Mobility okay in most of town

Lincoln County this year. So is skiing and snowmobiling.

The Board of Trustees of Carrizozo Tuesday afternoon repeated an action of several weeks ago and opened up all of Carrizozo to mobile homes except for an area generally bounded by 7th Street, 'E' Avenue, Highway 380 to 'H' Avenue, back to 'E' Avenue.

After hearing citizens' opinions for almost two hours, councilman Roy Harman moved that the town be opened to mobile homes except for the designated area. Councilman James 'Willie' Silva seconded the motion, and the vote was unanimous except that Councilman Earl Fenter, a member of the Planning and Zoning Commission, abstained.

The Planning and Zoning Commission had recommended that the entire town be opened to mobile homes with no exceptions.

Discussion on the mobile home question was hot and heavy at times during the Tuesday session at the Town Hall, starting at 4 p.m.

The same action was taken by the council several weeks before, but because not enough time was allowed between the time a hearing was announced and the time of the hearing, the action was nullified.

Mayor Bill Payne at the start of the mobile home discussion announced that the council intended to hear from the citizens before taking any action — that each person speaking should limit himself or herself to three minutes and provide the council with his or her name.

Bob O'Conner was the most vocal person in opposition to the Zoning ordinance.

He questioned the legality of reproduced copies of the Planning and Zoning Ordinance because some of the copies did not have the town seal or signature of the mayor.

"We are satisfied that the ordinance is legal," Mayor Payne said.

Pepper Smith asked how the planning and zoning ordinance originated.

Town Attorney Archie Witham explained that a city planning firm was retained to draw a development plan for Carrizozo, and that the city planners said the town was unsightly and was not growing according to any plan.

A zoning ordinance was recommended. Leroy Najar asked, "Do any of you people think Carrizozo is going to grow. Do we really need zoning?"

Tad Hinch commented that any house that can be moved can be considered a mobile home. "Adobe" would be the only exception, he said. The mayor disagreed and said the purpose of the meeting was not to define a mobile home but to decide where they can be placed in Carrizozo.

Wayland Hill Jr. suggested that the council either do away with the zoning ordinance entirely or come up with something more acceptable to everyone.

Hill also questioned a section of the ordinance which prohibits overhauling of automobiles at service stations.

Carmen Hill asked the mayor if his office wasn't in a residential area.

Payne said his business came under the grandfather clause, that "you're probably right" in that the business should burn down, the zoning ordinance would prohibit it being rebuilt.

That came up after it was pointed out that existing trailers in place when the zoning ordinance was passed are allowed, but that they can't be replaced — or couldn't until council action, Tuesday.

There was some sentiment that a town council should not have any control over private property.

Truman Spencer Jr. commented that since the original official town map was lost before 1937, corners "are not where they're supposed to be" and that a current zoning map is not accurate.

"If that map is part of the zoning ordinance, I'm against the zoning ordinance," Spencer said. Mayor Payne said it was not the intention of the council to put anyone out of their home, that he personally favored opening up more areas to mobile homes.

The area set aside for mobile home development was described by Harman as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of 7th Street and E Avenue; thence North along E Avenue to the alley in Block 12, Boulevard Addition; thence East along the alley to U.S. Highway 380; thence Southeasterly along U.S. 380 to G Avenue; thence South along G Avenue to 5th Street; thence East along 5th Street one block to H Avenue; thence South along H Avenue two blocks to 7th Street; thence West along 7th Street one half block to the alley in Block 10, McDonald Addition; thence South along the alleyway to 8th Street; thence West along 8th Street to the alley in Block 9; thence North along the alley one block to 7th Street; thence West along 7th Street one and one half blocks to E Avenue and the point of beginning.

Several persons commented that well-kept mobile homes are much more attractive than some dwellings in Carrizozo. Payne first proposed that Carrizozo be divided into six sections, that property owners of each section be invited to a hearing at a specified hour and day — that the majority vote from each section determine the mobile home issue.

That plan died when Harman made his motion. Marvin Rowen presented a petition which he said had 1,000 signatures favoring doing away entirely with the planning and zoning ordinance. The petition was accepted by the city clerk.

Two resolutions were passed by the board of trustees at the meeting, neither having anything to do with mobile homes.

One allows Carrizozo to file a pre-application for \$100,000 in community development funds with the EDA (Economic Development Administration). Some \$25,000 would be earmarked for development of a mobile home park and \$75,000 to be used for rehabilitation of existing homes.

A second resolution would allow Carrizozo city officials to seek Step I grant assistance in reshaping the sewer system.

Some \$200,000 is estimated needed to bring the system up to standard.

Payne said the community would not be committed by the resolution for any money beyond Step I a study phase. The town would be liable for 12 1/2 per cent of Step I expenditures recent issue money (\$5,000) has been set aside to meet Step I requirements, Payne said.

School building bids to be let

The Carrizozo School Board and Superintendent Jimmy Steinpreis hope to have bids out for a vocational building while the gymnasium is under construction, Steinpreis has informed the Lincoln County News.

Steinpreis indicated he is pleased with progress made on the new gym by Santa Rosa Lumber Co., which is constructing the cinder block gymnasium and complex.

The vocational building will be attached to the gym and will be 60 by 80 feet. Financing will come from a capital outlay building fund allocated by Santa Fe for the vocational building and an administrative supply building in the amount of \$151,000.

"There isn't enough money for both, so we'll build the vocational building first," Steinpreis said.

The vocational building - cinder blocks - will consist of a classroom 24 by 28 feet, an office, wash area, shop and outside covered work area. Restroom facilities in the gym will be used.

The old vocational structure will be utilized for

pre-vocational training at mid-school level, fifth through eighth grade.

If money permits, the superintendent said, auto mechanics and general construction (trades) offerings will be added at mid-school level.

Four-year terms contained in bill

Sen. John E. Conway has called attention to Senate Bill 179 which would provide four-year terms for Lincoln County commissioners if passed.


Sen. Conway, Lincoln-Otero, says the bill calls for election of county commissioners each general election, but that commissioners from District three and four would be elected for two years, commissioners from one and five, for four years, and the commissioner from District two, six years.

The bill reads, "In counties in which county commissioners are elected at large, the commissioners shall be designated by position. At the first general election after the effective date of this act, the commissioners for positions one and three shall be elected for terms of four years and the commissioner for position two shall be elected for a term of two years. Thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years."

Commissioners would serve a maximum of two terms.

News from the County Agent

You can sprinkle your trees before they bloom and delay the bloom for about two weeks. After the fruit tree has completed its required rest period, it starts to get ready to bloom. Any temperature above 43 degrees F. causes the fruit tree advance blossom development. In Utah they were able to delay full bloom 14 days by sprinkling the tree with a fine mist in the early spring anytime the temperature was above 45 degrees.

For more information on delaying bloom on fruit trees plan to attend the Hondo Valley Fruit School on Feb. 17, 1975 at the old Tinnie School in Tinnie starting at 6:30 p.m. with a put luck supper. Other topics to be covered are apple marketing and insects of fruit trees. A pruning demonstration at 3 p.m. in the orchard last of the of the Tinnie Post Office will start the activities.

Wool growers should separate their coarser grades of wool at shearing time. The wool buyers are going to be very selective this year. They will give the better price of uniform grades of wool in any sale lot. The fine wool and half blood grades are worth considerably more than three eights or one quarter blood grades.







Judge Zimmerman's closings' highest

District Judge George Zimmerman had the highest caseload completion record of any district judge in New Mexico with 2,068 cases closed during last year.

The annual report of Larry D. Coughenour, director, Administrative Office of the Courts, shows the statistics.

Judge Zimmerman also had the lowest number of cases pending in the state with 273 at the end of 1974.

"I am particularly proud of that," Judge Zimmerman told the Lincoln County News.

Some judicial districts had more cases filed and closed in 1974, but those districts had more judicial judges within the district. Judge Zimmerman is the only judge serving the 12th Judicial District.

Throughout New Mexico, 38,883 cases were closed during 1974. Some 22,831 cases were pending as of Jan. 1974.

In the 12th Judicial District, 1,504 civil cases were closed last year, while 233 criminal cases were closed. Some 342 juvenile cases had "finis" written on them.

Judge Zimmerman placed second in the state in average number of cases per judge with 1,880, with the 9th Judicial District showing 2,216. Lowest average was 710 cases in the 10th Judicial District which consists of Quay, Harding, and DeBaca counties. The 8th Judicial District takes in Curry and Roosevelt counties.

Jaurequi trial

Not guilty by reason of insanity was the verdict in the first degree murder trial of Cristobal Jaurequi, 24, of Tularosa in district court at the Lincoln County Courthouse, Sunday.

The trial got underway last Wednesday with selection of and continued until mid-afternoon, Sunday, when the deadlocked jury finally produced a verdict.

District Judge George Zimmerman, after the verdict was read, said Jaurequi was to be committed to the State Hospital at Las Vegas voluntarily.

The jury first began deliberation just before 8 p.m. Saturday after three days of testimony. Unable to agree by midnight, Judge Zimmerman told jury members to return at 11 a.m. Sunday. A verdict was reached about 4 or 4:30 p.m. Sunday.

Jaurequi was accused in the shooting death of Jose Victor Ortega-Macias in Alamogordo, Feb. 17, 1974.

Jaurequi's father, Henry Jaurequi, during testimony told of his son's early years and schooling in Carrizozo, his entry into the Army and of his son's preoccupation with the Vietnam conflict since he returned home from service.

The younger Jaurequi frequently carried an imaginary rifle, the elder Jaurequi testified.

The defendant's father said that on the day of the shooting he and his wife, Clara, went to Alamogordo to assist their son in finding Jaurequi's Renalda. On the scene were Jose Victor Ortega-Macias and his brother, Santos Ortega-Macias.

The Jaurequis were talking with Santos until Jose drove up. Jose was walking toward the group from the car when he was shot.

When cross-examined, Jaurequi told District Attorney Robert Doughty he did not kill Macias. Under re-direct examination, he said that "voices" told him to go to Alamogordo and kill someone.

Personnel of the State Hospital in Las Vegas testified as to Jaurequi's mental condition.

Two of the psychiatrists or psychologists concurred that Jaurequi did not know what he was doing when Macias was shot.

The slaying of Macias has been described as a case of mistaken identity.

Dr. Arthur Engleman, psychiatrist from Albuquerque and consultant to the state hospital, said that psychosis was indicated by the police report of the incident, but the actions were from a man who appeared to be mad at someone he believed to be "playing around" with his wife.

The trial was in Carrizozo on a change of venue.

County may receive property tax money

Lincoln County Commissioner Bill Hart sees chances of passage excellent for a bill in the New Mexico Legislature which would give Lincoln County approximately \$126,000 additional operating money from the property tax.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Raymond Sanchez, was heard Monday in the State Capital, and Hart was in attendance. It passed the taxation and revenue committee.

"Not a single opponent appeared at the hearing," Hart said.

The bill would let the counties have 2.80 out of 3.35 from the 20-mill levy property tax — letting the state keep .55 to operate the county appraisal system.

"This would mean \$126,000 to Lincoln County on present valuation — it's not a new tax — it's money that has been going to Santa Fe," Hart said.

Hart said the money could be used for animal control, land fill for solid waste, subdivision regulations, mental health and law enforcement. He said the county received only \$150,000 last year to June 30 in revenue sharing funds.

Support is sought on '37 road

The State Highway Department is currently contacting area residents to determine if there is local desire for a public informational meeting on the proposed construction of the final unpaved section of State Road 37, State Highway Engineer L. G. Boles has reported in Santa Fe.

The project under consideration is a 4.4 mile stretch of NM 37 from Angus north. Boles said a route location hearing was originally held on the project in August 1972, and that a draft environmental impact statement was also circulated to interested agencies and individuals at that time.

Subsequently, Boles said, a more detailed environmental statement was prepared and circulated in response to questions raised about potential social, economic, and environmental aspects of the construction. To date, the department has received no negative comments on the statement.

The road chief said the highway department is now offering the opportunity for a public informational meeting should this be desired. He said written requests for such meeting will be accepted by his office until March 14, 1975. If such requests are received, he said, a meeting will be scheduled after this date.

Boles noted that work on the project can be expedited if there are no negative comments on

the environmental statement and if local support seems assured. He said the road department will seek approval of a negative environmental impact statement from the Federal Highway Administration if no major objections are raised about the work. Such approval would eliminate the necessity of a further study.

Boles said he hopes to have a survey crew in the area by early summer if the environmental clearance has been received by them. He said some additional consultation is necessary between the highway department and the Museum of New Mexico about potential salvage work on archaeological sites located within the project termini, but said Museum personnel are waiting for better weather conditions before completing this evaluation.

Boles pointed out the project is on the State Highway Commission's approved long-range construction program and said that routine engineering and design procedures will be followed to prepare final plans once environmental clearance is received. A target date for construction will also be established within the framework of current priorities and the availability of Federal-Aid Secondary highway funds.

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Learn fire fighting

Carrizozo school children and their parents are urged to attend a program on "Fire Prevention at Home and Fire-Fighting," Monday at the Fire Hall.


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Carrizozo, N. M.


Booster club active

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
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
