## Company split three ways

### Scott Industries at work Tuesday

After being shut down for a week, Jim and Carolyn Cantrell have acquired ownership of the local Scott Industries, separating entirely from Aerodyne company in Alamogordo and Scott Air in Organ. Mr. Cantrell told the News that some details remain to be worked out but the company started work in Carrizozo Tuesday with ten people on the job and more will be put to work as orders come in.

Scott's primary business in Carrizozo is making the Scott 135 electric welder. This machine was recently redesigned by Jim Cantrell into a more compact unit which has several advantages over the older model.

The Scott 135 is lighter, weighing only about 20 pounds without the engine. Because of this light weight the welder can be sold overseas to better advantage. The frames are less complicated, the Scott 135 has a universal mounting so it will accept various makes of engines. This design factor helps the company, should one brand of engine not be available they can use another. The company will use different color fact plates to match the color of engines in use on the welder.

Scott Industries hopes to enter into a program of sales with Mexico. Engines available in Mexico would not fit the old model, but will work fine on the Scott 135.

Another part of Scott's work is manufacture of barrel cradles. This work amounts to \$50,000 to \$60,000 a year for Scott. In addition the Carrizozo company will be making parts in the machine shop for Scott Air, a separate company located at Organ, N.M., with Harold Scott as president. The Scott people purchased a complete machine shop last year and moved it to the plant in Carrizozo.

The Scott 135 is a real versatile machine. Besides the welding work it will do, the 135 will power electric tools or operate as a light plant for home, business or cabin. It is light enough to be handled by one person and taken where the work is.

The new hall is air conditioned, carpeted throughout, has room for police chief and town magistrate, as well as storage room. Offstreet parking now available and will be improved in months to come.

## Local cattlemen view the depressed Livestock market

While many of the wage earners in America are talking about depression, the cattleman is experiencing it. The Citizen interviewed cattlemen in Torrance County this week to determine the outlook from the local angle.

From questions posed by the Citizen it was determined that thus far local livestock men are not cutting their herds. Most growers are maintaining herds at the present level, selling calves and light yearlings and culling aged cows. Prices at the present level are about half what they were a year ago, with all feed and production costs storing the inflation trends.

Some producers said they may have to cut their herds if the market does not begin to build by spring of 1975. This depends on the kind of range they have available for the stock they now own. Some local producers have shipped their stock to other pasture because late rains did not provide mature grass and will not maintain the number of stock now grazing.

Monday, December 2, was the first day local cattlemen could sign up for the USDA emergency feed rations which will provide oats for livestock men who are in distress at about \$2.60 per sack. Larry Burnett of the ASCS office in Estancia said that 25 persons signed up the first day of the program for this emergency feed, significantly more than in past programs which were designed to help in areas where drought had caused hardships on livestock producers. At present it is necessary that persons file a financial statement in order to qualify for the grain program. In the past such programs offered corn, grain sorghum, and barley. This year only oats are available.

Some local ranchers are optimistic about the future of the cattle market and expect the trend to start upward by the spring of 1975. This will depend, says Mrs. Von Cain who ranches with her husband in the Mountainair area, on the condition of range in the United States and whether livestock men will have to cut herds because of drought, and on the import situation. Drought in other countries of the world could further complicate the picture, putting additional lower grade beef on the market at the same time the nation's ranchers are required to sell part of their herds.

Mrs. Povy Bigbee of Encino said the Bigbee Bros. Cattle Company people had discussed how soon they felt the market could expect some good news. They cannot make any sort of prediction because the agricultural economy is tied so closely with other parts of the economy. Fuel, fertilizer, imports, and politics all enter into the picture.

The importing of beef was cited by every rancher as factor in the decline of the market. In addition to imports is the growth of domestic herds in the United States during the past five years. The nation's beef cow herd has grown 20 percent in the last five years and the depressed market is partially the result of overproduction. Imported beef has, it is felt, put an unfair burden on livestock growers because it is not subjected to the same inspection processes as

domestic beef. This kind of product has further decreased the market value of "boned" beef, in this country.

One of the most immediate effects of the present situation in the livestock industry for the consumer is the appearance on grocery shelves of leaner, "grass-fed, baby beef, or forage beef" and others. High-production costs and inflated prices of feed have caused shortened times of feeding in feedlots and some packers are not buying grass fed beef for slaughter.

M.C. Berkshire, who ranches in the Estancia area, told the Citizen he expects the consumer to buy grass fed beef as well or better than the traditionally grain fed beef. He said on a recent trip to Texas he noticed that many markets were now offering several grades of meat and he thinks grass fed beef will be accepted by the consumer without too much notice. He said some consumers will probably not notice the difference.

Larry Burnett said he believed the people "will have to educate themselves to eat beef that has not been fattened to the extent that it used to be." He said with higher feed prices it doesn't make sense to put so much weight on the animal because much of this is waste which is trimmed off and thrown away in the slaughter process.

While local feeders have not cut their feeding time before marketing animals, some feedlots expect to see cattle carried longer on grass or roughage before they hit the feedlot or with less grain being used to put on the finishing layer of marbling and quality that Americans have come to prefer.

Some local feeders say they have not been able to cut their feeding time in the feedlot because the new grading system proposed by the government has not been put into effect to the extent that the price for lighter weight beef compensates for the time in the lot. Feeders say they do not necessarily want to fatten stock as much as has been done in the past, but the larger fat stock continue to be in the biggest demand by nearby packers.

How much the American consumer buys of the grass fed beef varieties will pose some big questions for the feedlot businesses. At this time feeders have no idea of how to plan for both feedlot and grain enterprises. If there are strong swings away from the grain fed beef it could have an adverse effect on the grain market, and this could cause a chain reaction down the line in the agricultural industry.

The general feeling of the local rancher is perhaps best summed up by Mr. M.C. Berkshire who says the established rancher who doesn't owe on his land will be able to weather the storm of depression, cutting back his heard if necessary until the market recovers.

The Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation District and Straley Brother's Ranch wish to extend their thanks to the interested people who came to their recent ranch tour. They also extend special thanks to Dutch Cox and his crew from Central Welding who served a delicious barbeque for the tour.

The purpose of the tour was to show and demonstrate plans which Lee Straley has made to begin an improved grazing program on his ranch. Greg Haussler, District Conservationist at the Capitan Field office of the Soil Conservation Service gave a talk prior to the tour to explain the purpose of the grazing program and the steps involved in setting up such a program. The tour continued with several stops at selected pastures on the ranch with explanations of past grazing history of that pasture and the effect that this grazing has had on the plant community in that pasture. Lunch was held in a pasture which had been heavily grazed for four months and then rested for a complete year. Lee plans to begin a grazing program similar to this for each pasture to improve the kind and amounts of plants available for grazing by his cattle.

He will graze and rest each pasture in a rotation cycle that will provide for grazing at different times of the year each time the pasture is grazed. By doing this, Lee plans to increase the desirable plants that are available for grazing at each season of the year. These include grasses such as Side-oats, Blue, and Black grama for summer grazing, Western wheatgrass and New Mexico Feathergrass or Buckgrass for spring and late fall grazing, and shrubs such as Winterfat and Chamiza for winter grazing. This will cut Lee's supplemental feed bill while providing more plant cover for soil protection from erosion.

Lee plans to have tours in future years to show effects of the program on his range condition. Ranchers who are interested in such a program should contact either a supervisor of the Carrizozo Conservation District or the S. C. S. offices in Carrizozo or Capitan. Supervisors of the Carrizozo District are A. W. Gnatkowski, Bill Stephenson, Bill Gallacher, Lee Straley, and Johnson Stearns.

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

# Legal Notice

## NOTICE

The most important aspect of the laws, rules, regulations governing dogs, cats and pets is **CITIZEN RESPONSIBILITY** and **CITIZEN CONSIDERATION** for the safety and privacy of their neighbors and other community residents. Laws protecting owners of dogs and cats and non-owners can be enforced effectively only if the citizens themselves know and understand the law, support and assist in their enforcement. Lincoln County residents must assist the County Government, animal control staffs, municipal veterinarians and humane society representatives, district health officer and Sheriff in safeguarding animals and protecting the citizenry from vicious animals and abandoned or stray pets and above all from rabies.

If every citizen assumes his appropriate responsibility - either tying his pets or reporting vicious, stray and abandoned animals, the governmental authorities will be effective in safeguarding the residents and preventing rabies.

Though the rabies problem is serious the most effective and economical approach to enforcing the law governing dogs and cats is citizen awareness and active assumption of their responsibility to tie their dogs and cats. If this is accomplished then the Sheriff and Municipal authorities will have a better opportunity to control stray and abandoned dogs, the number of which does not at this time warrant the establishment of a County dog and cat control staff, costing thousands of dollars. The Sheriff and his deputies can most likely respond to the need to control and disposal of abandoned and stray animals. However, the governmental authorities cannot assume responsibility that by law rests with the owners of dogs and cats.

At this stage in the quarantine declaration, efforts should be made to inform the County residents of their legal responsibilities of protecting their community neighbors and other residents from their dogs and cats. Many people may not realize New Mexico state law requires all citizens to vaccinate, tag and tie or confine their pets. Also Lincoln County citizens may not realize that the Sheriff may dispose of the animal after a reasonable effort to encourage a dog or cat owner to tie his pet has failed. To tie or confine a dog or cat or not to tie or confine a dog or cat is not a free choice of the pet owner. The law requires it!

On October 28, 1974 the Regional Health Director, Dr. David L. Michaels issued an order establishing a rabies quarantine for Lincoln and Otero County. The authority to establish the quarantine is section 47-1-2.65 N.M.S.A., 1953; Below is cited the State Law governing cat and dog ownership and responsibilities by agency, gov't unit and citizen and respective legal references:

- Responsibilities
- 47-1-2.5-47-1-2.6-47-1-4-47-1-9 County and Sheriff
- 47-1-2.6 County Health Officer
- 47-1-2.4-47-1-3-47-1-9 Veterinarian
- 47-1-2.3-47-1-2.4-47-1-2.5-47-1-3-47-1-9-47-1-4 Citizen
- 47-1-5-47-1-6 Municipal

**TEXT OF STATE LAW**  
**47-1-6 Quarantine** - Any district health officer may declare a quarantine against rabies within the health district of his jurisdiction when in his judgment rabies exists to the extent that it is a danger to public health. Upon such declaration, all dogs and cats within the health district shall be confined on the premises of the owner or keeper, in a veterinary hospital, commercial dog and cat kennel or in a municipal animal shelter. After reasonable effort to apprehend any dog or cat running at large and uncontrolled by its owner or keeper during a period of quarantine, any peace officer may kill the dog or cat and properly dispose of the body. A quarantine shall not be removed except on order of the district health officer. Dr. Michaels Quarantine Order requires Lincoln County pet owning Citizens to:  
 a. Securely fasten pets upon a leash at all times.

**47-1-2.1 Vaccination of dogs and cats required.** - Any person who owns or keeps a dog or cat over the age of three (3) months in this state shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies annually with a vaccine approved by the director of the health and social services department. All antirabies vaccine shall be administered by or under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian.

**47-1-2.2 Vaccination certificates and tags.** - The veterinarian who administers antirabies vaccine to any dog or cat shall issue to the owner or keeper of the dog or cat a serially numbered vaccination certificate containing the name and address of the veterinarian, the type of vaccine used, the name and address of the owner or keeper of the dog or cat, a description of the dog or cat vaccinated, the date of vaccination and the expiration date of the period of immunity. The veterinarian shall also furnish the owner or keeper with a metal tag bearing the certificate number and the expiration date of the period of immunity. The tag shall be affixed by the owner or keeper to a collar or harness and shall be worn by the dog or cat for which the certificate is issued.

**47-1-2.3 Vaccination of dogs and cats brought into state.** - Any dog or cat brought into the state shall be securely confined by the owner or keeper until vaccinated against rabies, which vaccination shall be administered within one (1) week after entry into the state unless the owner or keeper has a certificate of vaccination issued by a veterinarian in another state or foreign country and such vaccination conforms to the requirements of this state.

**47-1-2.4 Notice to health officer of animal bite - Confinement.** - A When any person is bitten by an animal, it is the duty of such person or his parent or guardian and of the owner or keeper of the animal immediately to notify the district health officer. Except as provided in subsection B of this section, the owner or keeper of the animal immediately and at this own expense, shall confine it securely for ten (10) days at a place designated by the district health officer. Every physician shall, within twenty-four (24) hours after his first professional attendance upon a person bitten by any animal having or suspected of having rabies, report to the district health officer the name, age, sex and address of the person bitten.

B. If the person bitten is bitten by a dog and if the owner of the dog produces a valid and unexpired certificate of vaccination for the dog issued under section 47-1-2.2 NMSAS 1953 evidencing vaccination at least three (3) weeks prior to the bite, then the owner shall be per-

mitted to keep the dog at his own premises for the required period of ten (10) days. Owner confinement shall be permitted by the district health officer if he has declared his area of jurisdiction a rabies-free area. No animal may be released from confinement except by a person designated by the district health officer.

**47-1-2.5 Dogs or cats bitten by rabid animals.** - Any dog or cat bitten by an animal known or proved to be rabid shall be killed immediately by its owner or by a peace officer, provided that any dog or cat which has been vaccinated at least three (3) weeks before being bitten shall be confined for ninety (90) days. At the end of the confinement period the dog or cat shall be released if declared free of rabies by a licensed veterinarian. If as determined by the veterinarian, the dog or cat develops rabies during the period of confinement, the owner or keeper shall have it killed and properly disposed of.

**47-1-3. Vicious animals - Rabid or unvaccinated dog and cats - Procedure following death from rabies.** - It is unlawful for any person to keep any animal known to be vicious and liable to attack and injure human beings unless such animal is securely kept so as to prevent injury to any person. It is unlawful to keep any unvaccinated dog or cat or any animal which has shown any symptoms of rabies except that, if such animal has bitten a human being, it shall be confined for a ten (10) day period. If the animal dies during the confinement period, the head shall be immediately sent to a laboratory by the district health officer.

The head of any animal suspected of having died of rabies shall be immediately sent to a laboratory designated by the health and social services department under such procedures as specified by the department.

**47-1-4. Failure to kill - Penalty.** - It is the duty of any person who is the owner or keeper of any animal, the keeping of which is unlawful, to cause such animal to be killed. Failure to comply with this section, after knowledge by the owner or keeper of the fact which renders such keeping unlawful, shall subject such owner or keeper to a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) and costs, and each day's failure to comply is a separate offense.

**47-1-5. Running at large in municipalities.** - Each municipal corporation shall make provision by ordinance for the seizure and killing of all dogs and cats running at large and not claimed or harbored by any person on their premises.

**47-1-6. Enforcement.** - Municipal corporations may provide enforcement of sections 47-1-2 through 47-1-7 NMSA 1953 by ordinance. In any area where dogs and cats are not controlled by ordinance, the sheriff or any peace officer shall provide for the disposal of any unvaccinated dog or cat not under ownership and control.

**47-1-9. Abandoned dogs and cats - Notice to owner - Disposal without liability.** - A. As used in this act (section), "custodian" means the owner or operator of a veterinary clinic or hospital, a doctor of veterinary medicine, a kennel, grooming parlor or other animal care facility.  
 B. Any dog or cat placed in the custody of a veterinarian, kennel, animal clinic or hospital, grooming parlor or other animal care facility shall be deemed to be abandoned if, after the term of any agreement for board or other care has expired, the dog or cat has not been reclaimed within ten (10) days after written notice has been given the owner or his agent by registered or certified mail.

C. Any dog or cat deemed abandoned under the provisions of subsection B of this section, may be disposed of by the custodian if not reclaimed. Notice of the intent to dispose of a dog or cat shall be given to the owner or his agent by registered or certified mail. Such notice when sent to the address given to the custodian by the owner, shall relieve the custodian from all liability to the owner or his agent for the disposal of the dog or cat.

D. The custodian may turn over an abandoned dog or cat to the municipal or county animal control center, pound or shelter for disposal by them. Nothing in this act shall affect the holding time or notice procedures regarding any municipal or county control facility which is owned or operated by, or is under contract or franchise to a municipality or county.  
 E. Nothing in this act shall relieve the owner of a dog or cat for the payment of all reasonable charges for medical or care services rendered to the dog or cat while in the custody of a veterinarian, kennel, animal clinic or hospital, grooming parlor or other animal care facility.



His parents, who showed partiality for a certain monogram, bestowed appellations beginning with the initial X on their seven sons and one daughter. Carson took to roving early in life, has traveled through Saudi Arabia, Viet Nam, Turkey, France, Germany, Holland, England, and the near and far of the continental U.S.

Research for his WANDERLUST magazine article, "Did The Lady Be Good Have a Survivor?" took the author to the Libyan Desert, the most isolated area ever visited by Carson, at Jalo Oasis near the crash site of the World War II bomber.

Crew members on the B24 Liberator had parachuted before the bomber's crash, thinking they were over the Mediterranean Sea, only to find themselves in the North African desert. For many years the U.S. plane was believed to have crashed into the sea with its nine crew members but, in 1958, wreckage of the bomber was found in the Libyan Desert and searchers soon located remains of eight of the nine crew who had died while walking across the scorching sands.

Carson's article gives full account of the tragedy and narrates his futile quest for the ninth man, who legend says survived and lives today among some natives near the crash site. In the early 1960s, before treasure fever got the best of him, Carson wrote a column for New Mexico's LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS but, later, he trekked off to North Carolina to see for himself the fabulous North Carolina emerald mining fields.

Peregrinations on the roads of fortune led Carson back to New Mexico, where he authored NEW MEXICO'S INSCRIPTION ROCK. He and his wife now live in Albuquerque, a city whose charm and history provide a romantic backdrop to research on sequestered riches.




