SCMRA hears director

"I believe this state can be the leader in the Rocky Mountain area in planning for the future," Dr. Grace Olivarez, new director of the State Planning Office, told members of the South Central Mountain Resource Area, Tuesday.

Ms. Olivarez spoke at the February meeting of the SCMRA at the Chaparral Hotel in Ruidoso Downs after the SCMRA executive committee met in the morning.

Presiding was Louis Merritt of near Ramon in the absence of Bill Gage, who is in Washington.

Ms. Olivarez, who has been on the job only six days, is an attorney, was graduated from Notre Dame, who first came to work for the Institute of Social Resources and Development in New Mexico. She was appointed recently to head the State Planning Office by Gov. Jerry Apodaca. She worked for state government in Arizona for a time.

"I want to professionalize the office — I have a lot of dreams and hopes," she said.

One plan, she said, is to put together a team of "cadre" of advisors from the various universities in New Mexico who would serve as consultants for special planning in technical fields.

She mentioned a transportation plan sought by the southern part of the state, of housing and

other problems with which her office will deal. She said the state has had remedial and patchwork programs rather than long-range planning.

"This is one reason why I believe in investment and planning," she said.

Solutions won't be so expensive with proper planning, she said. She mentioned the energy crisis as an expensive problem because it was fully recognized too late.

"I don't have all the answers, but I am a very opinionated woman — I will be glad to give you an opinion," she said.

I won't tell you how old I am or how much I weigh, but I will tell you anything else," she said.

Next week Ms. Olivarez will be in Las Cruces, El Paso and Juarez to "mend some fences" in connection with the Anapra port of entry project.

"Fiscally I am very conservative," she said. Although her budget will be slim, if present figures are approved by the legislature," she said, "I believe I can do the job."

Among Carrizozo residents at the meeting were Howard Abercrombie, resource conservationist; Howard Harkey, Sue Stearns, Roy Harman and Mary Ellen Payne.

John Goodwin, of the Department of Game and

Fish, gave the executive committee report at the afternoon session.

He reported the following projects closed: Trestle project at Cloudfcroft, Capitan water system, Corona city marshal, soil survey, and Lincoln County courthouse beautification project. Closed means "completed" or "shelved".

Bill Montoya area supervisor, Department of Game and Fish reported on the North Base Road (Capitan Mountains) problem with hunter access.

Because some portions of the road are on private property, access to hunting areas have been limited and the deer population is growing.

Since SR 48 is being paved, access roads are being fenced off, he said. By overhauling 10 miles, he said, access for hunters can be gained.

"Too many hunters and not enough placed to hunt," he said is the problem in Southeastern New Mexico.

Montoya mentioned a questionnaire that is going out to hunters regarding where they hunt, how long and where they killed deer.

He predicted that the day is coming when hunters will draw for the right to hunt or will be restricted, perhaps, to hunting one year in three.

The hunter pressure on the Guadalupe area, he said, is very strong. He said half the deer taken in the state are from southeastern New Mexico.

Any questions people in the Carrizozo might have, Montoya said, can be answered by a new Game and Fish Department man stationed in Carrizozo. His name is Jimmy Gonzales who operates from his home in Carrizozo.

He is a graduate of Eastern New Mexico University with a degree in biology and wildlife. He has just completed the law enforcement segment of his training. His district includes Carrizozo and Corona areas and north almost to Vaughn.

Also speaking was Audean Davis, Rep. Harold Runnels' representative of Lovington.

She said the congressman hasn't made up his mind on the best method of saving fuel and energy in this country. But, she said, older people and retirees and most people on fixed incomes favor rationing over higher gasoline prices.

One "hot issue" in Washington, she said, is National Health Insurance.

Rep. Runnels, she said, is not backing National Health Insurance, "but he is just one of many representatives." He may have to choose between the best of several plans, she said.

Next meeting of the SCMRA will be in Alamogordo, April 22, at 10 a.m. The annual meeting in June will be in Carrizozo with the date to be announced. Gov. Apodaca will be invited.

Brown Edwards reported that potential sanitary land fill sites still are being surveyed in the county.

Tom McCalmont, State Planning Office representative in this area, said that the project to establish a recreation-picnic area in the Indian Divide area is moving.

He said the district highway office said the project was "almost forgotten" but that interest has been rejuvenated.


"We will be applying for a special use permit from the Forest Service," he said.

Gregg Haussler said that the project to obtain a master plan for all the county is being pushed. Roads and subdivisions are the prime considerations, he said. U. S. Geological Survey maps are being used as base maps to "categorize subdivisions," he said.

It was reported that the project to fence the cemetery in Capitan has \$1,000 in the kill, but that \$2,000 to \$3,200 is needed.

A project to establish a marker, stone and fence where a cowboy was killed by lightning in 1902 is moving. Cold Industries, he said, will provide the plaque or marker — in the Oscura area.

Abercrombie said that the district highway office believes it has enough money to pave Highways 10, 42 and 37 although the district is short \$730,000 under expected allocations.

Scott Industries displayed and demonstrated the 125 with regulated power supply with a battery charger accessory.

Not Guilty pleas are entered here

John Phillip Friberg was arraigned on a charge of possession of a controlled substance. He entered a plea of not guilty.

Joseph Franklin Friberg Jr., John Phillip Friberg and Lourdes Chopitea Friberg are all charged with receiving and retaining stolen property in excess of \$2,500.

Each of the defendants pleaded not guilty. File in the case lists numerous items, from automatic dryers to lesser household items, in large quantities.

Witness demands retraction

"Either file formal charges against me for perjury or issue a public retraction and a public apology to me," Dr. John A. Salazar, clinical psychologist of Albuquerque, asks in a letter written to Robert H. Doughty II, district attorney of Alamogordo.

In a press release, Dr. Salazar of Salazar Clinic, Albuquerque, says, in part, "On 14 February 1975 I appeared as an expert witness in the case of the state of New Mexico vs. Cristobal Jauregui.

"On cross-examination by Mr. Robert H. Doughty II, district attorney, Alamogordo — he accused me of lying in a sworn statement referring to a telephone conversation which I had with Mr. George Hentes, Chief, Medical Administration VAH, Ft. Lyons, Colo. on June 13, 1974.

"I reaffirmed under oath on 14 February 1975 that my sworn statement of June 13, 1974, was true and that I again stood by my statement."

Dr. Salazar says he is demanding "immediate

action on what I consider to be a matter of grave concern. I consider Mr. Doughty's behaviour in accusing me of lying ill-founded, ill-advised and irresponsible."

In the letter to Doughty with copies sent to District Judge George Zimmerman and the press, Dr. Salazar says, — "I respect your right and duty to try to impeach my testimony if you can, but I know this charge to be an unfounded and false accusation reflecting your inept over-eagerness. However, this charge casts severe aspersions on my personal as well as my professional integrity and reputation, and I do not take such lightly."

"Therefore, I hereby challenge you and in fact make direct demand upon you as district attorney to get your facts straight and either file formal charges against me for perjury or issue a public retraction and a public apology to me."

Park funding is watched

Capitan and Lincoln County residents are closely watching the bill in the New Mexico State Legislature that would provide fundings for the Smokey Bear Historical State Park in Capitan, a town that has demonstrated its pride in the famous black bear since he was found in the nearby Lincoln National Forest 25 years ago.

In 1958 Capitan residents built and have since operated the Smokey Bear Museum. It has chronicled the exploits of Smokey during his long stay in the National Zoo in Washington, D. C.

"We feel that the Legislature will approve this project," said Capitan Mayor J. T. Johnston. "It is important to the state as well as this community."

The U.S. Congress, anticipating that Smokey will not live much longer, authorized the return of his remains to New Mexico.

Capitan hopes to make the bear's grave a major part of the state park. The park would also include the one room log building that houses the Smokey Bear Museum; a new visitor center, major trails, playgrounds and parking area.

Proposed legislation for the park would obligate \$165,000 in state funds this year toward the total cost of \$331,000.

Smokey became the living symbol of Forest Fire Prevention in 1950 when he was given to the Forest Service by the State of New Mexico. The bear then a badly burned cub was found by fire fighters near Capitan.

Steel jacket shells are very poor for deer, he told members of the South Central Mountain Resource Area at a monthly meeting in Ruidoso Downs, Tuesday.

The steel-jacketed shells pass through a game animal, generally, Montoya said, and mearly wound the animal rather than kill him.

He dies three days later — "it's inhumane," he said.

Sportsmen who like to hunt want a bullet that will kill, and that's the soft-nosed or "expanding-type" bullet.

He said he feels the same way about law enforcement officers being restricted to steel-jacketed bullets.

You know, he said, criminals will use the best and most effective ammunition or "soft-nosed" bullets.

He said law enforcement officers should be given every advantage possible in choice of ammunition.

The topic came up in a general discussion of impending changes in deer hunting rules.

Montoya predicted that some restrictive rules will have to come to prevent overcrowding of deer hunting areas from hunters in southeastern New Mexico.

He said the Guadalupe Mountains constitute an area where hunter pressure is becoming too great, that the "crippling loss" of game animals is 83 per cent of the hunter kill. In other words, for every game animal killed almost another is crippled or wounded.

Steel-jacketed bullets would only worsen this situation, he indicated.

Howard Abercrombie, resource conservationist, told SCMRA members that the latest rumor is that Capitan may get Smokey the Bear back alive. Smokey is very old and is not long for this world in Washington.

But what would Capitan do with Smokey alive and kicking? Cage, food, perpetual care — this would be more expensive than money available.

Still, it would draw tourists and more tourists to this area.

It's only a rumor — but a strong one.

The old post office building and store at Alto were torn down the past week because they were a fire hazard. Among names found on old postal receipts and bills from the store (dated 1927 and so) are J. A. Welch who charged and smoked Camel cigarettes extensively, Robert Rose who bought candy frequently, Mrs. Gettie West, G. B. Shook and others. Tempus fugit. B. Lj Luck ran the general merchandise store in Alto in 1927.

Capt. Steven Spencer of the ROTC Department of New Mexico Military Institute (son of Mr. and Mrs. Truman Spencer Jr. of the Carrizozo area) was among Institute personnel staging a recent training school at NMMI for Roswell Police Department officers and FBI personnel.

The school was part of a training course for officers who might be called upon to apprehend snipers some day and who might need to scale a sheer wall. Rapelling is ascending or descending via ropes.

Roswell Police Chief L. M. Hall said, "I hope we never have to use the group to combat a sniper. But I feel we would be remiss in our job if we didn't have them ready to go if we did."

Cattlemen improvement course

LAS CRUCES — Anticipated beef-cattle improvement trends were outlined Tuesday for participants in the Livestock Feeders and Cattle Growers Short Course at New Mexico State University. Dr. Marvin Koger, Department of Animal Science, University of Florida, outlined what he believes will be beef-cattle improvement trends during an address at the short course.

Koger sees increased emphasis on genetic improvement of reproductive efficiency, along with added emphasis on maternal ability. He also foresees development of cattle that will maintain their condition on pasture, and cattle that will respond in short feeding programs.

The University of Florida researcher predicts that there will be continued change in characteristics of standard breeds, and he anticipates increased popularity of some of the newer breeds. As a final note, Koger feels there will be further extension of systematic crossbreeding.

Koger was one of several distinguished speakers appearing before the livestock-producing audience. Among out-of-state speakers was L. S. "Bill" Pope, associate dean of agriculture, Texas A & M University.
