## Water wanted along West 380

Carrizozo town council, is a patient group of people. To start off its meeting Tuesday night the councilmen heard a two-hour sales message on merits of Matatan engineering company in Santa Fe. Ted Asbury told the council what his firm could do in planning industrial park and waste water disposal system.

The Town will need a preliminary design for industrial park to submit with request for some \$300,000 in grant money. The crux of this situation is, how much design work will need be done to satisfy the federal government, this problem to be worked out when more information is available.

The Town has taken the first step toward a new waste water disposal system, a program that will require at least 30 months, and will be government financed up to 87-1/2 percent.

Tony Lueras, supervisor of Valley of Fires State Park, attended the meeting in response to letter written by Weyland Hill to the Park Department, asking that at least five homes between town and the park be allowed to tie on to the water line running to the park. Right now the park meter is right up next to town and the line maintained by the park.

The council decided to ask the several people involved to attend the next meeting. The council would be in favor of extending water service if the people want to pay for running lines to their homes from the existing line, one going under U.S. 380 highway.

Final payment on new town hall will be made

soon as contractor installs small electric panel to complete the job.

Johnson Stearns appointed to recreation committee, replacing Ruben Chavez who resigned.

Occupation license issued to Joe West on cable TV business. This was franchised operation at one time, Ordinance 90 still on books. Council decided no franchise needed.

Atty. Archie Witham discussed probable incorporation of three recreation facilities on non-profit basis including the center, golf course and swimming pool. Plan will be presented to the existing recreation committee whereby the council will be the only board members of the corporation, allowing the council to appoint directors (committee members) and maintain some control of the corporation.

Willos Hill came in to ask about fire hydrants, said it had been ten years since much was done. Report from Johnny Johnson, public works supt., was that 18 hydrants either don't work or don't work well. Willos was advised that plans to remedy this situation were moving along, mainly the pending bond vote which would provide money for water system improvements.

Considerable discussion about what to do to control traffic coming from Malpais Courts area on to US 380 and "e" Avenue. No signs of any kind there, drivers coming up cause hazard. Some sort of sign will be put pending more positive action.

Two holes in ground need to be filled, one near new gym where pipe will be put in soon and will be filled. Other near Malpais Courts is waiting on manhole, barricade will be put up there.

Bill Gomez, Community Resource Specialist, discussed waste water disposal and other problems with town. Said that a coming thing, probably would be needed in Carrizozo to qualify for HUD money, would be 20-member Carrizozo Community Development Committee, which would include county commission, council and enough members to fill out the 20-person requirement.

New plat of cemetery received by town Atty. Witham will make out deeds for most lost of this cemetery so they will be available for people who want them. meeting adjourned at 11:15 p.m.

## School districts call for elections

Corona School District 13, Dapitan District 28 and Carrizozo District 7 have resolutions in this issue of the Lincoln County News calling for election of school board members.

Candidates for school board in any of the districts have until 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, December 31, 1974, to file in office of superintendent. Voters in this election must be registered in the county clerk's office and have until 5:00 p.m. Monday, January 6, 1975 to register to vote in the school board election.

Four positions are open in the Corona School District. Positions 1 and 2 for terms of six years,

Position 3 for term of 4 years and position 4 for term of 2 years.

Capitan school election voting will take place in the Village Hall. Absentee ballots may be cast in these school elections - get information from the superintendent. Two positions open at Capitan, both for six years.

Carrizozo school patrons will cast their ballot in the fire hall. Positions 1 and 2 are open. Ray Wells with 12 years on the board, and Wally Ferguson, appointed to fill the unexpired term of Ziggy Lessau, are the incumbents in these two positions.

## County Commission Dec. 10 report

The Lincoln County Commission met December 10, the following bids were accepted. Office furniture, bid went to Neely James \$1149; calculators and typewriters, Western Office Equip; \$459.50; bond bids, J. G. Moore Agency, \$639; bids for painting exterior of courthouse, Central Welding Supply, \$2100.

Also on the agenda; request for approval to postpone bookending bids, approved, shelving for Clerk's office, postponed. Execution of Ambulance Garage contract, postponed.

Acceptance of Warranty Deed for school land exchange approved, Superintendent Jim Sienpries was allowed the use of the voting machine in the school bond election.

Bill Trammell, ASCS county executive director, gave the News local, state and nation results of the wool referendum vote held November 4-15. The vote was in favor of the referendum by large majority, it will allocate 1-1/2 cents on pound of wool or 7-1/2 percent on unshorn lambs which money will be used for wool promotion program.

In Lincoln County 39 producers owning 36,837 sheep voted for, 6 producers owning 8,054 sheep voted against.

In New Mexico - 617 producers owning 231,294 sheep voted for, 74 producers owning 29,096 sheep voted against.

In the nation - 40,181 producers owning 7,959,642 sheep voted for, 6,829 producers owning 1,103,448 sheep voted against.





Pots seem to be the thing this year. In Roswell they are standing in line to weave the rope called Macrame. It is lots of fun. I just finished one. "Fours". This is a very old and used recipe. Roswell people have been making it for years. The Episcopal Church sell the candy every year (St. Andrews). Now cherish it!

1 box brown sugar  
2-1/2 cup sugar (white)  
3/4 lb. of butter (please use real butter)  
1 bottle of light or dark karo (16 ounces) I prefer dark.

1 qt. of cream, thick whipping cream.  
Mix all the above on low gear, leaving one pint of cream for later. When the above mixture is boiling slowly pour the pint of cream that you saved in to the candy while it boils. When the candy stops boiling wait until it boils again before you start pouring the cream again. Do this until it is all gone. You cook this, watching it until it reaches a soft ball, or 238F. with a thermometer. Be sure and grease a 14" or 15" by 10" or 10 1/2" by 9" cooky sheet. When the candy is done add nuts and pour into the pan. Let cool. Then heat the bottom of pan very lightly and turn the slab of candy out on bread board. Cut the candy into desired size squares, and dip them in choc (special dipping choc.) make a 4 on the top with the choc. They are out of this world. So take a tip on Fours!



Gymnasium Dedication

Before a big, enthusiastic crowd in the gymnasium—in Capitan on Saturday night, a dedication ceremony was held. The gymnasium, constructed in 1972, was named the Lewis E. Cummins Gymnasium on March 14, 1974. The ceremony on December 7, officially dedicated the naming of the gym.

In March, 1974, the Capitan Board of Education received a letter from the Capitan City Council suggesting that consideration be given to naming the gym after Mr. Lewis E. Cummins. On March 14, 1974 in regular session, the Capitan Board of Education voted overwhelmingly to name the gym the Lewis E. Cummins Gymnasium.

Representing the City Council was Norman Renfro. This activity was a joint endeavor by the School Board and City Council.

Serving as Master of Ceremony for the occasion was Richard Clifton, superintendent of schools. Clifton recited some of the background of Mr. Cummins.

Lewis Cummins was born in Kentucky in 1897. His family came to Roswell in 1907 and three weeks later settled on a homestead 2 1/2 miles northwest of Capitan. Mr. Cummins attended the Capitan Schools. His high school education was interrupted by service in the Navy during World War I. But in 1921 he graduated from high school. The next year he married Bessie Sellers, who still resides in Capitan.

Mr. Cummins began teaching school then although it wasn't until 1943 that he obtained his degree from New Mexico Highlands. His first teaching assignment was on the Mesa west of Capitan; then in the Tucson Mountains for one year. The next 33 years he taught in Capitan Schools.

He devoted 35 years, plus the remaining years after his retirement, to the interest and welfare of the children in Capitan Schools. While one could speak at length of his good deeds, maybe it could be summarized by saying that the students in Capitan was his life.

Lewis and Bessie Cummins had three children, one daughter, Mrs. Jerry McClung, who resides in California; Hollis Cummins, who resides in Capitan, and Ted Cummins who lives in California also. All three graduated from Capitan High.

A framed resolution was then presented to Mrs. Bessie Cummins and Hollis Cummins. The resolution was passed by the Board of Education naming the gym the Lewis E. Cummins Gymnasium. The resolution states, also, that a bronze plaque be placed on the front of the building reflecting the name of the gym. This has already been done.

A response was given by Hollis Cummins, who

mentioned several incidents concerning Lewis Cummins' love of sports and sportsmanship.

After the ceremony, the action of a basketball game soon began just as Lewis E. Cummins would have probably wanted it. One of the participants for Capitan was a grandson of Lewis E. Cummins.



### NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING PRIOR TO THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN REGULATIONS AND THE ADOPTION OF CERTAIN OTHER REGULATIONS BY THE PROPERTY APPRAISAL DEPARTMENT OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

TO ALL INTERESTED PERSONS:

Commencing on Friday, January 10, 1975, at 9:00 A.M., there will be a public hearing before the Director of the Property Appraisal Department of the State of New Mexico, or a hearing officer designated by him, on the proposed action of the Director of the Property Appraisal Department of the State of New Mexico, and repealing certain regulations and adopting certain other regulations. The hearing will be held at the P.E.R.A. Auditorium, second floor of the Public Employees Retirement Association Building or P.E.R.A. Building, State Capitol Complex, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503.

This hearing replaces the hearing scheduled for November 25, 1974 on the same subject which was vacated by order of the District Court of the First Judicial District, Santa Fe County.

The proposed action of the Department which will be the subject of the hearing is the repeal of all Department regulations in effect prior to January 1, 1975 which are adopted pursuant to Sections 72-25-6 through 72-25-8, N.M.S.A. 1953 (Supplement 1973), and the adoption of regulations required and authorized to be promulgated by the Department under the provisions of Article 29 of Chapter 72, N.M.S.A. 1953 (Special 1974 Supplement), of the New Mexico Property Tax Code, effective January 1, 1975. The proposed regulations have an effective date of January 1, 1975, and are retroactive to the effective date, pursuant to Section 72-31-87 (B), N.M.S.A. 1953 (Special 1974 Supplement).

The regulations to be repealed are to be repealed pursuant to the provisions of Sections 72-31-87 and 72-31-88, N.M.S.A. 1953 (Special 1974 Supplement), of the Property Tax Code, and regulations to be adopted are to be adopted pursuant to the requirements found in Section 72-3-188, N.M.S.A. 1953 (Special 1974 Supplement) of the Property Tax Code. The subject matter of the regulations to be repealed and the regulations to be adopted concerns:

- Definitions of specific kinds of property subject to valuation for property taxation purposes by a particular method or methods;
- Establishing taxable situs of property for purposes of property valuation;
- Establishing a method or methods of valuation for specified kinds of property; and
- Establishing rules and procedures for the allocation of the value of property for property taxation purposes.

The specific kind of property with which these regulations are concerned is tangible property, real and personal, whether the responsibility for valuation is with the county assessor or with the Property Appraisal Department or its successor, the Property Tax Department. Property valued by the Department includes property used in the conduct of the following businesses: 1. railroads, 2. telegraph, telephone or other transmission or reception of intelligence or information by electro-magnetic signals, 3. pipelines, 4. public utilities, 5. airlines, 6. electricity generating plants, whether or not owned by a public utility, if all or part of the electricity is generated for ultimate sale to the consuming public, 7. mineral property and property held or used in connection with mineral property, and 8. machinery, equipment and other personal property of all resident and nonresident persons customarily engaged in construction that involves the use, during the tax year, of the machinery, equipment and other personal property in more than one county.

The manner by which interested persons may present their views at the hearing follows:

- The Director will allow all interested persons a reasonable opportunity to submit arguments and to examine witnesses testifying at the hearing.
  - The Technical Rules of Evidence and the Rules of Civil Procedure will not apply at the hearing.
  - The Director may require reasonable substantiation of statements or records offered as evidence at the hearing.
  - The Director may also require any view to be stated in writing when the circumstances justify.
  - A verbatim record will be made of the entire hearing.
  - Each regulation will be considered separately at the hearing; however, presentation by the Department or interested parties may, with approval of the Director of the Department or his designated hearing officer, be combined to cover several regulations provided the regulations with which the presentation is concerned are required to be identified at the beginning of the presentation.
- The proposed regulations described above were filed, as proposed, in accordance with the State Rules Act on November 27, 1974 as required

pursuant to Section 72-31-88(F), N.M.S.A.: 1953 (Special 1974 Supplement). Several changes were made in the proposed regulations between the time of their issuance on October 25, 1974, as "Proposed Regulations Promulgated by the Property Appraisal Department Under the Provisions of Article 29 of Chapter 72, N.M.S.A. 1953 and Repeal of Regulations in Effect Prior to January 1, 1975 Which Were Adopted Pursuant to Sections 72-25-6 Through 72-25-8, N.M.S.A. 1953." Copies of the changes, in the form of insert pages, as well as full copies of the proposed regulations, may be obtained in the manner stated below. ## Former homesteader wins banker's award

Sparky Harkey has been chosen as this year's recipient of the Banker's Award because of the conservation work done on his ranch near Ancho and because of his past service on the Carrizozo Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

The work done on his ranch included 6 stock tanks, two miles of pipeline, 11 erosion control dams, 200 acres of brush control, 2 wells, and 2 miles of fences.

Sparky is a native of Carrizozo, Texas about 1900 and settled on the High Mesa south of Nogal near Loma Grande. He raised goats and cattle. He later moved to Carrizozo when it was just a tent town on the railroad. He died in 1914. Sparky was born here. Sparky married Rose Bingham in 1926. They recently celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary. Rose's stepfather was C. L. Robinson who had a ranch near Angus and later on the east side of Patos Mountain.

Sparky and Rose homesteaded in 1931 on their present ranch which has been added to from time to time. They are the parents of four children, Richard of Duluth, Minnesota; Howard of Carrizozo; Warren and Marilyn Geommini of Las Cruces, and they have nine grandchildren. Sparky served on the Board of Supervisors from 1951 to 1961. He has the oldest cooperative agreement signed November 2, 1946 which was also the first cooperative agreement in the district.

The Carrizozo NRCD was officially organized as a unit of state government on October 11, 1945. The original board of supervisors were: R. C. Withers, Harry Straley, Marshall Atkinson, Walt Wilson and Claude Branum.

The district was organized primarily to help ranchers with their livestock overgrazing and distribution problems. Watering facilities were very scattered and sparse, and livestock concentrated around these facilities were causing severe overgrazing and erosion.

The original district covered approximately 412,000 acres, primarily around Carrizozo. Since this time, the district has grown through seven additions to 1,025,000 acres. Over 90 percent of the ranches within the boundaries of the district have become cooperators and developed conservation plans with district help. Ranchers have been very active in carrying out brush control, erosion control, and livestock water development programs.

Approximately 70 percent of the land in the district has been covered by conservation contracts with the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The district operated equipment for earth moving, brush control, etc. for over 20 years. This provided a real needed service to the cooperators and caused some real headaches for the Board. They operated the equipment at cost with no profit realized. Many times the operation was so far in the red that it looked hopeless. It was bailed out several times by people who believed in the program, and were willing to help. Since paying the bills was up to the Secretary-Treasurer his job became pretty unpopular. Truman Spencer put up \$1800 of his own money at one time to make a tractor payment. Another time the trading of bulls around with the district somehow coming out with the money got them over a crisis.

The equipment was leased and later sold to a private contractor, Dutch Cox, to put the business into private enterprise.

The work has continued at an active pace as indicated in the annual report for fiscal year 1974.
