Lots of action during 1974 year

Pete Sedillo got out, county did good too!

As reported in the Lincoln County News, Thursday, January 3, 1974, Capitan volunteer firemen went to the Abel Pino house reported to be on fire. They broke the door in and there was Pete Sedillo, black and burned, trying to get out. Lincoln County budget increased from \$254,000 to \$350,000, including revenue sharing the county planned to spend \$483,691.

Round and about — R. C. Barham did quarter horse judging in Hawaii. Xi Beta Epsilon presented silver tray to Geraldine Perkins for her work as Corona pharmacist from 1929 to 1973. Roby Burke reports snow and winter really here.

January 10 — Truman Spencer pictured pointing at possible alternate route to Water Canyon, Commissioner Bud Payne watching. Carrizozo C of C set renovation and remodeling of physical appearance of town as prime project. Bonds for new gym in ZoZo sold at 4.67949 interest. Polly says children will love the snow storm. Hattie Phillips writes of western style wedding in Lincoln school where Billy Key and Cindy Goodloe were married.

January 17 — Carrizozo Community Association of the Performing Arts presented its first program, concert pianist Joan Ballenger. Scott Shafer joined Bank Securities. Orlando Montes and Dennis Cleaver appointed deputy sheriffs. This issue of News had map and pictures of stage coach serving this area in 1888.

January 24 — Emeline Beck was first candidate to announce for county office, Bill Payne announced as candidate for mayor of Carrizozo. C of C received good support for plans to improve "your town". Call to organize hospital auxiliary. Capitan girl tigers' swamp Ruidoso basketball team.

January 31 — Austin Wooten, county resident since 1919 died Monday. Price Miller who started ranch work near Ancho in 1917 died the 23rd. Alfred Kline accepted pastorate at T of C.

February 7 — Bonito Volunteer Firemen elected John Hall as chief. County commission heard assist. DA Charles Shaw say the commission must support both hospitals in the county with mill levy. Charles Castillo's Greyhound basketball team won junior league basketball tournament.

February 14 — ZoZo school board settled hair-dress fuss. C of C will form committee to inspect every lot and building in town; making note of conditions that should be corrected. Bill Elliott in sheriff race. Bronson Cummins wins cooking award.

February 21 — Sheriff investigating pack-of-dogs killing sheep at Glencoe. Future Homemakers select Carol Harkey at 1974 Blossom. Barbara Ward elected to head Hospital Auxiliary.

February 28 — Wild burros picked up south of Carrizozo become center of tussle between federal government and state ranchers. CCAPA sponsors square dance evening. Dutch Cox was lot bidder on new town hall in Carrizozo. It's Bill Payne and Ed Jones for mayor, no candidates for trustee and S. M. Ortiz for municipal judge.

March 7 — Joe Skeen steps up campaign for governor with activities in Lincoln County. Panyee, Roy Harman, James Silva are elected town officials. Ken Fuller, L. L. Carnell and Lee Mulkey elected at Corona. J. E. Johnston, Valton Hall, Norman Renfro and Chuck Pankay elected at Capitan. Annual pro-am bowling tournament schedule by Joe Light for next week. Old house northwest of depot torn down in Capitan, will be park area.

March 14 — Members of Church of the Brethren bus-breaks down, these people had lots of nice words for people of Carrizozo. \$2650 prize money for bowling pros. Two juveniles caught following break-in. Lewis Cummins, beloved citizen of Capitan, died March 5.

March 21 — Plan for preservation and maintenance of Old Lincoln Town started. L. Z. Manire received 25-year pin from Lions Club. CCAPA presented chorus from Alamogordo. Joe Light won the big bowling tournament money. Mayor Bill Payne appointed Archie Witham as town attorney. Capitan Methodist Church received much remodeling.

March 28 — For the first time, girls compete in Grizzly Relays. Gaylord Freeman, Lincoln County rancher and chairman of the board of First Chicago Corporation (bank) writes that their business grew more in 1973 than any previous year. Maggie Jump see signs of spring at her home. Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer and Chris Bancroft return from three-week vacation in Switzerland. Doc with broken leg from skiing in east.

April 4 — County commission districts have six candidates, John Harelson, W. A. Hart, Roman Nunez, Don Stark, Paul Pacheco and Mike Hernandez. Joe Light had another big bowling win; this time the Alamo Bowling Assoc. singles and high scratch. Bill Gallacher, Jr. house burned to ground. Tularosa girls and Socorro boys are winners in Grizzly Relays. Mrs. Claude Foster elected president of Xi Beta Epsilon. Travis Parsley shows a friendly smile in picture announcing store manager's sale. 4-Winds Restaurant (burged out in 1973) reopened for business under management of James Silva.

April 11 — R. L. Van Norman requested transfer of liquor license from Johnnie's Bar to former postoffice building, granted by town council. Sunrise service at Valley of Fires State Park to feature Molly Gayton. Carrizozo school board decides to build gym ahead of vocational facility. Capitan 4-H has sold eight cords of wood as fund raising. Town planning committee appointed includes Tom Ward, Jackie Spencer, Fred English, Chevo Baca and Albert Roberts.

April 18 — Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association announces rate increase of 75 percent. Town council received recommendation from planning committee to look at other sites for new town hall. Alice Oroscow won 10-pound beef roast raffled off by Cowbelles. Vos Vaqueros, the singing men of Las Cruces, were big hit on CCAPA program. Corona, Capitan and Hondo schools invited to attend Carrer Education Weed activities in ZoZo. Tammy Owen of Corona will travel in Europe this summer under special program.

April 25 — Lincoln County Rodeo Association expecting contestants from six states for three-day rodeo. Hondo Valley fruit crop heavily damaged by cold weather says Ralph Dunlap. Dir. Arnold Boyce and Grizzly band will present concert in Capitan School.

May 2 — Carrizozo Woman's Club won \$400 first place award as the New Mexico club which in 1973 did the most to improve the environment of its community. Public hearing called on zoning ordinance by town council. Coach Jack Mayfield is proud of Capitan girls track team which placed third in Rose Relays at Tularosa.

May 9 — C of C announces "yard of month" awards. Robbie Simpson won track and field competition for 5-6th grade boys. Elizabeth Jenkins was installed as Worthy Advisor for Order of Rainbow Girls. Capitan Junior Riders start 4th year.

May 16 — Chancy Thompson reopened Corona Trading Co. and then sold to Cason. Corona seniors are first to graduate in 1974. Luncheon was held at Lincoln for Sen. and Mrs. Tibbo Chavez. Carlos Pacheco was high point individual in junior division of state wool judging contest in Roswell.

May 23 — Public hearing on zoning (mobile homes) held Friday heard no opposition to the proposed new ordinance. Inez and Kenneth Ballenger on CCAPA concert schedule. Word received of death of Mrs. T. E. Kelley in Albuquerque. Robje reports lots of visitors in Nogal area. Steve Harkey received State Farmer award from FFA.

May 30 — Carrizozo school district valuation is \$5,240,347, budget for 1974-75 year is \$515,696.00. Recreation Center bowling league winners received awards at potluck supper. Joyce Simpson retired after 25 years of teaching. Arnold and Dorothea Boyce received "lawn of month" award from Woman's Club. Margaret Rench reports forest fire in Bear Canyon, county is dry.

June 6 — Complete election returns in this issue show Bill Elliott, Paul Pacheco, Joe Skeen, Veta Allen and John Bigbee as primary winners. A 100-year-old desk was used for signing of document setting in motion at \$124,000 water system for Lincoln. Mr. and Mrs. Johnny LaMay have new daughter named April Dawn. Super delicious dinner for Clark Pfingsten's birthday dinner at Lincoln. Kevin Kiefer and Cheri Carnell received perfect attendance awards at Corona final assembly. Sue Stearns told Roby that square dancing is really super.

June 13 — With Mike Swickard as manager, ZoZo swimming pool opened today. School board president Ziggy Lessat announced he is moving to Deming. School was requested \$151,000 capital outlay money to help with building program. James Silva, owner of 4-Winds, and Jonie Sapp and Lil Howard, managers of lounge, will have grand opening June 19. Thirty young people from Plainview came to visit Capitan Nazarene Church. Ruth and Edward Penfield started off historical seminar at Lincoln.

June 20 — Five girls in county queen contest are Kandie Huey, Patricia Ann Tully, Nancy Hunter, Elizabeth Jenkins and Debbie Lee McDaniels. Test well near Three Rivers has moved out, speculation runs high as to results, not known. Joe Barham rolled Gary's cement mixer. HERO class at ZoZo made \$435 on cooking.

June 27 — Dedication of new half million dollar recreation facility in Carrizozo set for Saturday, many visitors expected. Fishing in area lake opens June 29, a first in Carrizozo. Polly says it is time to begin child birth exercises.

July 4 — Special guests introduced at dedication of Recreation Area were Jackie and A. N. Spencer, Mae Shafer, Mrs. Sabino Vidaurri, Bill Gallacher, Tom Mann and golfer Nancy Lopez. Chevo Baca and Buck Morrison won the dedication golf tournament. Smokey Bear Stampede coming up. Ancho Rico mining equipment to be sold at auction. Thirty-fourth Cowboy Camp Meeting opens July 17.

July 11 — ZoZo school calls for bid on gym August 6. Sheriff Leandro Vega recovered 22 full grown marijuana plants in Cedar Creek Campground area near Ruidoso. 5000 people were fed at Stampede barbeque in Capitan July 4. Nancy Hunter reigned as queen. Cowbelles named Johnson Stearns as Father of Year. County valuation set at \$48,600,000.

July 18 — Planning and zoning committee approved closing of street between schools in Carrizozo. Town will assume management of Evergreen Cemetery. Ralph Petty, Jr. is named president of Bank of Santa Fe. Quarter horse show on July 13 drew over 160 entries from three states.

July 25 — News has interesting feature on Raventow, once a lively village. Mary Lou Beddoe and Margaret Stearns have planned a scramble golf tournament at Recreation Area. Involuntary manslaughter charges against Wm. Hickman dropped. Scott Industries sent its 1000th welder to market in mid July.

August 1 — Dutch, Roe, Johnson and Don are winners in first local golf tournament. Dr. Ernest A. Steinhoff says county not using available water. Ed Johnson is new man at General Lumber. Margaret Rench reports heavy rains surrounding Capitan, N.M. Woolgrowers and state wool show at Capitan. Eleven children of late Sue and Omer Owen had family reunion at Baca Capsite near Lincoln.

August 8 — Crisis at ZoZo Hospital, money and doctor needed. Wesley Lindsay heads Billy the Kid Rodeo committee. Ted Clements beat Benny Runnels in the 40-mile Pony Express Race. 11 firms bid on ZoZo gym. Time to get fair exhibits ready. Brett Carnell, Phoebe Foster, Kathy Garfield, Kathy Hopper and Mary Kilgore attend year book school from Corona.

August 13 — Patient service ceases, ZoZo hospital put on standby basis by action of the board. Bill Mac Veigh made the first hole-in-one at Recreation Area golf course. School opened August 19 at Capitan. Gov. Bruce King appointed Ken Fuller of Corona as Aide-de-camp.

August 22 — Council discusses shortage of fire hydrants, school crossing, new town hall, beer sign, property cleanup. Dorothy Guck gets letter from Mr. President, a former high school friend. Grady Lee Eldridge won best junior boy award at Billy the Kid Rodeo.

August 29 — Phil Straley had grand champion heavyweight steer at fair. Bishop Alsie H. Carleton coming for Methodist barbeque. Corona schools opened with 161 students. Roby reports lots of humming birds around Nogal. Hattie Phillips talked with two distinguished visitors at Lincoln, Hilary Tunstall-Behrens of London and Charles Behrens of California, both relatives of John Henry Tunstall who figured prominently in the Lincoln County War.

September 5 — Town puts up many choice lots at auction. News announces first football jackpot contest. Dr. Amy Barton had black coffee at Methodist barbeque. Art Kudner told News that irrigation project on O-Bar-O Ranch doubled carrying capacity of ranch. Chamber of Commerce send letter telling of many accomplishments to people of area.

September 12 — Law suit over mining claims in amount of \$4,671,200 filed against Reuben Goodman. Mobile home owners want another hearing, will be Sept. 24. No winner in first jackpot. Wally Ferguson was appointed to ZoZo school board for term of Ziggy Lessau. Ruidoso won FB game over ZoZo 42-6, Capitan beat Corona.

September 19 — Rancher Holt Lovelace was killed in plane crash on Walker Ranch. Sale of town lots in Carrizozo brought \$14,520; Mayor Payne thought sale went well, \$30 in FB jackpot. Carol Reamy doing double duty as acting county manager and clerk. Word received that former Grizzly Coach Bernie Laabs will be inducted into Wisconsin hall of fame. Thieves took only best of whiskey from Dutch's Bar in Corona.

September 26 — Pat Dunning's Millhorn Lazy Three Quarter Horse Ranch is having a big year on horse shows with four winners in tough classes. \$30 FB jackpot split between Orilda Luna, Manuel Vigil and Mary Bennett. Mobile home owners tell council they don't want to move, county will look at zoning ordinance again. Front page feature tells of work at Carrizozo Sectional Center serving 34 associate post offices. Daylene Huey installed as president of Capitan Women's Club.

October 17 — Carrizo Mountain Classic Golf Tournament set for 26-27. Bishop Robert Fortune Sanchez will visit Saint Rita Church. Council votes to ask vote on water and industrial park bonds. Pat Sandoval was robbed of cash and checks outside Rec. Center. Margaret reported five inches of rain at Capitan. Queen candidates for ZoZo homecoming are Lupita Mackey, Delores McBride, Liz Luera and Laurie Voss.

October 24 — CCAPA will present "How the old lady got the shaft", plus candle light buffet. Fishing derby planned at Carrizo Lake. Democrats had big time at lunch in 4-Winds.

October 31 — James Silva of Socorro on Carrizo Mountain Classic. News predicts Democrats may pick up office in courthouse (they took two), and Skeen will carry county by 400 votes (he did by nearly 1000). Tigers beat Mountaineer 37-2. ZoZo beat Reserve 29-16.

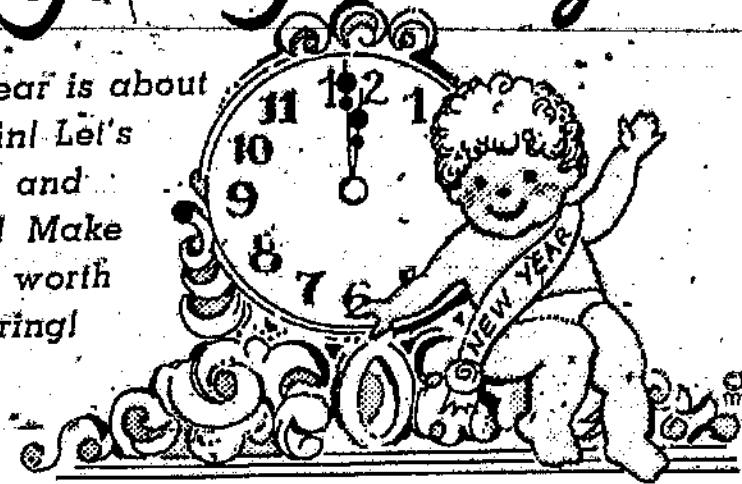
Court News

NOTICE TO LINCOLN COUNTY PROPERTY OWNERS

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE LINCOLN COUNTY ASSESSOR

1. Property valued in the 1974 tax year by the County Assessor need not be reported for any subsequent tax year unless required to be reported under paragraph (3)
2. Property not valued in the 1974 tax year by the County Assessor but which becomes subject to valuation by the County Assessor in any subsequent tax year shall be reported to the County Assessor not later than the last day of February of the tax year in which it becomes subject to valuation, but such property need not be reported for any year subsequent to the year in which initially reported unless required to be reported under paragraph (3)
3. Property once valued by a County Assessor in a tax year, but which is not valued for a year subsequent to the year of initial valuation because it is not subject to valuation for that subsequent year by the County Assessor, shall be reported to the County Assessor not later than the last day in February in a tax year in which it again becomes subsequent to valuation by the County Assessor.

VETERAN'S AND FAMILY EXEMPTIONS - NOTE CAREFULLY

Veteran and Head of Family Exemptions claimed and allowed in the 1974 tax year need not be claimed for subsequent tax year if there is no change in eligibility for the exemption, nor any change in ownership of the property against which the exemption was claimed. Exemptions allowable shall be applied automatically by the County Assessor in the subsequent tax years. Veteran and head of family exemptions not claimed and allowed in the 1974 tax year must be claimed in a subsequent tax year in order to be allowed, but once an exemption is claimed and allowed in a subsequent tax year, it shall apply to all subsequent tax years without further claiming as long as there is no change in eligibility for the exemption and no change in the ownership of the property. However, a claimant for a Veteran's Exemption may apply in a subsequent tax year for a change in the amount of the exemption to be applied to specific property.

Lincoln's share \$11 million

(WASHINGTON, D.C.) - The Federal total of \$260 billion during fiscal year 1974, and according to U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-NM, \$2 billion of the expenditures were credited to the State of New Mexico and \$11.4 million was credited to Lincoln County.

"The 1974 figures represent a \$1.9 million federal budget, when compared to last year," Runnels said.

The Congressman said the data was obtained from a report prepared annually by the Office of Economic Opportunity for the Executive Branch. The report provides a detailed breakdown of all federal spending by agency and in each county of the state.

The Congressman emphasized the report is an estimate of federal spending in Lincoln County. "Some of the figures represent actual expenditures by an agency in New Mexico and other figures are the County's prorated share of a federal expense," he said.

Runnels said he was releasing the information from the report, as he has done in past years, to provide New Mexico resident with some indication of the economic impact of federal spending in their state. "It is not my intention," he said, "to claim any credit for the expenditures by the various federal agencies, or even to imply that I have supported all of the federal funding in our State, for I have not done so."

The Federal Government's largest expenditure credited to Lincoln County was \$3,498,000 from the Department Health, Education and Welfare. This included \$2.5 million in Social Security benefits and \$423,000 in Medicare payments.

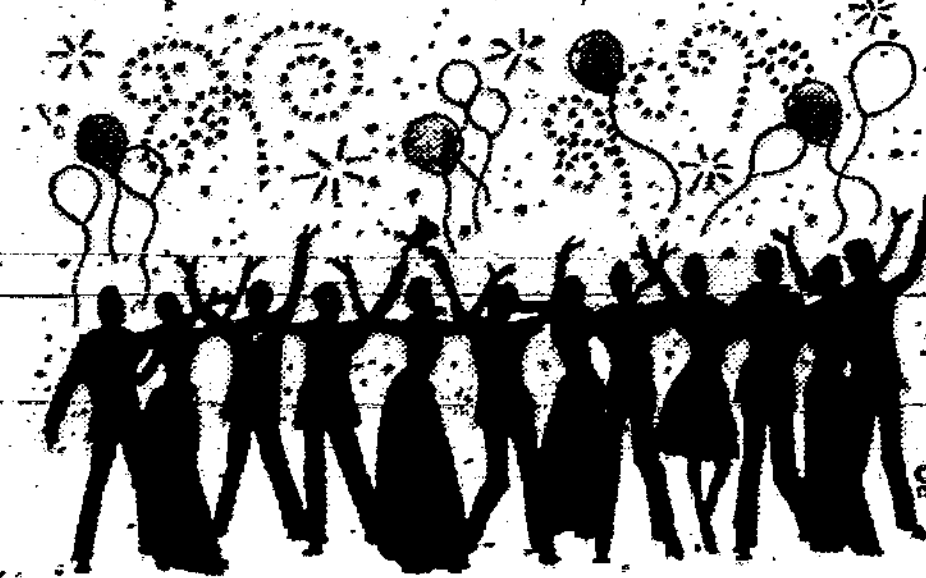

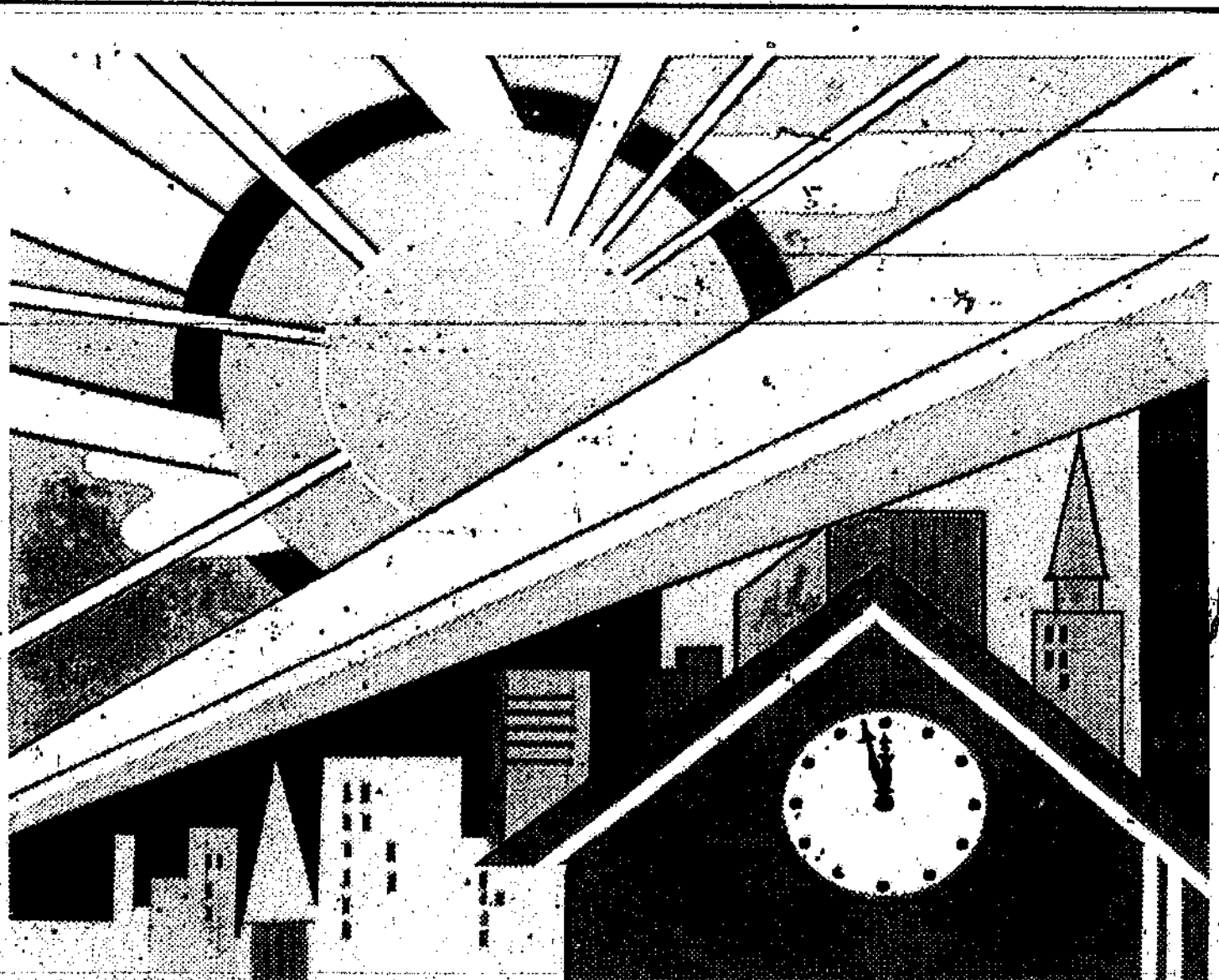

Presbyterian conference

Frank Crown, pastor of the Presbyterian Churches in Ancho, Nogal and Ruidoso, attended the "Knowing and Growing" conference in Kansas City, Missouri on November 11-15. He was a representative of the Synod of the Southwest of the United Presbyterian Church.

Learning, it's newest forms and concepts were studied in depth during the conference. Creative communication conferences, a division of Word, Inc., of Waco, Texas was responsible for bringing together two dozen of the nation's best educators.

Lectures, Seminar sessions and participant interaction were integrated throughout the Conference to enable those attending the Conference both to hear and to implement what was being said.

As the week progressed, continuity was given to the Conference by the emphasis on such themes as the dichotomy between changers and traditionalists; the rejoining of the mind and body, and the common pilgrimage faced by teacher and learner alike.

Topics ranged from Harris's keynote address on "New Discoveries in the Mystery of the Body as Temple Reflections in Learning and Physiological Research" to Lyman Coleman's Model on "Building Community through Communication Games," to John Killinger's speech on "Liturgy and the Radical Vision."

Special program personnel to make note of are Dr. Christiane Brusselmanns of Belgium, now a visiting professor at Harvard Divinity School who has taught at numerous European and American Universities and author of "We Celebrate the Eucharist"; Dr. Coulson, a fellow of the Center for Studies of the Person in LaJolla, California; Dr. Harley Swiggum, executive director of the Adult Christian Education Foundation and originator of the Bethel series; Dr. Sidney Simon, professor at the Center for Humanistic Studies at the University of Massachusetts and Author of Valve Clarification, Cynthia Wedel, author and former President of the National Council of Churches; and Ken Medina, composer and performer.

A highlight of the Conference was a Multi-Media show presented at the closing session. The presentation was prepared "on-the-spot" during the week's activities by Media specialists Keith Miller participated in the presentation, giving commentary on what had occurred.

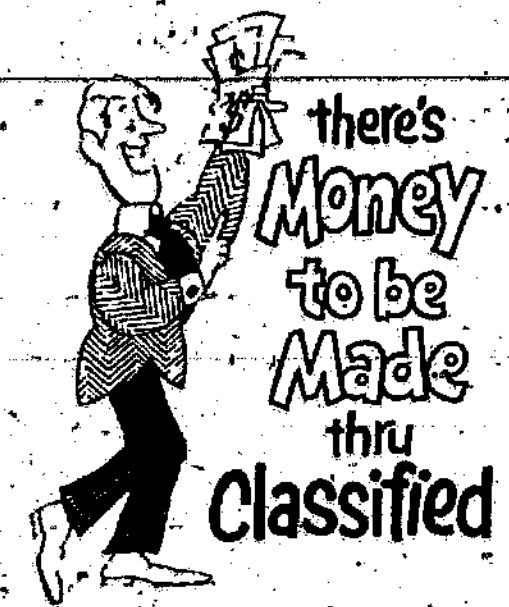

VIEWPOINT

Back in October Fred Ward, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Estancia which happens to be my home church, brought me an article which had been published in the Rotarian magazine; written by Ken Reuter. This first issue in 1975 is a fitting time to bring some of the thoughts in this article to the attention of our readers.

Title of the piece is "Recycle A Human Being" and it begins as follows:

"Littering and pollution are not confined to the world of glass, paper, metal, and plastic. Look into the landscape of your mind and you'll find a junkyard of thousands of people — thrown there by you because they did not come up to your unreal standards of perfection. In our throw away society a father will, in one big swoop, throw away his daughter, son-in-law, and granddaughter as easily as he throws a beer bottle out of his car window because he doesn't like his son-in-law's political views, or his whatever. A woman will pitch out a girl friend as easily as she does a hat she's tired of because the friend didn't follow her advice. A yogurt-eating student will drop a brilliant teacher as easily as he does a fig wrapper because he doesn't like the teacher's preference for hamburgers and french fries.

"You can't end people-littering once and for all by using the percentage method of acceptance. One hundred-per cent perfection is impossible to find. The most precise and expensive instrument will not draw a 100 per cent perfect line. There will be imperceptible bumps and wiggles. On a scale of one to 100, quickly decide how much you like this or that person. You'll be surprised to find you like them 50 or 70 per cent or maybe even 80 per cent. And all this time you thought you hated them. — It's wise to accept the imperfections of people as a part that you don't like which belongs to a whole you do like.

"Learn to accept yourself just as you are at this moment, even though you have countless imperfections and problems. Do this by admitting your mistakes and imperfections, and by overlooking them in others. Find your rating on that same percentage scale. You might find it higher than you thought possible.

"When you learn to accept yourself, it is much easier to accept others. At least, you've stopped littering your landscape with people!

"You can take a person you've scrapped and recycled him into a shiny new friend. People are like newspapers. Their words are boring and stimulating; their advertisements garish and exciting; their information faulty and accurate. Perhaps the newsprint rubs off on you, but it will wash away if you make the effort. It's exciting to turn to them each day to get the news. And you'll find their great article, if you look for it and keep flipping the pages. If you can accept the bad and the good in your newspaper — and recycle it — can you accept the bad and the good in a human being, and recycle him?"

The author points out, however, there may be some people with natures so different from your own, that you cannot recycle them. When this is

With these ideas in mind, we hope you will be able this coming year to re-cycle some human being whom you thought should be discarded. People — our greatest resource — we can't afford to waste them.
