Farm Bureau sessions • planned at Ruidoso

Energy, water and land will take the spotlight July 30 and July 31 when the Annual Farm Bureau Summer Conference will be held at the Chaparral Hotel in Ruidoso.

The New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, headed by Bill Langenegger of Hagerman, will be in session.

At 1:30 p.m., July 30, members of the New Mexico congressional delegation or their assistants will discuss "The Effect of Public Land Use on the State's Economy."

During that afternoon, Arthur Zimmerman, state director, Bureau of Land Management, and Phil Smith, U.S. Forest Service, will be on the program.

Their topic will be the qualifications, duties, selection and tenure of the B.L.M. and Forest

Service advisory boards and B.L.M. grazing regulations and forest service goal establishing program.

Robert Storey, legislative director, New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, will deal with "The B.L.M. Organic Act."

"The B.L.M. and Forest Service Permittee Problems" will be the last item on the program that afternoon.

The following will present that topic: Mike Traynor, Fabian Garcia, Warner Fluhman, Oliver M. Lee, Charles Walker, Truman Pierce, Ralph Rainwater and F.F. Montoya.

A barbecue and dance are scheduled for the evening.

Friday at 8:30 a.m., "Extra Territorial Zoning

as it Affects Agriculture" will be discussed by Frank Coppler, executive director, New Mexico Municipal League.

At 9:15 p.m., "Rural Development Programs" will be presented by Dr. Eugene Ross, associate director, New Mexico Extension Service.

At 10:15 a.m., Dr. John Clark, director, New Mexico Water Research Institute, will talk on "New Mexico Water Resources."

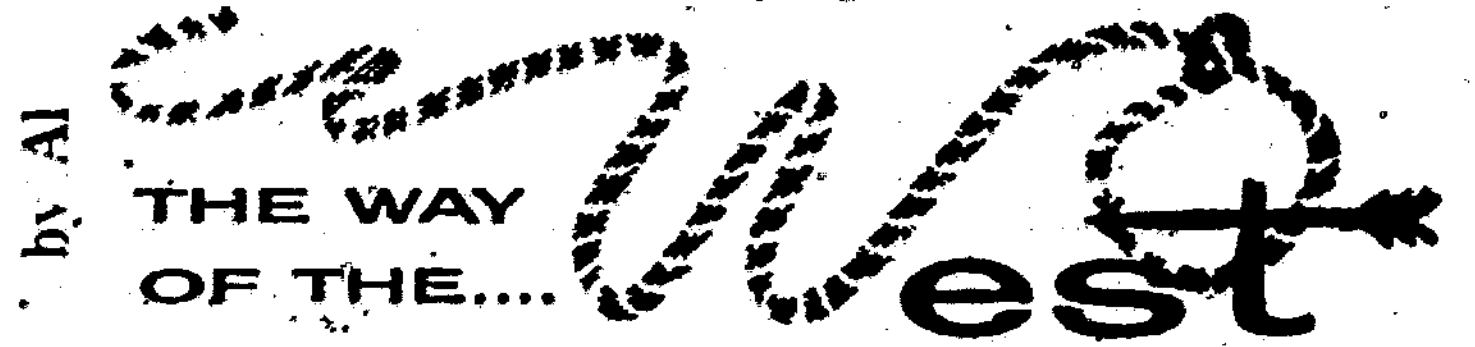
"Regional Water Needs" will be the topic at 11 a.m., by L. E. Davis, vice president, Farm Bureau.

The final presentation will be "The Energy Outlook for the Next Fifteen Years," by Dr. M.W. Fleck, environmental consultant, Public Service Company of New Mexico.

The soil survey will be completed in 1979 and published in 1980-but facts will be available before then on areas already covered.

It had been hoped the survey could be moved to the more populous areas of the county-but since aerial photography has to follow ground work in the survey by two years-the project will continue in the northern part of the county as originally planned, Landers said.

Such surveys are invaluable tools to planning and zoning people and to subdividers.

Bill Melton will detail "Some Things We Would Like to Know about the Alfalfa Plant." He will stress improving alfalfa as a feed. Melton, a NMSU Experiment Station researcher headed development of Mesilla and Zia alfalfa.

Attendance was so great at the Ranchmen's Camp Meeting on Nogal Mesa this year, Wednesday night through Sunday night, that the parent organization was authorized another board member for the Nogal Camp Meeting.

Bob Shafer is the new board member. Parent organization is Ranchmen's Camp Meetings in the Southwest-which sponsors camp meetings at Nogal, Colorado, Sierra Grande in New Mexico, Four Corners and the Chiricahua Ranchmen's Camp Meeting 50 miles southeast of Willcox, Ariz.

The Chiricahua camp meeting will be July 31-Aug 3. All others have been held, including the one at Nogal last week and on the weekend.

Officers of the Nogal Camp Meeting were re-elected Sunday-Walt Wilson, general chairman; LaMoyné Peters, vice chairman; Johnson Stearns, treasurer; Bob Shafer, new board

member; Opal Peters, assistant secretary-treasurer; and Rick Steele of Las Cruces, camp manager here and at other camp meetings.

Some 7,600 plus meals were served on Nogal Mesa this year, with registration hitting over 1,700. The project at Nogal was supported to the tune of over \$13,000 by those who attended. Support is by donation only-no offerings are taken during the multi-services each day. Bible Study and other activities marked the four days, also.

Sunday at noon, 805 meals were served. Over 400 were served Sunday night-final night of services.

Over 600 persons camped on the grounds during the camp meetings. Others commuted from near and far.

Some 25 quarters of beef were served and over 300 pounds of pinto beans-plus other fare. Camp officials and local committee members were taking a good rest after final cleanup, Monday.

Bank stock-holders given good news

Stockholders and officers of Ruidoso State Bank heard some good news last week at the annual stockholders meeting on Wednesday afternoon.

That evening, they adjourned to the Silver Dollar at Finnie for a stockholders' party and dinner.

The Silver Dollar was closed for the evening-except for the couple of hundred or so stockholders, offices, wives, etc., who gathered for a fine evening.

At the stockholders meeting in the afternoon, promotion of Mike Capps, assistant vice president, to vice-president was announced. Capps manages the Capitan Branch of the Ruidoso State Bank.

Bank President Ken Cox in a letter to stockholders presented the semi-annual statement for the period ending June 30, 1975.

He said, "Our demand deposits have increased 22.84 percent compared to this date in 1974. The overall deposits have not increased to my satisfaction, partly due to interest rates on time deposits not being as attractive this year.

The demand for loans has greatly increased resulting in a gain in loan totals of 16.03 percent compared to the same period last year. Funds for loans generally are plentiful across the nation except in areas on the grow and our area certainly falls in this category. Subsequently, your bank has shown an increase in net operating earnings of 29.7 percent-the highest in a six month period in its history.

Since our last shareholders' meeting we have employed two new loan officers and operations officers. I think the addition of these young people has certainly been beneficial to our bank. My compliments and appreciation to the entire staff for a job well done.

Two new board members were announced, Ken Cox and Dan Griffith.

Officers of the bank were introduced, including new faces-Preston Isaacs, vice president; Lamar Osborne, vice president, and Bud Browning, cashier-plus the new vice president, Mike Capps, a veteran bank employee.

Capps is in Dallas this week attending a two weeks bankers school.

A radar gun-sophisticated one-purchased by the town of Carrizozo for \$2,500 for use by State Police-is turned over to Carrizozo's two State Policemen, Max Watson and Dale Housley by Johnny Johnson, Carrizozo town superintendent

NEW BRANCH

Wednesday of this week the bank had open house at the new building in Ruidoso Downs which houses the bank's branch office there.

On deck for the open house were officers and board members of the bank-plus the branch manager, Tina Baca and cashier, Geraldine Bundy.

Refreshments were served, and souvenirs distributed.

The mayor of Ruidoso Downs or his representative was scheduled to cut a ribbon, officially opening the new structure. The bank has had a branch in Ruidoso Downs for a long time-in older quarters.

The Ruidoso State Bank's semi-annual report shows total resources of \$17,366,879 as of June 30 this year compared to \$15,588,216 a year ago.

Net earnings on a share of stock for the six months ending June 30 of this year was \$3.35, compared to \$2.58 a year ago. The ten-year average earnings stand at \$1.16.


A dividend was paid July 1 of this year at each share of stock.

The two men were treated at a Carrizozo doctor's office for abrasions and contusions and were released.

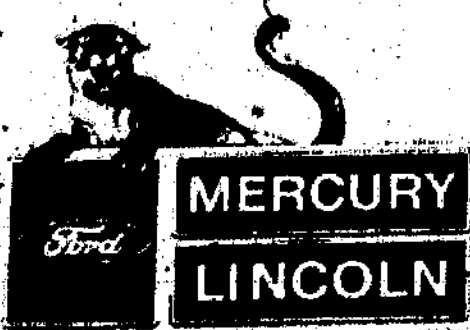
Bailie apparently went to sleep at the wheel.

Start fire, Mix ingredients and shape into six burgers about 1/2 inch thick. Handle lightly. Grill, turning once. It should take 7 to 12 minutes total cooking time, depending on desired doneness.

Serve on buns.
Note: If ground beef is extra lean, have a little suet ground with it to keep burgers moist.

Monosodium glutamate may be added to enhance the meat flavor; if used, omit seasoned salt. Serves 6.

Variation
Lamburgers or vealburgers. Use 1 1/4 pounds ground lamb or 1 pound ground veal. Decrease salt to 3/4 teaspoon. Mix 1/4 cup french dressing with a minced garlic clove. Use dressing to marinate meat before and during grilling.

Fish Baked in Foil
2 pounds fish fillets, fresh or frozen

- 2 green peppers, sliced
- 2 onions, sliced
- 1/4 cup margarine, melted
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon paprika

pepper
Thaw frozen fillets. Start fire. Grease six 12-inch squares of heavy aluminum foil. Cut fillets into six portions. Place fish, skin side down, on pieces of foil. Top with vegetables. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over vegetables and fish. Bring foil up over the food and close edges with tight double folds. Place packages on a grill about 5 inches from moderately hot coals. Cook 45 to 60 minutes or until fish flake easily when tested with a fork. Serves 6.

Roads, paving occupy commission

A little blade work should solve a drainage problem at Bonito-Lou's cafe and store in Bonito Canyon, the Lincoln County Commission indicated at a regular meeting, Friday.

The commission indicated that the road department will send a blade to the area to take care of the problem.

The commission also authorized the expenditure of \$5,000 in revenue sharing funds to pave a parking lot and heliport or helicopter landing pad at the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital.

In other action, the county commission could see no liability for taking care of roads in the Sierra Vista Estates subdivision in the Ruidoso area.

Mrs. Wanda Cook has requested graveling of the roads in the area. The person who set up the subdivision, the commission discovered, did not do original road work as specified in the subdivision plat.

Mrs. Cook was advised to submit a petition from the 149 property owners and residents of the subdivision requesting that a road district be set up.

Commissioners for the first time in a long time refused to approve the minutes of a previous meeting.

At a previous meeting, Commissioner Bill Hart submitted a resolution to the commission criticizing what he said was lack of parliamentary procedure at commission meetings. He also was critical of the county manager's budget preparation.

Friday, Commissioner Bud Payne moved that a portion of the resolution "which might boomerang" be removed from the minutes.

Hart said, "The opinion is mine and it is a part of the minutes and I stand on my right to have my statement as part of the minutes." Payne moved that the portion be deleted, but obtained no second to the motion from Chairman Roman Nunez.

Then all three commissioners voted to table the issue "for more discussion."

In other action, the commission: -Asked the county manager to obtain a budget and proposed expenditure plans from the Lincoln County Fair Board. This will be presented at the Aug. 1 meeting.

-Approved sale of county-owned obsolete and worn out equipment.

-Approved \$1,500 in recreation funds as matching money toward a rest stop at Lincoln. The state would provide another 25 per cent of the cost and the Federal government, 50 per cent, if an application is approved. The application was sent off this week.

-Approve an expenditure to send county assessor's office personnel to a school in Albuquerque July 21-23.

-Okayed a request from the Sun Valley Sanitation District. The district asks that the county collect and disperse an 18-mill tax levy for improvements in the district.

Ride for all you're worth will be the rule of the day Aug. 2 when the annual Pony Express Race is run from historic old White Oaks to historic old Lincoln town.

Riders will hear the starting gun at 7:30 a.m. in White Oaks and will ride as hard as they can push for two hours into Lincoln. The winner will receive a silver-trimmed saddle.

All riders will carry first class letters and anyone desiring to have a letter postmarked with the two-inch Pony Express Seal must:

-Mail all letters to be carried by riders to: Pony Express, Box 217, Carrizozo, N.M. 88301, by the July 31 deadline.

-Affix a 10 cent stamp to each letter to be carried by Pony Express and include 25 cents for each letter, for handling.

The White Oaks-Lincoln route is through the Capitan Gap, with the winning rider due at Lincoln between 9:30 and 10 a.m. As the rider crosses the finish line he must dismount and deliver his mail pouch to the Lincoln Postmaster on foot.

Deer spotlighting forbidden

ALAMOGORDO—One Cloudcroft man has been assessed \$500 in fines, civil damages and court costs for game law violation, and two others have paid lesser amounts in separate cases arising out of spotlighting for deer in the Sacramento Mountains.

District Wildlife Conservation Officer Roy Owens, assisted by N.M. State Police officer Ron Shriver and game officer Steve Harvill, brought charges of killing a deer out of season and hunting with the aid of an artificial light against Jack Sullivan, 37, of Cloudcroft.

Sullivan pleaded guilty to the charges before Judge Robert Bradley of Alamogordo and was

assessed \$190 plus \$10 court costs for killing the deer and \$200 for spotlighting. The game department assessed Sullivan \$100 in civil damages on behalf of the state.

In charges arising out of the same incident, Don McKeeman, 50, also of Cloudcroft, was fined \$25 and \$10 court costs for illegal possession of deer meat, allegedly part of that killed by Sullivan.

In a separate case brought by Owens, 19-year-old Clinton Varbel of Mayhill, was fined \$150 and \$10 court costs for hunting with the aid of an artificial light. Six juveniles allegedly accompanying Varbel, were cited into juvenile court on the same charges.

Alamogordo Magistrate Henry Prelo heard the Varbel case.

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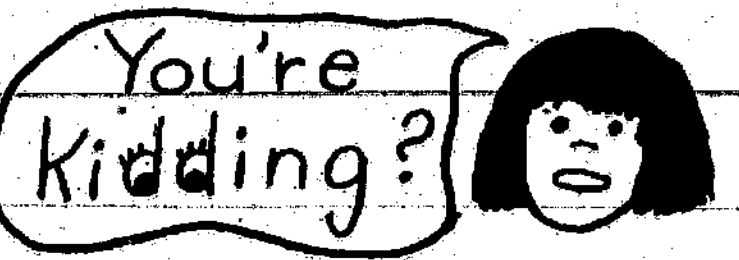
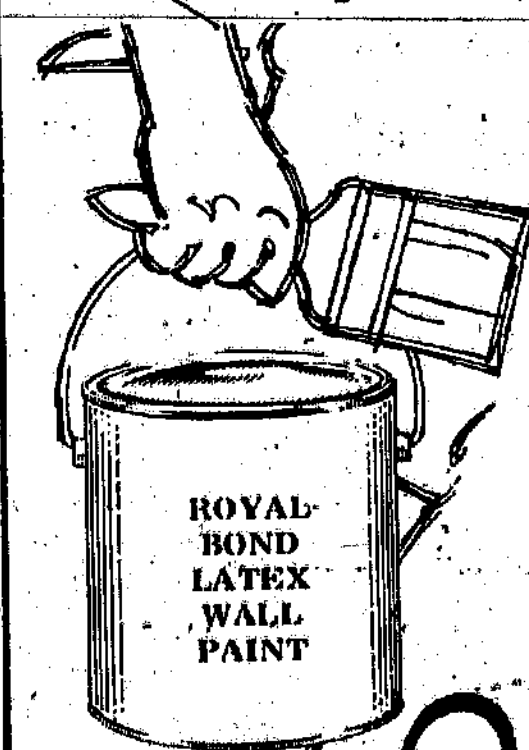
