## Vocal crowd at mobile home owner showing

In times like these when people can't afford to travel around a lot, they get together and argue with their neighbors which was about the shape of the situation during joint meeting of Carrizozo town council, Planning and Zoning commission, and a room full of mobile home owners and other people meeting Monday night.

The important result of this two-hour and fifteen minute meeting was vote by trustees to completely eliminate any mobile home zoning regulations in all parts of the Town of Carrizozo. Getting to this point was not easy.

The meeting was officially opened by Mayor Bill Payne who read resolution authorizing the filing of applications with the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce, for a grant under the terms of Public Law 89-136 as amended. This is next step in water-sewer and industrial park project.

Mayor Payne resubmitted the name of Floyd Siegrist as member of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Assn. Board. Roy Harman moved Siegrist be appointed, there was no second, the motion died.

Jo Hoffman has asked for occupation license for opening a store to be called The Clothes Rack. Miss Hoffman will pay utility bills regularly to get current with the Town, license was granted.

Council members present were Payne, Harman, James Silva and Earl Fenter.

Mayor then turned the meeting over to Fred English, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, members present were Ramona Ortiz, Albert Roberts and Paul Payton. This commission met last week and came up with three recommendations for the council. 1) That an area from 8th St. north to US380 and from 'B' Ave. west to town limits (approx.) be opened for mobile homes. 2) All lots on northwest side of 11th St. be rezoned from commercial and service to R-1 single family residence not including courthouse block. 3) That the zoning ordinance be changed to allow only non-resident mobile homes in B-1 area.

Atty. Archie Witham stated that three people had filed conditional use applications, two of which had been published in the newspaper and could be considered at that meeting, the third would have to be published, so people in the area would know, before it could be given consideration.

The applications of Friday Sherrill and Wesley Lipsday, for permitting mobile home in areas not allowing them, were considered by the P&Z committee and approved. The request of Gilbert Lucero was to be published this week and considered next week, his possible fine extended 30 days.

There was mention of fact that the zoning ordinance was passed in June and that the council has not acted in that length of time to re-examine the status of mobile homes. Mayor Payne said that the P&Z committee has changed frequently and that any person wanting to serve on this committee should contact him or the Town clerk.

Val Duval, new owner of former Jack Hefker property, has two sisters and needs two mobile homes, one for each sister and wanted to locate another on his property. He has partner coming

here who will want to live in mobile home.

Wayland Hill held up sheaf of papers and said they contained 348 signers protesting the mobile home zoning. Truman Spencer, Jr. had some words about the zoning and Joe West wanted to know the value of zoning.

The council reconvened and Harman presented a prepared change in the zoning ordinance which would open the town to mobile homes except the triangular area bounded by 7th St., 'E' Ave. and Hiway 380. This motion received a second, whereupon Fenter moved to amend the original motion by allowing mobile homes anywhere in town. There was no opposition—the amended motion carried.

Mobile home owners were all satisfied with this action, meeting ended.

## News Bulletin

The Carrizozo Mayor and Town Attorney, after reviewing appropriate statutes, are in agreement that the action taken January 27 by the council in repealing that part of the Zoning ordinance relating to mobile homes was invalid.

This is because New Mexico statute (14-20-4) requires a minimum of fifteen (15) days notice between publication and public meeting. In this case there were only four days between publication and meeting.

Until the council convenes in legal meeting 15 days or more after publication the ordinance remains in full force and effect as originally enacted.

A public meeting has been set for February 18, 1975 at 4:00 p.m. in the Town Hall to consider changing the zoning ordinance as it pertains to mobile homes. This is the earliest possible date for such meeting.

the stocking and pull the fabric taut. Run two rows of short stitches all the way around the hole, to reinforce the edges. Do not pucker or gather.

The first step in weaving is to run rows of threads going in one direction across the entire hole. After the hole has been closed in one direction, you are ready to darn in the opposite direction. Move the needle over and under each of the threads until you have reached the opposite edge of the hole. Take a stitch to secure the thread and work back in the opposite direction, alternating the over-and-under threads to make a plain weave. When you have completely closed the hole, fasten the thread, using two short overlapping stitches instead of a knot.
