High Court to review wild burro case

ALBUQUERQUE -The U.S. Suprefe Court has agreed to review a three-judge federal court federal law protecting wild horses and burroe from slaughter.
The Interior Department has told the high
courtit feared the lower curt ruing interpretation precedent under which other wildife laws might be ruled unconstitutional in the future. Specifically cited were the laws endangered species.
The laws protecting the wild horses and burroe was passed by Congress after the number of such animals had dwindled to only a few thousand from an estimated two million that roamed the orbids capture or slaughter of any wild horses or burros on rederally owned land, and requires owners of private land to contact federal officials public land onto their property
In January 1974, rancher Kelly Stephenson of Carrizozo, N.M. found 19 wild (Ed, note - Lincoln County ranchers consider these burros as
unbranded rather than wild) burros on his private property and on public grazing land he was leasing for livestock. Stephenson claimed the burros were eating the feed supplement he was providing for his cattle brand laws. which give control of the state New Mexico Livesotck Board rounded up the burros and sold them under the state's law for handling wild beasts.

Once upon a time the hand of Man picked up a
rock and patiently pecked a message on a rock and patiently pecked a message on a
boulder. Suin came, and wine - and rain, Sandblasted, frozen in the winter chill, baked in summer sun, that message is still there on boulders and in caves, on flatlands and high
ridgetops across the length and bredth of the Southwest. Three Rivers Petroglyph Site is one such gallery of the ancients, a mile-long ridge where petroglyphs pecked a thousand years ago reach

Why these dengis pecked and palnted in the rock? No man today can say for sure, , but it's certain they were the product of no random
doodling. Some of them are directional signs and other glyphs may be fourid by following their directions, Sọme were sympathetic magic signs,
wherein one wishes for a successful hunt, pecks a symbol of his desire, (a deer, a mountain goa and then goes out, knowing good magic will travel with him on his hunt. There are symbols of the sun and starts - the blessing bringing warmth after the cold sleep of

pictured on the rocks: Man rejoicing, reaching pictured on the rocks: Man rejoicing, reachig
out across the yearr to you who stand there
lo wondering what it was meant to say.

wand or an atlatl (a spear-throwing device that predates the bow and arrow) in his hand. He's facing what seems to be a mountain lion; while
another lion is attacking hum trom the back: Was wand? Had he medicine man, and was that a lion's mate come to the rescue?' Or - is that first lion, the one with the strange designs inscribed You can sit a spirit" lion?
You can sit for hours in front of one of these One recurring feature at Three River
cross, sometimes plain and sometimes Maltese helosed in a circle made of dots. Morning star lost to memory? Take your pick.
And - fish. Fish drawings in every size and shape and form are found on the rock ridge of Three Rivers. Memories of a time when there was a lake out beyond, where now white sands

That winter troutt's Fisheries Division note that winter trout management has begun in
some of thestate's warmer waters, meaning that anglers fishing designated winter trout waters can calch troul-and must also have a troul stamp.
Both bass and trout, as waters cosol, are becoming more active; fat from summer's
feeding, they are generally of good size'as well say the fisheries biologists.
Good brownitrout waters are Laguna Larga, the lower Red River, the Rio Grande box, the Cimarron, Los Pinos, Pot Creek, Rio Chiquito, the Pecos and Guadalupe Creek.
In southern New Mexico, Quemado, Sn'bw Lake and Lake Roberts have begun cooling to Trolled rapallas, Mepps spinners, flatilish and red and white spoons are proving effective at McAllister and the other lakes. Black or brown wooly worms are also enticing trout.
