Belco Industries
has winter layoff

Belco Industries this week announced a seasonal layoff of about half of its production crew.

In making the announcement Carolyn Cantrell said that the layoff was caused by a seasonal sales problem and that production had exceeded the anticipated winter sales.

Mrs. Cantrell said that the company had no long range problems. She said that sales and production in the past eleven months had exceeded the total past figures for the company.

The machine shop, the office and half of the production department will continue in operation. Previously a Christmas week closing had been expected and according to the management, this layoff amounts to a two week extension of that plan.

Exports to Canada of the portable welder continue and Mrs. Cantrell said purchasers from Sweden and Australia were expected to visit the plant in the near future.

Mrs. Cantrell said that production was up because of superior working conditions in the new plant. She said that the techniques had been refined and the company was pleased with the progress of the personnel.

About 13 people are affected by the layoff.

Architect says gym
floor to be fixed

The discoloration of the school gym floor and a lighting problem will be corrected in the near future.

Tuesday night, the Carrizozo School Board in a special meeting talked to the new gym architect, Nolan told the board that the company, Robbins Floors, was extremely apologetic about the floor and would correct the section that was discolored after basketball season in March.

The board agreed to pay two thirds of the \$23,500 bill pending correction of the flaw.

A shadowing caused by the mercury vapor lights was also discussed. The emergency lighting is not working correctly also. Mr. Nolan told the board that the work would be corrected.

The board held a closed session to discuss a personnel matter concerning the resignation of Gilbert Archuleta. A new custodian will be hired at the next regular board meeting.

Deadline
announced
for college

Prospective instructors for the Carrizozo Community College should have their course description in by December 22. Ralph Dunlap who is responsible for compilation of next semester's schedule has requested the teachers to try to do better than the deadline.

"We have a lot of work to do and with the holiday interruption we need to get started on the prospectus," he said.

Anyone who wants to teach is welcome to submit a course description. No previous experience is required--just the knowledge of a subject or skill, and the desire to help others learn.

At least two credit course will be offered. Mrs. Paul has been approved for an undergraduate 3 credit hour accounting course. She has been teaching a non-credit course this semester. A graduate course called "Reading Through Writing" will also be offered.

Carrizozo Community College is a non-profit community service organized by local citizens. It is funded through New Mexico Tech by the federal government under Title I of Higher Education Act.

Pat Baca is the director. Her budget is \$17,805 which includes her salary, a secretary, travel and supplies. A utility bill of \$100 in Carrizozo is also paid to the public school for use of the class rooms.

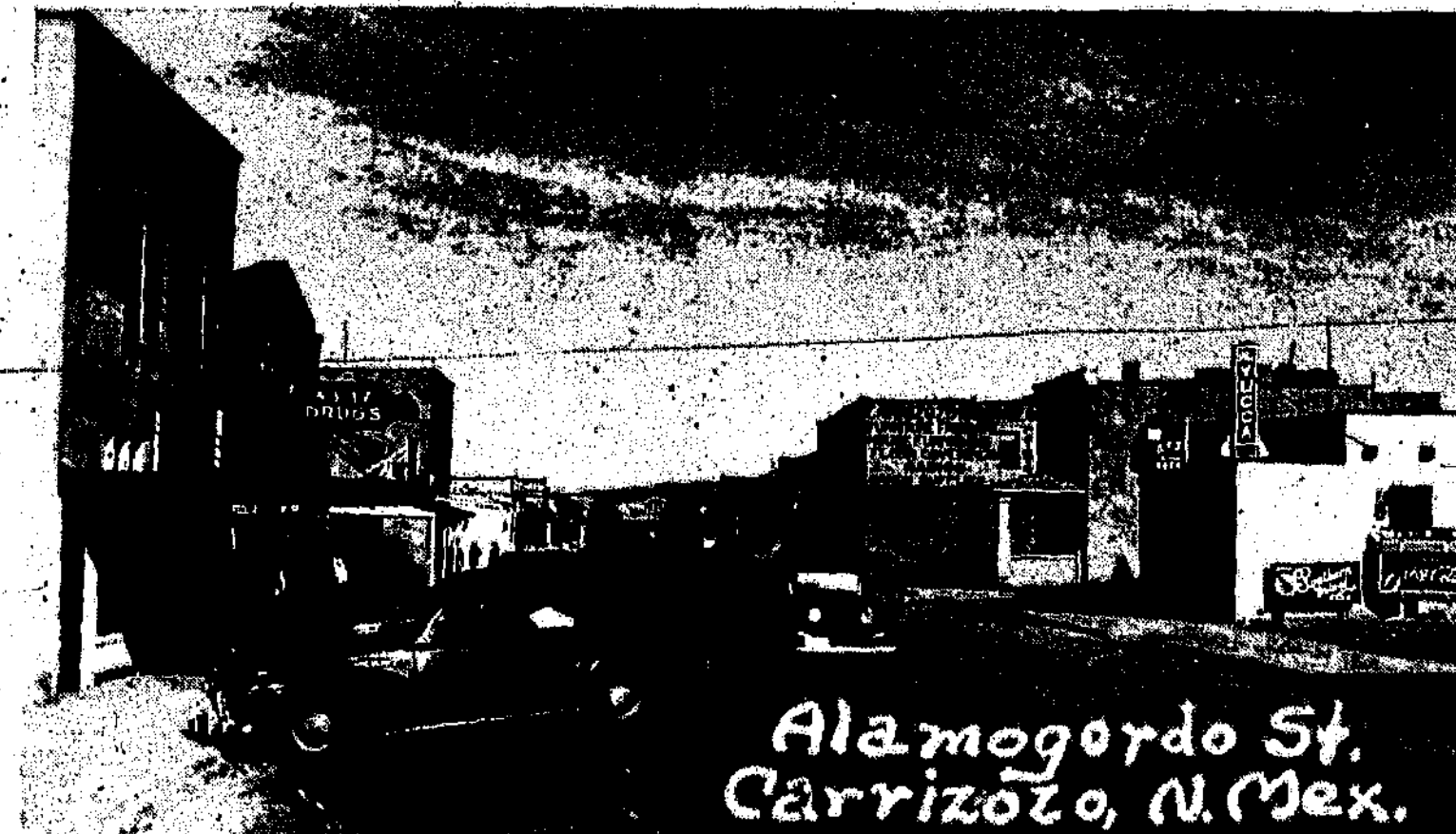
Each student pays \$15 per course. This money is mostly paid to the instructors. The formula this semester and next semester is based on enrollment with a teacher receiving a maximum of \$135 a semester for 9 students. Those with less than nine are paid the tuition total. Those with more are paid \$135. The balance is \$318.45 for this semester and will be held as a cushion.

Registration for next semester is January 8 between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. at the Carrizozo Recreation Center. Courses being offered will be announced by the NEWS prior to registration.

Employment office opens



The new Employment officer for Lincoln County is Mrs. Elsie Faecke.

The Employment Security Commission of New Mexico opened a Rural Manpower Office in the Lincoln County Courthouse Annex, on Dec. 5, 1975. This was made possible through an agreement with the Lincoln County Commissioners and the Employment Security Commission.

Mrs. Elsie Faecke will be in charge of the Carrizozo Office. Mrs. Faecke has been in training at the Alamogordo Office of the New Mexico State Employment Service for the past 10 days. She will be open for business from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday. The Rural Manpower Office is located on the second

floor of the Court House Annex across the hall from the top of the stairs.

Mrs. Faecke will register applicants for work, file claims for unemployment compensation, register food stamp recipients for work, identify applicants in need of counseling and testing services, solicit employer job orders, make referrals of qualified applicants to employees and use the statewide job bank service.

Veterans are encouraged to register for work. When making referrals of qualified applicants to job openings, Veterans are given preference.

Migrant and seasonal farm workers are encouraged to register for work at the Rural Manpower Office.

In the past the services were available only on a bi-weekly itinerant service out of Alamogordo. This service accumulated an Active file of job applicants that will now remain in Carrizozo.

Employers are encouraged to list their openings at the Rural Manpower Office.

There is no charge to either the applicant or the employer for the service rendered by the Rural Manpower Office.

The mail address is: Rural Manpower Office, Employment Security Commission of New Mexico, General Delivery, Carrizozo, N.M. 88301.

The County Commissioners recognized the need for this service in this part of the County. With the office here their will be no need to travel to Alamogordo. Last year a similar office was started in Ruidoso. The Ruidoso Office has rendered service to hundreds of people each month.

Nursing home director convicted

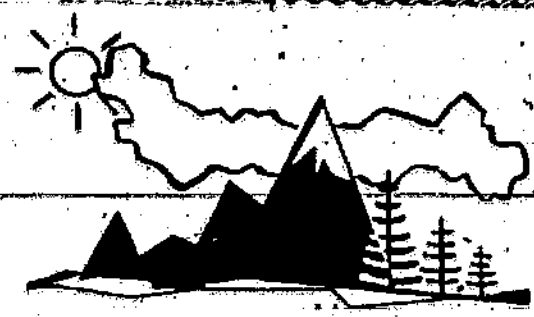
"Barbara T. Bradshaw, the Director of Nursing at Mauritz Memorial Hospital, Ganado, Texas, has been convicted of one count of defrauding the Medicare program," Tim Hassen, social security field representative stated today. "Ms. Bradshaw was found guilty of making false statements and misrepresentations of material facts with respect to the conditions and operations of Mauritz Hospital to Medicare surveyors of the Texas Department of Health.

According to Hassen, this was the nation's first conviction under a 1972 amendment to the Social Security Act which made it a federal offense for hospital personnel to misrepresent the operating conditions of a hospital to Medicare representatives. Hassen stated that this amendment was prompted after Congressional investigation and review indicated that some individuals and institutions had made false statements in order to secure approval for participation in the Medicare program.

"The majority of providers of health services are interested in providing quality health services, give accurate facts about their facilities, and file valid claims for reimbursement. Regrettably, there are a few individuals in any activity who will attempt to take unfair advantages," Hassen concluded. New Mexico farms funded by banks

Operating and real estate loans to New Mexico farmers by New Mexico bankers totaled more than \$180.5 million at year-end 1974, the New Mexico Bankers Association reported today.

The 1975 agricultural credit report, prepared by the Agricultural Bankers Division of the

American Bankers Association (ABA), indicates New Mexico bankers held \$162.6 million in production loans, 63 percent of all loans in this category, and \$17.9 million in farm mortgage loans at the end of 1974.

The figures in the report are compiled by ABA from various federal agencies' reports.

By comparison, NMBA reported life insurance companies in the state held \$82.6 million in real estate loans, Federal Land Banks \$100 million in real estate loans, Production Credit Associations \$77.8 million in production loans and the Farmers' Home Administration \$25.3 million in real estate loans and \$7.9 million in non-real estate operating loans.

At the end of 1974, America's banks nationwide had \$18.2 billion in farm operating loans outstanding, up 6 percent from the year before, and \$5.9 million in real estate farm loans outstanding, up 9 percent during the past 12 months.

Farmers' equity totaled \$438.4 billion nationwide at year-end 1974, increasing \$36.7 billion from the end of 1973. Farm expenses jumped \$7.6 billion to \$73.4 billion at the end of 1974, with realized net income from farming dropping \$1.7 billion to \$27.7 million during the year, but still the second highest income level ever.

The number of farms estimated at year-end 1974 totaled 2,830,000—down 14,000 from a year before, and down 1,133,000 from the total in 1960, the ABA's report noted.

Bankers in New Mexico are increasingly aware of the huge capital investments required by American farmers today and are using improved lending programs, correspondent bank services and secondary market resources to help meet the changing credit demands of the state's farmers.

86 percent of the banks in New Mexico extend credit to farm operators.

Dear Mrs. Rich:

I felt that the people of our county would be interested to know of the plight of a group of Christians, some 34,000, in Malawi, Africa. Thousands of Christians are now under brutal persecution in Malawi. Starting August 19, 1975, Jehovah's Witnesses who fled as refugees to Mozambique in 1972 because of severe persecution, were found to return to Malawi and now experience brutal persecution again. All of this is because of their refusal to join a political party.

I just received a report from N. H. Knorr at the Brooklyn headquarters of Jehovah's Witnesses. He said that when a group of Jehovah's Witnesses arrived at the Malawi border, the Minister for the Central Region, Mr. Kumbweza Banda, greeted them: "We welcome you with both hands. You left Malawi of your own accord and now you have returned of your own accord. The Malawi Congress Party is still in power in this country. Go back to your home villages and cooperate with the party officials." Then, referring to the members of the League of Malawi Youth, he said: "My boys are here to see that you do cooperate with the Party." Soon roads in the north and central regions of Malawi were filled with Jehovah's Witnesses on their way back to their home villages.

In some instances the Witnesses were allowed to enter their villages and take up occupancy of houses they abandoned in 1972. However, in most cases Youth Leaguers soon called to ask if they were prepared to buy political party cards. Referring to Jesus' example of political neutrality, the Witnesses refused. Immediately beatings, rapings and other atrocities began again and many were driven from their homes. In Kancheche six Witness women were all raped by several men. In Sosola village a group of men and women, including the local Member of Parliament, Mr. Elson Muluzi, seized the possessions of the Witnesses and drove them from the village.

Early in September youths under the direction of the Kasonjola branch of the Malawi Congress Party visited homes of Jehovah's Witnesses in six villages, demanding they buy party cards. When they refused, the youths stole all their belongings, subjected them to terrible beatings and destroyed their small supply of flour. In other locations the Witnesses were stripped naked, their hair buned off their bodies with torches and beaten until blood came out of their mouths and noses. This happened at Chimasongwe village in Lilongwe under the direction of the local chairman of the Youth League, Mr. Chipukupuku, while the attackers were urged on by local women members of the League of Malawi Women.

Because no one will accept them, many Witnesses have been forced to wander in the cities by day, sleeping in nearby forests at night. Upward of 4,800 fled to neighboring Zambia, but reports just received say they were retaliated to Malawi by force.

Dr. H. Kamuzu Banda, Life President of Malawi, recently instructed the Malawi police to round up adult Jehovah's Witnesses and put them in detention camps. The children are being left behind either to stay with relatives or fend for themselves. The government order applies this to nursing infants. The police have ruthlessly executed this order. Whole congregations of Witnesses, men and women, have been rounded up and put in detention to further pressure them into buying political party membership cards and to prevent flight from Malawi.

It seems a shame that humans could treat other humans in such an inhuman way. Therefore, I wanted to inform the people of Lincoln County of these atrocities.

Thank you, Mrs. Rich, for publishing this letter in your paper.

ATTENTION MOBILE HOME OWNERS

If you own a mobile home that exceeds 8 foot wide or 40 foot long you are required to display a mobile home sticker showing that your mobile home is on record at the Assessors Office.

Over the past three years various colors of stickers have been used. This year, (1976) a light blue sticker will be used. On the sticker will also be a large number 26 indicating Lincoln County. Each County in the State will have a different number.

If you now have a sticker issued by the Assessors Office in Lincoln County you will be receiving a new sticker by mail very soon.

If you feel that your mobile is not on record at the Lincoln County Assessors Office then you should call or write to that office so that they may issue you a sticker.

Persons owning mobile homes should remove old stickers and display the new sticker on the window nearest the tongue or front of the mobile home. Failure to record mobile home with the Assessors Office or to display the new sticker could result in a penalty.

Mobile home owners are also reminded that they are required by State Statute to fill out and return to the Assessors Office the "Mobile Home Report" located on the back of the notices of value that they will be receiving in the month of January. Failure to do so will result in a penalty.

Mobile Home owners who wish to move their mobile homes are also reminded that they are to contain a release from the Assessors or Treasurers Office before obtaining a move permit. A move permit is not valid without the release being attached to the permit according to the Motor Vehicle Code. A person not complying with the Motor Vehicle Code could have the mobile home owner fined and the mobile home impounded until compliance is met.

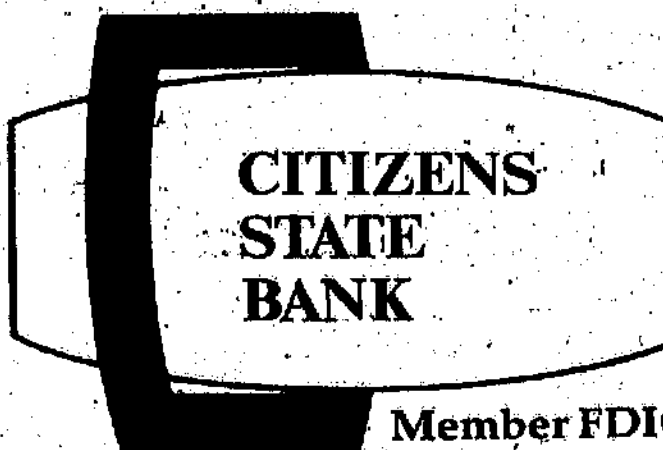

from an auto wreck in which an entire family of eight had been killed—all but the mother.

I have not found that such training deadened compassion but it does desensitize the nerve endings that respond to embarrassment.

Otherwise, how on earth could I face the county road crew after publishing an article that mentioned 12,000 miles of county roads? (We have 1200 miles to take into consideration.)

And this week, leaping lizards, a typesetter who refuses to confess, had the school board protesting. A \$51,740 November gas bill. We thought the \$517.40 was high.

There is an account of a man who fell off a 64 story building when a reporter happened to be on the 50th floor. He stuck his head out the window and called, "How are you doing?" "Everything fine so farrrrrrr," was the answer.

Let's pretend that I wrote, "Johnny Apple was seriously injured this week when he was struck on the head by an apple. The apple fell from a tree during a storm and Mr. Apple had taken cover under a tree in his orchard. Mr. After Fact, insurance safety expert, said "apple growers should be taught not to sit under apple trees."

Valley apple growers would no doubt rise up in justified wrath. "Every one in Lincoln County but that fool woman knows that poor old Johnny Apple hasn't been quite right since his horse kicked him. There isn't an apple grower in the Valley that sits under a tree, what trees that are left. And that insurance guy is just trying to get out of paying what he owes old Apple."

In all of these years, Mr. Pflingsten, I have yet to write that (blank) into a telephone pole, or (blank) telegraph pole or (blank) utility pole. This is not because of a superior knowledge of pole nomenclature. It's pure chance.

A year or so back I did write about a highway department standard. It was not in a newspaper but rather in a letter in response to a demand by the highway department that I send a check to cover the cost of replacing a "standard". I sent the check under protest but that is another story.

For my own ignorance, brazen nerve, mistakes, misrepresentations, omissions and other journalistic crimes, I will take responsibility.

For those of a "Roswell paper" and the other thousands of news reporters in New Mexico and the United States, I will claim a certain degree of empathy but no liability.

However, I did spend the afternoon, and it was a Sunday afternoon, looking into your condemnation of "incautious" pole reporters.

Anything published after 1960 I consider modern and besides, the library is closed so the books on hand must do the job.

Webster's New Practical Dictionary, 1961 edition, which is the dictionary that is supposed to be used in the NEWS office, on page 498, defines "Pole (pol), n.1. A long slender piece of wood or metal; as telegraph poles."

There is no mention of telephone poles which only proves the carelessness of the lexicographer in this instance. The Encyclopaedia Britannica, 1960, says that (by 1960 telegrams are all transmitted by a wireless method, namely radio.)

In Funk & Wagnalls Standard Dictionary International Edition, 1960, there are neither telephone or telegraph poles under 't' but under 'p' there is a pole bean, pole fence, pole jump, pole star and, ah yes, a "pole line A line of telephone or telegraph poles."

This was not the triumphant end of the pole research, Mr. Pflingsten.

I decided to go to the horse's mouth which in this case I suspect of being a telephone company public relations expert who objects to the use of the telephone company's name every time a car and pole meet.

Since it was Sunday and the usual people were off I was able to get to the top without any trouble. I talked to Charlie Martin, the Mountain Bell Service Foreman in Alamogordo. Now if there is one person around here who knows about the transmittal of sounds over wire, it is Mr. Martin.

I asked Mr. Martin if the telephone company owned any poles. He assured me that the company has quite a few used exclusively for telephone lines. He said there were other poles carrying both telephone and electric lines.

I asked him what the uprights that carry telephone lines are called. He said that he calls them "telephone poles." He said that probably folks at Otero Electric Cooperative called their poles "electric poles", and that where they are shared, the nomenclature might be "utility poles."

I had not at this point told him the reason behind my question and so it was a surprise when he laughed and said, "But, everytime a car hits a pole, it always is called a 'telephone pole.'"

You are correct in assuming that telephone and telegraph poles were shared to a certain extent. As best as I can discover, most telegraph line ran parallel to railroads and the telegraph stations in those days were in railroad stations or adjacent there to.

The messages were delivered to homes by boys on bikes and then later called over the telephone to the recipients.

Telephone lines, however, mostly ran along roads. Telephones go to homes and homes are on roads. Anyone who has every tried to get ten miles of telephone line out of his ranch understands why.

It is my guess that before the telephone was invented, old Jessie James would say to his gang, "Fellows, we'll ambush the train at the 150th telegraph pole west of Dry Gulch."

And mamas travelling with young children probably said, "You may have another cookie when you have counted 500 more telegraph poles."

But a long long time ago, my sister and I used to count telephone poles and think we had been riding a mile for every 100 telephone poles. We were very little girls and did not know about odometers.

Finally, Mr. Pflingsten, I suggest that all of those reporters who write about vehicle-pole collisions were once little boys or girls who were told to "hush and count the telephone poles" or had dads who said "I must have climbed one thousand telephone poles today." Perhaps, even today they might watch old television movies where the FBI director instructs our hero to climb a telephone pole and the telephone of the bad guys.

Mothers, on the other hand, have tried for

years to assist the telephone company. They always say, "Johnny, do not climb that ELECTRIC pole. You will get burned to a crisp." Friend Pflingsten, this may all be history soon. Just as the telegraph line and pole vanished, the telephone pole is doomed. Already a large percentage of Ma Bell's line runs in underground cables; and some calls are transmitted in some miraculous manner wirelessly through the air.

One small comfort to pole aficionados might be this thought: If the lines in Lincoln County should all go underground, it is highly unlikely that our telephone service will be interrupted by water in the cable as we are now by lines blown down.

Pat Dunning, the remarkable Lincoln County lady whose Mill Iron Lazy Three Ranch produces some of the nation's outstanding quarter horses, sent the following from the December issue of "Grain Producers News."

"Here is a version of a story which I used in my soil conservation classes when teaching at Arizona State University. It tells much succinctly and dramatically.

Not long ago, "The Morning Star People" reported that the editors of the Farmer-Stockman, a Middle West farm publication, printed a picture of a deserted farm house, set in a sand swept field. The editor offered a prize for the best 100-word essay about the impact of land erosion as pictured by the desolate scene.

An Indian lad from Oklahoma knocked off the prize with this graphic interpretation:

"Picture show white man crazy. Cut down trees. Make too big teepee. Plow hill. Water wash, wind blow soil. Grass gone. Door gone. Squaw gone. Whole place gone to hell. No pig. No corn. No pony.

Indian no plow land. Keep grass. Buffalo eat grass, Indian eat buffalo. Hide make plenty big teepee. Make moccasin. All time Indian eat. No work. No hitchhike. No ask relief. No build dam. No give dam."

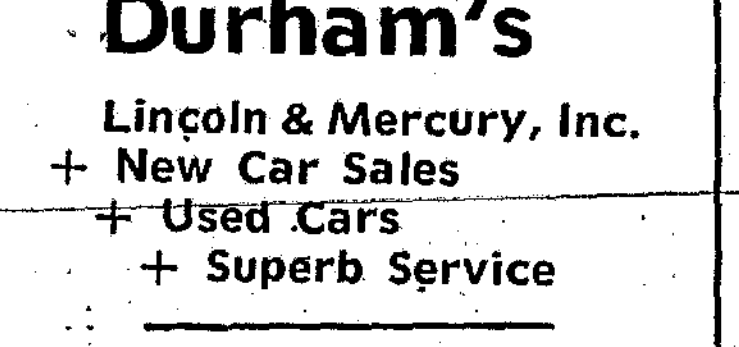

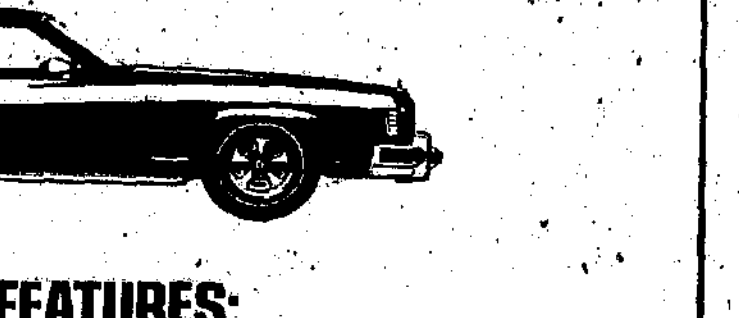

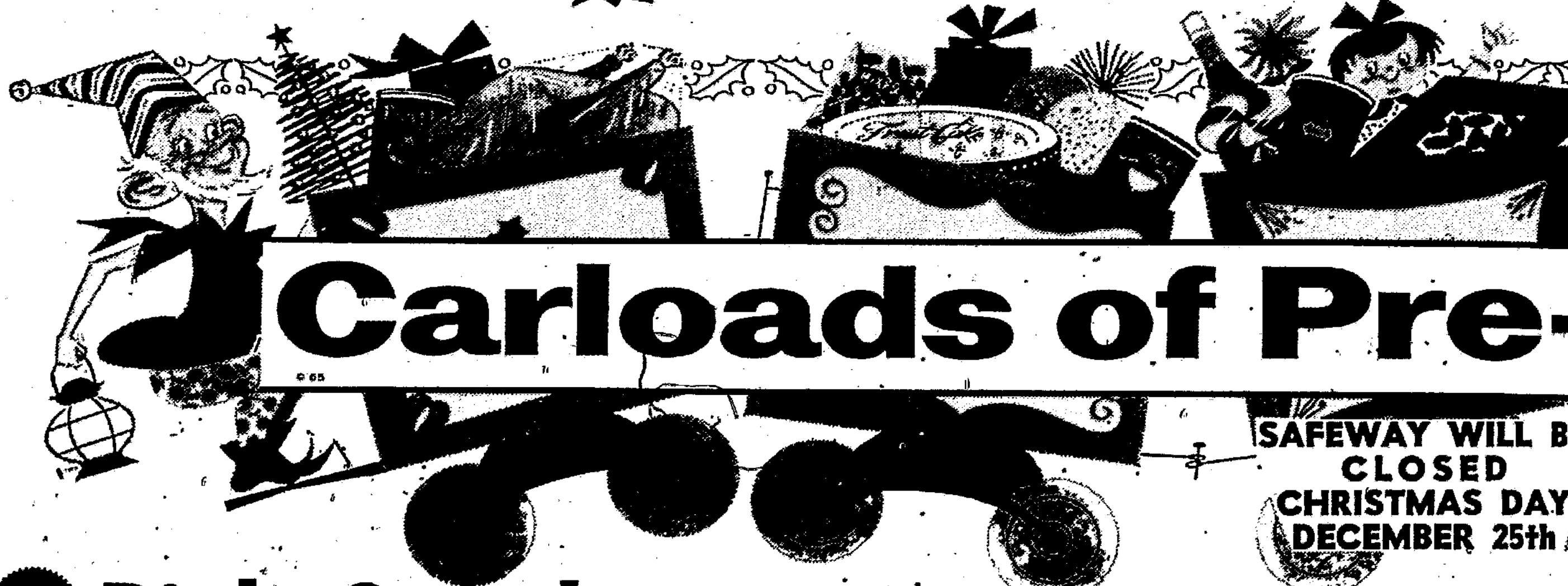
