senate seat and Bill Shreengost state representative office. Dave Cargo beat Gene Lusk by 400 votes in governor race.

Voting by precincts followed a close to normal pattern - Democratic team of Lusk and Chavez won Capitan by 6 votes, Bonito, Carrizozo B and Ancho by a 20-9 count. This left Cargo and Francis ten precincts including Lincoln, Hondo, Picacho, Greentree, Nogal, Corona, Carrizozo A, Ruidoso A, Ruidoso B and San Patricio.

Winning governor in Lincoln County carried by count of 1423 to 1090, also was state winner.

In November 1970 the Lincoln County News headline read, "Democrats score big in state, Lincoln County goes Republican."

And that's the way it was, King and Mondragon lost in Lincoln County by 1194 to 1336 for Domenici-Skeen. King and Mondragon have been serving as governor and lieutenant governor the past four years.

The King combine carried four precincts; Capitan-Lincoln-Ft. Stanton, Capitan-Nogal, Carrizozo West, and Corona. That left Carrizozo East by 7 votes for Domenici-Skeen, Angus,

Ruidoso City Hall, Ruidoso Airport, Ruidoso Downs, San Patricio and Hondo. Republicans held two commission spots, and probate judge, treasurer, sheriff, clerk and assessor county offices.

A total of 2638 votes were cast. Just for the heck of it, let's look at the 1972 off-year election when politics were scrapping with a state championship football team in Carrizozo for newspaper space. Pictured in the November 9 issue of the News shows the Grizzlies huddled in prayer on Eagle Field at Farmington - which may be all we can do about politics above the county level.

Republicans Paul Pacheco and Bud Payne along with Democrat Bill Hart won commission seats. Clerk Barbara Lovelace won handily and is unopposed in 1974; Mabel Vigil won treasurer office and is not a candidate this year; Julia Samora won assessor race by over 400 votes, has opposition; Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. won his race by 1000 votes, has tough competition this year; Democrat Auslin Woolen won probate judge seat and died in office.

The top vote getter in the county in 1972 was Republican Leandro Vega, Jr. with 2083 votes. A total of 3386 votes were cast.

Election day in 1974 is November 5 and the political bag of worms has been shook, scrambled and used for fish bait any number of times - none of which is likely to stir Lincoln County voters too far from their beaten paths - but we do expect a few changes, and so predict.

Speaking specifically of county and district races - we predict that the Democrats will show an uplift of spirit which will be translated into more votes for their candidates, which are a better than average selection this year.

The surest cinch in this election is to vote for the three Democratic magistrate candidates, they are unopposed. Likewise Clerk Barbara Lovelace and Commissioner Bud Payne have an easy unopposed path to reelection. The Democrats could well pick up at least one spare office in the courthouse.

We've heard so much speculation about the governor race that we consider it much like the quarter horse futurity - one that will be won right down at the wire, on Tuesday when "no comment", "undecided", "independent" voters go in to mark their ballots along with known Republicans and Democrats.

Ponder these figures a lot before you predict how many precincts either governor candidate will carry in Lincoln County, or which governor candidate will win in the county.

In 1958 the Democratic governor won 7 precincts in the county - yet lost the county by 299 votes.

In 1962, 1966 and 1970 elections the Democratic candidate for governor carried four precincts each time, and no consistency to the pattern. Bonito, Capitan, Carrizozo West (B) come nearest to voting a consistent Democratic block. Those precincts will probably go for the Democratic governor again this year - but not by big margins.

We expect the three big Ruidoso precincts to give the Republican governor a nice majority which should offset Republican loss in other precincts, like in the Hondo Valley.

Then consider this - in each of the last four governor elections the Republican candidate has won by majorities of 299 in 1958, 305 in 1962, 333 in 1966 and 142 in 1970.

This year, 1974, Lincoln County has a home-county man in the governor race, a Republican with strong conservative leanings - which may be interpreted as meaning putting New Mexico's surplus money to work in New Mexico, lowering taxes, slowing up spending on worthless social projects that solve nothing, and in general helping New Mexico People meet raising costs by holding down on cost of state government.



The Capitan Tigers got back on their winning track Wednesday, October 23. The Tigers corralled the Mustangs of Mountainair with the score of 37-2.

Mike Renfro, the senior halfback, led the Tigers as he had a very big night. He rushed for a total of 301 yards and crossed the goal line five times. This is the second time this season Renfro has scored 5 touchdowns in one game. He accomplished the feat for the first time in the first game of the season. In between those two games he has scored two other touchdowns so Renfro has scored a total of 12 TD's this season for a total of 72 points.

The Tigers had a total of 417 yards rushing as Mike Beltran added 60 yards, Kenny Dummins, 37 yards and John Taylor had 19 yards.

Passing statistics read 3 for 10 for 48 yards. Those on the receiving end were Kirk Phillips, John Taylor, and Renfro.

Renfro scored his touchdowns on runs of 5, 24, 4, 4, and 85 yards. Beltran scored Capitan's other touchdown on a run of 24 yards. Beltran added another point with his toe as he kicked one PAT. Defensively, the Tigers held Mountainair to minus yardage in the first half. Mountainair had one first down in the first half which came as a result of a penalty against the Tigers. In the second half, Tiger substitutes saw a lot of action on defense.

Leading tacklers for the Tigers were Taylor with 11; John Lucero and Benjie Trujillo with 10; Beltran, Ricky Richardson, Cummins, "Ace" Griego, and K. Phillips had 9. Credited with a pass interception was K. Phillips. Having a good night in the secondary on pass defense was Robbie Richardson. He batted down several passes intended for receivers in his vicinity.

This Friday is the game for all the marbles. The Tigers entertain the Carrizozo Grizzlies in Mr. Tiger Stadium this week. The Grizzlies succeeded in knocking off highly rated Reserve this past Friday. Therefore it's all up to the Tigers.

If the Tigers beat the Grizzlies, the district will end in a three way tie with all teams at 1-1. If the Tigers lose to the Grizzlies, the Grizzlies take it all and will advance to the play-offs.

The Grizzlies scored 29 points against the Reserve Mountaineers. Those same Mountaineers held Capitan scoreless the previous week. The Tigers are going to have their hands full Friday night. The game appears to be a typical Capitan - Carrizozo football game. It may come down to who has the most desire - who really wants to win this game. Neither team can end up with a winning regular season even with a victory this week. So which team has enough team pride to win the really big one? Come to Tiger Stadium, Friday, November 2. Kick-off is set for 7:30 p.m. Be there, Tiger Fans!


Med-we-care, Inc., the group organized to do liaison work between National Health Service and the Carrizozo community should a new doctor come here, met for election of officers Monday.


