Doctor's arrival to culminate county effort

With the arrival of Dr. Marie Cortelyou, April 15 will be a red letter day for all citizens within the Carrizozo Medical Trade area.

The arrival of Dr. Cortelyou cumulates months of effort by Med-We-Care, Inc. Being instrumental in having part of Lincoln County declared a critical medical shortage area, Med-We-Care then made application to the National Health Service Corps for the services of two physicians to serve the area.

Med-We-Care will be setting up practice with the first physician on April 15 and a second practice will be possibly set up in July of 1975. This will mean that the Carrizozo Medical Trade area will have three full time physicians and adequate medical service will once again be available.

Med-We-Care is a tax exempt organization that will be required to pay back, to the federal government, all of Dr. Cortelyou's salary in addition to paying all the office expense, the salaries of its staff, and purchase supplies and equipment to assist the physicians.

An estimated \$10,000 will be needed during the first three months Dr. Cortelyou is in practice. Additional funds will be required when the second doctor is brought in.

To defray these sizable expenses Med-We-Care will collect and allocate the doctor's fees. However, particularly at first, these fees will not be sufficient to cover the costs involved.

Med-We-Care is requesting that all people of the Medical Trade area think of the great advantage of having adequate health care services and give to this worthy cause.

The funds solicited will be used only to defray expenses and procure necessary supplies and equipment and are totally tax deductible.

An Open Letter to Lincoln County,

The people of Med-We-Care asked me to write something about myself for the local newspapers.

Well, I can't climb a wall no one else can climb, nor kill a dragon in record time; so I will keep the part about myself as brief as possible and then get on to talking about you, and us, and what we can do to make good health care more accessible.

A 1960 graduate of the University of Illinois College of Medicine, I interned in Flint, Mich., worked at the Sandia Base Hospital near Albuquerque and the Open Door Medical Clinic in Isla Vista, Calif. After moving from Albuquerque I found myself yearning to return to New Mexico.

Now, courtesy of the National Health Service and the people of Lincoln County, I get to return and stay in New Mexico.

Traditionally, most doctors have been a figure of authority, whose judgement was not to be questioned. While it may still be that way in some offices, it will not be so in mine. I believe in the let-us-reason-together approach to medicine. You can and should know at least as much about maintaining your body as you do about

maintaining your car.

Your part of the task of maintaining your own health becomes greater, the farther you are from your doctor and hospital.

You the people in the Carrizozo medical trade area, want and deserve better, more accessible health care. You can have it with three kinds of investments:

1. Everyone can become more interested, more knowledgeable and more responsible for personal and family health.

2. Some people can become community health teachers and workers and emergency medical technicians.

3. All area citizens can become involved by supporting the efforts of Med-We-Care both with moral support and financially. Bringing additional medical care into Lincoln County is both time consuming and expensive.

I will close with saying I am going to like being one of your doctors. I will be seeing you April 15.

Center remains in bind

Corona Mayor Ken Fuller thought he and the town of Corona had \$1,900 coming from the county of Lincoln via recreation funds but the water surrounding that issue are muddled.

County Manager Les Olson told Fuller at a commission meeting last Friday that he could find no reference to such an agreement in the minutes of county commission meetings last year.

And in the meantime, the attorney general has given an opinion which says counties cannot contribute money to projects within towns or cities.

This apparently leaves Corona with a youth center, a \$40,000 one, that is closed for lack of restroom facilities and which needs a new roof.

And Corona citizens so far are out of pocket for "engineering" Fuller said he was told in Santa Fe had to be done on the youth Center project.

Fuller appeared before the county commission Friday to request the \$1,900 or to determine what had happened to it. He produced a letter from the former acting county manager, which indicated the commission last year had approved \$1,700.

But minutes show no such agreement.

There may be a way out. County Manager Olson said the Department of Finance in Santa Fe will approve joint town-

county youth-oriented recreation fund projects where it is shown that both town and rural youths will benefit from the projects.

Olson was advised by Commissioner Bill Hart to go to Corona and with Mayor Fuller draw up a plan or proposal for a project which would satisfy Santa Fe so that funds can be allocated. "Our tail is in a crack...we don't know what to do," Mayor Fuller told the commission.

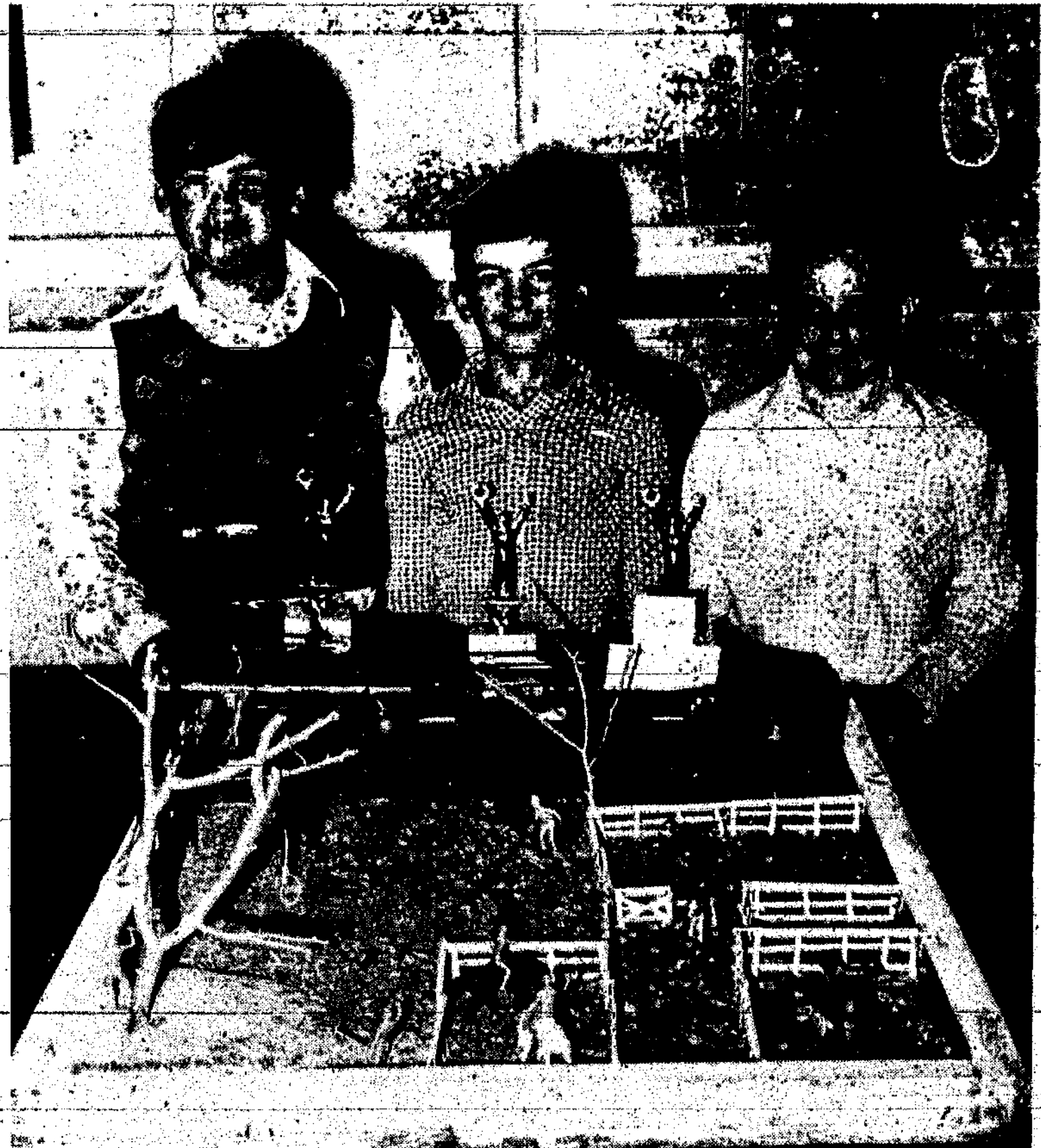
Commissioner Bud Payne told him, "It's illegal what we promised...you'll just have to hit us with a stick."

New DFA guidelines require agreements and contracts on joint town-county recreation projects for youth.

Meanwhile the engineering has been done on the restrooms, but, no restrooms.

Fuller was accompanied to the commission meeting by Deputy Sheriff Dave Wheeler.

Escapee's exploits wild
An escapee from the state penitentiary's Los Lunas honor farm whose exploits in Lincoln County had the County wide-eyed was last reported in serious but stable condition at a Roswell hospital after shooting himself in the stomach area at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital, last Thursday.
As he was being prepared for transfer back to the prison farm, last Thursday, Owin Lee Reinhart, 25, grabbed a pistol from a mounted patrolman and shot himself.
Reinhart was held overnight for observation at the Ruidoso hospital after he rammed his stolen car into a State Police vehicle at a roadblock out of Capitan about 10:30 p.m. the night before.
State Policeman Jack Johnson, who was in the parked police car at the roadblock, suffered a head cut requiring eight stitches in the accident which wiped out the police car and Reinhart's stolen vehicle.
The action started in Carrizozo near the town limits on U. S. 380 west when City Marshall Choncho Morales and John Works asked Reinhart, who had stopped at a bar, for his identification. Reinhart said the papers were in the glove compartment of his car, got in the car and roared off through Carrizozo toward Capitan where he later rammed Johnson's vehicle.
Morales and Works were in hot pursuit of Reinhart as the escapee approached Capitan.

Asa F. Evans dies
Asa F. Evans, former resident of Tucumcari and Alamogordo with both relatives and friends in Carrizozo, died March 10 in hospital at Los Altos, California. He had been hospitalized for 25 days. Mr. Evans was 78.
Albert Roberts and Red Eaker of Carrizozo have two sisters, Alma Evans; wife of the deceased, who lives at 840 Parmaway, Los Altos, Ca. 94022, and Carrie Bacot of Carlsbad, Calif.
Mr. and Mrs. Evans were married in 1927 at Tucumcari. They operated a restaurant there in the 1920s and 30s, and a short time in Alamogordo in 1940s. They were in the restaurant business at Mountainview, Calif., during the war and retired about five years ago.
Both of the Evans were members of the Masonic Order at Tucumcari, Mrs. Evans serving as Worthy Matron of Order of Eastern Star.
According to Red Eaker the funeral service will be in Tucumcari either Thursday or Friday.

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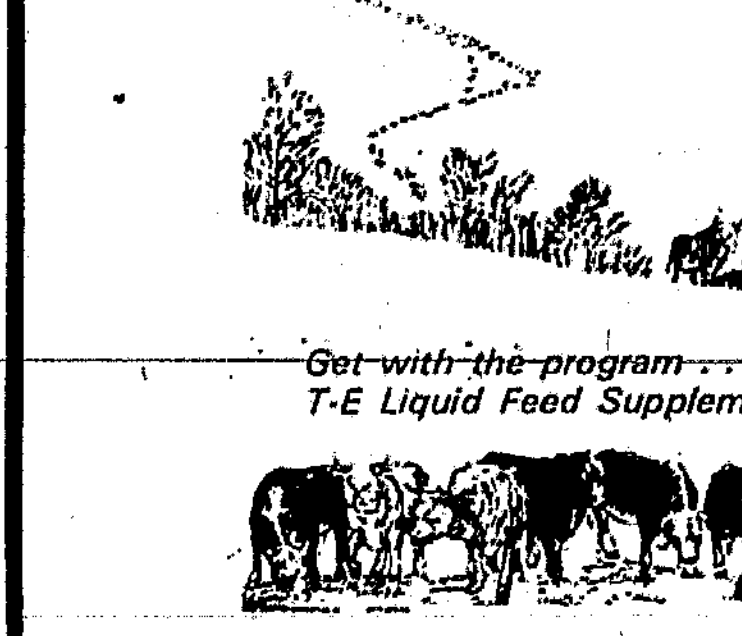

'Burro' order is stayed

An order staying the judgment that the Wild Free-roaming Horse and Burro Act is unconstitutional was filed in federal court, Albuquerque, last week.

The order, signed by the three-judge federal panel which had earlier ruled the act unconstitutional, was based on an oral motion from Asst. U.S. Atty. James Grant.

The Wild Horse and Burro Act was designed to officially protect all unbranded, unclaimed horses and burros as "an" endangered wild species.

Feb. 28, U.S. District Court Judges Edwin L. Mechem and H. Vearle Payle along with 10th Circuit Court of Appeal Judge Oliver Seth held the act was unconstitutional and permanently enjoined the government from enforcing it. The order last week stayed the judgment in the

action pending further court order. A formal motion is to be filed by Asst. U.S. Atty. Grant within five days.

The court action stems from the New Mexico Livestock Board's impoundment in February 1974 of 19 unbranded, unclaimed burros which were rounded up and sold at public auction in Roswell.

At that time the government claimed the animals under the Wild Horse and Burro Act.

Near asphyxiation in Capitan

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brubaker and son of Capitan, who live on Fourth Street, were hospitalized for a short time last weekend after apparently being almost overcome by carbon monoxide in their home early Saturday.

Mr. Brubaker reportedly collapsed when he answered a knock on the door early Saturday, and Mrs. Brubaker was found to be obviously suffering from near asphyxiation. They were taken by ambulance, with their son, to the Ruidoso-Honda Valley General Hospital. They had recovered by early in the week.

Hat Ranch wins permits suit

A history-making precedent was set recently when sections of the Taylor Grazing Act, dealing with renewal of grazing permits on BLM land, were upheld by the Administrative Law Judge for the Department of Interior, Robert W. Mesch.

His decision followed a hearing October 23, 1974 on an appeal filed by Hat Ranch, Inc. The District Manager of the Las Cruces Grazing District had previously turned down a request by Hat Ranch to renew its 10-year grazing permits, stating that only a term permit for a period of three years would be issued, pending the completion of a Framework Plan.

Sections of the Taylor Grazing Act provides in part, that: "...no permittee complying with the rules and regulations laid down by the Secretary of Interior shall be denied the renewal of such permit, if such denial will impair the value of the grazing unit of the permittee, when such unit is pledged as security for any bona fide loan..."

Hat Ranch had 10-year grazing permits for two ranch units, covering the period from March 1, 1964 to February 28, 1974. The permits were pledged as security or collateral for bona fide loans. In the request for 10-year renewals, Hat Ranch pointed out that it would make it possible to "pledge the same as collateral with my financial institutions, as per their request."

Regarding the question of whether the refusal to renew the 10-year permits impairs the value of the grazing unit which is pledged as security for loans, Judge Mesch said, "It might be argued that it is not necessary to even consider this question inasmuch as a permittee has a preference right of renewal in the discretion of the Secretary, and if there is no justifiable reason for a denial of a renewal, then the permit should be renewed, even if there is no showing that a failure to renew will impair the value of the grazing unit pledged as security for a loan."

The District Manager took the position that there was essentially no difference between a 10-year permit and a 3-year permit or an annual license. In regard to licenses, Judge Mesch said, "After some 40 years of operation under the Taylor Grazing Act, a question might be raised concerning the authority of the BLM to continue to issue licenses as a temporary measure under the implied authority of Section 2 of the Act rather than permits under the specific authority of the Act." (In the early stages of the administration of the Act, it was recognized that, before it would be desirable to issue permits, a

considerable amount of preliminary work would be necessary. This could not be accomplished in time for permits to be issued for the ensuing year, so temporary licenses were issued.)

The judge's conclusion was that the refusal to renew the 10-year permits for a period of ten years impairs the value of the grazing unit, which is pledged as security for bona fide loans.

The case was remanded to the District Manager for the issuance of 10-year grazing permits.

Agriculture to Fore

Lincoln County Cowbelles announce that Gov. Jerry Apodaca has signed a proclamation declaring March 24 as "American Agriculture Day". State officials of Cowbelles were in Santa Fe recently to observe the proclamation signing.

The governor said, in part, in the proclamation:

"The purpose of American Agriculture Day is to make all Americans, both in rural and in urban communities, aware of the fact that agriculture is as important today as it was in 1776 when 85 percent of the population worked or lived on a farm: and

Every American should be interested in farm efficiency because it combats inflation, strengthens the dollar, and provides the brightest opportunity to narrow the trade deficit; and

American Agriculture Day is a nationwide project to make all citizens realize that agriculture is still America's strength; and

"Farmers need to become aware of what is being done by other farmers and by worked in non-farm industry to build and maintain American agriculture as the largest industry in this nation; and

"Urban Americans need to be reminded of how often their lives and their jobs are touched by agriculture each day."

EIA Reports projects

The monthly report of the New Mexico environmental improvement Agency for January shows that Water Pollution Control Construction Step 1 applications for Estancia, Hatch, Clovis, Bernalillo, Artesia, Fort Stanton and Lovington were received for review by the central office in January.

All except Fort Stanton and Lovington were approved and processed to EPA in Dallas, the report says.

The report noted that a request for a pre-application conference was submitted by Carrizozo. That conference was held Feb. 17 and the town council approved a Feb. 18 resolution to start the ball rolling for a Step 1 grant to reassess the town's sewer system. Step 1 involves a study to determine needs.

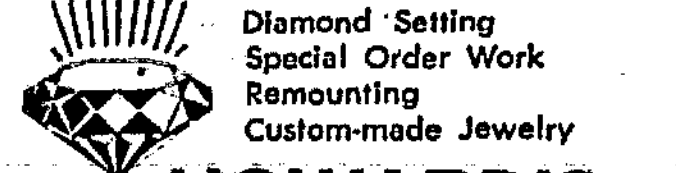

It is easy to see why Adam was to easily tempted by the apple. It is a most delicious and versatile fruit. Apples are used with every part of the meal and for snacks. They seem to be the most popular for dessert. The International Apple Institute recommends Individual Apple Cobblers;

1 cup sugar
3 tablsp flour
1/2 teasp salt

1/4 teasp nutmeg
1/4 cup water
2 cans (20 oz each) pie-sliced apples or 4 cups home-canned sliced apples
1/2 teasp cinnamon
3 cups biscuit mix
Combine sugar, flour, salt, spices and water; mix well. Add apples; blend well. Cook over low heat, stirring often, until apples are tender and syrup thickened; so that mixture resembles pie filling. Prepare biscuit mix as directed on package; divide in half. Roll 1/2 dough to 1/4 inch thickness; use to line four 6-inch pie pans. Elute or crimp edges. Fill pans with hot apple mixture. Dot with butter. Roll out remaining biscuit dough about 1/2-inch thick cut with 1" cutter. Place 4 biscuits on top of each filled pie pan. Bake at 425 for 20 minutes. Makes 4 individual cobblers 6 inches in diameter.

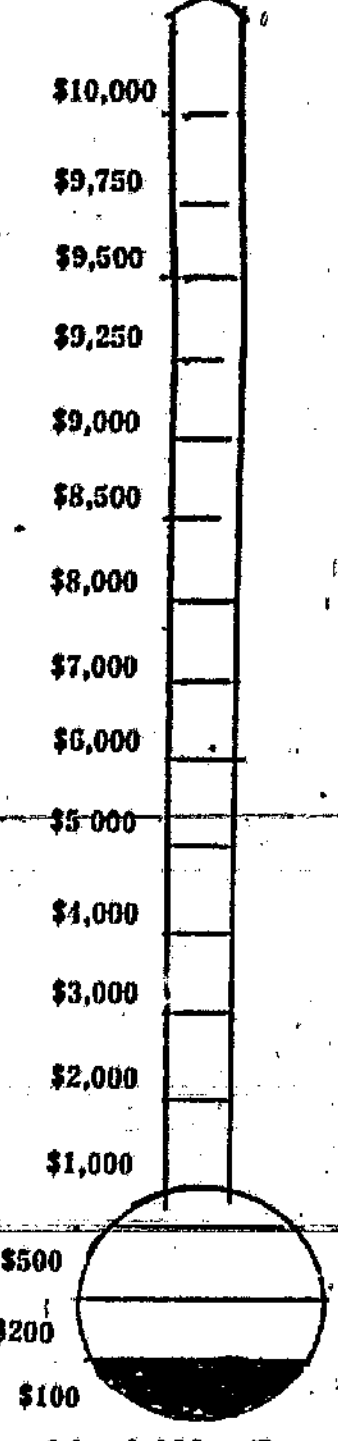

Peavine or annual loco is likely to be found in many areas of Lincoln County with the recent moisture. Peavine is one of several plants that cause alkaloid poisoning. Its poisonous potential is much greater on some areas than others. Generally soils of limestone origin have fewer alkaloid poisoning problems.

The alkaloid poisoning affects the nervous system. Some of the symptoms are trembling of muscles, lack of coordination and labored breathing. Animals that have just been off the bad ground are often unable to use their hind legs properly and their hoofs hit together; this is called "clicker Disease" by some.

There is no antidote for peavine poisoning, only good feed and care can overcome the effects of poisoning.

When using insecticides or herbicides: It's a faulty reasoning to think that using twice the recommended amount will give better results. Recommended rates of application are the result of long periods of scientific study by qualified researchers in both government and industry. The label recommendations cannot be improved by a person's "questimation," so follow the recommendations printed on the label of each container.

I believe the people of Lincoln County should demand an accounting from this body, before the pettiness of such biased politics causes us untold anguish and heads the County towards bankruptcy.

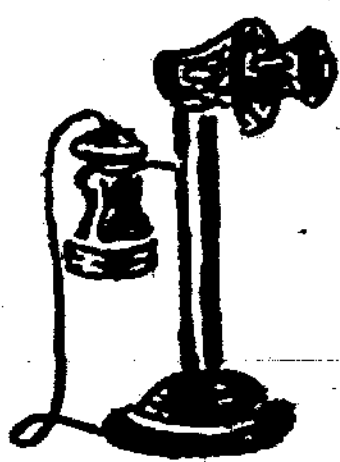

J. H. Fullmer Jr dies of burns

One of Carrizozo's most beloved citizens and long-time resident, J. H. Fullmer, Jr. died March 16 at Sierra Madre, Calif., where he lived with his son's family, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Fullmer.
Margaret Fullmer (Mrs. Bill) called Monday to report his death.
For many years Jake loved to smoke his pipe and that contributed to his death. Margaret said they kept matches hidden from Jake so he would have to use lighter for his pipe. Nevertheless, Jake got hold of some matches, a lighted match got away from him and set his chair on fire. Probably the chair burned awhile before Jake noticed it and called to his family. They came running in to help him out of the chair but by that time Jake had burns all down his leg, some fifteen percent of his body.
The incident happened January 25. Mr. Fullmer was taken to hospital where skin grafts were performed, all took and he seemed to be

coming along fine. He was moved to nursing home to complete recovery last Thursday. Sunday the 16th he died. Margaret felt that he had decided he'd seen enough of this world.

Mr. Fullmer made trips to New Mexico early in this century, probably before statehood, and the family moved to Lincoln County to stay in 1918. Mrs. Fullmer died in Carrizozo in 1966 and was buried at Cedarvale Cemetery at White Oaks. Mr. Fullmer was cremated at Sierra Madre and the remains will be brought to Cedarvale for burial near his wife, probably this summer.

Survivors include two sons, Walter of Dillon, Colorado, and Bill in Sierra Madre, California. Margaret Fullmer said that Jake had received lots of help from Lighthouse of the blind Organization, and that people wanting to make memorial gifts could well give to this worthy organization.

Lincoln County lost one of its most honored citizens with the passing of J. H. Fullmer (Jake) at Sierra Madre, California, March 16, 1975.

Mr. Fullmer came here in 1907 from his old home in Mishawaka, Indiana, and settled in the then flourishing mining community at Parsons. He had become very interested in furthering the mining industry in this area and undertook the management of the Parsons mine and mill in which he had invested heavily and caused to be vastly expanded. He foresaw that mining required and abundance of power and so installed the first power plant in the county at White Oaks with service to the mines there and by a high line to Parsons. To provide fuel for the plant his company developed the coal mines at White Oaks which provided coal for the Carrizozo area for many years.

Gold mining here as elsewhere was seriously hampered by the advent of World War I with its surge of increasing costs in materials and labor which lead to the virtual extinction of gold mining in Lincoln County about 1917. The static price of gold could not absorb the increased costs. However one progressive move leads to another in the chain of human achievement; it was Mr. Fullmer's energy and vision that lead

him with his long time Partner, John E. Wright, to build a power plant in Carrizozo, and, among other enterprises, to start the Ruidoso Telephone Company, now one of the largest independent telephone companies in the southwest.

Many of us will remember with affection Jake's kindness and hospitality, his concern about everyone's welfare, the late afternoons with Jake and his Marie (who predeceased him in 1966) at their lovely home; his shuffle into your hospital room to see how you were when you were incapacitated; his booming and infectious laughter that could be heard a block. In the Lincoln County museum there is an old incandescent electric lamp which purports to be his first, the first one in Lincoln County and like Jake's good deeds it still glows when connected.

In a report, Chief C. A. Morales reports the police car driven 3,207 miles, using 584 gallons of gasoline.

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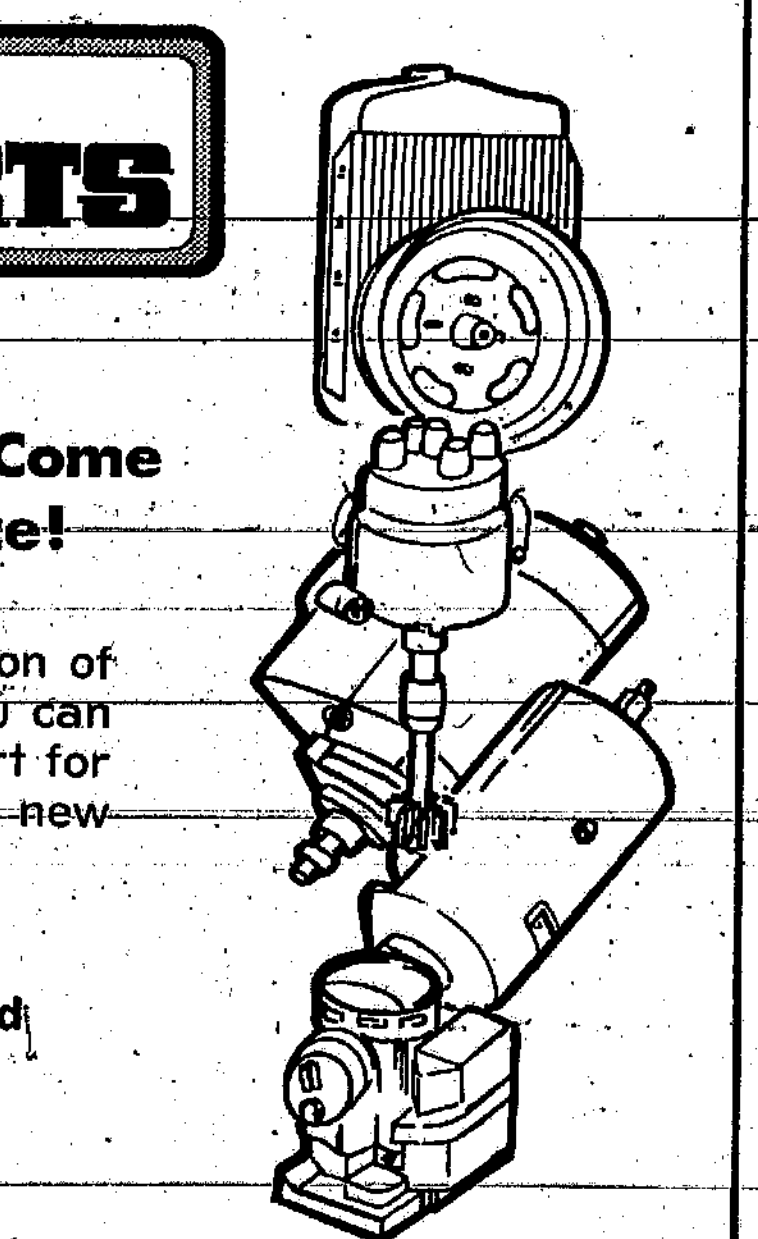
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THE WAY OF THE WEST
