Medical helicopter available

Carrizozo doctors, county officials, law enforcement officers, State Police and others were briefed last Thursday on a helicopter medical evacuation program which has been instituted out of Biggs Air Force Base and which includes Carrizozo, Ruidoso and most of Lincoln County.

The 283rd Medical Detachment (Helicopter Ambulance) is the unit involved. Here to brief Carrizozo area residents were SW-2 Cliff McGee, MAST project officer) and SW-2 Russell Capps, safety officer for the unit.

MAST stands for Military Assistance Safety and Traffic.

The unit operates Huey UH-1 helicopters which will take four litter patients and three ambulatory patients plus a crew of four—making a total of 11 persons.

The unit is on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week to provide fast transportation to medical facilities (hospitals) when required.

Automobile accidents, mountain climbing accidents—any medical emergency including

premature birth when an emergency—all qualify for helicopter transport to El Paso hospitals or closer hospitals, if need be. Qualified to summon the helicopters are police officers, doctors and such.

Since May of 1972, when the 283rd started operations at Biggs, 320 medical emergency missions have been flown in three West Texas counties and in nine New Mexico counties—the area covered by the service.

The helicopter service is supplemental to civilian ambulance services and is not a replacement.

The helicopter unit flew 20,000 hours in Vietnam and airlifted 60,000 patients during that operation.

The helicopter is particularly useful in mountainous terrain when mishaps occur—such as airplane crashes, mountain climbing accidents, etc.

The copters carry full medical supplies including incubator where required.

Pilot and crew are all qualified medical technicians. Or, event of need a doctor will be aboard. Flying time from Biggs to the Carrizozo airport, including a fuel stop at Holloman AFB, is about an hour and 15 minutes. Patients will be brought to Carrizozo for air evacuation via ground ambulance in most cases since Carrizozo is the northernmost point where the choppers can fly without fueling problems. Ruidoso also is served.

Six aircraft and two crews on full alert stand by at all times at Biggs—awaiting emergency calls.

The helicopters can carry a hoist and 250-foot cable when an emergency requires such equipment in places difficult to land. Pilots of the 283rd must get in a combined 2,400 flying hours per year. The medical evacuation program provides a needed service as well as fulfilling the flying time requirement.

The service is provided at no cost to civilian agencies.

The annual vocational home economics teachers' meeting was held in Portales the week of Aug. 4 with five speakers on the program.

Saul Schur of Good Housekeeping Educational Forum in New York presented a program centering around consumer education and nutrition. He also had supplies of teaching aids for over 200 teachers from all his advertisers in Good Housekeeping magazine.

Mrs. Jean Snodgrass, Las Cruces, presented a program on the use of textured vegetable protein (TVP) in the preparation of foods.

Dr. Edwin J. O'Neal, Las Cruces, told of the many ways in which cotton seeds are being used as a new source of protein for human consumption.

Mrs. Kathryn Berry gave a demonstration on the preparation of Pro-Ten meat. Mrs. Martin's demonstration-lecture was on the use of the new grain, triticale, which has been produced around Muleshoe, Texas. This new grain is some 30 percent higher in protein content than any other grain product.

The theme of the conference was "Latch on to new developments in Home Economics."

Attending from Carrizozo were Mrs. Larue Wetzel and Mrs. Elmira Catherine Lawson who was the state chairman in charge of planning and conducting the week-long meeting.
