## 'Cleanup month' given approval

July will be "Cleanup Month" in Carrizozo with renovation or demolition of old buildings to be a part of the special month, Mayor Floyd Siegrist indicated Tuesday night at a regular town council meeting.

Authorization for condemnation proceedings, where needed, was included in action some months ago, by the town council.

Town Attorney Bill Payne said he would check with former Town Clerk Archie Witham to determine status of notification of affected property owners.

Mayor Siegrist told the town council that rather than a cleanup day, a whole month will be devoted to improving the appearance of Carrizozo.

The town council approved a resolution designating July as "Cleanup Month."

In other business, the town council Tuesday agreed to buy a radar gun which will be used by State Police within the city—with fine money to pay or help pay for the device.

Price is about \$2,500—payable over a 36-month period.

Representative of Med-We-Care were at the council meeting. Joan Means, president, requested \$500 a month for the next year or \$6,000 to help equip doctors offices here.

"Three good doctors here will insure growth," she told the council.

Med-We-Care is a non-profit organization involved in helping National Health Service doctors get established and in full practice here with modern equipment.

Mayor Siegrist told the Med-We-Care people that the auditor is due here soon and "we'll see what we can do."

The council was informed by the mayor that only one "Welcome to Carrizozo" signs of the environs of Carrizozo is "legal" and that the highway department is "knocking down" signs on highway right of way under the highway beautification act.

The one at "E" Avenue and U.S. 380 is legal as it is on private property.

Others will have to be moved, the mayor said.

The council authorized the town clerk to check into Citizen Band radio equipment. Needed is a base station at the town hall and three mobile units for vehicles.

The council discussed purchasing more sophisticated equipment but decided to explore the less expensive. Citizens Band radio equipment.

Roy Harmon told the council, "We don't need sophisticated equipment if something else will do just as well."

The council approved paying bills for May including a rather hefty one from Town Attorney Bill Payne.

Payne told the council May was a "rather unusual month" and that he would rather bill the town and do the work than "not bill you and not do the work." He said that after the retainer for the first four hours, his rate is \$30 per hour.

The council approved that approach.

Regarding a park approved for across the railroad tracks, Payne reported that the town has a deed from a Mrs. Padilla and that the tax deed must be obtained from the state.

The council agreed that "public input" is needed on what equipment should go into the park.

A master plan for Carrizozo in booklet form is in the hands of each councilman. Gliserio Rodriguez, Community Planner, Southern New Mexico Economic Development District, was at the meeting seeking reaction of councilmen to the plan.

Councilmen expressed interest especially in housing development proposals and will study the plan as presented. No action was taken.

The council agreed to pay hospitalization and medical costs for a city employee injured at the golf course when he got his hand caught in a power mower. Amount is \$439.15.

Mayor Siegrist proposed Vernon Petty to fill the council seat vacated by Earl Fenter. The choice was quickly and unanimously approved. Petty has served on the town council previously, off and on since 1947.

## ICF closure is approved

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital Board approved Monday the closing of the ICF (Intermediate Care Facility) at the Carrizozo hospital effective June 30.

The board also met with county commissioners for two hours Monday afternoon hashing out details for a health care plan for Carrizozo and its medical trade area.

Commissioners agreed to a budget of \$58,282 for such a program to include medical support for Carrizozo's doctors. National Health Service doctors come under Med-We-Care, not the county.

Included in the program would be a treatment and diagnostic center, laboratory technician, secretary-bookkeeper, maintenance man and a nurse for the facility at the hospital. It also includes money for purchasing a house near the hospital for use as a doctor's office and upgrading of equipment—including ambulances.

A "zero" budget for the ICF was approved for next fiscal year, which means it will be closed. The budget for the medical care and support services includes \$28,700 for salaries, \$4,500 for operating and maintenance supplies, \$17,528 for capital expenditures, \$4,000 for ambulance operation, and miscellaneous expenses of operating such a program.

## Friday race action heavy

RUIDOSO DOWNS. — Trials for the upcoming \$25,000 (est.) Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity have attracted 37 head for Friday action at Ruidoso Downs.

The two-year-olds are divided into four heats slated for the sixth, seventh, ninth and 11th races. Each of the divisions will be contested over four furlongs and carries a \$1,900 purse.

The first two finishers in each of the trials and two of the third-runners will be eligible to compete in the finals to be run Sunday, June 22.

Table Policy, a winner of two at the recent Sunland meeting, drew into the seventh race. The filly, trained by Margie Renfro, won her maiden early in April by 1 1/4 lengths. Then she returned for a 3-length victory in the New Mexico Breeders' Stakes on the final day at Sunland. Her main competition will be Sky Capsule and Flashy Stack.

Sky Capsule came from a little off the pace last week to a head victory in Maiden competition. Flashy Stack has yet to win but posted two

seconds and two thirds in six trips.

A couple of last-out winners will battle it out in the 11th race feature. Brud's Boy nosed out some more experienced maidens in a four-furlong bout two weeks ago and did it as a 14-1 longshot.

Sand Fighter made her first trip last month. She scored a half-length victory after four furlongs in maiden company.

The Second Consolation of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity occupies the co-featured 10th slot. All 10 of the qualifiers returned for a chance at the \$3,857 winner's share of the \$30,221 gross purse.

Kitamans Gal tops the list of hopefuls. Two weeks ago the filly finished fourth to Girl O' My Dreams, the top qualifier for the finals, in the elimination trials.

Previously the chestnut posted four wins, two seconds and a third in eight trips to the gate. The work boosted her bankroll over the \$26,000 mark. She'll be coming out of the second hole with Don Tyre up.

Tru Tru Chick will be coming from the sixth slot. To date, the colt has posted three wins and a second in six trips and earned almost \$12,000.

Filling out the lineup are Masters Angel, I'm Sincere, Azure Jet, Hyonjet, Jet Charger, Speckled Trace, Miss Going Bug and Jody Oh. Weekend action continues through Sunday. The first consolation of the Kansas is on the Saturday schedule. A \$58,056 purse will be decided in that one. Sunday's spotlight, of course, centers on the finale of the \$403,846 Kansas Futurity.

First post both Friday and Saturday is the usual 1:30 p.m. But on Sunday kick off time begins at an early 1 p.m. in deference to the telecast of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity.

Work day will be June 21 starting in the early morning. "Bring a basket lunch," Stearns advises.

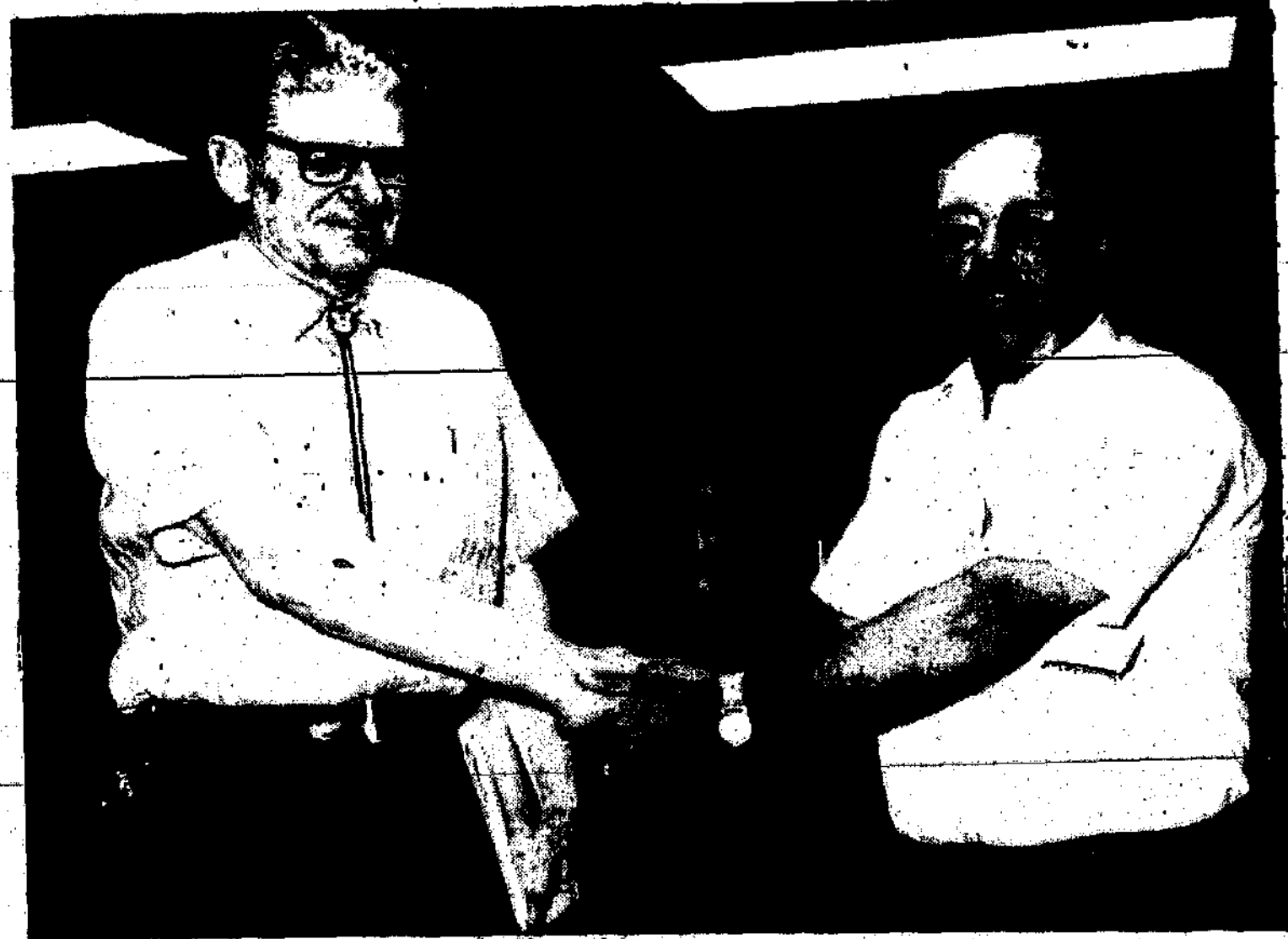

## You think you have bills, bills, bills

The Carrizozo Recreation Council and the town of Carrizozo approved steps Tuesday—in separate meetings—which should go a long way toward removing a blight from the credit of both.

The recreation commission and town discovered recently that thousands of dollars in bills incurred by the Carrizozo Recreation Center over the past year and longer were lost, thrown away or misplaced. Invoices are missing in most cases.

The recreation council members shuffled through the huge stack of bills Tuesday noon at a regular meeting. New recreation center director Jim Valdez is notifying creditors of the problem

and is asking for new invoices so that the bills can be paid.

Mayor Siegrist told the town council Tuesday night "I understand we have some bills that have been turned over to a collection agency."

All of the bills involved the recreation center except two—chargeable to the golf course.

Bill Payne, town attorney, said, "I don't think this is anybody's fault in city hall."

Recreation council members implied at their meetings Tuesday that some of the bills which had been sent to city hall for payment had been misplaced or lost and that others had never been sent to city hall for payment from the recreation

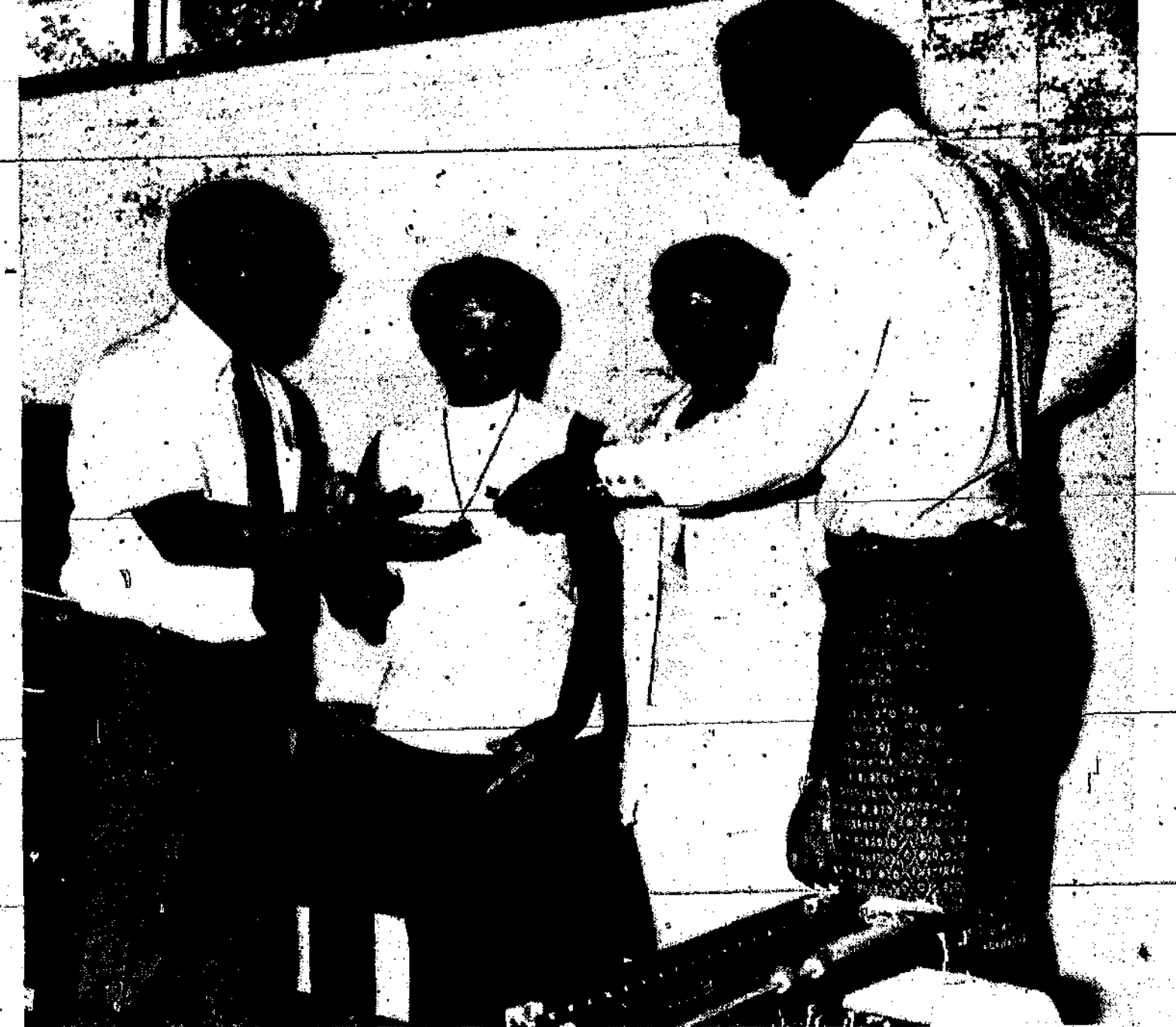
center. Joe Light recently resigned under fire from the recreation commission as director of the recreation center.

Valdez, of Roswell, was appointed to replace him.

Valdez was asked by the recreation commission to contact all creditors and explain what had happened.

Valdez said some of the creditors are "pretty mad."

Bills involve air conditioning, over \$400 to a soft drink company and many other purchases. One or more of the bills date back to 1973.

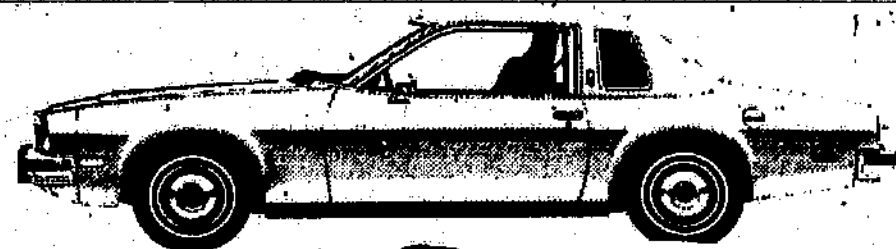

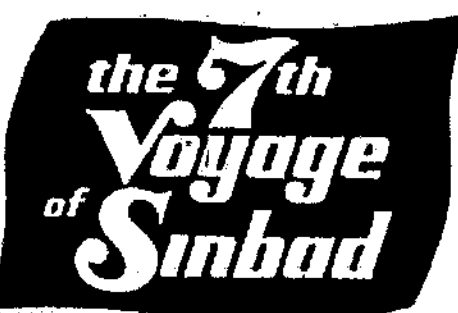

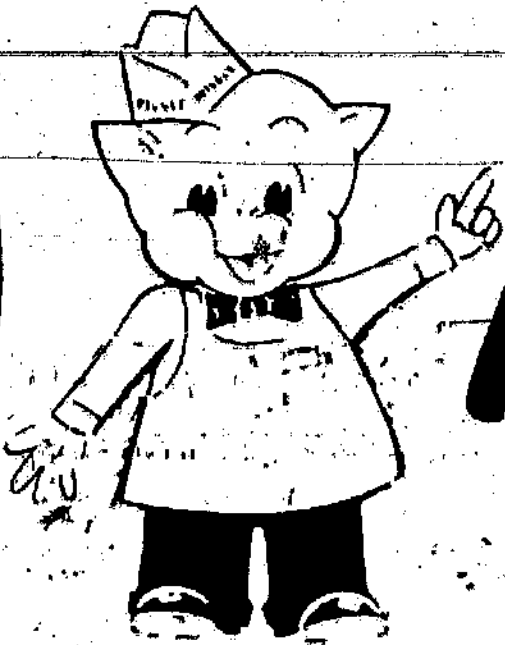

## Commission deals with road projects

Road work in Lincoln County came to the fore again in a regular meeting of the Lincoln County Commission, Friday.

County Commissioners Ramon Nunez, Bill Hart and Bud Payne approved an agreement with the U.S. Forest Service for joint work on the Bonito Dam road just under the dam to reduce the grade and make it smoother for recreation vehicles and such.

Alamogordo was asked to furnish oil for the project, but the city manager of Alamogordo wrote that the cost of the oil could not be included in next fiscal year's budget.

The commission voted to go ahead with the project, with Alamogordo possibly to come in later with payment for oil on the project.

The Forest Service will contribute \$4,000 in work and/or materials to the project. The city of Alamogordo owns the immediate area where the road will be improved and draws water from the dam for municipal use.

Chuck Jordan of the Forest Service said that the Forest Service is in early negotiation stages to buy the dam and immediate area from the city of Alamogordo. Some \$400,000 in Bureau of Recreation money would be involved.

The road work agreement was subject to approval by the assistant district attorney and the New Mexico Department of Finance.

Gavilan Canyon road work—where county crews are widening and improving that road in the Ruidoso area came in for discussion, some of it heated. Commissioner Payne said he thought the road crews ought to be pulled out of Gavilan Canyon until school starts because of heavy traffic.

"In the total work program (for the road department) Ruidoso area is not ahead of schedule," Commissioner Hart said. "There should be no change, we agreed on it," he said.

Payne mentioned that the heavy equipment could be used at gravel pits. Hart said that the road crews haven't even started a cleanup on the first phase of the Gavilan Canyon project.

Payne said that gravel work in Cedar Canyon is a new project.

"We are digging into reserves in the road department...every time we add a man the cost is up," he said.

"We can't hand the next commission an empty basket," Payne said.

Commissioners and the county manager Les Olson agreed to look at the Gavilan Canyon project on June 20 to determine its exact status, and whether or not road crews can be utilized elsewhere at the present time.

### DOG PROBLEM

Joe Truit of Ruidoso, who heads up the Ruidoso Humane Society, appeared at the meeting and asked that the county help pay board for dogs brought in for observation for rabies by the sheriff's department from out in the county. He said Deputy Sheriff Cleaver brought in "seven cases of dogs having bitten people from Capitan and Nogal. We had nine dogs we had to keep for 14 days. Only in one instance was a dog claimed by its owner."

Truit said Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs subsidize the dog control program he operated in Ruidoso to the tune of \$550 a month, but that the actual cost is \$900 a month.

He said he has dug into his own pocket to the tune of \$5,000 to \$6,000 over a five-year period, that he would like for the Humane Society to handle the whole county in animal control.

Commissioner Hart said the county should take care of bills incurred when deputies bring in dogs. It was indicated this will be done.

Hart also said the commission will have to decide whether to operate its own dog control

program next fiscal year or have you "Truit" do it.

"I favor a contract with Truit," Hart said. This will be considered when the fiscal budget is finalized before July 1. Truit was asked to submit a formal proposal.

In other action the commissioners:

—A letter from the chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission indicates that the Rock Island, in financial trouble, will continue to operate the segment of line from Kansas City to Santa Rosa.

—If the Rock Island must be shut down, the chairman wrote, the ICC will act to insure service. Southern Pacific, which serves the Vaughn, Corona, Carrizozo, Alamogordo area has applied to take over the Rock Island route. So has the Santa Fe Railway.

It was reported to the commission that the Mescafero Apaches want another 2,400 acres of the wilderness area in the Lincoln National Forest.

Commissioner Payne said he opposed any such annexation.

"Pretty soon they will have Bonito Dam and all of it," he said.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca wrote the commission that he will do everything possible to expedite construction of State Highway 37 from Angus to south of Nogal.

—Bill Seekbach, of Ruidoso, newly elected chairman of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission, said that the Soil Conservation Service is undertaking a comprehensive soil survey in the county, but has started in the northeast part of the county.

The soil information would, he said, be more valuable if the initial work were done in a more developed area, he said.

The commission will write a letter to SCC officials asking that the work start in the more populous area of the county.

Seelbach informed the commission that P&Z is in the process of redoing subdivision regulations and wants to make sure there is money in the budget for publishing the new regulations.

He also asked for a contingency fund of \$1,500 to hire experts (engineers, etc.) when needed as advisers.

Seelbach was told that the P&Z would need to come to the commission for money at the specific time experts are needed.

Seelbach said that the plan is agreeable with him.

Jordan, of the Forest Service, told commissioners that money from timber harvest which goes to the county from the Forest Service will be down this year because prices are lower for timber.

Net amount to the county will be \$21,369, he said.

The county has a budget figure of \$25,000 for timber revenue. So, loss to the county will be about \$3,700 over previous years.

County Manager Olson said the outlook is bleak for CETA (manpower training program) money the next fiscal year.

The county works five to six people now under the CETA program.

"We may not have any next year," Olson said. Some 16 liquor licenses within the county were approved by the commission for renewal.

Such licenses are issued by the county clerk when license holders pay fees to the county.

One change in one ownership was noted—at Riverside.

John G. Tomlinson apparently has purchased the Riverside bar-restaurant complex from Shorty Hill.

### DAMAGE TO HIGHWAY

Commissioner Hart said that part of the Carrizo Road up Carrizo canyon has been damaged when Cablevision of Lincoln County laid cable near the edge of the highway and across it.

The commission approved sending a bill for \$500 to Cablevision to repair the damage.

Commissioners agreed to meet last Monday to consider medical service items for the Carrizozo area and sit in on tax protests to the assessor.

## FFA delegates at convention

On June 2, 3 and 4th three delegates representing the Carrizozo FFA Chapter attended the 47th Annual New Mexico FFA Association Convention held at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. The delegates were Rex Wilson, Billy Bob Shafer, and Paul Wetzel. Others attending the sessions were Steve Harkey, Mrs. Howard Harkey, and FFA Advisor Dan Ware.

One of the highlights of the convention for the Carrizozo FFA Chapter was Paul Wetzel and Steve Harkey receiving their Sunshine State Farmer Degree. This is the highest honor that can be given by the state association to a FFA member.

The chapter scrapbook put together by Laurie Voss and Brenda Lindsay received a 2nd place medal in the state scrapbook contest. The Carrizozo FFA Chapter received the Superior Chapter rating for the third year in a row and the chapter also received a certificate for having 100 percent of the vocational agriculture students in Carrizozo High School as FFA members.

The entire convention was very interesting and educational.

## 4 Winds builder died Saturday

Frank Phillips, who built the 4 Winds Restaurant and Lounge in 1960 and operated this business in Carrizozo up to a year ago, died in Florida Saturday. A heart attack was probably cause of his death.

Funeral services were to be held Wednesday in Arlington, Texas. Survivors include his wife Mary, and two sons, Gordon and Johnny, all of Arlington.

The 4 Winds became known as one of the most popular eating places in the southwest shortly after it opened for business. Fire destroyed the structure two years ago and it was rebuilt following the original pattern.

Right after the rebuilding job Mr. Phillips sold the 4 Winds to James Silva who continues to operate it now.

### Mother, children killed

Funeral services were scheduled today in Deming for Mrs. Evelyn Guest and three of her children who were killed late Saturday in an accident on a bridge near Glenwood.

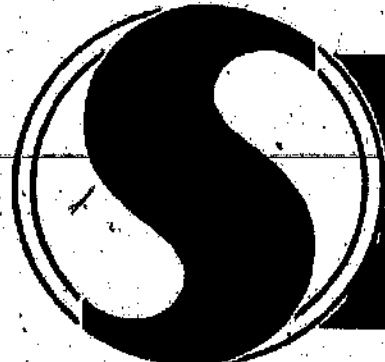

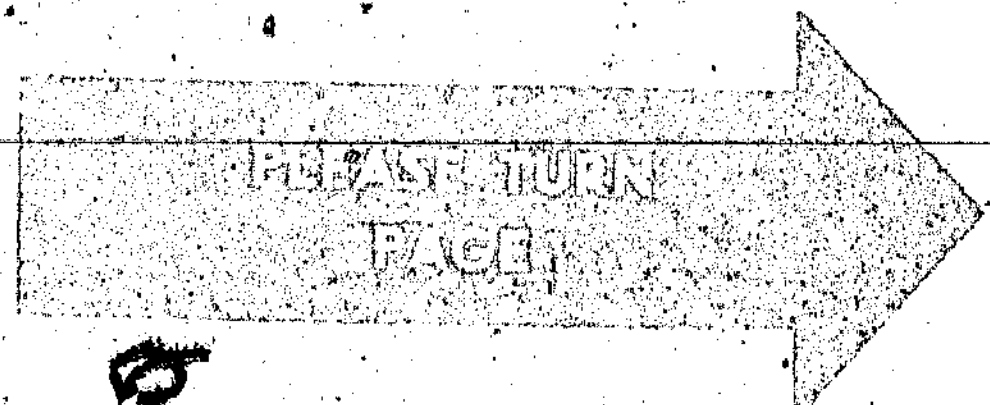

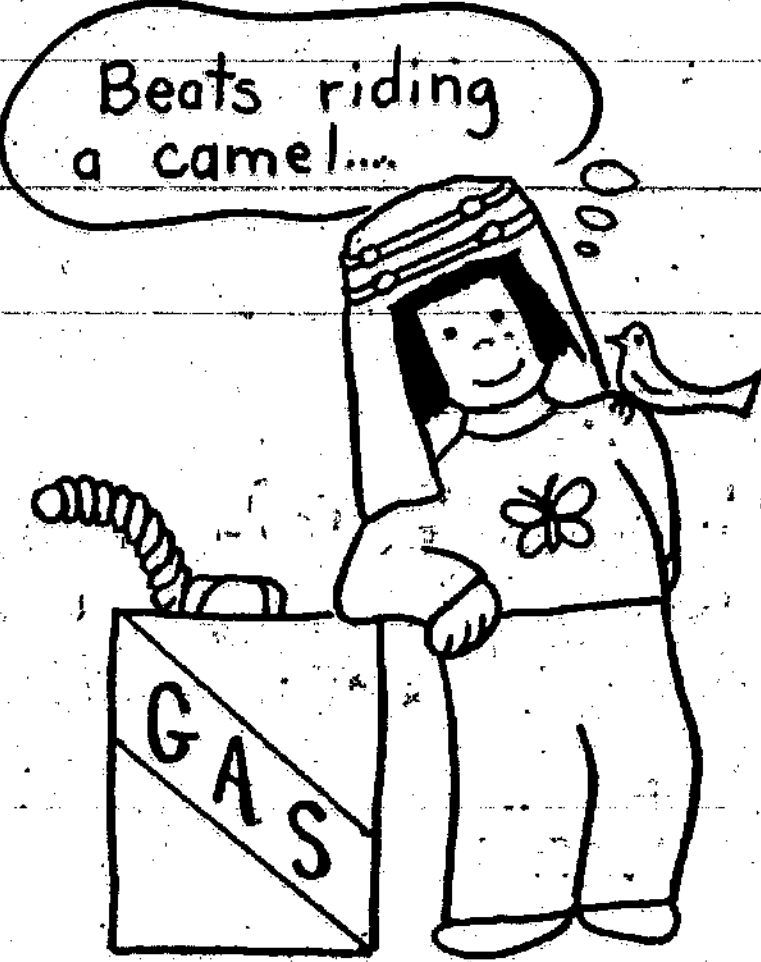

Unfortunately, not all in this household appreciate the art of walking. In fact some think the "footmobile" is for the birds and the horseless carriage is the only way to go.
Cars are here to stay so here are a few gas-saving tips: (Because of the fuel shortage and the rising cost of gasoline getting the most fuel economy is of importance to every car owner.)
Areas requiring periodic maintenance that can affect gasoline consumption are air filter, the ignition system (spark plugs, distributor points and ignition timing), carburetor and proper air-fuel mixing, cylinder compression, and lubrication. Gas mileage will suffer if any or all these items are not in proper working order.
Drive at steady speeds whenever possible, avoiding unnecessary speedups and slowdowns, anticipating stop lights and slowing down gradually, and keeping idle time to a minimum. After starting a cold engine, long warm-up periods should be avoided. It is more economical to drive slowly for a mile or so before reaching cruising speed.
But to save the most everywhere use the foot mobile. Without food, your body wouldn't have any fuel and couldn't "go" either so remember to serve well-balanced foods.

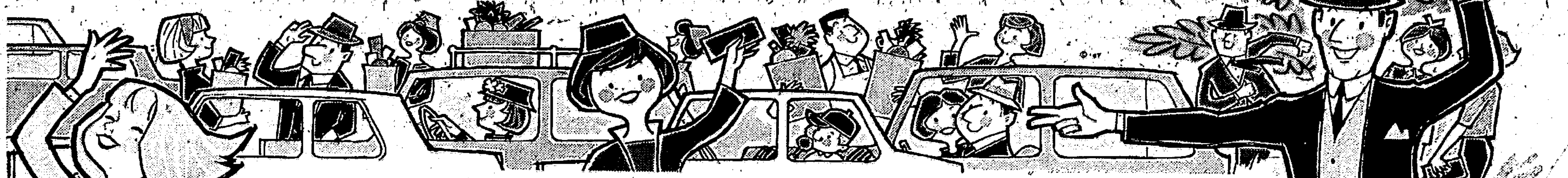
