
According to Eugene Batie, six Suffolk stud rams and 100 Suffolk and Hampshire show lamb prospects will sell at the May 24th event.



Here is another project for the kids to do when school is over and 'there's nothing to do.'


A picture can be composed of many dots with a pencil dripped in acrylic or tempera paints. Here, are the instructions:

The few materials needed are; several new, sharpened, eraser-tipped lead pencils; acrylic or tempera paints; white or colored construction paper. (The pencils must be new, as the eraser is used for the painting of the dots.)

With a pencil lead, lightly mark your design on-.the paper. Then paint in the dots, using both ends of the pencil. The eraser makes the big round dot, the sharpened lead point makes the small dot.

Step away from the painting and view it from various distances to see the results. A child can thus explore color perception while enjoying a simple craft. Adjoining and overlapping dots of different colors create different effects.

Save the pencils; they can be rinsed and used again.

Backrest serves hospital need

It's not surprising that Sonny Banning, Church of Christ minister, should be a good carpenter. It goes with the trade. A least, it did in Nazareth. He and his wife Norma Talley Banning areexpecting their first child about June 30. They hope that it can be born in Lincoln County Municpal Hospital . where Norma was born.

Just recently, doctors have re-discovered a medical fact forgotten since the Middle Ages. It's easier to have, a baby sitting up, than lying flat. But even the most modern delivery tables are seldom equipped with backrests. A backrest is available as a factory option costing over \$300. At Dr. Marie Cortelyou's suggestion, Sonny made measurements and sketches of the delivery6 table, and within 1wo weeks had designed and built a wooden backrest that fits under the table mattress. It is quickly adjustable trom flat to reclining to sitting position, and is heavily varnished so that it is as easily washable as the rest of the delivery-room furniture.

against will be added--a real necessity since the leg supports on our 1938-model table "give you the most--awful leg cramps," according to a local ranch wife who has been there twice. But with the modifications, the table will be more confortable than some 1975 models.

Sonny's material costs and the value of his labor came to \$93.50, which will be deducted from Norma's medical bill as "service-in-kind." This is an arrangement encouraged by the National Health Service, which is helping to sponsor the Carrizozo Health Center.
