Doctor's arrival to culminate

With the arrival of Dr. Marie Cortelyou, April 15 will be a red letter day for all citizens within the Carrizozo Medical Trade area.

The arrival of Dr. Cortelyou cumulates months of effort by Med-We-Care, Inc. Being instrumental in having part of Lincoln County declared a critical medical shortage area, Med-We-Care then made application to the National Health Service Corps for the services of two physicians to serve the area.

Med-We-Care will be setting up practice with the first physician on April 15 and a second practice will be possibly set up in July of 1975. This will mean that the Carrizozo Medical Trade area will have three full time physicians and adequate medical service will once again be avallable.

Med-We-Care is a tax exempt organization that will be required to pay back, to the federal government, all of Dr. Cortelyou's salary in addition to paying all the office expense, the salaries of its staff, and purchase supplies and equipment to assist the physicians.

An estimated \$10,000 will be needed during the first three months Dr. Cortelyou is in practice. Additional funds will be required when the second doctor is brought in. To defray these sizable expenses Med-We-Care

will collect and allocate the doctor's fees. However, particularly at first, these fees will not be sufficient to cover the costs involved. Med-We-Care is requesting that all people of

Escapee's exploits wild

An escapee from the state penitentiary's Los Lunas honor farm whose exploits in Lincoln County had the County wide-eyed was last reported in serious but stable condition at a Roswell hospital after shooting himself in the stomach area at Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital, last Thursday.

As he was being prepared for transfer back to the prison farm, last Thursday, Owin Lee Reinhart, 25, grabbed a pistol from a mounted patrolman and shot himself.

Reinhart was held overnight for observation at the Ruidoso hospital after he rammed his stolen car into a State Police vehicle at a roadblock out

of Capitan about 10:30 p.m. the night before. State Policeman Jack Johnson, who was in the parked police car at the roadblock, suffered a head cut requiring eight stitches in the accident which wiped out the police car and Reinhart's stolen vehicle.

The action started in Carrizozo near the town limits on U. S. 380 west when City Marshall Choncho Morales and John Works asked Reinhart, who had stopped at a bar, for his identification. Reinhart said the papers were in the glove compartment of his car, got in the car and roared off through Carrizozo toward Capitan where he later rammed Johnson's vehicle.

Morales and Works were in hot pursuit of Reinhart as the escapee approached Capitan.

They were in the restaurant business at Mountainview, Calif.,

Hat Ranch wins permits sui

A history-making precedent was set recently when sections of the Taylor Grazing Act, dealing with renewal of grazing permits on BLM land, were upheld by the Administrative Law Judge for the Department of Interior, Robert W.

His decision followed a hearing October 23. 1974 on an appeal filed by Hat Ranch, Inc. The District Manager of the Las Cruces Grazing District had previously turned down a request by Hat Ranch to renew its 10-year grazing permits. stating that only a term permit for a period of three years would be issued, pending the completion of a Framework Plan.

Section of the Taylor Grazing Act provides in part, that: ...no permittee complying with the rules and regulations laid down by the Secretary of Interior shall be defiled the renewal of such permit, if such denial will impair the value of the grazing unit of the permittee, when such unit is pledged as security for any bona fide loan...

Hat Ranch had 10-year grazing permits for two ranch units, covering the period from March 1, 1964 to February 28, 1974. The permits were pledged as security or collateral for bona fide loans. In the request for 10-year renewals, Hat Ranch pointed out that it would make it possible to "pledge the same as collateral with my financial institutions, as per their request."

Regarding the question of whether the refusal to renew the 10-year permits impairs the value of the grazing unit which is pledged as security for loans, Judge Mesch said, "It might be argued that it is not necessary to even consider this quest inasmuch as a permittee has a preference right of renewal in the discretion of the Secretary, and if there is no justifiable reason for a denial of a renewal, then the permit should be renewed, even if there is no showing that a failure to renew will impair the value of the grazing unit pledged as security for a loan."

The District Manager took the position that there was essentially no difference between a 10year permit and a 3-year permit or an annual license. In regard to licenses, Judge Mesch said, "After some 40 years of operation under the a Taylor Grazing Act, a question might be raised concerning the authority of the BLM to continue to issue licenses as a temporary measure under the implied authority of Section 2 of the Act rather than permits under the specific authority of the Act." (In the early stages of the administration of the Act, it was recognized that, before it would be desirable to issue permits, a

n by Ralph Dunlap Peavine or annual loco is likely to be found in many areas of Lincoln County with the recent moisture. Peavine is one of several plants that cause alkaloid poisoning. Its poisonous potential is much greater on some areas than others. Generally soils of limestone origin have fewer

alkaloid poisoning problems. The alkaloid poisoning affects the nervous system. Some of the symptoms are trembling of muscles, lack of coordination and labored breathing. Animals that have just been off the bad ground are often unable to use their hind legs properly and their hoofs hit together; this is called "clicker Disease" by some.

There is no antedote for peavine poisoning, only good feed and care can overcome the effects of poisoning.

When using insecticides or herbicides: It's a faulty reasoning to think that using twice the recommended amount will give better results. Recommended rates of application are the result of long periods of scientific study by qualified researchers in both government and industry. The label recommendations cannot be improved by a person's "questimation," so follow the recommendations printed on the label of each

Lincoln County Home Economist It is easy to see why Adam was to easily tempted by the apple. It is a most delicious and versatile fruit. Apples are used with every part of the meal and for snacks. They seem to be the most popular for dessert. The International Apple Institute recommends Individual Apple

1 cup sugar 3 tabisps flour 18 teasp sait

14 teasp nutmeg 4 cup water 2 cans (20 oz each) pie-sliced apples or 4 cups home-canned

sliced apples 1/2 teasp cinnamon 3 cups biscuit mix Combine sugar, flour, salt, spices and water; mix well. Add apples; blend well. Cook over low heat, stirring often, until apples are tender and syrup thickened; so that mixture resembles pie

filling. Prepare biscuit mix as directed on package; divide in half. Roll ½ dough to ½ inch thickness; use to line four 6-inch pie pans. Elute or crimp edges. Fill pans with hot apple mixture. Dot with butter. Roll out remaining biscuit dough about 12-inch thick cut with 1" cutter. Place 4 biscuits on top of each filled pie pan. Bake at 425 for 20 minutes. Makes 4 individual cobblers 6 inches in diamater.



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

The Lincoln County Homemaker

It's not just the \$\$\$'s you spend but think a little about the amount of energy your family uses. Gas and electricity are limited. These things can run out if they are not used wisely. Remember the "brown-outs" in the East coast last year? Is this a warning about what the future may hold? Let's look at what each one of us can do in our home and we'll start with one item - hot water. You hot water heater takes 15 percent of the energy used in the home. Lowering the water temperature would save money, but for health reasons, it's well to keep the temperature set at 140 degrees F. Hot water - 140 degrees F. - is still needed in automatic dishwashers and in hot water laundering to prevent the spread of colds and other infections. What steps can you take then to stretch your hot water dollar? Stop all hot water leaks. Insulate hot water pipes. You're spending \$28 a year for each family member who takes a long hot shower. A tub bath uses 10 to 15 gallons more water than a short shower. Consider cold water rinses for laundry. Wash full loads in the clothes washer and the dishwasher.

This newsletter will be talking a lot more to use of energy in the months to come. The problem is here and now, and htmemakers with their families should be solving a lot of the problems.

Sewing shears are important to do a good job. Good quality shears will last a lifetime; if they receive good care. Dressmaker shears have bent handles so the blades will slide along the table and allow the fabric and pattern to lie flat. There isn't anything that makes sewing or mending harder than a dull pair of scissors. Plan on hiding your sewing shears from the rest of your family. They should not be used to cut paper dolls, model cars or in er of any kind; (the things children and husbands will do with them). Items other than fabric will dull and nick good shears. Store the shears in a cover. Always take them to a professional, sharpener or return to the manufacturer for shaprening.

Good food buys Watch for these food items to be good buys because of plentiful supplies: Beef plentiful supply. Pears - plentiful. D'Anjous especially. Apples - cold storage stocks are 7 percent more than a year ago. Fresh Citrus Fruits plentiful. Stocks of Florida frozen concentrated orange juice are highest of record. Potatoes - fresh and processed, are expected to continue plentiful into March.

Food for thought—Sugar, candies, syrup jellies soft drinks and alcohol add calories - but February shows \$245 paid in fines. little or no food value to the diet.

Clothes prices: If you are buying children's clothing, you know how much prices have soared on clothing. It is bad enough for adults, but children just keep growing and growing. We can cut down on our one expenses by wearing our clothes longer and remodeling them. There is another thing we can do. Demand quality!

As a consumer you may be able to help change "declining quality" situation. Complain and return the dress, or better yet do not buy it. For every dress returned, there may be tengothers that should have been returned. If the manufacturer cannot ship proper goods then the retailer should take a stand and send it back or not buy from them again. If the consumers make enough honest returns, the retailer could be forced to take a stand. A domino reaction could make an impact at the source. Consumer voices will have to get louder if we want quality. T. H. Thompson said, "Be kind - Remember everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle."





Nevertheless, Jake got hold of some matches, a lighted match got away from him and set his chair on fire. Probably the chair burned awhile before Jake noticed it and called to his family. They came running in to help him out of the chair but by that time Jake had burns all down his leg, some fifteen percent of his body.

The incident happened January 25, Mr. Fullmer was taken to hospital where skin grafts were performed, all took and he seemed to be

J. H. Fullmer

One of Carrizozo's most beloved citizens and coming along fine. He was moved to nursing long-time resident, J. H. Fullmer, Jr. died home to complete recovery last Thursday. Sunday the 16th he died. Margaret felt that he had decided he'd seen enough of this world.

Mr. Fullmer made trips to New Mexico early in this century, probably before statehood, and the family moved to Lincoln County to stay in 1918. Mrs. Fullmer died in Carrizozo in 1966 and was buried at Cedarvale Cemetery at White Oaks. Mr. Fullmer was cremated at Sierra Madre and the remains will be brought to Cedarvale for burial near his wife, probably this summer.

Survivors include two sons, Walter of Dillon, Colorado, and Bill in Sierra Madre, California,

Margaret Fullmer said that Jake had received lots of help from Lighthouse of the blind Organization, and that people wanting to make memorial gifts could well give to this worthy organization.

Lincoln County lost one of its most honored citizens with the passing of J. H. Fullmer (Jake) at Sierra Madre, California, March 16, 1975. Mr. Fullmer came here in 1907 from his old

home in Mishawaka, Indiana, and settled in the then flurishing mining community at Parsons. He had become very interested in furthering mining industry in this area and undertook the management of the Parsons mine and mill in which he had invested heavily and caused to be vastly expanded. He forsaw that mining required and abundance of power and so installed the first power plant in the county at White Oaks with service to the mines there and by a high line to Parsons. To provide fuel for the plant his company developed the coal mines at White Oaks which provided coal for the Carrizozo area for many years.

Gold mining here as elsewhere was seriously hampered by the advent of World War I with its surge of increasing costs in materials and labor which lead to the virtual extinction of gold mining in Lincoln County about 1917. The static price of gold could not absorb the increased costs. However one progressive move leads to another in the chain of human achievement; it was Mr. Fullmer's energy and vision that lead

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him with his long time Partner, John E. Wright. to build a power plant in Carrizozo, and, among other enterprises, to start the Ruidoso Telephone Company, now one of the largest independent telephone companies in the southwest.

Many of us will remember with affection Jake's kindness and hospitality, his concern about everyones welfare, the late afternoons with Jake and his Marie (who predeceased him in 1966) at their lovely home; his shuffle into your hospital room to see how you were when you were incapacitated; his booming and infectious laughter that could be heard a block. In the Lincoln County museum there is an old incandescent electric lamp which purports to be his forst, the first one in Lincoln County and like Jake's good deeds it still glows when connected.

Anglers are still getting use from their 1974-75 licenses, which expire March 31. Fishing generally is slow to fair, both in spiny-ray waters and in trout streams and lakes. Warming waters, however, are expected to increase fishes' feeding activities, - and anglers' catches.

Both trout and spiny-ray waters have new regulations going into effect on April 1, the day new licenses - with trout stamps for designated trout waters - are required.

The new possession limit on trout will be 16: _however, the game department reminds anglers the daily bag limit is eight trout.

Two-pole fishing is allowed in spiny-ray fishing waters except during those periods when a trout stamp is required, as in during the winter months in winter trout waters.

The 1975-76 fishing proclamation and new license forms are available now from license vendors and game department offices. Fishermen are urged to study all regulations carefully and to avoid violations,

The spring turkey hunt opens April 19 one-half hour before sunrise and ends at sunset nine days later, April 27. A total of 4,400 permits are available; including 1,500 in Area D, in the Sacramento Mountains, and 1,000 in Area E, the Capitan Mountains.

Turkey hunters should apply on Form C, available from license vendors and game department offices and have the application in no later than March 27.

The only fee to accompany the application is a \$1, nonrefundable fee. Successful applicants will be mailed an authorization to buy a license, which they can obtain from local vendors or game department offices.

If the number of applications exceeds the number of permits available, the authorizations will be awarded by public drawing.

The turkey regulation authorizes the game department to close turkey hunting in areas closed to entry due to extreme fire danger. Successful applicants are advised to wait to buy their licenses until it becomes clear the hunt will be held. No license fees will be refunded.





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
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
