The old man had been tending his cows and it was about dark-time to head for home. About the same time, a young citizen of that San Antonio decided to give his new car a shakedown



The grave site is in the Smokey Bear State Park at Capitan which is being built now. The Mayor of Capitan, Jay Johnston, is in charge of the burial service. It was decided to keep the ceremonials to a minimum. Plans are for a simple service involving local people.

Later, probably next summer, a park dedication ceremony is planned with state and national dignitaries to participate.

When the eleven officials were asked about the detail planning for a bear's burial, a spokesman said that Smokey is better known than any president. Royalties from his advertising has brought millions of dollars and his mail has required a separate zip code number.

...Smokey has served as an effective symbol for fire prevention and wild life conservation. Now -there is another Smokey in the Washington Zoo named Smokey Bear. But old Smokey sleeps in the sun and will someday be coming home to Lincoln County.

Ruidoso track improvement slated

A 400,000 improvement project is planned for Ruidoso Downs Race Track, according to an announcement issued by General Manager Al-Rosa.

Rosa made the announcement immediately after getting the project okayed by the New Mexico State Racing Commission during a meeting held in Albuquerque.

"As a result of sharply increasing business at Ruidoso Downs, we gave top priority to the improvement and expansion of the track facilities," Rosa said.

"These improvements are planned with both the public and horsemen in mind. We were delighted to have gotten quick approval by the Racing Commission, so that we can now finalize all details, put the projects out to bid and have the work completed in time for the 1974 racing season.!

Rosa said the expansion approved by the Commission represents the first phase of a 24month project, which in turn is part of an overall master improvement plan,

The initial step, as okayed by the Commission; includes three categories: the expansion of the grandstand: the erection of new barns; and the expansion of the All-American Sales Arena.

"The second phase of the 24-month project is the construction of a new totalisator board," Rosa pointed out. This would be a Western style tote board, approximately 145 feet in length. offering complete mutuel information.

Since considerable lead time is required in the entering of the highly specialized tote equipment, and since extensive work will have to be done under the racing surface near the finish line, this phase of the project is planned to get underway after the completion of the 1976 racing season, and will be ready for the '77 meeting,

The cost of the totalisator project-which is not part of the \$400,000 already allocated by the Board of Directors-was estimated by Rosa at another \$100,000.

The three projects already approved by the Commission will be submitted for bids in the weeks ahead, Rosa said. "We hope to begin construction by January 15," he went on, "The target date for completion of the grandstand and stable improvements is May 1. The completion date for the Sales Arena expansion is June 1."

The Ruidoso racing season traditionally begins the third week in May, and concludes on Labor-Day. The track offers two sales-the Select Summer Sale of Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses in late July, and the All-American Yearling Sale during Labor Day weekend,

The grandstand expansion, according to Rosa, will consist basically of an extension on the west side (toward the first turn); the erection of bleacher seating accommodating 504 patrons:

Helicopter flights plan

Helicopter flights are planned near Socorro and southwest of Datil November 25 by the Bureau of Land Management as part of a resource inventory.

Arlen Kennedy, Socorro district manager for the Bureau, announced plans for the flights "to reassure those who may see them that livestock mutilation is not our purpose.."

The BLM official said he had noted recent accounts of livestock mutilations in the state and reports of mysterious helicopter flights to which some persons attributed the animal deaths.

The flights will be east of Socorro and in the Pelona Mountain area south and west of Datil, he

said. "These flights are the only practical way we have of gathering resource inventory information in these areas in a short period of time." Kennedy said.

the installation of a new box-seat area with tables; and the expansion of the front portion of the grandstand to include an additional 672 seats in four terraced rows.

Seats for both the table area and the new terraced area will be available either on a seasonal or daily basis, Rosa said.

At the west of the grandstand, the new facility will measure 50 by 60 feet, and will offer an enclosed public area which features concession stands and 20 mutuel windows. Taking into account the bleacher seating area, the extension at the west end will have an overall length of 150

"We're especially delighted to make these improvements in the grandstand area," Rosa said. "We felt the renovation of this area should get top priority, since our last expansion-four years ago-did not include any substantial improvement of the grandstand. We're confident the expanded facilities will be very well received by our grandstand patrons."

So far as the barn area is concerned, Rosa saidthe plans call for the construction of 3 metal barns-each stabling 32 head in 10 by 12 foot stalls. The site of the new construction is not far from

'the horsemen's kitchen. No existing barns will be torn down. So the new barns will lift Ruidoso's stabling capacity to more than 1,200 head. Rosa said that the three proposed barns are based on current cost projections. If these cost

estimates do not hold up, then two barns will be built, with the third being deferred until the following year. "Our long-range plan is to eventually provide

enough stalls to accommodate 1.600 horses." Rosa pointed out.

The All-American Sales Arena will be expanded 50 percent. "This will provide a 20 percent increase in seating, in addition to a greatly expanded concession area."

The proposed expanded area will measure 50 by 150 feet. The main entrance, and concession and office areas, will be moved into this area. and the existing structure will be devoted completely to the actual sales activities. "Our Plans also call for a substantial improvement of the accoustical system" Rosa said.

A new paddock will be constructed so that the buyers, and public, can more conveniently view the horses preparing to enter the sales ring.

Comfortable, vinyl-lined seating will be installed on ground level immediately surrounding the sales ring. The plans also call for the installation of "bucket" seats at ground level, and the erection of additional bleachertype stands.

"These comprehensive improvements of the Sales Arena reflect the importance with which we hold our two sales. Rosa said.

He noted that the All-American Sale, which now ranks as the world's largest and most prestigious quarter horse sale, is vital to thequarter horse industry and the State of New Mexico, as well as Ruidoso Downs.

Architect for the entire project is the San Diego firm of Bird, Fujimoto and Fish, "This organization is the nation's most experienced architectural firm in the area of racetrack expansion and remodeling," Rosa said.

Montoya studies mail

Action by U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, D-N.M., has resulted in steps to improve mail service in New Mexico.

Sen. Montoya, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Treasury, Postal Service and General Government, asked the U.S. General Accounting Office (GAO) to make a study of the mail problems in New Mexico after receiving numerous complaints from constituents.

Although it was found that the U.S. Postal Service was not meeting its stated goals for mail traveling within the state, originating in the state for out-of-state delivery, and for mail originating outside the state for instate delivery the problems have been pin-pointed and steps have been taken or proposed to improve the situation, the GAO report stated.

The GAO said late mail deliveries were the

Transportation breakdowns, sorting errors and improper labeling of mail pouches that sent mail to wrong destinations, changes in the mail distribution program, procession delays due to out-moded policies, sabotage by mail carriers showing dissatisfaction with a change in rules for handling mail.

The GAO listed some specific details and showed some example of mail delays in its

For example, due to a transportation schedule

Domenici aids revenue sharing

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici has told a group of New Mexico county commissioners and officials here that he will continue to strongly support revenue sharing.

Revenue sharing, which turns federal monies to local governmental units without federal red tape intervening, is up for a review this Congress. by the national legislature.

Visiting with Domenici on the concept were R. E. Thompson and Milton Matson of Chaves County, W.A. Hart of Lincoln County, James Carpenter of San Juan County, Frank Sedillo of Valencia County, George R. Bell of Dona Ana County, and David Santillanes and Nooley Reinharit of Bernalillo County, all county commissioners in their counties.

Also with the group were New Mexico Association of Counties Executive-Director Philip Larragoite and Bob Bacon of Aztec, president of the NMAC.

Domenici said that "counties will prove; with more experience in handling these programs and with more certainty that the revenue sharing concept will be with us for a long time, that they can use such funds more efficiently and to better effect than the federal government.

"Some of the problems encountered in the program will be easily solved and it would be silly of us to end such a promising approach to returning real purse power to the people because of minor abuses which have cropped up," Sen Domenici continued.

change the "traditional" overnight mail service between El Paso and Alamogordo (a distance o about 85 miles) became a two-day problem.

An example of "missent mail" involved fou letters that were sent from Clines Corners t Albuquerque but went, instead, to Santa Fe. Th letters reached Albuquerque, about 60 mile from Clines Corners, three days later.

The GAO probers sent 1,088 letters from various points to test the Postal Service' handling of them in New Mexico. The study wa

made earlier this year. The GAO report to Sen. Montoya also showed that processing delays at the Albuquerqu processing center threw 629,000 pieces of first class mail into the "late" category over a 254 day period in 1974.

· Another foulup resulting in "delayed mail concerned the rules for handling mail in the Albuquerque center from Dallas. Even though the mail arrived overnight from Dallas the policy was to let the mail lie dormant in Albuquerque until the next day.

This meant that mail processed in Dalla made its way to Albuquerque within a few hour but once it reached Albuquerque it cooled it basis for 24 hours before being processed. The after being processed it had to be distribute around the state with another day involved.

The reason for handling the mail in thi manner was because it was, through policy designated "three-day mail" the GAO repor





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

Doctor bills for October, November, and December may in some cases count toward the \$60 annual deductible for both 1975 and 1976 under the "carryover" provision of Medicare & medical insurance, according to Tim Hassen. social security field representative.

Medicare medical insurance doesn't pay for the first \$60 in covered medical expenses in a calendar year. "But people who haven't had \$60 in covered expenses before October should be sure to send in all the bills for covered services they receive in October, November, or December," Hassen said, "Any expenses you have during the last 3 months of the year that can be counted toward your deductible for that year can also be counted toward the deductible for the next year."

The carryover rule helps people who might otherwise have to pay the \$60 deductible twice in a short period if time at the end of one year and at the beginning of the next year.

Bills for covered medical service performed in New Mexico should be attached to a filled out REQUEST FOR MEDICARE PAYMENT form and sent to "The Equitable Life Assurance Society, P.O. Box 3070. Station D. Albuquerque, New Mexico 87110." If the services were secured in Texas, the bills would go to "Group Medical and Surgical Service. P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Texas, 75222."

House plants that have been outdoors this summer will get a real shock when they're returned to the house in the fall, says Ricardo E. Gomez, Extension horticulturist at New Mexico State University: The difference in humidity. light and temperature often causes a sharp decline in the plant's appearance and health. The leaves turn yellow and start to fall off, the flowers fade, the buds drop and the whole plant begins to look very unhappy.

Although the shock can't be avoided entirely, you can ease the change by observing a few precautions. Take plants inside before outside temperatures become too cool. The inside and outside temperatures differ greater as fall approaches. This is very important for all of your tropical foliage plants-like philodendron, schefflera, pilea and pepromias.

If plants have been growing in the ground, try to repot them a week or more before you transfer them to the house. This reduces the shock. Also, prune back the tops to shape the plants. This will help reduce the amount of water lost through foliage.

Keep the plants in a cool place inside the house. Avoid spots where they'll get blasts of hot air from heater vents. Use an atomizer to spray the plants with water at least once a day. Use distilled water to avoid burning the leaves with the salts dissolved in regular water.

Finally, avoid overwatering. Soil dries in a different rate indoors than it did outside, especially if the pot sits in a saucer. Let the soil dry out between waterings, without letting the plants wilt. Use your atomizer to perk up plants that need a little extra humidity between waterings. Keep the watering flexible, based onplant need rather than a set schedule.
