## Propane supply adequate

Lincoln County propane wholesalers do not anticipate a shortage this winter, according to Mrs. Frank McBride, but elsewhere the Federal Energy Administration is forecasting extreme shortages.

For once the lack of major industry seems to be the county's plus factor. The run on propane is being created by an industrial switch from natural gas to propane.

If allocations hold the same as last year then Lincoln County should face no major heat problem as far as propane users are concerned.

There was a price increase in September and Mrs. McBride said her company had no way of forecasting prices.

Authority to allocate and establish reasonable prices for propane is being urged by the Federal Energy Administration, said by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, FEA regional administrator.

"We are expecting very serious shortages this winter, as industries with interruptible natural gas service enter the propane market to obtain fuel as a natural gas substitute," Fowler explained.

"Without propane price and allocation controls, desperate buyers will bid up the price beyond what many traditional users can afford to pay," Fowler predicted.

Fowler said Frank G. Zarb, FEA administrator, has sent a letter to House Speaker Carl Albert asking to push for legislation that would help avert an anticipated serious propane shortage this winter. Meanwhile, regional administrators are attempting to bring home the seriousness of the problem to local congressmen.

Fowler said propane supplies will be further diminished by the decline in natural gas production, since some 70 percent of the nation's propane is extracted from raw natural gas as it is brought from the ground. The remaining 30 percent of the propane is a by-product of the crude oil refining process.

## Vernon Petty recognized by Red Cross

Twenty years of volunteer service to servicemen and their families earned a certificate of appreciation and a twenty year pen for Vernon Petty, Carrizozo.

John W. Rogers, state field representative for the American National Red Cross, and Marion Spencer, Lincoln County Red Cross Chairman, presented Petty with the framed certificate at the Court House Thursday.

It read: In grateful appreciation for your sincere concern interest and sensitivity to the needs of the military community and others served; has contributed immensely in achieving a higher degree of visibility for the Lincoln County Chapter.

Petty has served for twenty years as Military Families Volunteer Chairman for the county. He is the direct contact between the military and the service families. He investigates hardship cases, family illnesses and arranges emergency services for military connected families.

## County asks mental health designation

Lincoln County commissioners have petitioned the State Department of Hospitals for a designation as a Local Mental Health Authority.

Seventeen county commissions have petitioned the Department of Hospitals and Institutions for designation as Local Mental Health Authorities. They are: San Juan, Taos, Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Mora, Colfax, Union, Curry, Roosevelt, Torrance, Valencia, Sandoval, Sierra, Lincoln, Hidalgo, Grant, and Luna.

The petitions are in response to a provision of the New Mexico Community Mental Health Services Act which empowers DHI, as the State Mental Health Authority, to form partnerships with local governments to plan and develop a system of comprehensive mental health services statewide.

The Act, passed in the 1975 Session of the Legislature and signed into law by Governor Jerry Apodaca on April 2nd, also charges DHI with the designation of service areas and the development of a funding formula to establish the proportionate share of local funds to state monies.

A study committee is working on developing a proposed funding formula. The preliminary findings will be submitted to legislators, county commissions, members of the New Mexico Community Mental Health Services Council and others for their review and comment prior to DHI's report and recommendations to the Legislative Finance Committee in December.

Locally, members of the New Mexico Community Mental Health Services Council and DHI Community Services Coordinators have been involved in a number of activities aimed at public awareness of mental health needs in their areas and of the Mental Health Act.

## Zozo trustees will consider Cable TV bid

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees decided to at least listen to a request for a Cable TV franchise. A number of the trustees appeared to be reluctant to open that subject. Vernon Petty recalled problems in the past. He said some of the trustees were so harrassed by Cable subscribers who had problems, that they spent more time looking at other people's TVs than their own.

The discussion came Tuesday night when Mayor Floyd Siegrist read a letter from Ari L. Cope, president of the Tularosa Cable TV Company, requesting the opportunity to discuss a Cable TV franchise for Carrizozo.

Carrizozo's existing cable TV company operates on a regular business occupancy license and has no franchise.

Attorney Bill Payne said that there should be a franchise, not necessarily exclusive, for any Cable Company who used the streets and alleys of the town. He explained that the town, under a franchise, had some say as to rates charged and service, and should receive some revenue from the operation.

He said that if the new company would not offer more channels and better service than the existing one, then the trustees should probably not consider granting a franchise.

Petty said that probably other Cable companies would ask for a chance at a franchise. The trustees voted to invite Cope for a hearing on the possibility.

In other action the Trustees accepted full responsibility for cemetery maintenance, considered dog problems, studied employee insurance and solid waste disposal and appointed a new Natural Gas Board member.

Mayor Siegrist nominated J.O. (Bud) Payne as a member of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Board to replace himself. Siegrist has resigned because of his other duties. The Trustees made the appointment.

There was a discussion of the loose dog problem that appears to be increasing again. Mayor Siegrist said that a resident had complained about loose dogs in his neighborhood. They had been invited to appear but failed to show. Attorney Bill Payne told the board that residents so troubled should file a complaint with the city magistrate as provided by ordinance.

There was some talk about the reluctance of people to file complaints and Payne said that the dog problem would not be solved without citizen cooperation.

A representative of Republican National Insurance Company in Dallas will be invited to discuss a proposed medical insurance program for city employees. Under state law it is mandatory that towns offer some kind of hospitalization program for employees. The city has about \$1500 budgeted for insurance and the balance will have to be paid by the employees.

Thursday at 3 p.m. at city hall trustees will see a demonstration of a proposed solid waste collection system.

The system included 90 gallon containers distributed to residents. The containers are emptied by a fork lift and the waste is automatically compacted.

The collection method is supposed to eliminate the loose debris that now plagues windy Carrizozo.

Town manager, Johnny Johnson, explained the financial facts of the proposal. He said the current method cost about \$17,000 a year in salary and operating costs.

The new system will cut costs to under \$6000 thus creating a savings of \$11,500 annually.

The cost of the system is about \$60,000 and Johnson felt that the annual saving could be used to purchase the equipment. He said that after the

The closest in the Corona Vaughn heartbreaker 24 to 20, was Alfonso Lucero predicting Vaughn 26 to 19.

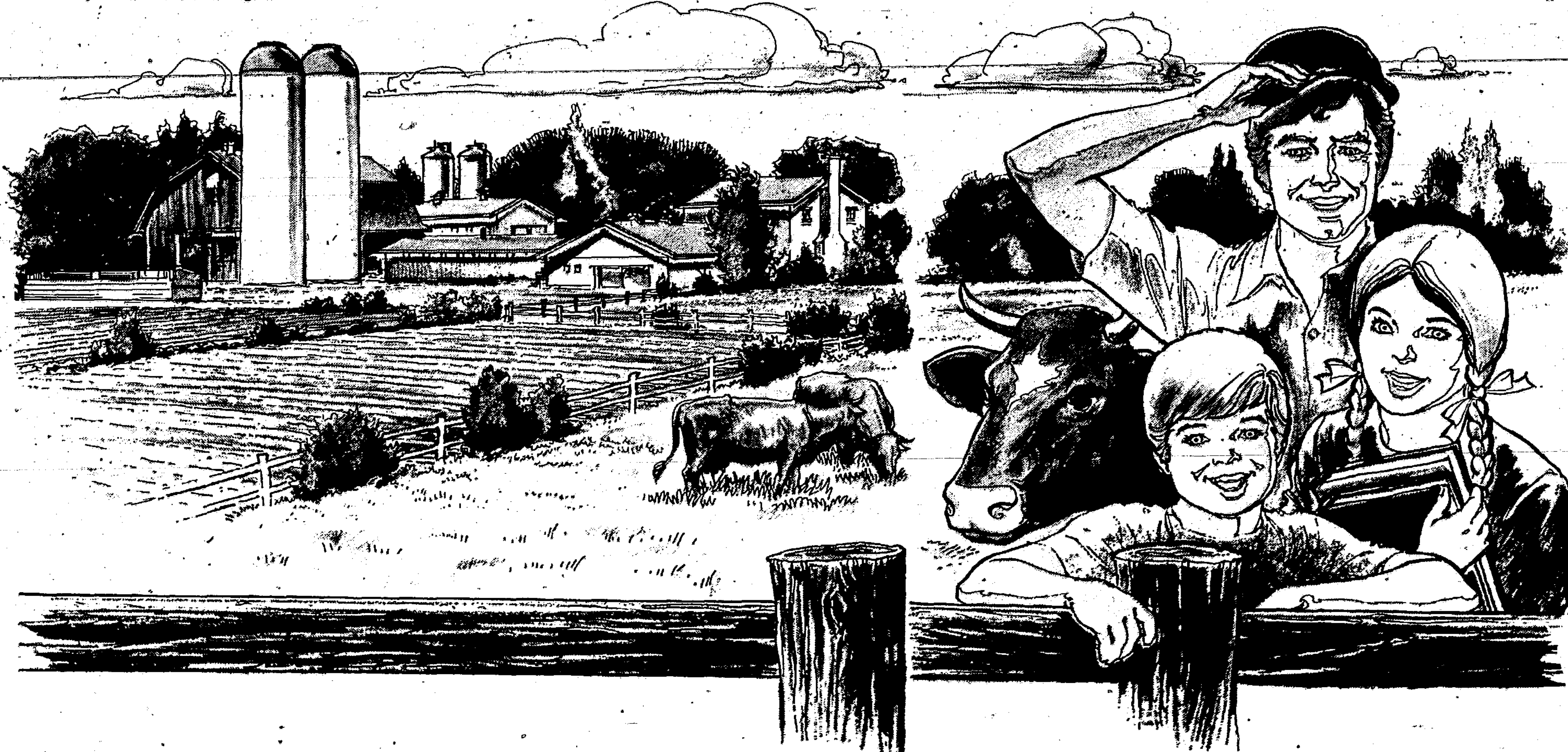

## Runnels asks for academy applications

U.S. Representative Harold Runnels, D-N.M., announced today that his office is accepting applications from eligible young men and women who desire to complete for an appointment to one of the United States Service Academies.

To be eligible for the appointment to the Army, Navy, Air Force or Merchant Marine Academies, a candidate must be not less than 17 and must not have reached the age of 22 as of July 1, 1976.

Those selected for appointments will join classes which form at the various academies in July of 1976. The Congressman indicated the Second District will have vacancies to fill at each of the academies.

## Claunch-Pinto NRC goes, on trip

Four representatives of the Claunch-Pinto Natural Resources Conservation District, Jack Kite of Gran Quivira, Morgan Maxwell, South of Gran Quivira, Doc Dean of Claunch, and Ben Creighton of Mountainair, flew to the Sonora Experiment Station south of Sonora, Texas recently to take a look at research on range management practices.

They saw examples of continuous grazing compared to rotation grazing, as evidenced by photos shown elsewhere.

Findings at the experiment station, which would be applicable to most of Texas and probably most of New Mexico, show the

economic return under heavy grazing is 11 cents per dollar investment; for light grazing 11 cents per dollar investment; and moderate grazing 26 cents per dollar investment, net return. These findings are the result of 30 years of research. Dr. Leo Merrill has been Experiment Station Superintendent since 1945, and most of the research on grazing systems and degrees of grazing has been compiled since 1935.

According to Ben Creighton of the Mountainair SCS, the group found that the maximum net dollar return for any type of grazing was with the rotation grazing system. They also found that a combination of cattle and sheep or cattle and

goats netted 23 per cent more return than a single class of livestock.

Merrill says the best kind of grazing system in this area would be a rest rotation system where the rested pasture would receive as near as possible one year's rest.

Experience on the rotation grazing system in New Mexico, says Creighton, has shown a net profit increase from 25 to 100 per cent.

## Special rules apply in death

"The question below is typical of questions asked us following the death of a Medicare beneficiary," Tim Hassen, social security field representative, said.

Question: My mother recently died at 69 after a long illness. If I pay our family doctor, who was treating her, can I apply for the Medicare medical insurance payment?

Answer: When someone who has Medicare dies, special rules apply to the medical insurance payment. If your doctor accepts assignment, Medicare will pay him. If he doesn't accept assignment, the payment will be made to the person who pays the bill. You will need to file two forms and proof of payment. The forms are REQUEST FOR MEDICARE PAYMENT and STATEMENT REGARDING MEDICARE PAYMENT FOR MEDICAL SERVICES TO DECEASED PATIENT. Both of these forms may be secured from any social security office.

"If the doctor does not accept assignment, and if no one pays the bill, no Medicare reimbursement is possible," Hassen explained. Mr. Hassen may be contacted at the County Commissioner's Room in the Court House in Carrizozo on Tuesday, October 21, between the hours of 10 - Noon.

## Channel cats planted here

Channel catfish - 350,000 of them - will be planted in New Mexico's warm water lakes later this month, according to the Department of Game and Fish.

The fish, hatched and reared at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service hatchery near Arnett, Texas, are to be planted mostly in the southeastern quadrant of the state.

They are to arrive on Oct. 22 and Oct. 29. They will be keeper sized by next summer.

### Keep the same age chick flock

Raising only one age of chicks at a time should be considered by the poultryman. This "all in and all out" program keeps disease from spreading among age groups, says D.W. Francis, Extension poultry specialist at New Mexico State University.

In this program, the poultryman must realize that he is caring for a large number of babies at one time and that the young chicks require sanitary conditions. Thoroughly clean and disinfect the facilities between lots to eliminate all contamination from the preceding brood.

## W.W. Gallacher, Jr. wins oryx draw

Eight New Mexico residents and two nonresidents named were drawn today from a field of 893 applicants for the second New Mexico ibex and oryx hunts--the only such hunts in the United States.

Drawings were also held for javelina and Barbary sheep hunts, and for special entry permits into the Manzano, Oscura and San Andres-Organ Mountains and the McGregor Range, for which 270 permits are still available.

Lucky residents licensed for the oryx hunt, to be conducted under N.M. Department of Game and Fish supervision on White Sands Missile Range, are D.C. Burnside, 3101 Eubank N.E. Albuquerque; C.A. Conway, 704 N. Miranda, Las Cruces, W.W. Gallacher Jr., P.O. Box 707, Carrizozo; E.A. Martinez, 1900 Dietz Pl. NW, Albuquerque and S.P. Rutherford, Box 3, Salem. The only nonresident oryx license was drawn by W.E. Stewart, St. Louis, Mo.

The rugged Florida Mountains will be the site of the ibex hunt, also supervised by department personnel. Winners were J.J. Blanchard, 2006 Lea Ct., Holloman AFB; J.J. Lavandoski Jr., 1705 Ridgcrest SE, Albuquerque and G.L. Pack, P.O. Box 824, Hurley. R.J. Rapson of Wyoming, Michigan was lucky in the nonresident license drawing.

The first public ibex and oryx hunts in the United States were held last year in New Mexico. These unusual animals were imported from Iran and the Kalahari Desert in Africa, respectively, by the department as part of the exotic game program. After careful study, the department transplanted the animals to areas of the state most like their native habitats. Last year, all of the oryx hunters were successful, as were three of the four hunters.

Barbary sheep applicants totaled 941, and 115 were drawn. For the javelina hunt, 798 hunters applied for the 300 authorizations available.

Manzano Mountains (E-1) entry permits were drawn by 800 of the 920 applicants. For the Oscura Mountains (E-2) entry permits there were 2,307 applicants, from which 750 were drawn. There were 2,727 applicants for the 1,500 entry permits available for the San Andres-Organ Mountains (E-3).

Only 130 applications were received for the 400 available E-4 McGregor Range permits. The

remaining 270 permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Those interested in applying must do so by mail only to the Santa Fe office of the Department of Game and Fish, State Capitol, Santa Fe, N.M. 87503. No applications will be accepted after Oct. 31. Application form C-1 is available at any department office or license vendor, and requires a \$1. fee for each applicant listed on the form.

The E-4 entry permit hunt falls within the stratified deer season and successful applicants may hunt only during the period marked on their deer licenses. The E-4 is a buck-only hunt.

Unsuccessful applicants for E-1, E-2, or E-3 entry permits may reapply for an E-4 entry permit; applicants successful in the entry permit drawings are not eligible for an additional E-4 entry permit.

The entry permit system provides a means of closely controlled hunting on special management areas or on military reservations.

### Clean summer clothes

Warm-weather clothes should be cleaned and laundered before storing for the winter, Says Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Stains left in clothing over the winter could set permanently. Soiled areas also attract insects which may cause fabric damage.

Treat stains before the final summer washing. To treat a fruit stain, for example, sponge with water immediately. Then pour hot water through the fabric from a height of one to three feet, providing this will not hurt the cloth.

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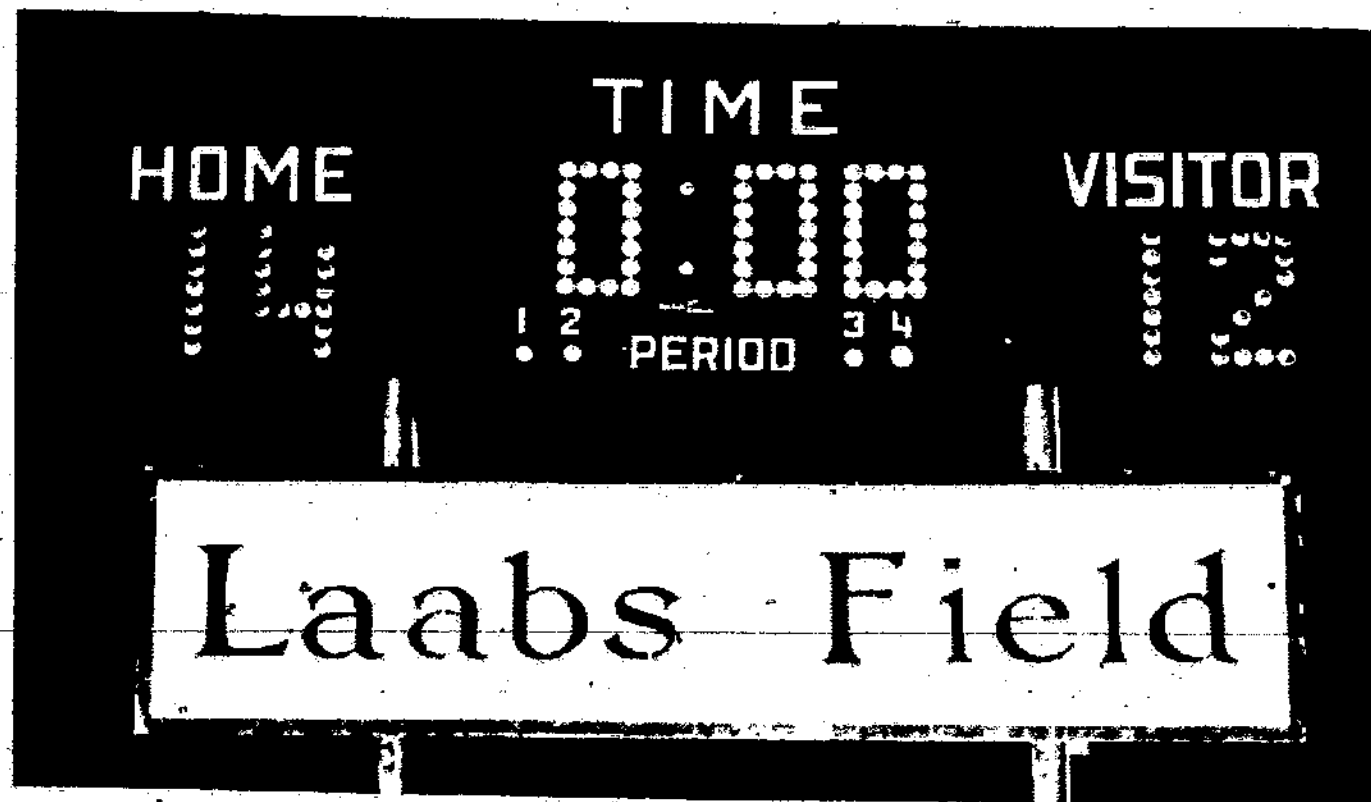

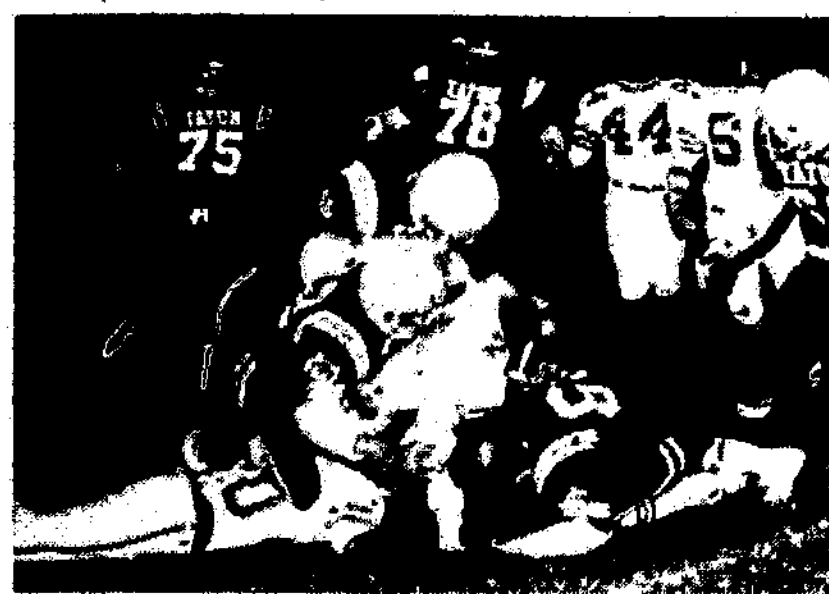

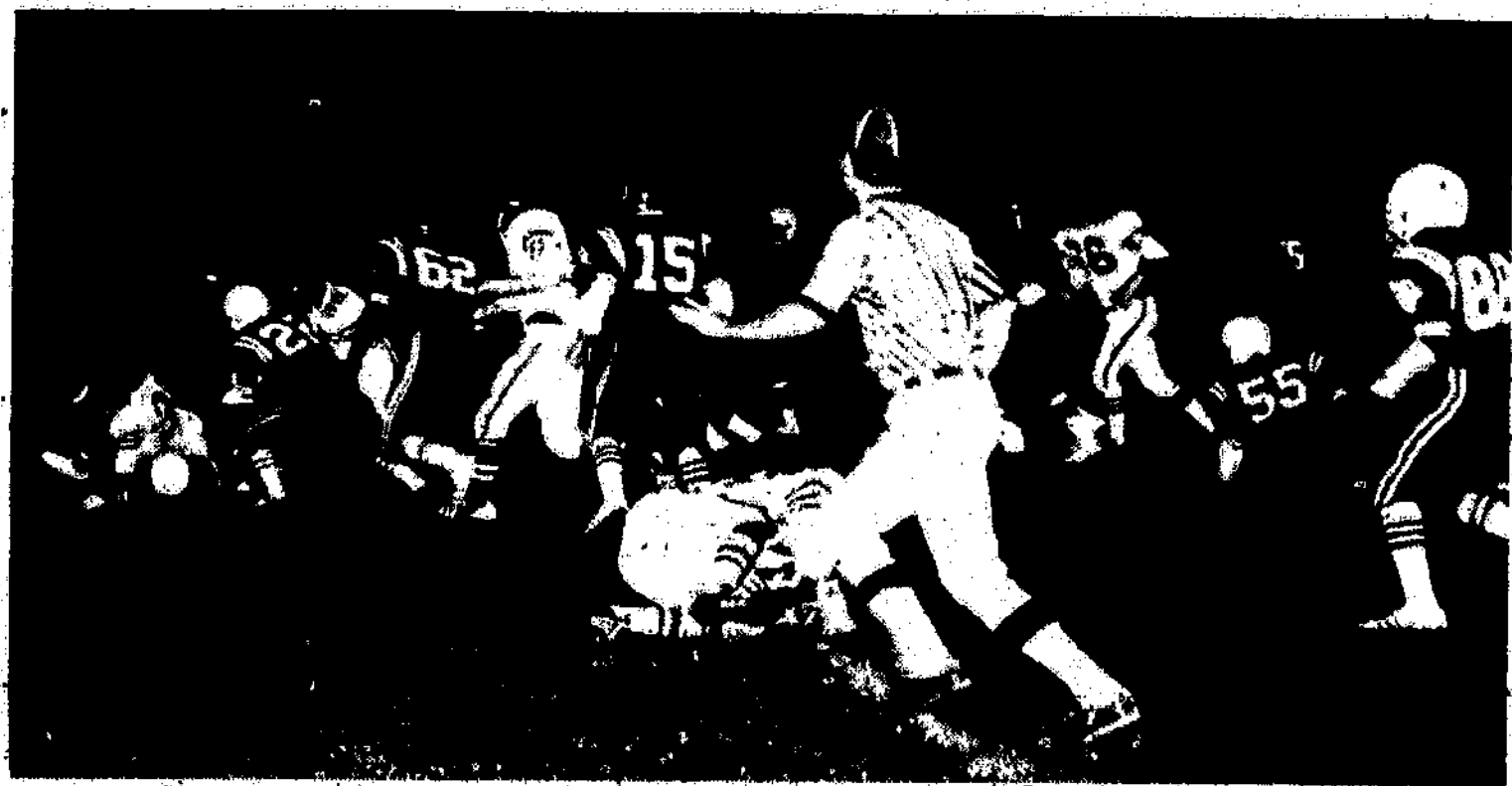

**Law job is difficult**

The first duty as a police officer is to protect and to serve the people of Carrizozo. The second is to enforce all the laws set down by the governing body of Carrizozo.

We have an oath to obey and to carry out: "We do solemnly swear that we will faithfully, impartially, and according to law, discharge the duties of said office of Police Officer, to the best of our ability, so help us God."

We, in the police department, try to do our job to the best of our ability. We aren't prejudiced, against any one race of people, whether it be Spanish, Caucasian, Negro, or Indian, etc. It does not matter, for we try to treat everyone equally.

Many people believe that the police are just out to get them; this is not true. We do, however, intend to prosecute all violators because it is our job to maintain and uphold law and order in Carrizozo.

Many people feel that we do not do our job, to the best of our ability. For example, if your house was burglarized and we were called to investigate, we would do everything in our power to catch the subject who did it.

We would gather evidence found in the house and then we would talk to the neighbors to see if there was anything else we could come up with. Many times the neighbors tell us nothing for fear of someone or they just don't want to get involved.

This is not what we need. We need cooperation from the town's people so that many crimes can be solved or prevented from happening again.

For a long time, we had only one officer. We now have two and have expanded. We also have acquired another police unit and in the near future we hope to obtain new and better equipment so that we can serve the people of Carrizozo in a better way.

Many people do not realize the job of a police officer is very difficult. The hours are sometimes, long and restless, and at times the job can become unruly. There are times when an officer must lay his life on the line and he wonders if he will return to his family at the end of his day. This does not go for just the officers in Carrizozo, but for all officers.

The police department is currently involved in a bicycle safety program in which we will teach children the proper and safest way to operate a bicycle. We plan to have a bicycle rodeo for the children in the near future.

Always remember that if you ever need us, call us, for our first duty is to protect and serve the people of Carrizozo.

**Comprehensive Health Planning Division to conduct hearing**

The State Planning District 6 Review Committee of the New Mexico Comprehensive Health Planning Council will conduct a public hearing in Ruidoso on Saturday, Oct. 18, to consider a proposal by the Good Samaritan Society, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, for a capital expenditure of funds to construct a 60-bed nursing home and sheltered care center in Ruidoso. Estimated cost of the proposed project is \$1,130,000.

The health facility capital expenditures review which will be conducted by the Committee is authorized in Section 1122 of the Social Security Act. The program is to assure that Federal funds are not used to support capital expenditures for unnecessary and duplicative health care facilities such as hospitals, nursing homes, or health centers. The capital expenditures covered are those which are over \$100,000, add or terminate a service, or add or subtract bed capacity.

No federal or state funds will be used to cover construction costs for the proposed Ruidoso facility. However, the Good Samaritan Society plans on making it eligible for Medicaid compensation for the care of patients who receive Medicaid benefits.
