County OK's Alto water.

In a special meeting Friday, the commissioners approved the Alto Water System Franchise application.

In discussion preceding the approval, County Manager Les Olson read a letter from the District Attorney's office asking more time to study the ordinance. He said he would have a definite opinion by Wednesday, and asked that the commissioners not adopt the proposal until then.

Bill Payne, representing Alto Village, replied the county had had the proposal for 90 days and the D.A. for 60 days. He said it would be 30 days before it becomes effective, during which time if the commissioners could reverse their decision.

The commissioners were also reminded that before water rates can be set, there will be a public hearing before the Public Service Commission.

In other action, the commissioners met with a representative of Trans Western Pipeline Co. to discuss the paved road from the Transwestern Station 8 to the State Highway 42. The road is in extremely bad shape and is very dangerous. Alternatives to completely tearing the existing road out were discussed and further action postponed until the next meeting. In the meantime, County Road Superintendent, Jack LaMay, and representatives of TransWestern are to inspect the road.

Howard Wright of Capitan Volunteer Fire Department asked the county to buy a two-way radio for their rescue unit. He was told to request

an allocation from the City of Capitan first. And if funds are all not available, to come before the commissioners again.

Co-op agreement with the State Highway Department, concerning the paving of the helicopter landing pad and parking lot at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital brought forth resolution to enter into an agreement with the Highway Department on a 50-50 basis for the paving.

Commissioner Hart moved to hold a public hearing on establishing a parks commission for Lincoln County, with a letter of invitation to the different agencies that might be involved. The motion was approved but no hearing date was set.

County Road Superintendent was instructed to fill the ditch at the Nogal Water Crossing with rock and pour cement, to keep it from washing out, at the earliest possible date.

A letter from County Manager outlining proposed Merit System for County employees was given to each commissioner to study and review. More action will be taken at the December 9 meeting.

Mary Ellen Payne requested an educational leave of absence to attend school in the fall of '76 so that she may earn her Master's degree. The request was approved.

He is New Mexico's most famous resident.
He is a multi-millionaire.
He has his very own zip code.
He has five million visitors each year.
He has a large office staff.
It took an act of congress to settle his burial plans.
He is still living but his end is approaching and already the place, method and ceremony of his

return to the earth has caused national discussion.

Last week representatives of the federal, state and Capitan town government met in the last of a series of meetings to complete the burial arrangements for Smokey Bear.

To all of Smokey's friends, this is probably the final word until the day of his death. Smokey will stay in his home in Washington D.



MacVeigh tells Rotarians BB team to move

Carrizozo basketball coach Bill MacVeigh gave a TV-talk presentation to Rotarians last week on the coming basketball season. The emphasis this year will be on a controlled fast break for the Grizzlies squads. Defense will be man-to-man with several options such as full and half court press, basket defense, a perimeter defense with some zone.

MacVeigh says he is getting good hustle in early practice session. He likes to keep his players hungry for the game so they are ready to go when the whistle blows. There will be some pass and go offense to keep the ball moving, plus room for freelanding.

A lot of highpowered officialdom met in Capitan to discuss plans for the burial of Smokey Bear. Around the table are Lou Armijo, Forest Service; Jay Johnston; Mayor Capitan; Jack McDowell, State Game and Fish Dept.; Tom Schmeckpeper, Forest Service; Richard Cooper, State Park Commission; Sam Craft, Director State Park Commission; Joe A. Clayton III, Forest Service; Felipe A. Gonzales, Department of Development; Ray - J. Polasky, State Forestry; John A. Hesterson, Forest Supervisor for the Lincoln; Ray S. Page, Forest Service; and visitors Lamoyne Carpenter and Norm Renfro.

Immediately upon his death, Smokey will be flown to Holloman Base in Air Force plane and delivered into the custody of John Hesterson of the Forest Service. He will notify everyone involved that Smokey is back in New Mexico.

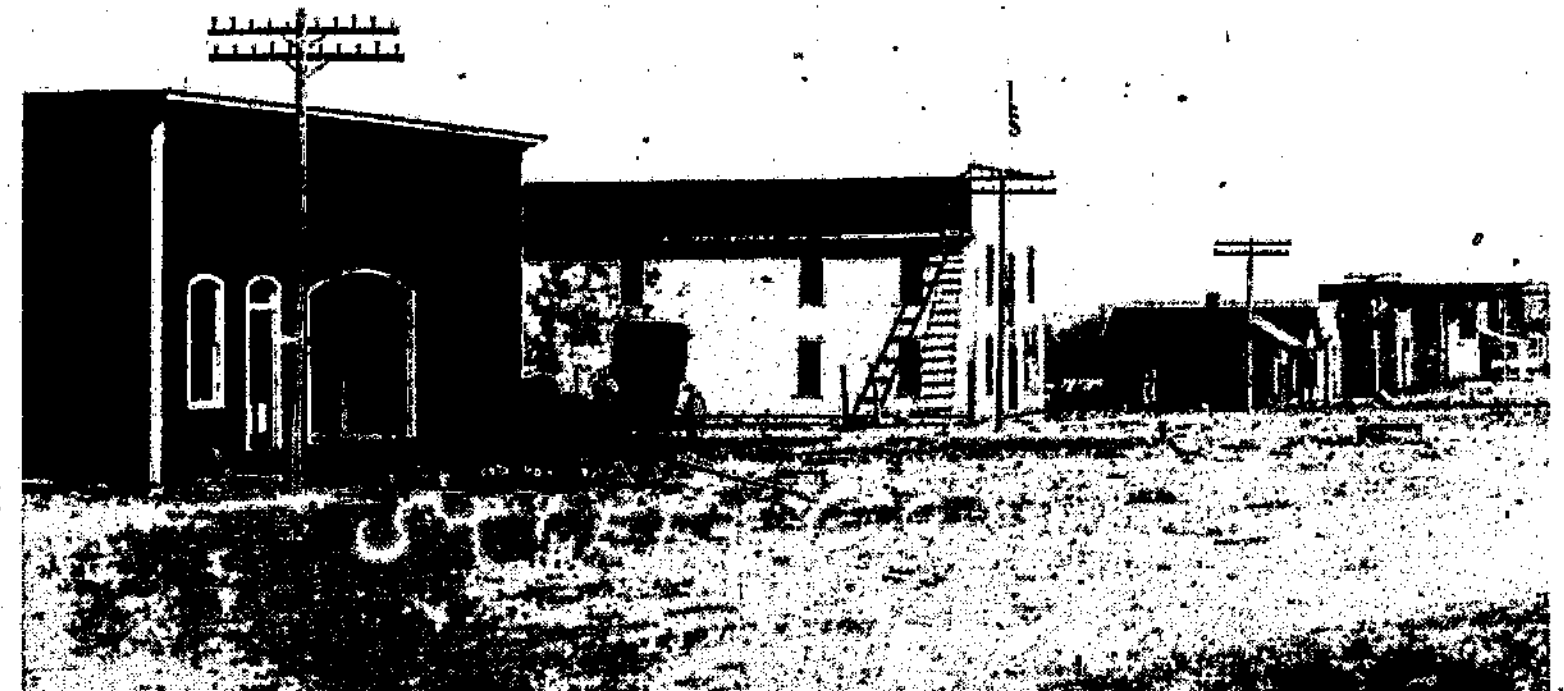
A Capitan carpenter is building a pine coffin for him. He will be delivered to Capitan and given into the custody of the New Mexico State Parks Department Richard Cooper.

The grave site is in the Smokey Bear State Park at Capitan which is being built now. The Mayor of Capitan, Jay Johnston, is in charge of the burial service. It was decided to keep the ceremonial to a minimum. Plans are for a simple service involving local people.

Later, probably next summer, a park dedication ceremony is planned with state and national dignitaries to participate.

When the eleven officials were asked about the detail planning for a bear's burial, a spokesman said that Smokey is better known than any president. Royalties from his advertising has brought millions of dollars and his mail has required a separate zip code number.

Smokey has served as an effective symbol for fire prevention and wild life conservation. Now there is another Smokey in the Washington Zoo named Smokey Bear. But old Smokey sleeps in the sun and will someday be coming home to Lincoln County.

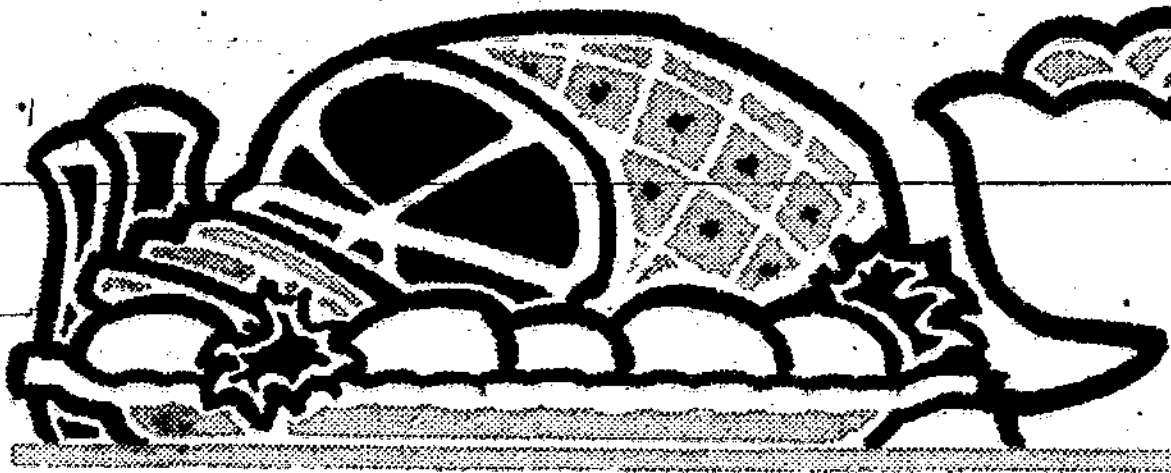

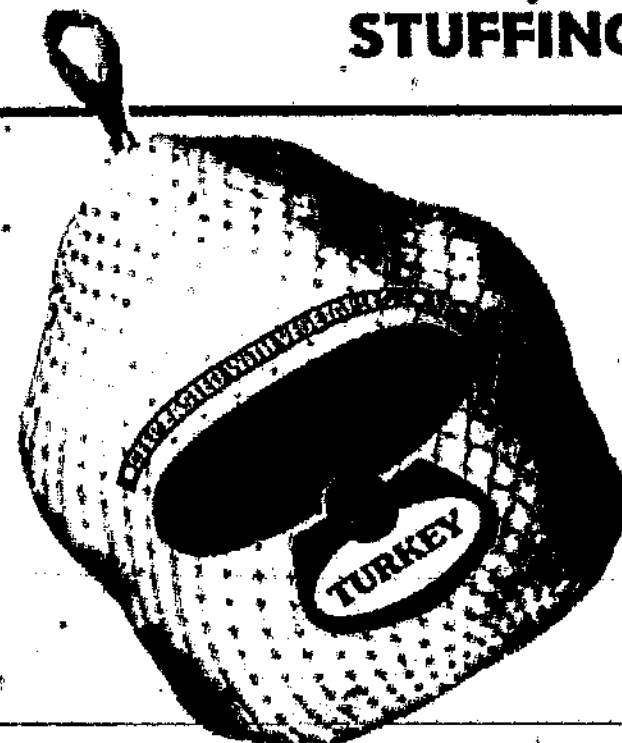

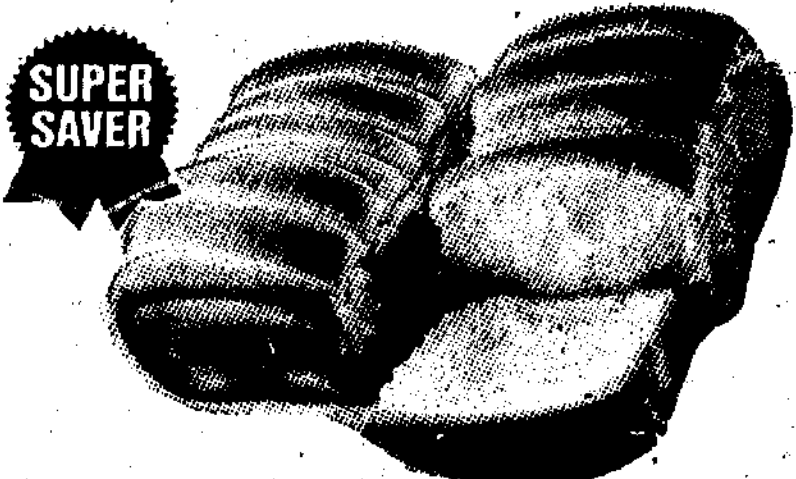

Program chairman for the afternoon was Mrs. James Cantrell. Hostesses were Mrs. Paul Payton and Mrs. Harold McDonald.

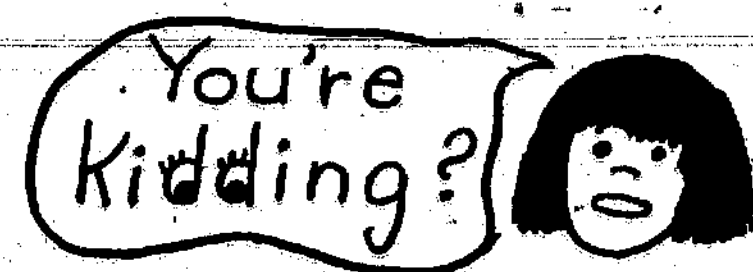

The Carson, Cibola, Gila, Lincoln and Santa Fe National Forests in New Mexico announced their plans for personal use Christmas tree sales today, as well as special office hours in some offices to accommodate the annual rush.

As in past years, District Forest Rangers advised visitors to be prepared for cold weather and to equip their cars with snow tires or chains. Some areas may be closed if conditions warrant.

The District Rangers have selected cutting sites where Christmas tree harvesting will have a beneficial, thinning effect on the forest. The removal of some trees permits those remaining to grow faster.

Trees up to 8 feet tall sell for \$1 each. Following is a list of Ranger Districts, number and species of trees available, and special hours.

LINCOLN NATIONAL FOREST
Cloudcroft Ranger District—Douglas-fir, white fir, Southwestern white pine, and pinyon pine. Sales Nov. 22-Dec. 23, from 8-5, 7 days a week.

Mayhill Ranger District—500 Douglas fir, white fir, Southwestern white pine, and ponderosa pine. Sales Dec. 1 Dec. 22, from 8-4, 7 days a week.

Smokey Bear Ranger District (Ruidoso)—Douglas fir, white fir, and pinyon pine. Sales begin Nov. 24-Dec. 24, from 8-5, 7 days a week. Tags also available at the Capitan Administrative Site, Dec. 6-7, 12-14, 17-21, from 8-5.

Plants cannot be removed says BLM

Permits are required for removal of any native vegetation from national resource lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management. Las Cruces BLM District Manager, W. K. Barker, observed that desert plants sometimes are removed from BLM administered lands for landscaping purposes without authorization.

To aid those persons wishing to collect native vegetation for landscaping purposes, an area has been established southwest of Las Cruces for removal of soap tree yucca (Yucca elata). Permits for other species will be considered on an individual basis depending on the location.

Persons desiring additional information regarding yucca permits or any other aspect of the national resource land may call the Bureau of Land Management at 623-5571 or come to the office at 1705 N. Valley Drive in Las Cruces.

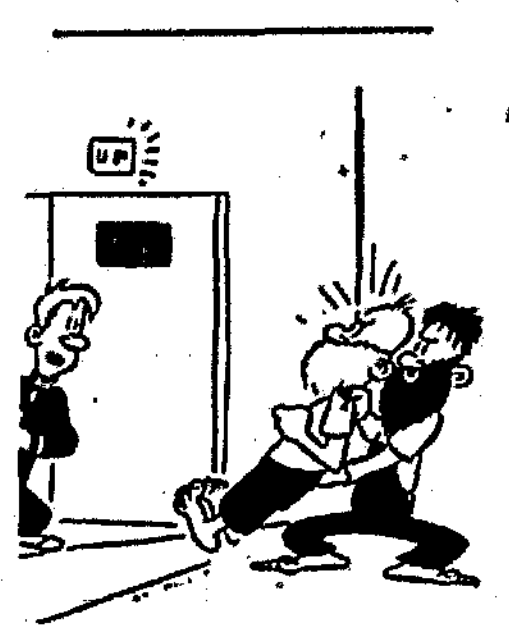
