## Water sewer bonds carry big in Tuesday voting

A lot of Carrizozo water users should be happier now and more so in coming months when new water wells are put on the town system, new water lines laid and pressure in all parts of town brought up to good standard.

Proposition One on the ballot will allow the Town of Carrizozo to incur indebtedness by issuing negotiable general obligation bonds in the aggregate amount of \$50,000 or so much there of as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing, enlarging, improving and extending the water system of the town.

This proposition carried 104 voting for, 37 against.

Proposition Two on the ballot allows the Town to issue GO bonds up to \$25,000 for construction, enlarging, improving and extending the sewer

system of the town. Most of this work will be done at the proposed industrial park.

This proposition carried, 97 voting for, 42 against.

Mayor Bill Payne said that the next step would be a meeting in Roswell with Economic Development Agency officials today (Jan. 23) to discuss grant money of some \$250,000.00 which was contingent on a favorable vote in the January 21 election.

The Town engineer will be in Roswell with Mayor Payne to go over plans for the industrial park, and see the project moved along as speedily as possible.

Two voting machines were set up in the new town hall, one for private use of only two voters who own land in town but do not live in town.

Election officials said that neither of these two property owners showed up to vote. The other machine was used by Carrizozo residents.

## Report from State Rep. John Bigbee \$438 million budget a little high

State Rep. John Bigbee of Encino called Wednesday morning to report on the opening day of the state legislature. Bigbee has been appointed to serve on the appropriations and ways and means committees.

He thought Gov. Jerry Apadoca's "state of the state" address was good and Bigbee said he was very much for three items discussed by the Governor. Apadoca asked for exemption on gross receipts tax for everybody on medical services, asked for more of sales tax to revert to municipal governments, and also asked that a greater share of property tax be returned to county government.

The governor did ask for 10 percent increase in state official salaries, and Bigbee said he was not sure whether Apadoca meant just for top brass

or across the board increases. Bigbee would not be for raising salaries of top officials only, they are pretty well paid now, he said.

The total budget request by the Governor of \$438 million might be a little high in view of present economic conditions, was Bigbee's comment. He would like a cautious approach to government spending, even more than the governor outlined.

The state has been doing well financially because gross receipts tax income has increased with inflation. Bigbee said that butane has doubled in price the past year and that people are paying double tax at the same time which puts more money in the state pocket. Gas tax is a big revenue producer and this has increased.

## Feet dragging on Angus road

SANTA FE — The State Highway Department is still dragging its collective feet on paving a Lincoln County road, scene of a head-on collision that injured Lincoln County Democratic Chairman Fern Sawyer.

The stretch is 4.8 miles of NM-37 from the NM-37-NM-48 junction at Angus northwest. The SHD held a public hearing on the project 3 years ago. But a second hearing must be held in Lincoln County because the SHD has not moved ahead with construction.

The SHD says hopefully a survey crew will be assigned to the site in the spring. This can be done only after the SHD wins approval of its project environmental impact statement from affected state and federal agencies and the Lincoln County Commission.

The project, linking 2 paved NM-37 stretches, is not on the SHD present or future construction schedule yet. Nogal rancher Fern Sawyer suffered rib and right ankle fractures in the crash on the icy, snow-covered road.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U. S. Sen. Pete Domenici (R-NM) achieved an overall voting record of 99 per cent for the 2nd session of the 93rd Congress.

Domenici's voting record is more than eight percentage points higher than the Senate average of 88.6 per cent.

These figures reflect attendance for 168 days the Senate was in session, from Jan. 21 to Dec. 20, 1974.

## Rileys named State Farm family

Mr. and Mrs. Herman L. Riley and their five children, natives and residents of Torrance County, have been named the State Farmers Home Administration Farm Family of the year, it was announced last Wednesday. The family was recently given the honor as the County Farm Family at special recognition luncheon in Estancia.

Due to Mr. Riley's physical condition, Mrs. Riley does a lot of the farming the boys (Runnell and Randy) help with the farming and do all the cattle feeding and feed hauling and stacking. While Mrs. Riley and the boys are helping with farming, cattle and harvesting during the summer months, the oldest girl, Linda, keeps house and does the cooking and takes care of the youngest child, Lynette, age 3.

The family will now be considered for the honor of National FHA Farm Family of the Year. They will be honored at special recognition ceremonies in Albuquerque February 19.


Each year the family plants a one acre garden plus approximately one acre of sweet corn. From this they can and freeze vegetables to carry them through the winter and spring. They also butcher and freeze their own beef annually as needed. They participate in community affairs and are members of the County Farm Bureau.

The story of the Herman L. Riley family is one of tenacity, wisdom, courage, and some success. Mr. Riley is 32 years old. He grew up on an irrigated farm approximately four miles north and five miles east of his present home. He quit school when he was 16 to work farming and milking cows for a local dairyman.

The four older children are active in 4-H Club work and the oldest girl, Linda, was the 1972 Ewing 4-H Club Hi-Point girl carrying four projects. In 1970 Linda showed the first place beef breeding heifer at the county fair and in 1971 showed the Grand Champion beef breeding heifer at the county fair. She is now a member of the Future Farmers of America.

Riley and his wife, Leah, married when they were 18 and 17 years old. They had total assets of \$25, and a 1949 Chevrolet pickup on which they owed \$75, and Herman was working as a milk hand, earning \$150 per month. Today they have 1104 acres of land of which 120 acres are irrigated farmland and 240 acres is dryland farm. They also own 112 head of breeding beef cows and a full line of farming equipment.

Mrs. Riley's school career was similar to that of migrant children since her family moved frequently. She graduated from Estancia High School in 1961 as Valedictorian of her class, after the birth of their first child.



The first four months after marriage they lived with Leah's parents, then purchased a small house in Estancia. He worked for a year for the State Highway Department, then went to work for Tillery Chevrolet. He had developed spinal arthritis in his hips in 1961 and it moved to his lower spine.

The Riley family has been named the State FmHA Farm Family of the Year. Mr. Riley says he will soon be depending on these two younger children to help with chores. They are Lisa and Lynette.

In 1963 Riley had to quit his work due to his back, the couple sold their house and lived in Mrs. Riley's parents house for six months. During this period they drew no unemployment compensation but Herman did what ranch work he could and they hauled firewood to pay living expenses.

After six months he was able to return to work and they purchased a small house in Estancia in December 1964. In 1965 Herman leased 487 acres of grass in the Ewing area and bought five cows, paying cash, continuing to work for Tillery.

At the time of their first FmHA loan in 1968, Mrs. Riley was driving a school bus and she continued to drive and work in the County

**Bob Freeland homesteaded in Capitans**

Mr. Robert (Bob) Travis Freeland, born April 24th 1871 at Duck Town, Tennessee. He died Jan. 13 in Roswell. He came with his parents to Roswell, New Mexico in the early 1890's where he resided until 1898, when he returned to Tahlequah, Oklahoma to marry a former sweetheart, Miss Ruth Gibbons, on July 6, 1898. In 1907 they moved to Clovis, and from there to Roswell, in 1908.

Mr. Freeland was a boot maker by trade and was associated with Amonette Boot and Saddle Shop until 1909 when they moved to the Capitan Mountains where he homesteaded and began ranching, a business which he followed the rest of his life.

Mrs. Ruth (Gibbons) Freeland preceded him in death on April 15, 1956 at Capitan.

Bob and Ruth Freeland had six children, two girls and four boys, all of them still living. Listed according to age, as follows: Mrs. Virda (Freeland) Cook, Artesia, N.M.; Mrs. Minnie (Freeland) James, Roswell, N.M.; Mr. Campbell L. Freeland, Bakersfield, Ca.; Mr. Roy M. Freeland, Roswell, N.M.; J. P. (Pete) Freeland, Blythe, Ca.; and Mr. Robert (Boys) Travis Freeland Jr., Thoreau, N.M.

Mr. Freeland is also survived by sixteen grandchildren, one of which, Mrs. Alyce Morris is his guardian, also twenty five great grand children and eleven great, great grand children. Two sisters also survive Mr. Freeland, Mrs. Ida Sheets, Albuquerque, and Mrs. Evelyn Terry, China Lake, Ca.
