Council considers rates

Official legal holidays for Carrizozo town employees were approved Tuesday night in a regular meeting of the town council at the town hall. Holidays will match those adopted by the state for state employees.

High natural gas bills this winter concerned the council, and Sally Ortiz, board member of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Assn. was on hand to answer any questions. Mayor Bill Payne, attorney for the association, also contributed to the discussion and said the association is in pretty good shape now—having gotten some financial difficulties straightened out since the

early part of last year.

Ortiz had praise for association manager Floyd Siegrist, who he said "has done a good job."

Councilman C. D. "Duff" May said, "I am impressed with what they are doing over there (in Capitan)."

"Every board member is for Mr. Siegrist," Ortiz reported.

Payne said that the Dec. 15-Jan. 15 period was a particularly cold one in Lincoln County — accounting, in part, for higher gas bills. He said a 75 per cent rate increase only became markedly evident since the start of winter on gas bills — accounting in part for some rather hefty bills this winter.

Ortiz said his gas bill went up to \$90 "and I am on the board."

Ortiz said that the gas association would welcome a public meeting in Carrizozo so that association officials can explain to the public the several reasons behind much higher bills.

Payne reported the gas association's finances are in good order, that \$10,000 per year is being set aside to pay on a delinquent interest indebtedness and that money is going into contingency funds.

HUD almost took over the association last year, he said, "but backed off."

Councilmen discussed a Lone Star beer sign on U.S. 380 which they say obstructs the view. Possible warning to the owners with intent to remove the sign after due notice was discussed, but no action was taken. Town Attorney Archie Witham said he will check more into legal technicalities in the matter.

Restrictive clauses in some deeds prohibiting mobile homes on some pieces of property in Carrizozo were discussed. May brought up the question and was advised by Payne that the "intent of the clauses" is to prohibit mobile homes.

The town council, Payne said, has no authority to change or deal with restrictive clauses in deeds — that he feels sure the courts would recognize "intent" where such clauses are made to "temporary structures" being disallowed on property.

Consensus of opinion was that property owners who have such clauses in their deeds have no worries about mobile homes being put on such property. However, Witham said he thinks the clauses are ambiguous.

Councilman Roy Fenter reported that the Recreation Commission had purchased a vacuum cleaner for \$600 or \$700 without obtaining bids. Law requires bids for such expenditures unless the town council declares an emergency.

Mayor Payne said the town of Carrizozo is concerned only to the extent that "auditors could come back on us."

Duff said, "they know they are breaking the law."

The town attorney will write the Recreation Commission outlining regulations in the matter.

Holidays approved for town employes this year are as follows:

Good Friday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day Oct. 13, Veterans Day, Nov. 11; Thanksgiving, Christmas and Friday, Nov. 28 (in lieu of Lincoln's birthday) and Friday, Dec. 26 (in lieu of Washington's birthday).

Lincoln's and Washington's birthday are not being observed by state employes because the legislature is in session.

Occupation license fees paid in January by Carrizozo businesses were approved. Fees are based on business gross.

Approved payments were \$15 for Simmons Auto Repair, and \$10 each for David's Chevron, White's Trailer Park (being sold), Harkey Realty, W. W. Farless and Clarke's Chapel of Roses.

White's Trailer Park is being sold to Frank Montoya who said he will take care of past due occupational license fees and \$80 plus in overdue water bills. Seller is Leandro Vega, Jr.

Simmons Auto Repair was high bidder for a 1965 pickup being sold by the town. His bid of \$125 was accepted. Only other bidder was Kenneth Stone of Capitan, who bid \$43.50.

Councilman approved the purchase of a Remington photo copier on a joint timepayment — lump sum payment schedule. Total cost including interest and a service contract will be approximately \$950.

Payne reported that the Four Corners Commission has approved an assistance grant of \$69,000 for the industrial park contingent on approval by EDA of a grant of \$166,000.

Payne said he expects EDA approval down the road with little or no difficulty.

The council confirmed the recent favorable vote on \$85,000 in water and sewer bonds and said the money can be spent in whole or in part, on the industrial park project.

Monthly reports were approved and adopted. Johnny Johnson, superintendent of public works, reported: 5 water connects; 1 water disconnect; repaired 11 water leaks; completed sewer line at Lava Vista; installed sewer line at Outpost Bar; street repair; completed EDA grant forms for SENMEDD; conference with engineers on water line replacement; made application to Highway Dept. for permit to replace sewer line at Outpost Bar; disconnected water service for nonpayment of bills; surveyed sewer system and plant with EIA official.

Work plan for Feb. 1975: repair fire plugs, repair streets, grade streets, grade sewer plant road, fence city yard, remove old 10 inch water line to be used for drain pipes across tracks; clean up city yard as time permits.

School vocational spotlighted

FFA, FHA and the business department of Carrizozo High School are taking special note this week of Vocational Education Week. This week is a time the public to recognize the vocational offerings of local schools.

A special program by the FFA students at Corona Wednesday in an assembly acquainted the student body with the goals and projects of FFA, according to Royce Washburn, FFA adviser and vocational agriculture instructor there.

The annual Future Homemakers of America Blossom and Beau Festival Tuesday night was a highlight of the special week. It was staged in the Carrizozo cafeteria.

Today, selected members of the three Carrizozo organizations departed for Santa Fe for a meeting with local legislators and a special legislative assembly for all such youth in New Mexico.

From Carrizozo, Wilfred Holmgren, Pat Palomarez are representing FFA; Annette Chavez and Roberta Vega, FHA, and Lisa Zumwalt and Lupita Mackey, representing OEA and the business department.

Agriculture offers basic courses which teach young men and women the basics of carpentering, welding, caring for machinery, as well as farming and caring for animals — all the

myriad of things which must be done to keep a ranch operating.


Home Economics offers basic courses which give the training needed for the career of homemaking all the way from handling the family finances to bandaging junior's knee and from caring for children to the psychology of just living together as a family. The business department offers basic courses in typing and other needed business skills.

All three departments now have added features built onto the basics which train juniors and seniors for entry-level jobs into businesses. Each of these is offered during a two-hour block of the school day and pupils are given an opportunity to do the actual work required on the job. Already several students who have had this training have gone direct from high school into jobs for which they were trained.

At present, three are using their skills to work their way through college. This year (1974-75) Carrizozo has added another vocational area. This one is directly in conjunction with local businesses and is only offered to seniors at the present time. Students are in the classroom one hour per day for this course, learning how to get along on jobs, how to find satisfying jobs, what compensation to expect, as a few of the many things that must be studied in class of this kind. These students are then placed in actual jobs for half a day.

Old Nike screen exists no more

The old Nike drive-in movie screen on the edge of Carrizozo along U.S. 380 had its underpinnings cut with a torch Monday morning, and then at 10 a.m. sharp, the structure met its demise via a cable and pickup truck.

W. B. Lockridge and Gene Murfin cut the pipe which anchored the 20-year-old structure and then pulled it down in a huge cloud of dust.

"It came down easier than I thought it would," Lockridge, who operated a welding service, said. Bob Means, of Means Motor Supply, was the

owner of the structure, but he sold it recently to Sandy Martin of El Paso for metal salvage. The steel later was sold to a Buster Prather of Alamogordo.

Means says the screen and projection building were erected about 1955 or 1956. The drive-in was closed in 1961, he said.

The welders cut through each support pipe until they reached the final one. The screen support structure fell before the last pipe was cut.

New mobile home action necessary

The Carrizozo town council, which voted Jan. 27 to eliminate mobile home zoning in all parts of Carrizozo, will have to reconsider the matter in a special meeting at 4 p.m., Jan. 18, in the council chambers.

State law requires that no zoning ordinance changes can be voted without governing bodies giving 15 days notice as to time and place.

Four days' notice was given before the council action on Jan. 27. By next Tuesday, 15 days will have elapsed so that any action of the council on the mobile home issue will be strictly according to Hoyle.

The meeting next Tuesday, according to Archie Witham, town attorney, will be to consider change in the zoning ordinance as it relates to mobile homes and trailers. The zoning ordinance became effective last July, but the mobile home issue has not been clarified or explored thoroughly until this year.

New Mexico Statute 14-20-4 says that no zoning ordinance can be amended unless a public hearing is held "at which all parties in interest and citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard." And the law requires the 15 days notice.

The present ordinance almost prohibits mobile homes in Carrizozo — except for specific exceptions, Witham says.

State law on zoning, 14-20-4, also says: "If the owners of 20 percent or more of the area of the lots and land included in the area proposed to be changed by a zoning regulation protest in writing the proposed change in the zoning regulation, the proposed change in zoning shall not become effective unless the change is approved by a three-fourths vote of all members of the governing body of the municipality or by a two-thirds vote of all members of the board of county commissioners."

The current Carrizozo ordinance affecting mobile home allows for storage of mobile homes (travel trailers, etc.) less than 40 feet long and ten feet high in the side or rear setback areas. Such vehicles must be properly licensed and not used as living quarters or connected to utilities. The planning and zoning commission in mid-January made three recommendations concerning mobile homes to the town council.

The recommendations are as follows: "That an area from Eighth Street north to U.S. 380 and from "B" Avenue west to the town limits (approx.) be opened for mobile homes.

"All lots on the northwest side of 11th St. be rezoned from commercial and serving to R-1 single family residences not including the courthouse block.

"That the zoning ordinance be changed to allow only non-resident mobile homes in the B-1 area.

At the Jan. 27 meeting, Wayland Hill held up a sheaf of papers and said they contained 348 signatures protesting the mobile home zoning.

Councilman Roy Harman at the Jan. 27 meeting presented a prepared change in the zoning ordinance which would open the town to mobile homes except the triangular area bounded by 7th St., "E" Ave. and Hiway 380.

But Councilman Earl Fenter moved to amend the original motion to allow mobile homes anywhere in town. There was no opposition — the amended motion carried.

The action will have to be reconsidered, Feb. 18, however, Harman said he "still feels the same way" and wants the ordinance amended to exclude the triangular area from mobile home development.

Harman said he feels "every citizen is trying to do what's right. Each one of us has to give a little. I hope others will give a little. I want to do what is right for the town."

Rancher's Message October 1972

A tour to see where the first Atomic bomb was exploded in 1945. This 1,820,506 acre area has some of the best grazing land the state of New Mexico has.

About one hundred (100) pioneer ranchers started developing this vast area about one (100) years previous to this date. Water was developed first with pick and shovel, ropes and buckets.

Homes were built with whatever was available with no government aid at that time.

About 28,440 head of cattle was being grazed in this area by these ranch families and about 21,330 calves were produced by these ranchers at 500 lbs. dressed beef weigh 10,665,000 per year.

More beef could be raised in this area since plastic pipe is available to develop more watering for cattle.

In April 1942 under condemnation and court orders we were forced out with our stock with no place to relocate.

Stock was sacrificed at 25 percent of the prices today. Our improvements are being destroyed, burned, etc. We pay our taxes and state leases on this property that we own and control.

We are not recovering any money for lease. We ranchers could be producing 10,665,000 pounds of beef per year for 127,267 people.

The importers profit from this loss. Please read U.S. News and World Report, April 10, 1972, "Why Food Prices Are Up" by Secretary of Agriculture, Earl Butz.

Our enemy aggressor of 1941 have their country back and producing, also their impounded money returned.

The economy of the State of New Mexico will be deprived of \$51,192,000.00 at the end of eight years which will be 1980. This is dressed beef value from this area. This only includes the White Sands Missile Range. The McGregor Range in what it would supply is not figured with this.

Please write your Congressmen and Senators and demand that this area goes back to its original owners and get it back into production again.

We thank you for the day.

Bargaining, drinking bills in

Inside the Capital by Fred Buckles

SANTA FE — Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, opposes public-employee-collective-bargaining and 18-year-old drinking, both pending in the House.

Sen. Lee, a conservative, says: "It's up to us in the final analysis to appropriate money for public employees. Often times the buck's going to stop right here."

Sen. Lee says: "Each state that has lowered the drinking age to 18 has experienced an increase in fatal accidents in 18-21-year-old drivers." Lee will propose return of 2.85 mills of property tax to counties from the state "based on where the tax is generated."

He would permit a credit on state income tax for state gross receipts tax paid on prescription drugs and medical services. Sen. Lee is on the new joint legislative-energy committee. Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, is also on the new panel.

New House Republican Leader Hoyt Pattison, Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, proposed to reduce the state gross receipts tax one-half per cent and allow cities to adopt up to one-half per cent of gross receipts tax by voter referendum. The move would lower state income \$30.7 million a year. Pattison's bills were sent to the House Taxation-Retenu Committee.

Rep. Von Rue Crawford, R-Luna-Hidalgo, opposes 18-year-old drinking and public employee-collective bargaining. A Deming businessman, Rep. Crawford says of 18-year-old drinking: "Most people in my district oppose it."

Rep. Crawford says of public employee-collective bargaining: "I don't want to see our citizens put at the mercy of a union. If the police, Fire Dept. to water employees were on an extended strike, it could be a real health hazard. Also, the cities have a certain amount of money. They don't have any money to bargain with."

Rep. John Bigbee, R-DeBaca-Guadalupe-Lincoln-Torrance, proposed a constitutional amendment giving permanent status to the state severance tax permanent fund created by the 1973 Legislature "so it can't be raided." The fast-growing fund's balance will be about \$39 million June 30.

Rep. Bigbee, a rancher, also introduced a memorial for the Land Use Advisory Committee. The memorial asks Congress to review the federal estate tax because some ranches must be sold now to pay the tax.

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, predicted the legislature will pass his bill banning carrying of a deadly weapon on licensed liquor premises. A House Judiciary Committee hearing on the bill is set this week.

Rep. Berry was pondering introduction of a bill banning public school employes from receiving compensation from a school district while they serve in the legislature. Nine legislators are public school administrators or teachers.

Rep. Berry said payment of public school personnel while they serve in the legislature "is for services not rendered and that's strictly against the law."

Rep. Berry opposes a pending bill that could create five county commissioners in Class B counties — Lea, Chaves, Dona Ana, Curry, Eddy, Grant, McKinley, San Juan, Santa Fe and Valencia.

The Senate passed five bills by Sen. Kenneth Schlientz, R-Curry-Quay, supported by New Mexico District Attorneys Assn. Among them was a bill imposing a special penalty for

possession of large quantities of marijuana. The bill calls for a 2-10 year prison term or a \$5,000 fine if a defendant is convicted on the first offense of possession with intent to distribute more than 25 pounds of marijuana.

Rep. John Hays, D-Clovis, says the state franchise law should be revamped. He says some companies force unreasonable quotas and allotments of merchandise on distributors and retailers.

Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Sierra-Grant, says the legislature "is in a position of considering \$30-\$35 million in tax relief." Rep. Ryan says the state income tax is the logical area for tax relief, especially in the \$10,000-\$25,000 middle income brackets.

Ryan, state Republican chairman, opposes 18-year-old drinking and public employee-collective bargaining. He says public employee-collective bargaining would burden local governments already in financial straits.

New Senate Majority Leader C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, says: "I want to put the Senate in a very businesslike and orderly operation." An insurance agent, Sen. Trujillo, 42, says: "I think so far we have succeeded." Trujillo is adamantly opposed to extending legislative sessions beyond 60 days.

Sen. Odis Echols, D-Clovis, would attack New Mexico's major water problems with a new special fund for research, conservation and development projects. Sen. Echols will introduce legislation this week.






Judge reinstates E. Sanchez

By court order, Deputy Sheriff Ernest Sanchez has been reinstated as deputy sheriff in the Lincoln county sheriff's office.

District Judge George Zimmerman issued an order Feb. 5 which says, in part, that "the sheriff of Lincoln county, New Mexico, Leandro Vega Jr., may hire as his deputy sheriff, his brother-in-law, Ernest Sanchez". The order is retroactive to Jan. 1.

At a meeting of the county commission in Carrizozo Feb. 3, Lincoln County Commissioners adopted the policy of eliminating nepotism to the third degree in county government.

The action removed Deputy Sanchez and Mrs. Leandro Vega Jr. as cook for prisoners effective that day, Jan. 3. Mrs. Vega is the sheriff's wife.

The court order restores Sanchez to his position, but the status of Mrs. Vega apparently remains in doubt. As of Tuesday of this week she was still on the payroll and still cooking for prisoners.

Mrs. Vega is not in the same category, legally, as a bonded employee such as Deputy Sanchez, a former sheriff of Lincoln County.

Judge Zimmerman told the News that Sanchez is "well qualified and is a good police officer...it appears that I have the power to approve bonds for the sheriff...I checked with the district attorney and deputy district attorney...and decided to reinstate Deputy Sanchez."

The order signed by Judge Zimmerman reads: **IN THE MATTER OF THE APPROVAL OF ERNEST S. SANCHEZ AS DEPUTY SHERIFF OF LINCOLN COUNTY.** NO. 8343-A

WHEREAS Section 5-1-10, N.M.S.A. (1953) Compilation requires the approval of the Presiding Judge of the Twelfth Judicial District Court whose duty is to approve the bond of Leandro Vega, Jr., Sheriff of Lincoln County, New Mexico and employer of Ernest S. Sanchez; and,

WHEREAS prior approval is required for said employment of Ernest S. Sanchez by Leandro Vega, Jr., and good cause appearing;

IT IS ORDERED, Nunc Pro Tunc, as of January 1, 1975, that the Sheriff of Lincoln County, New Mexico, Leandro Vega, Jr., may hire as his deputy-sheriff, his brother-in-law, Ernest Sanchez.

DONE this 5th day of February, 1975. **GEO. L. ZIMMERMAN** DISTRICT JUDGE

Requirements of State Law Sec. 5-1-10 (1953) allow an elected county official to employ a relative, but the county commission must pass a resolution which is published that waives the nepotism (showing favoritism to nephew and other relatives).

In the action Feb. 3, the commission had Sanchez signed oath of office on the desk, but voted that his commission be rejected and no waiver would be issued in the case. That action applied only to Deputy Sanchez.

Following that vote, a policy resolution was passed that no waivers of nepotism would be issued in Lincoln County government. This action had the effect of eliminating Mrs. Vega from her job.

Commissioner Bud Payne abstained and took no part in the discussion Feb. 3. Commissioners Nunez and Hart cleared the nepotism decks by their majority vote.

Sheriff Vega and other elected county officials are covered under a blanket bond - signed by Judge Zimmerman and by Roman Nunez, chairman of the county commission.

If the steaks are frozen they should be 4 1/2 to 5 inches from heat. Broil 22 minutes turn and 40 to 45 minutes total time for broiling 1 1/2 inch rare; 45 to 55 minute medium done.
