Grizzlies back on Championship trail

After a one-year hibernation period the Carrizozo Grizzlies are once again on the "Championship Trail" this year.

After defeating the Capitan Tigers 6-0 in a hard fought game at Capitan last Friday night, the Grizzlies now turn their attention towards the Roy Longhorns, whom they will meet in the Regional Play-offs at Roy this Friday. Kick-off is slated for 7:00 p.m.

Not too much to report about the Roy team except that they won their district race by receiving the most second place votes from the coaches from within their own district. This came about after the three teams in that district all ended up the season with 1-1 records (Roy, Vaughn and Melrose). Apparently what happened was when the vote was taken to see who would represent the district, everybody voted for themselves, but, they had to cast a second place vote. Melrose and Vaughn both cast their second choice vote for Roy. So, Roy it shall be.

Roy comes into the game with a 5-3 record and ranked No. 6 in the last AP Class A Poll. Their most important victory probably being the game in which they beat Vaughn by the Score of 6-0, even though Vaughn gained over 300 yards on them. The Grizzlies meanwhile go into the game with a 3-6 record and ranked No. 9 by the AP.

The Grizzlies will go into the game hurting some after their victory at Capitan. Ernie Beltran is a question-mark as to how much he can play this Friday, and also how hard he can go if he does get into the game. Coach Webb says he will go as far as he can without him. Ray Hernandez will take his place on offense and Ray Beltran will take his spot on the defensive team. Michael Vega is also somewhat of a question, but

should be ready by Friday. Without Ernie and Michael in the backfield the offensive load will fall on the shoulders of QB Raymond Beltran, along with Tony Zamora and Dick Portillo.

Either way you look at it, it is shaping up as a low scoring game with the defense dominating the game for both teams. Should Ernie and Michael all of a sudden get well, things could very well turn in favor of the Carrizozo team. Defensively the Grizzlies have come of age after having two outstanding games against Reserve and Capitan. Last Friday the Grizzlies limited the Capitan Tigers to a total net-yardage of 45 yards, and that my friends, is playing some really good defense. Plus recovering a couple of Capitan fumbles, which included Clifford Sombrano taking the ball right out of the hands of Capitan QB and going for about 15 yards before being overtaken by the Tigers from behind. Bobby Beltran also came up with a super play, intercepting a Tiger pass near mid-field in the last quarter of play. From there the



Grizzlies took the ball and marched downfield for the only score of the game, with Ernie Beltran going the final 12 yards for the TD. Ernie gained 155 yards on the ground on 22 carries against the Tigers and played a tough game at linebacker, making numerous tackles and knocking several long passes down.

Michael Vega again came through with an outstanding game on both offense and defense, getting some crucial first downs in the winning drive and coming through the line and throwing the Tiger backs for several big losses. QB Raymond Beltran continues to improve each game, running the wish-bone attack almost to perfection. So good in fact that the refs in Capitan twice blew the whistle on the back which didn't have the ball, once which probably cost the Grizzlies a touchdown in the first half. Raymond also picks up big yardage on the roll-out, and plays a real hard head-knocking game on defense.

The Grizzly offensive-line continued their fine blocking for the Grizzly backs, opening up gaping holes in the Tiger defensive front, the pass protection for the Grizzly QB could stand a little improvement, but that I am sure will be remedied by this Friday. The defense will have to come through with the big plays against Roy Friday night once again, and give the ball to the offense more often than not in order for the Grizzlies to come out on top. The offense will on the other hand have to cut down on their mistakes and keep them to a minimum and make sustained drives and take it to the Roy defense.

As far as I know the Carrizozo team will leave for Roy around 7 or 8 Friday morning. Approximately 25 players will make the trip. Sure hope lots of local people can make the trip up there. I'm sure that the players and their coaches need all the support they can get, and that support should start with their fans. A real humdinger of a crowd at Capitan.

Democratic sweep follows through in county

Democrats oust two county incumbents

The News editor was feeling the pulse of a suffering Republican party and a Democratic party that no longer needs get-well cards in the Lincoln County News last week.

Gov. Candidate Joe Skeen went way beyond our expectations in the county while losing the state by 4,000 votes. Instead of one new face in the courthouse, as we predicted, there will be two, and, coupled with that, the county races were all close right down to the Hondo box coming in last.

One Republican campaigner watching the sheriff's race said he knew the party was in trouble when Sheriff Leandro Vega, winner by over 1,000 votes two years ago, lost four precincts in Ruidoso by large margins. Vega came back to win this race by 278 votes, 1751 to 1472 for Bill Elliott. Elliott carried six of the 12-plus-four precincts.

Roman Nunez won a seat on the Lincoln County commission before the Hondo box was counted, beating incumbent Paul Pacheco 1526 to 14379. Nunez carried 5x precincts, getting a big majority in Capitan and standing off the Republican in other precincts.

Another Republican incumbent to lose was Probate Judge Kenneth Nosker. Hondo came in with a big margin for Nosker but not enough to offset the lead Thompson had gained in Capitan, Ruidoso, and Carrizozo. Final tally here was Thompson 1517, Nosker 1491.

Another race that went down to the last box was for office of county assessor. Incumbent Julia Samora was behind some 30-40 votes while waiting on the Hondo box which was expected to put her over. It did, giving Samora 137 to 75 votes for Democrat Carl Jorren. Final count was 1515 to 1487.

The county treasurer race was equally close. Democrat Emmeline Beck started off with a big majority in Capitan 275 to 134 for Veta Allen and Mrs. Beck also carried both precincts in Carrizozo. Allen scored big in Ruidoso to win this tight race — final 1571 to 1425.

Democratic Commissioner Bill Hart of Ruidoso, the incumbent, had quite a race with Republican Mike Hernandez before winning. Hernandez has relatives in Carrizozo and they must have been out working to put Mike over in both precincts, where not many Republicans got a majority of the votes. Hart won 1653 to 1413 for Hernandez.

Most of the county races, except for sheriff, were decided by 100 or less votes and that is the tightest local outcome seen in Lincoln County in many years.

Lincoln County did not follow its usual form of giving majorities to all Republican state office candidates. Democrat Ernestine Evans got majority here for secretary of state, Democrat Edward Murphy a majority for state treasurer, which has not happened often.

All three constitutional amendments lost in Lincoln County by large majorities. Apparently only one carried state-wide, that being Amendment 3 allowing the legislature to establish a program of loans to students of the healing arts.

Lincoln County backed up its home-county governor candidate fully as good as could be expected in a "Democratic year". Skeen lost the two Carrizozo precincts by 20-30 votes each, and San Patricio gave Apodaca a two-vote margin. There were 3327 votes cast in the 1974 election in Lincoln County. All figures given here are unofficial.

So after three plays, John Taylor once again was called upon to punt. It was a fine punt for Capitan as the ball was downed at the 6 yard line of Carrizozo.

Carrizozo moved out in a hurry, however. The first quarter came to an end with Carrizozo still in possession of the football. The Grizzlies were finally stopped by their own mistake. Another fumble was recovered by the Tigers.

First six-person jury verdict to Straley

The first six-person jury ever called in Lincoln County took about ten minutes to decide that Lee Straley had done no wrong in going out to check his cattle during antelope hunt on the Straley Ranch.

Lee had been gone for couple of weeks attending the state fair and the eastern fair and when he got home the first thing to do was go out and see how his cattle were doing.

Straley had given permission to the State Game & Fish Department to stage an antelope on his ranch, all patented land, and the hunt was in process September 29 when Lee went out to look things over, six miles northwest of Ancho.

He met a game official named George Downer about 2:30 p.m., told him what he was going to do and the officer said OK. About 3:30 p.m. here comes another game official named Rick Flowers who gave Lee a citation on charge of driving off an established road during a hunt. Flowers was assisted in this citation giving by Downer.

Law 532-7 and 2-9 purports to give the Game &

Fish Department the right to amend, change, or enact any rule they deem necessary to enforce a hunt in progress.

Straley told the News that he had met Officer Flowers for the first time at Petty's store on Monday, had never met Officer Downer until he saw Downer in the Straley pasture. Straley learned that Downer had been with the department since July, Flowers since January of this year.

Some words were passed back and forth between Straley and Flowers after citation was issued, Straley refused any sort of fine payment and said he would take the case to court.

Case wound up in Judge Bill Payne's magistrate court where six-person jury was impaneled on October 30 to hear case of State of New Mexico vs. George L. Straley, Jr. Assistant DA Charles A. Shaw represented the department, Atty. Archie Witham represented Straley.

The jury consisted of Robert Blaine Beavers of Ruidoso Downs, Theodore M. Bennett of Ruidoso, James E. Godley of Ruidoso, Mrs. Magdalena Montano of San Patricio, Carol W. Morrison of Ruidoso, Jackie Ann Warden of Ruidoso Downs.

Sparkey wins banker's award

E. J. "Sparkey" Harkey has been chosen to receive the award at the eleventh annual Banker's award banquet to be held November 8th.

Sparkey has always considered the owning of land a special privilege and proper care of the land as essential.

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
