State law requires all persons born after Jan. Fall hunting season, Jim R. Gonzales, of 1, 1958 to successfully complete a hunter training course prior to hunting with or shooting a firearm in New Mexico. Many other states have similar requirements and all will accept New Mexico certificates.

Classes are scheduled as needed in each locality. The hunter training class covers safe handling, sighting and shooting techniques, knowledge of guns and ammunition, proper carries and transportation of firearms, hunter responsibility, shooting qualification, basic concepts of wildlife management, game identification, archery, and survival and first aid.

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Lettuce truck wrecks out of Corona

A tractor-trailer loaded with 800 cases of lettuce from California slipped off the highway two miles couth of Corona about 9 p.m Friday and overturned down a four-foot embankment, injuring the driver, State Policeman M. Watson reports.

The driver. Earl Stadtlander of Garden Grove; California, was believed seriously injured, but later was determined to have relatively minor

injuries. Watson said.

The driver and his co-driver, James Taylor, were treated in Carrizozo and were kept overnight in the Carrizozo hospital and were transferred to El Paso Providence Memorial Hospital, Saturday morning. Taylor was not seriously hurt but had cut his foot on glass in extracting himself from the truck cab after the

wreck. Watson said the truck came upon a car in the center of the highway, apparently, in the snowstorm Friday night and got into trouble when wheels hit the soft shoulder of the highway.

The injured men were brought to Carrizozo

and to the doctor here by Deputy Dave Wheeler of Corona. Bud Payne and Bill Miller took the men by ambulance to Alamogordo and then to El Paso on Saturday.

Stadtlander was though to have a concussion, but his severe head pains were found to be caused from a pinched nerve instead, doctors reported Saturday in Alamogordo.

Watson went to Corona Saturday to block traffic while Malcolm Service of Albuquerque picked up the lettuce cargo. Lincoln County Motor Co. and Means wreckers

were busy all-Friday night and into Saturday assiting motorists who had run off highways in the Carrizozo vicinity - in all directions:

Highways glazed over relatively early Friday evening after an all-day snowfall Friday. Thawing began Saturday, and by mid-day Sunday much of the snow was gone and high-

State Policeman Watson said the pickup "went over so easy" he doubted if damage was extensive. Burch and his passenger, his mother, were not hurt in the mishap. Burch stayed with the pickup until the Means wrecker arrived.

The daily and possession limit for unlicensed fishermen under 12 years of age shall be one-half April 1, 1975, marked the start of a new fishing, the limits permitted licensed fishermen except on Indian reservations where special rules may apply.

> Trout stamps are required at Bonito, Nogal and Alto Lakes; no trout stamp is required at. Carrizozo Lake until October 1, 1975 thru March 31, 1976. Two poles may be used at Carrizozo Lake except during periods when a trout stamp is required.

Fishing hours on Alto and Bonito Lakes will be from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Waters closed to fishing at Bonito and Alto Lakes are those portions within 600 feet of the outlets as posted.

It shall be unlawful to fish with more than one pole while angling in all regular trout waters, to leave a camplire furning and unattended and to leave any fishing pole or line unattended while angling.

Any fishermen planning to fish on Indian reservations must have a proper state license in addition to a tribal permit as required by the reservations. A trout stamp is not required on Indian reservations.

Fishermen are urged to become familiar with the fishing proclamation available at license





America Buffalo 25,000 strong

Washington — A century after one of history's worst mass killings - 60 million lives descendants of the native American victims are safe and surviving.

They are buffalo, bison to naturalists. Their ancestors were almost wiped out in a cold-blooded policy of extermination in the early 1870's with support of some government officials. By the time official attitudes turned around and the slaughter halted it was almost too late.

But today American buffalo are about 25,000 strong, living unharried lives in protected herds on private ranches and National Parks, the National Geographic Society says.

Ranchers now butcher a few hundred yearly. The tanned hides go into robes and coats of thick, dark brown, wooly luxury. The meat usually is compared closely with the best beef.

Making of a Desert A hundred years ago the waste of the killing brought this comment in Kansas: "Where there were myriads of buffalo the year before, there were now myriads of carcasses. The air was foul with a sickening stench, and the vast plain which only a short twelvemonth before teemed with

animal-life, was a dead, solitary, putrid desert." The days of the buffalo were numbered when the Iron Horse began galloping west after the Civil War. The thousands of men working on the railroad, laying track toward the flat horizon, had to be fed and the buffalo were a bargain commissary on the hoof.

Buffalo meat became their standard fare. daily, month after month. Professional hunters used newly perfected breechloading rifles fired quickly at saddle-level. William Cody, one of the many calling themselves Buffalo Bill, killed 4,280 in 18 months as a railroad hunter, once shooting 48 in 50 minutes.

Others hunted for hides, working with skinners who were hard to keep up even those who could relieve a buffalo of his robe in five minutes. Some killed only to slash out the buffalo's tongue, considered a delicacy in city meat markets.

Picking Bones A year or so later bone pickers arrived, trying to make their own fortunes. Railroad cars, filled with bones scavenged from the plains, would have stretched twice across the entire country.

Students 18 and over getting monthly social security payments will soon get an attendance report card that should be filled out and returned to social security as soon as possible, according to Gordon Lunsford, social security field

representative. "The cards are mailed about three months before the end of the school year to students getting social security checks. The information on the attendance report helps us decide if the students can continue to get monthly payments. Delay in returning the report card can mean a

delay in future payments," Lunsford continued. Full-time students 18 and over who remain unmarried can get social security checks until they're 22 if a parent gets social security payments or has died after working long enough under social security.

About 700,000 students (well over 4000 in New Mexico) in colleges, high schools, and trade schools get monthly social security checks. The total received by these students amounts to more than all the scholarships in the country.

"Students who need help with the attendance report or information about social security benefits should contact their nearest social security office," Lunsford suggested.

Lunsford may be contacted at the County Commissioner's Room in the Court House, in Carrizozo, on Tuesday, April 15, between the hours of 10 a.m. and noon.



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

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Truffles are valued high

Washington — In the good old days five years ago, truffles cost only \$40 a pound. Now they're selling for as much as \$200 a pound.

Most housewives somehow are taking the increase in their stride, though dedicated epicures relish the gastronomic prices about as much as a siege of "crise de foie."

But even threatened by a "crisis of the liver." French food lovers cannot resist the "black diamonds of the kitchen." Truffles are a vital ingredient in the highest of the high cuisine, but their piquant-fragrance adds a touch of elegance to even a simple omelet. Truffle Production Drops

Truffles never have been cheap, but they are even more expensive these days because production has dropped sharply in recent years in France and Italy, the major producers.

No one is quite sure how to increase the output because the truffle is something of a mystery. Cultivating and gathering them is not a science but an art heavily laced with tradition and superstition. It's practiced by free spirits who believe the best truffles are found at night by the light of the moon.

The truffle is a small black fungus, though an Italian variety is white, the National Geographic Society says. It is related both to mushrooms and to less appetizing fungi such as yeasts, mold, and mildew. .

Truffles grow in clusters about five or six inches underground. Microscopic filaments attached to the roots of trees, usually oaks, are believed to supply nourishment, but attempts to raise the yield by injecting truffle spores among oak roots have failed.

The fungus is capricious in choosing a host tree. A French study indicated that some trees. have "a special truffle vocation," but farmers cannot predict which tree will be hospitable. It often is the scrawniest in a grove.

Italians with dogs, and sardinians with goats. Not every pig is a potential fruffler. The fémale's sense of smell seems to be more acute than the male's. French farmers test the females in a litter by offering them truffle tidbits. The animals that display the most interest receive

The Federal Power Commission has granted a one-week entension of time to Southwest Natural Gas Users Association in order to prepare petitions and affadvits regarding Opinion 697-A. which would place natural gas for irrigation wells in Priorty III. Organizations from other areas of the southwest have followed the lead of EMW Gas Association in seeking a re-hearing of the opinion with the FPC. The hearing was allowed for agricultural users only, and was originally scheduled for March 31. The hearing will be May 5, in Washington, D.C.

Forest money distributed

Four local counties share in \$143,088.25 representing their part of earnings on the Lincoln National Forest during fiscal year 1974.

Forest Supervisor John A. Hafterson said counties share in National Forest income according to the amount of National Forest acreage within their borders. The major sources are timber sales and grazing fees. Charges for land use permits and recreation concessions and minerals exploration fees add to the total.

By law, the county shares distributed through the state treasurer's office are earmarked for roads and schools. The ctunty shares represent

25 percent of National Forest income. Following is a breakdown of net National Forest acreage and amounts paid to counties in

FY 1974. Chavez County 40,332 acres - \$5,230.84; Eddy County 135,019 acres - \$17,511.25; Lincoln County 364,402 acres - \$47,261.00; Otero County 563,517 acres - \$73,085.16.

Lincoln County has 34,342 acres located in the Cibola National Forest for which they received an additional \$2,105,57 last year.



Lopez is also on the Santa Fe County Manpower Council, which is Chaired by the chairman of the Santa Fe County commissioners.



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

Cystic Fibrosis, and incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive C-F gene. It is estmiated that one in twenty or 10 million Americans carry that C-F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research, funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, is seeking a pratcial test to identify these

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C-F patients are now living beyond infancy to their teens and even into young adulthood. That smae therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from the other related lung diseases.

"Most people don't realize that there are over six million children in the United States affected by pulmonary illness," said Mrs. Payne. "For these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."


