## Road crews scheduled

Heavy weather in the White Oaks area where road crews have been working on a school bus route has delayed for a short time the county road work schedule, but county road construction crews will move into Gavilan Canyon at Ruidoso April 7 "give or take a week." County Manager Les Olson said the county road department is split into two sections, one

for maintenance and one for rebuilding and construction. The construction crew will move into Gavilan Canyon at Ruidoso where the eight miles of road will be brought to state standards and gravelled by late Fall in 1976. The lower part of the road, in Ruidoso, will be rebuilt and gravelled before September of this

year and the whole road cut out by Oct. 1. In September, the upper end will be gravelled with that portion to be finished out next spring. The first portion of the project calls for straightening the lower portion into the Dobbs place and installation of a culvert by the water reservoir near Hull Road.

One "cat" will be used for construction; the county's second dozer is used in rock crushing operations.

The road construction or rebuilding crew will work on the Gavilan Canyon project until about Oct. 1 when the crew will move to the Corona-Carrizozo-White Oaks area until the first of the year.

After Jan. 1, according to present schedules, the crew will work in the Picacho and Hondo Valley area until April, then return to Gavilan Canyon for completion of that project.

County "blades" are assigned, with two "floating" within the county to points where needed. Billy LaMay and Everett Green schedule the floating blades.

One blade is assigned to Maintenance District 4 and 5, under Earl Roper; another is in Maintenance District 6 under Ken LaMay; another in MD 1, under Melvin Chavez; another MD 2 and 3, under Earl Allison.

The rotation schedule for crushed rock production within the county is as follows through next year: Crushed rock stockpile schedule.

Equipment used consists of loaders, one dozer, and one tractor and low-boy.

January 31, 1975 to July 30, 1975 Gavilan Canyon - crushes 40 to 50,000 yards.

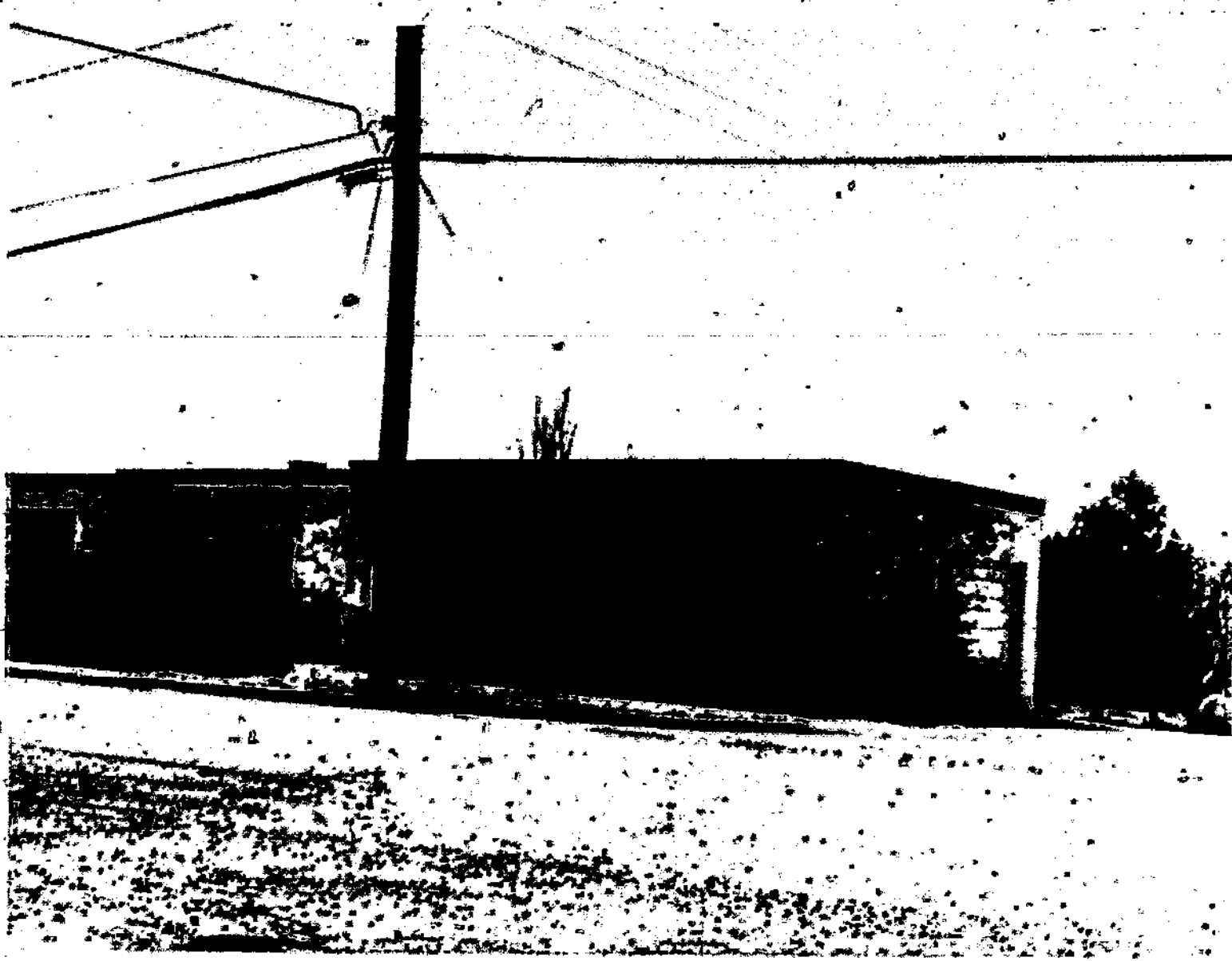
August 1, 1975 to Dec. 1, 1975 - Maintenance District 4 (Corona Area).

December 1, 1975 to March 31, 1976 - Maintenance District 1 (South Picacho)

April 1, 1976 to July 30, 1976 - Maintenance District 2 - (Gavilan Canyon)

Aug. 1, 1976 to Dec. 1, 1976 - Maintenance District 2 (Capitan area)

December 1, 1976 to April 1, 1976 - Maintenance District 3 - (Carrizozo area).

## Sheriff is concerned

SANTA FE — Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. raised questions on Public Employees Retirement Association contributions.

Sheriff Vega says Lincoln County, via the county commission, affiliated with PERA by resolution in August, 1974, effective Nov. 1, 1974. Sheriff Vega says: "I came into the picture as a past member and county has whacked me retroactive back to Nov. 1, 1974. They took out \$244 at one whack. It left me staggered."

Sheriff Vega adds: "I believe PERA serves its purpose if an individual can make a career out of a job. But like in our county, a political subdivision, one is lucky that he stays two years, not future whatsoever."

"PERA pays no interest on our money. When your job terminates if you are lucky in staying two years one will automatically apply for the refund of one's money from PERA. PERA automatically keeps the matching funds the county paid in so PERA is the one that thrives."

Sheriff Vega also says: "This has really created a real hardship and I speak for all the employees of the courthouse." He pushes for removal of the mandatory clause requirement via the legislature or by bringing this subject to the attention of the State Human Rights Commission.

Sam B. Garcia, PERA deputy director, says PERA membership is permissive for elected officials. But Garcia says if a person was a PERA member previously and later becomes an elected public official, PERA membership is mandatory.

Garcia said Lincoln County apparently did not begin withholding PERA contributions Nov. 1, the effective date of PERA affiliation by the county, and the withheld amount seems unduly large in Sheriff Vega.

Garcia said he is unaware of any retirement fund that pays interest on funds earnings to its members when an employee withdraws funds. He said he will contact Sheriff Vega and explain fund procedure. Employee and employer contributions to the PERA fund are five percent each.

## New jail cook hired

Mrs. Viola Vigil has been employed as cook at the sheriff's office for the county jail, the sheriff's office reports.

The position of cook became vacant when the county commission in a recent regular meeting let a previous action stand regarding nepotism — hiring or relatives — in county offices.

Mrs. Leandro Vega, wife of the sheriff, was cooking for jail prisoners but, the county commission action eliminated her from the job.

The commission action also resulted in Deputy Sheriff Ernest Sanchez being released from his position as deputy in the Hondo Valley.

At last report, Sanchez had not been replaced.

Todd Proctor, Allen Ponder and Eddie Davis were ninth and Roe Ann Icenogle, Ken Gibbs and Olen James were tenth and Yvonne Jones, Claudia Jones and Barbara Davis were eleventh. James Davidson won first overall in wool and Tim Proctor was fourth.

The livestock team of Janet Davidson, Ward Alford, and Scott Nalda won fourth with Scott Nalda being sixth overall.

Janet Davidson, Ward Alford and Scott Nalda also came in fourth in the horse judging. Laban Tubbs, Brent Sultemeier, Scott Mulkey and Tom Perkins were seventh and Clay Lightfoot, Roe Ann Icenogle, Ken Gibbs and Olen James were in eighth place. Jim Parker was fifth high individual in horses.

There were about 28 other 4-H teams from all over the state at the contest.

## Lettuce truck wrecks out of Corona

A tractor-trailer loaded with 800 cases of lettuce from California slipped off the highway two miles south of Corona about 9 p.m. Friday and overturned down a four-foot embankment, injuring the driver, State Policeman M. Watson reports.

The driver, Earl Stadlander of Garden Grove, California, was believed seriously injured, but later was determined to have relatively minor injuries, Watson said.

The driver and his co-driver, James Taylor, were treated in Carrizozo and were kept overnight in the Carrizozo hospital and were transferred to El Paso Providence Memorial Hospital, Saturday morning. Taylor was not seriously hurt but had cut his foot on glass in extracting himself from the truck cab after the wreck.

Watson said the truck came upon a car in the center of the highway, apparently, in the snowstorm Friday night and got into trouble when wheels hit the soft shoulder of the highway. The injured men were brought to Carrizozo

and to the doctor here by Deputy Dave Wheeler of Corona. Bud Payne and Bill Miller took the men by ambulance to Alamogordo and then to El Paso on Saturday.

Stadlander was thought to have a concussion, but his severe head pains were found to be caused from a pinched nerve instead, doctors reported Saturday in Alamogordo.

Watson went to Corona Saturday to block traffic while Malcolm Service of Albuquerque picked up the lettuce cargo.

Lincoln County Motor Co. and Means wreckers were busy all Friday night and into Saturday assisting motorists who had run off highways in the Carrizozo vicinity - in all directions.

Highways glazed over relatively early Friday evening after an all-day snowfall Friday. Thawing began Saturday, and by mid-day Sunday much of the snow was gone and highways were clear.

The storm forced cancellation of the Easter service at Sunrise at Valley of Fires State Park and forced postponement of the Grizzly Relays

## Sessions on hunter training

Hunter training courses will be conducted in Carrizozo and in other towns in New Mexico to reach as many persons as possible prior to the Fall hunting season, Jim R. Gonzales, of Carrizozo, with the Department of Game and Fish, announces.

Classes will be held in Carrizozo on April 9, 10, 16 and 17. Each session will be two to three hours long. The class requires eight to ten hours of instruction. The class will be at Carrizozo High School and have been tentatively scheduled to begin at 3:30 p.m. on the above dates, Gonzales said.

Volunteer instructors for the hunter training session will be Danny Knight and Dennis Jeter. Both will be or have been certified by the Hunter

Training Section of the Department of Game and Fish.

State law requires all persons born after Jan. 1, 1958 to successfully complete a hunter training course prior to hunting with or shooting a firearm in New Mexico. Many other states have similar requirements and all will accept New Mexico certificates.

Classes are scheduled as needed in each locality. The hunter training class covers safe handling, sighting and shooting techniques, knowledge of guns and ammunition, proper carries and transportation of firearms, hunter responsibility, shooting qualification, basic concepts of wildlife management, game identification, archery, and survival and first aid.

## New fishing season opened

April 1, 1975, marked the start of a new fishing season. It marks the opening of Bonito Lake, and Carrizozo Lake changed from winter trout water to warm or spiny-ray water lake. The daily trout bag limit is eight, and the possession limit is 16; however, any licensed fisherman found along a stream or lake with more than eight trout on his person will be considered in violation of this regulation.

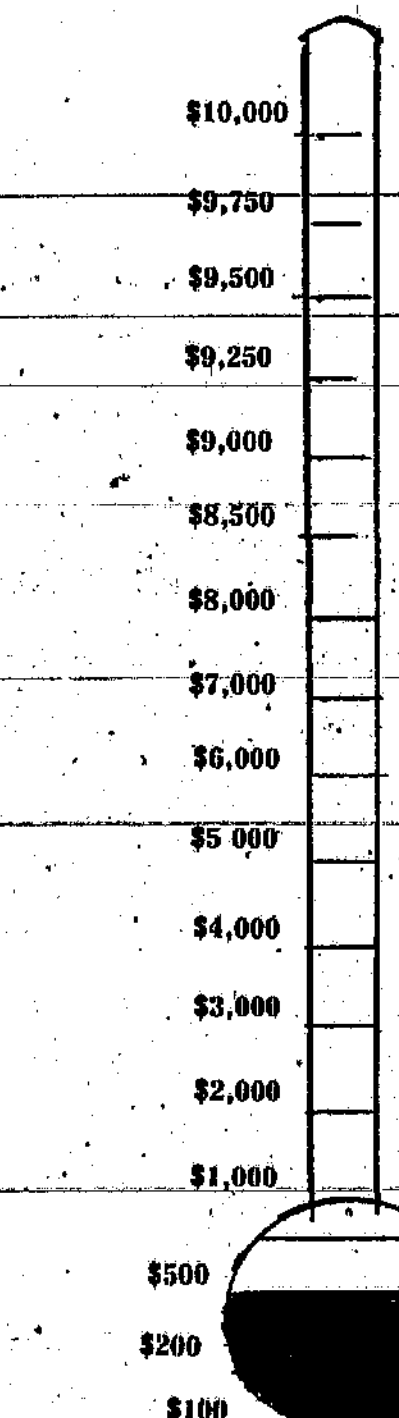

**America Buffalo 25,000 strong**  
Washington — A century after one of history's worst mass killings — 60 million lives — descendants of the native American victims are safe and surviving.  
They are buffalo, bison to naturalists. Their ancestors were almost wiped out in a cold-blooded policy of extermination in the early 1870's with support of some government officials. By the time official attitudes turned around and the slaughter halted it was almost too late. But today American buffalo are about 25,000 strong, living unhindered in protected herds on private ranches and National Parks, the National Geographic Society says.  
Ranchers now butcher a few hundred yearly. The tanned hides go into robes and coats of thick, dark brown, woolly luxury. The meat usually is compared closely with the best beef. Making of a Desert.  
A hundred years ago the waste of the killing brought this comment in Kansas: "Where there were myriads of buffalo the year before, there were now myriads of carcasses. The air was foul with a sickening stench, and the vast plain which only a short twelvemonth before teemed with animal life, was a dead, solitary, putrid desert."  
The days of the buffalo were numbered when the iron horse began galloping west after the Civil War. The thousands of men working on the railroad, laying track toward the flat horizon, had to be fed and the buffalo were a bargain commissary on the hoof.  
Buffalo meat became their standard fare, daily, month after month. Professional hunters used newly perfected breechloading rifles fired quickly at saddle-level. William Cody, one of the many calling themselves Buffalo Bill, killed 4,280 in 18 months as a railroad hunter, once shooting 48 in 50 minutes.  
Others hunted for hides, working with skinners who were hard to keep up even those who could relieve a buffalo of his robe in five minutes. Some killed only to slash out the buffalo's tongue, considered a delicacy in city meat markets.  
**Picking Bones**  
A year or so later bone pickers arrived, trying to make their own fortunes. Railroad cars, filled with bones scavenged from the plains, would have stretched twice across the entire country.

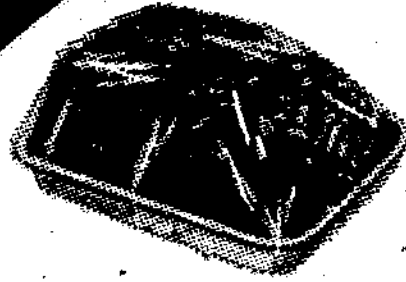

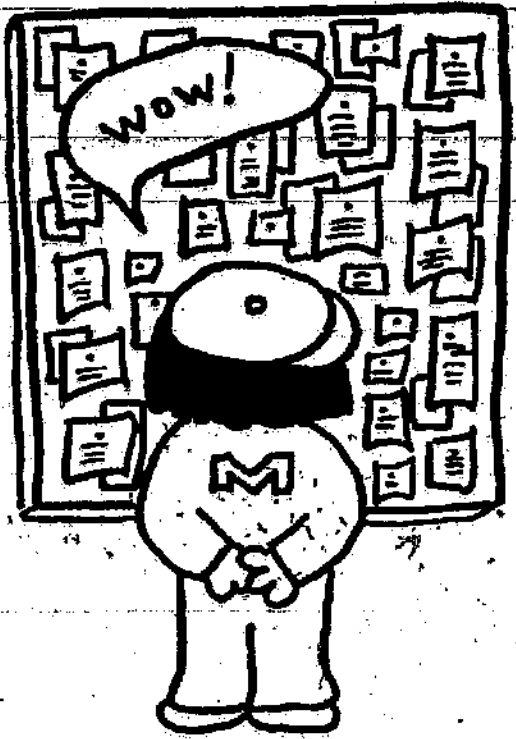

## Polly's Bulletin Board

Here are some things of interest concerning this, that and the other (taken at random from my bulletin board.)

1. Cream peanut butter with a bit of orange juice.
2. Crack nuts inside a plastic bread bag.
3. Split a cupcake, frost, put back together and pack for lunch.

### SS advises students

Students 18 and over getting monthly social security payments will soon get an attendance report card that should be filled out and returned to social security as soon as possible, according to Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative.

"The cards are mailed about three months before the end of the school year to students getting social security checks. The information on the attendance report helps us decide if the students can continue to get monthly payments. Delay in returning the report card can mean a delay in future payments," Lunsford continued.

Full-time students 18 and over who remain unmarried can get social security checks until they're 22 if a parent gets social security payments or has died after working long enough under social security.

About 700,000 students (well over 4000 in New Mexico) in colleges, high schools, and trade schools get monthly social security checks. The total received by these students amounts to more than all the scholarships in the country.

"Students who need help with the attendance report or information about social security benefits should contact their nearest social security office," Lunsford suggested.

Lunsford may be contacted at the County Commissioner's Room in the Court House, in Carrizozo, on Tuesday, April 15, between the hours of 10 a.m. and noon.

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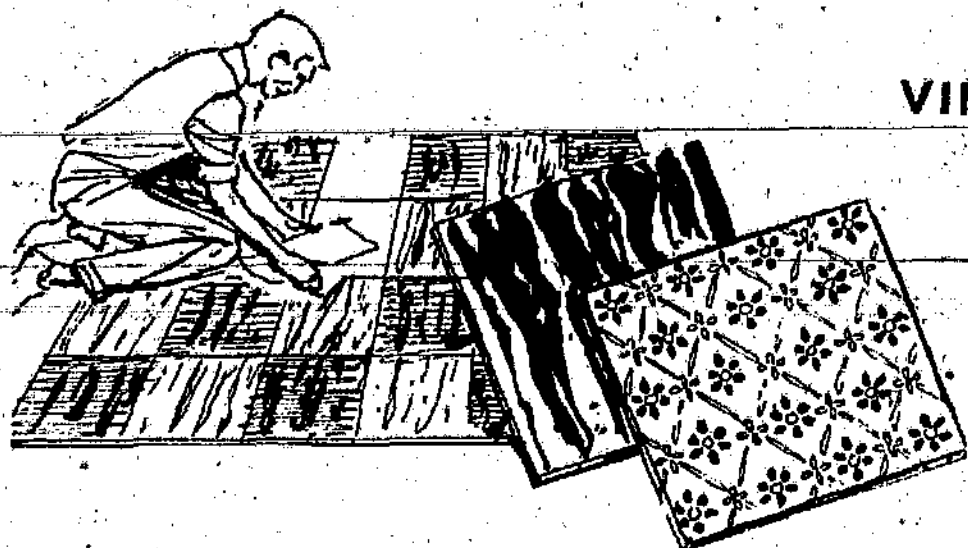

Mix up all ingred. put in ice box for 3 hr. Then roll out or pat out into small cookies and bake 375 about 15 min.

Lopez is also on the Santa Fe County Manpower Council, which is chaired by the chairman of the Santa Fe County commissioners.



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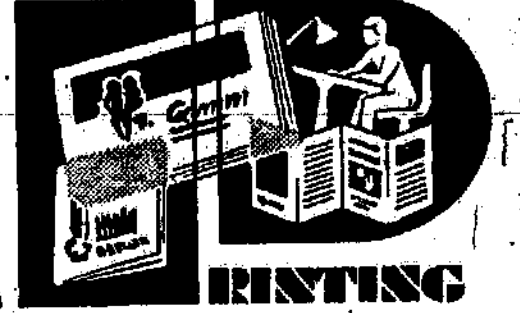


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Editor: Lincoln County News:  
I want to comment on the article in last week's paper on J. H. Fulmer.  
Two statements in the article are out of line. First Fulmer did not install the first power plant in Lincoln County.  
The plant was installed at Vera Cruz Mine on the Capitan branch between Carrizozo and Capitan. I don't know what year that was.  
But in the year 1910 the Wildcat Leasing Company bought the plant and moved it to White Oaks mainly for their own use and they furnished power to Carrizozo.  
And for developing coal the wildcats had their own mine at the plant. Also, they developed the Alto Springs for water for the boilers. It was soft water. The springs were three miles from the plant.  
It seems to me that was about 1916 when the Parsons Mining Co. began. It was a Chicago Company. Fulmer was superintendent at Parsons or head man.  
At that time I was a fireman and operator at the power plant working for the Wildcat Leasing Co.  
In the deal Parsons Co. bought the plant from the Wildcats. Between the two companies a big turbine generator was installed. The Parsons Co. finished the job, by that time they owned the plant. They also installed a 500-horsepower boiler.  
For the test run there were a group from Chicago to witness it. It was done on my shift. I was on duty at the time. Johnny Wright did the testing. He was the electrician. I say he was an electrical engineer. He was good at any and all parts of the work. I had a lot more contact with him than I ever had with Fulmer. He spent most of his time at Parsons.  
Naturally we who were working at the plant for the Wildcats were transferred to the payroll of the Parsons Mining Co. Later the Lincoln Light and Power Company.  
I worked with them till I had to go to the army in World War One. Oct. 3, 1917, a bunch of us were shipped.  
An about the coal development it was some time after 1919 they opened a new entry. The old entry was worked out. The new was on property adjoining.  
The first coal mine opened was the Parker Mine in the 1800's. The next opened was The Old Abe coal mine. It was in the 1800's too.  
My dad hauled coal from the Old Abe coal mine to the Old Abe mill and the Gdiva Mine all of the year 1899 and part of 1900. He had teams and did all kinds of hauling.  
I didn't intend to write so much when I started this.

Mrs. Bill G. Payne has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Lawrence D. Buxton, 1975 president of the New Mexico Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.  
Mrs. Payne will lead volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and a condition called "childhood emphysema."  
The goal for Carrizozo is \$225 with the campaign kicking off the week of May 17-23.  
Cystic Fibrosis, and incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive C-F gene. It is estimated that one in twenty or 10 million Americans carry that C-F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research, funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, is seeking a prenatal test to identify these carriers.  
Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C-F patients are now living beyond infancy to their teens and even into young adulthood. That same therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from the other related lung diseases.  
"Most people don't realize that there are over six million children in the United States affected by pulmonary illness," said Mrs. Payne. "For these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."  
The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research, but 117 C-F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country. New Mexico has a C-F Care, Teaching and Research Center located in Albuquerque.
