Tax on cats same as dogs

Rate-and-half set for out-of-town water users

Carrizozo Town Council moved through a wide variety of subjects Tuesday night, all members present, with "closed door" session at the end. Dick Bradley, Bob and Betty Means, Jay and Jane McSwane were in to talk about water for houses near US380. West from town to the Malpais. The Town now has water line running to the Valley of Fires State Park and final decision was to locate park meter out beyond and household users and allow as many as (approx.) eight houses tie on to the two-inch water line.

These out-of-town users would pay \$100 for meter installation at existing line, plus \$20 deposit. They would be billed at rate-and-half for water used, which amounts to \$4.50 for first 3000 gallons, 67.5 cents per 1000 after first 3000 all the way up to 60,000.

Should the water-sewer bond issue pass next Tuesday and water lines run to industrial park area, the Bob Means house would be closer to this source than the park line along US380. Would also mean that other homes around Means could use water from industrial park lines and this would allow more people to tie on to the Valley of Fires Park line.

There appears to be plenty of pressure in the two-inch line to supply eight households. Mayor Bill Payne told the group that should there be a water shortage, the town's first obligation would be to people in the town. Town will maintain only the present line. Only one household per meter will be allowed.

Town Atty. Archie Witham told the council that he had written sign company about the beer sign on US54 South, giving them 30 days to remove the sign. He thought it would be done. Witham discussed the federal sign law, expected to have the end result of all signs being removed along state and federal highways, but may take several years. Signs are permitted on commercially zoned property.

Witham also asked that wording in minutes of previous meeting be changed slightly, mostly to clarify handling of proposed non-profit corporation being set up to control recreation facilities. Town council will be members of this new corporation, giving them power to appoint directors (recreation committee) and control functions of the directors.

Mayor Payne has been talking with Bill Gomez about possible funds that might be used to

finance new housing or repair of existing housing. Before any steps in this direction can be made, the Town needs Housing Committee. It will be composed of all or part of these people; Johnson Stearns, Tino Lopez, Jim Gibson, Henry Vega, Dan Wright, Nick Serna, Ralph Baroz, Jr., Earl Fenter and Charley Castillo.

Floyd Siegrist's name was presented by the Mayor for reappointment to the natural gas board. Siegrist is now chairman of that board. Trustee Roy Harman expressed his distrust of past actions of this board, that they look ridiculous, they've been throwing money away. Payton spoke up saying they ought to have all new management. Mayor Payne told the council that Earl Allison had been hired as manager, that he thought things would go much better from now on, that the trustees ought to go to meetings of the gas board. Payne also stated that HUD (Housing and Urban Development Agency) had come to town last year to foreclose on the natural gas company, they had been talked out of that action at which time rates were increased by 75 percent, and since that increase there have been three rate increases resulting from increase in cost of gas. Reappointment of Siegrist was tabled.

Application for occupation license was tabled pending payment by the applicant of utility bills due the Town. Motion was passed to require that all businesses clear debts to Town before occupation license is issued.

February 1 was set as day for animal vaccination. Council voted to include cats in present dog ordinance, and to set license fees at \$3 for females and \$2 for males, either cats or dogs. Council also voted to require that dogs and cats be licensed at the same time they are vaccinated. Question was asked about cost of animal control officer, Mayor Payne responded that it was costing the Town ten times as much as license fees received.

Town pay changed slightly, now same as county, every other Friday, makes 26 pay days a year. Witham reported that Town has cemetery map, that Odd Fellow Lodge was meeting that same night to set price of three acres in Odd Fellow plot, west side of cemetery, no graves there. Tentative price reported at \$1,000. In order for the Town to officially take over Evergreen Cemetery, an ordinance needs be passed and published. Such an ordinance was read and passed. Cemetery operations will be handled by committee of Roy Harman, Clara Snow, Albert Roberts, Mrs. Wm. Hayes and J. E. Thornton for the Town.

Police Chief Choncho Morales suggested to Council that it considered around-the-clock police protection for the Town. Mayor Payne said the Town had requested funds on 13-month basis for two new employees, should these come through the Town might consider full-time police protection.

Morales is on duty from 3:30 p.m. to about 5:00 a.m. but frequently gets called out in the morning. Council wanted to know why the Town could not get some help from county sheriff department during hours Morales is off duty. No answers to that question, Mayor will talk with Sheriff.

There's a lost sewer line in old postoffice area which is causing bad problems for new Outpost Bar. Johnny Johnson asked permission to tear up some paving, council objected, said try everything else first.

Last item up for discussion was proposed salary increases for January 1, 1975. Council asked all people to leave, went into "closed door" session for this discussion.

Present at this meeting were Mayor Bill Payne, Trustees James Silva, Roy Harman, C. D. May and Earl Fenter, Atty. Archie Witham, Public Works Supt. Johnny Johnson, Clerk Viola Fenter, Police Chief Choncho Morales, and visitors previously named.

Reports received by the Council included animal control, municipal judge and police, superintendent December work report and plans for January.

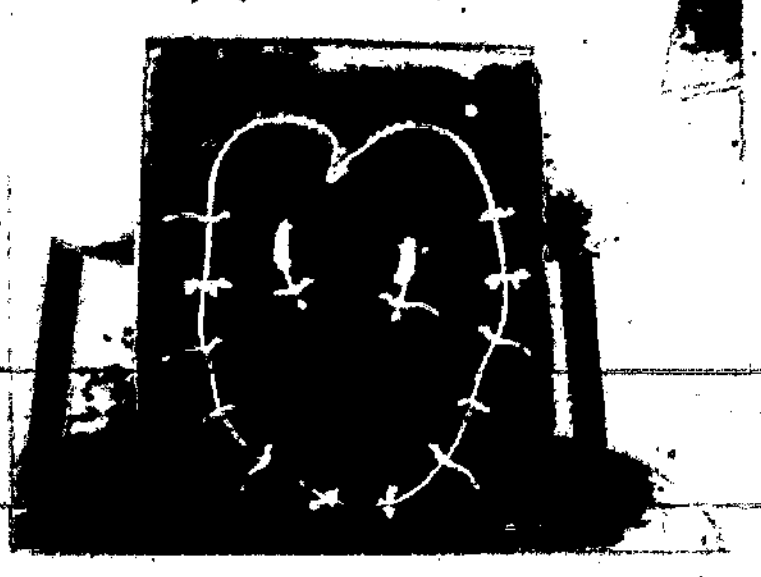

Ranchers hope for better things Carrizozo economy holding steady

Country & City Banks — This is a term applied throughout the banking industry to denote the kind of banks there are and according to Johnson Stearns, President, Citizens State Bank with offices in Vaughn, Estancia and Carrizozo, this bank is a proud country bank because of where it is located and because of the people it serves. SCMRA backing many projects

The Steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met in the Recreation Center in Carrizozo, January 7, at 1:00 p.m. Chairman Bill Gage presided.

Mr. Lewis Merritt gave the invocation. John Goodwin, the District Wildlife Officer from Roswell, introduced Jim Goitzates, the new Game & Fish Dept. officer stationed in Carrizozo.

Mr. Merritt gave the executive committee report as follows: A project submitted by Larry Powell of ENMU was introduced. He would like to initiate a conference among various groups to reach fundamental agreements as to which direction successful utilization of wood wastes could take. It carried.

Mr. Gallacher requested that a fence and grave marker be erected for a cowboy named R. L. Lee who died at Oscura in 1907. It carried.

Mr. Steinepreis asked that various agencies give talks to the mid-school level introducing conservation, environmental improvement information and career opportunities. It carried.

The Cloudcroft Fire Department is seeking a means of funding for printing a document on firefighting equipment and capabilities in case of fire disasters. It carried.

Bud Payne requested assistance on the removal of cattleguards near Capitan. This carried.

A suggested proposal was read concerning establishing a surgical clinic for horses in Ruidoso. More information is needed and this will be brought up again at the next meeting.

Mr. Leslie Olson, Lincoln County Manager, wanted a progress report on the sanitary landfill site studies.

Mrs. Beck requested that a historical sign be made for "My House of Old Things" in Ancho, telling about the history of Ancho. Much discussion followed this and it was also brought out that White Oaks and LaLuz need such signs. Mr. Abercrombie is to write the Highway Department as this is already a project measure. A brief discussion was held on project progress. A survey team is working on deeds concerning the White Oaks Cemetery. The feasibility study on flood control on Dry Canyon in Alamogordo needs a release in writing from the Corps of Engineers. The flood water plan for Boles Acres is being worked out. An easement to divert water across Wes Walker's land is being obtained. Some work is now being done on the sanitary landfill site study. An engineer is completing plans on the Pinon Pipeline. It is partly designed and they have approximately one-half of the funds necessary.

Here's water for your Saturday night bath

Sitting here on a tailbone that is still sore after we busted it on some slick ice two weeks ago, we live in hope that piece of anatomy will start healing about the same time Carrizozo heals some of its water and job problems. The Town of Carrizozo could easily win faster than Payton does. We've tried heat and a batch of things, none of which work — all Carrizozo people have to do is vote "yes" for some rather painless water-sewer bonds. You can read a story about "faith" on this page that at least two banking people have in our community and the surrounding country. The Lincoln County News editor has a lot of this same "faith". We believe this community is one of the finest found anywhere. And equally important, that we need to help ourselves in making Carrizozo a better place to live. Good water service is vitally important. People now living in Carrizozo have been suffering from low water pressure for years, and it is really a miracle that our insurance rates have not gone up because of lack of fire hydrants in many areas of our town. The bond issue will cure both of these ailments, by providing funds for new wells to be tied onto the system, and new water lines around town. We also need more jobs — in the worst way. More jobs mean more people, more people means that more services could be provided in our town. This is important, when you are con-

sidering whether to vote "yes" or "no" on the bond issue, this new bond issue will not increase your taxes, and will not increase your water or sewer rates. If the bond issue is approved it will almost immediately provide some jobs during the construction period of over \$300,000.00 project, and then our Town will be in a better position to secure permanent jobs if industry will locate in the new industrial park — it could well happen. The bond issue for Carrizozo people is not large, water bonds in amount of \$20,000 and sewer bonds in amount of \$25,000, which money will be used to match Federal funds of approximately \$248,000.00. Carrizozo people need to be thanking

seriously about some of the services that are now available in town, or have been in the recent past, that certainly will not continue if the town declines much more. Our hospital is not open for business — we miss that, and if it should reopen with the coming of a new doctor, more people in town wanting medical service will really help the hospital situation. The court house has been in Carrizozo a long, long time, during which years the population has shifted. Zozo is no longer the largest town in the area, and a continuation of decline in population here and growth in other areas of the county does not help the court house stability one bit. Times are tough on our ranchers, gasoline prices are going up and need to,

but the local and-or national picture is surely not as black as our Malpais. Let us close with words from editor Malcolm S. Forbes. "Remember, when unemployment is at 8 percent, there are 92 percent that are working, and mostly at the highest pay ever. And, prices that aren't going down are no longer going up. And whether it's clothing or cars, prices are being cut to move 'em, even at a loss. Inflation is slowed. Consumer confidence can, and will return as swiftly as it vanished." We believe that a "yes" vote in the coming bond election, Tuesday, January 21, is a vote for Carrizozo, a lot more than for the good water or industrial facilities the funds will provide. -PWP

Unfortunately Roy Taylor was unable to be there as his mother was very ill and he had to go to Texas to see her.

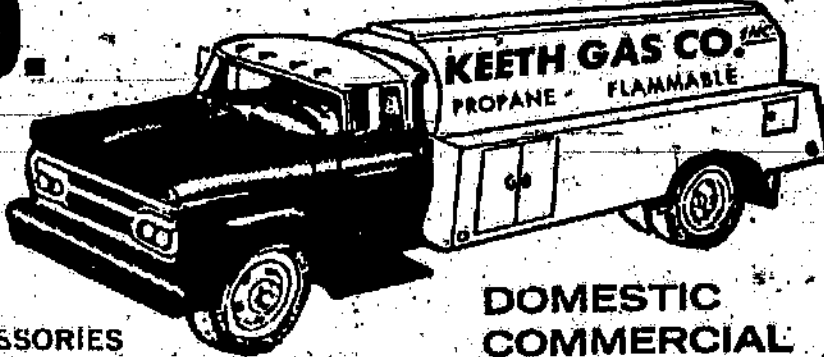
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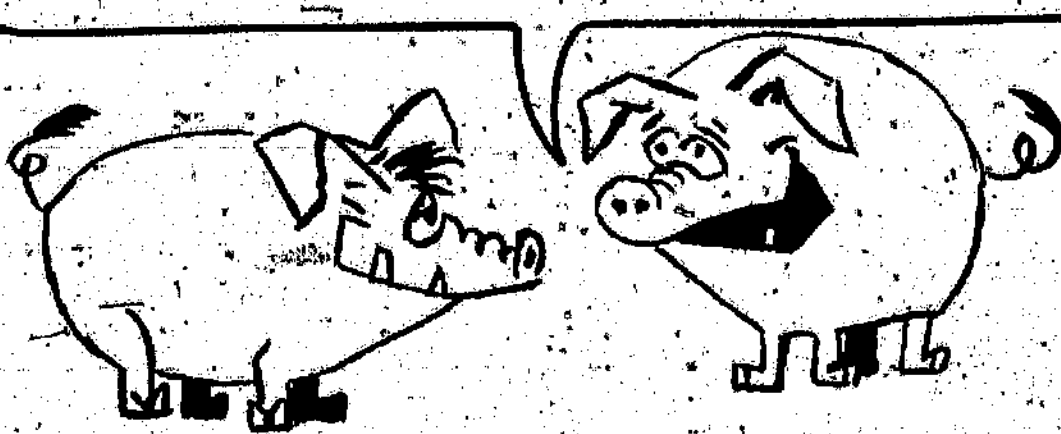
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West Point Nomination

Phillips has been on the track team for three years. As a sophomore and junior member of Capitan medley relay team he participated in the State Track Meet.

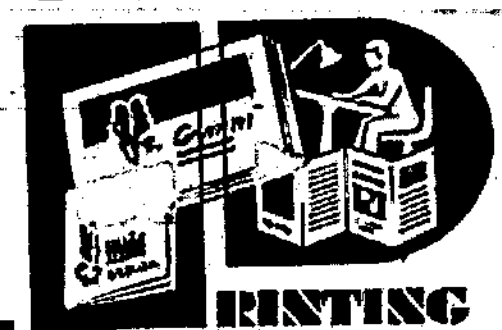

The South Central Mountain Resource Area R&D Executive and Steering Committees met in Carrizozo at the Recreation Center Tuesday for discussion of project progress and acceptance of new measures.

Representatives of the State Natural Resource Conservation Commission, Extension Service, State Forestry, Game & Fish Department, State Engineer Office, ASCS, Soil Conservation Service, County Commission, Otero and Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation Districts and other interested individuals accepted five new project measures bring the total projects for the SCMRA to 165.

The new measures include coordinating an effort between various agencies for the utilization of wood residue.

A marker for the grave of R. L. Lee at Oscura was requested and accepted.

Mrs. Steinepreis, Superintendent of Carrizozo Schools, requested assistance to have various agencies give talks at the mid-school level to aid students in the educational aspects of the environment. This met with much enthusiasm from the group.

The Village of Cloudcroft Fire Department is asking for financial aid in having a catalog printed containing data of all available fire fighting and emergency equipment for south central New Mexico. This need has been recognized since the Spring Fire. It is felt that such information catalogued would be very valuable to Lincoln County also.

Lincoln County Commissioner Bud Payne requested assistance in getting several cat-leaguards near Capitan moved.

The next meeting will be February 25th in Ruidoso.

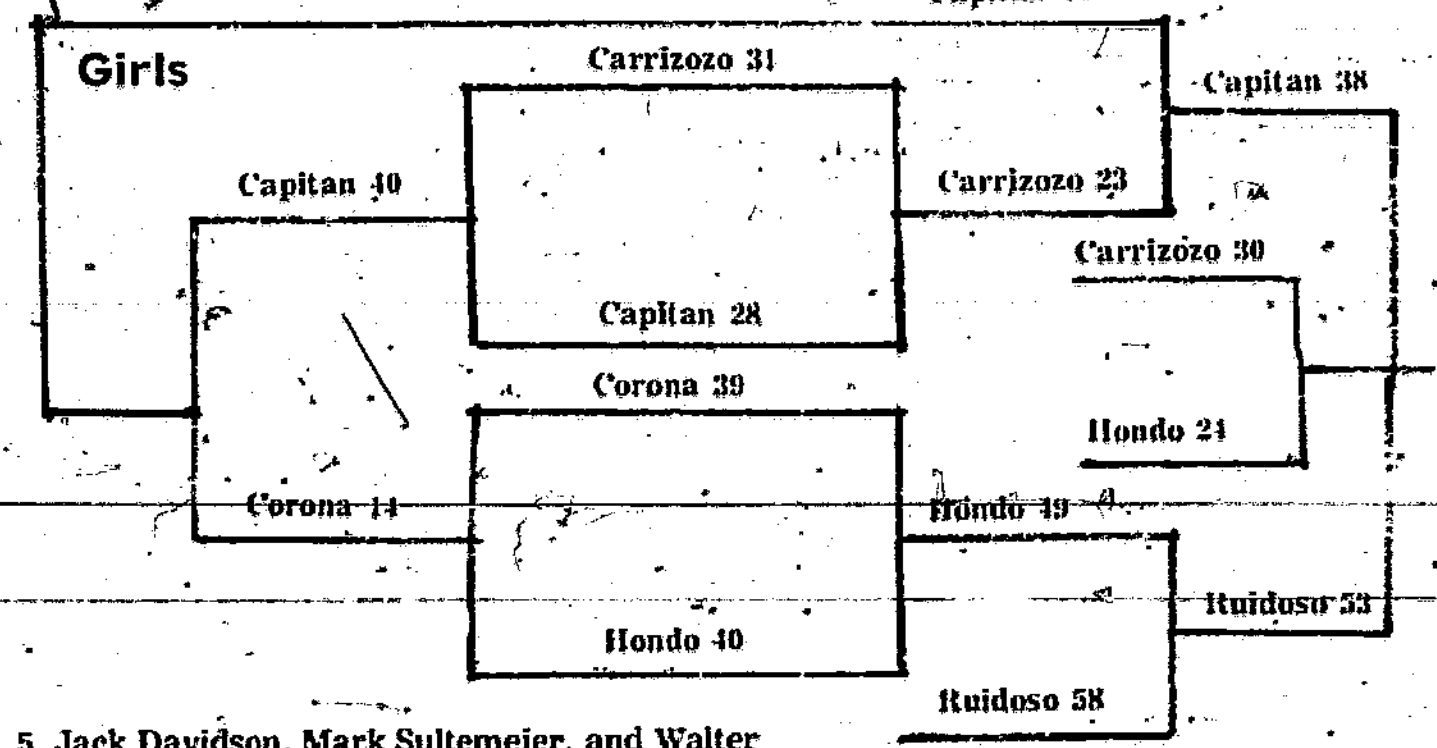
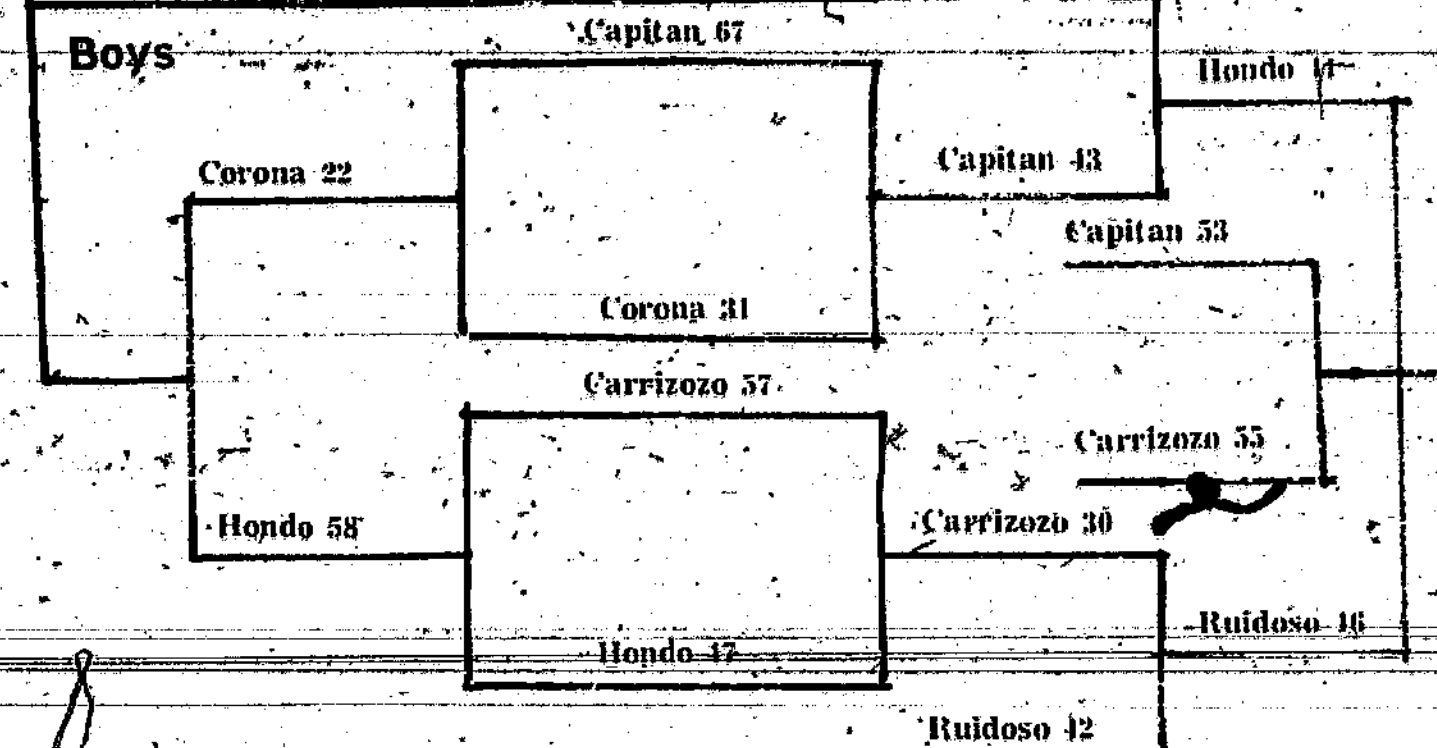

Voter Approval of Water-Sewer Bond Means More Jobs and Progress for Carrizozo . . .

On Tuesday, January 21, 1975, the Town of Carrizozo will hold a Bond Election. There will be two bond issues voted on. One will be a Water Bond in the amount of \$60,000.00. The other will be a Sewer Bond of \$25,000.00.

A tablespoon of gardening in January
Any of you who have hanging baskets might note the following - Wandering Jew, this little vine can grow beautifully. "Botanically" it is called "Tradescantia," as a child I called it "Wandering Jew". It had green jelly looking leaves. In the summer it had small bright blue flowers. We always saved a few pieces before the frost killed it. I will grow in water alone.

The fancy ones we know today have striped leaves with white and green variegation leaves that are green on one side and purple on the other and the solid green ones that are both dark green and light are a new variety that I discovered in a nursery last year. To keep it full, bushy break off the ends. Get the ends to transplant. They do well with or without drainage.

Now if you have never grown any thing this is the one for you. You might have a friend who will give you a cutting. It is really exciting to have a little plant that depends on you and that produces living beauty in the house.
