## 22 given diplomas

Twenty-two Carrizozo High School seniors received their diplomas, Tuesday night, when the senior class was presented by Supt. James C. Steinepreis. Diplomas were handed to beaming students by Ray Wells, president of the Carrizozo Board of Education.

Giving the Valedictory address was Lisa Zumwalt who has had a big week. Her engagement to Ace Porter of Nogal was announced this week—along with her being graduated from high school with highest honors.

Miss Zumwalt in her address told seniors that "Knowledge is power...the more knowledge we have, the more control we have over our lives...we have been given this knowledge, it is up to us to use it."

Steve Harkey and G.L. Straley, co-salutatorians, addressed the seniors as did Tommy Luercas, representative boy, and Margaret Chavez, representative girl.

The processional was played by Mrs. Mary Jeter, the invocation given by Mr. Dan Wright, minister.

Leo Samora, Senior Class president, welcomed parents, relatives and friends of the graduates to the ceremonies.

Special music was by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Vest, accompanied by Mrs. Jeter.

Mrs. Sally Florian, of the Carrizozo Woman's Club, presented a scholarship to Lupita Mackey. It was in the amount of \$150 for application to a vocational, technical or liberal arts school. Runnerup for the award was Miss Zumwalt.

Vest presented awards as follows: University of New Mexico Alumni Assn., \$50 each to Cheryl Johnson (Citizenship) and to Lisa Zumwalt (Humanities).

Co-salutatorian plaques and the valedictory plaque were presented.

Miss Zumwalt received an Honor Award given by the faculty and administration of Carrizozo High School.

Academic scholarship to the University of New Mexico were presented to Lisa Zumwalt and G.L. Straley.

Representative boy Luercas told seniors that graduation is a beginning and also an ending—"the end of a beautiful time."

Miss Chavez stressed responsibility and the fact that graduates are expected to be responsible.

Steve Harkey said that the nation needs leaders who are unselfish and "willing to do their jobs, good leaders need us."

## Town clerk appointed

Christine Chavez, who has been working at City Hall since Jan. 1, will become the Carrizozo town clerk about July 1.

Ms. Chavez was selected by a committee of two-Mayor Floyd Siegrist and acting Town Clerk Johnny Johnson—at a special town council meeting, Tuesday night.

The town council approved a motion by Trustee Roy Harmon that the mayor and Johnson screen applicants for town clerk and swimming pool manager and lifeguards and make appointments to be approved by the council.

Named swimming pool manager was Mrs. Jennifer E. McClarin, 21, of Capitan, who the mayor says, holds "all" certificates in water safety, swimming, etc.

Lifeguards approved by the council were Dolores McBride, Jackie Sue Dross and Nancy Lee Dross. The Dross sisters worked, as lifeguards last year.

Mrs. McClarin is a 1973 graduate of New Mexico State University and attended the Red Cross National Aquatic School at Highlands

University in 1971. She was a certified water safety instructor from 1971 until the present. A lifeguard at Alamogordo from May to September in 1971, she also was a lifeguard at Holloman AFB and has various other qualifications and certificates.

Ms. Chavez was graduated from Carrizozo High School in 1970 and from Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, in 1974—majoring in the business and secretarial field.

She formerly worked for the Lincoln County assessor until she joined the town hall staff the first of this year.

Mayor Siegrist said the applicants were selected strictly on the basis of qualifications.

Mayor Siegrist did not name a new trustee to replace Earl Fenter, resigned, but will select a person for approval by the council at the next regular meeting.

Johnny Johnson will serve as acting town clerk until about July 1 because of technicalities (signatures) required on water and sewer bonds sold 10 days ago.

## Gavilan Canyon accident fatal

Willet J. Hickman, of New Orleans, La. was killed about 3 p.m. Wednesday in Gavilan Canyon, Ruidoso, when a D-6 "cat" was backed over his car, crushing the vehicle and fatally injuring its occupant.

The D-6 was being operated by a county employee who was working on the Gavilan Canyon road job.

The News learned that Hickman had purchased a lot in Ruidoso and apparently was in

Ruidoso for a brief time concerning that business.

Gavilan Canyon road is being widened and resurfaced by county road crews.

County Manager Les Olson was called out of a meeting of the Carrizozo Hospital Board to the scene of the accident about 3:30 P.M.

County Commissioners were on the radio and telephone seeking details of the accident.

Details were sketchy at the News' press time.

## Medical plan developed

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, Carrizozo, board of trustees were struggling with plans to retain the ICF (Intermediate Care Facility) at the hospital and with ways and means of financing expanded health care for Carrizozo and its medical trade area. Wednesday.

The trustees, headed by Nancy Knight, late in the afternoon were developing a plan which would strengthen X-ray, laboratory and other medical services.

The trustees Friday will present a master plan on medical services and the ICF at a regular meeting of the Lincoln County Commissioners on Friday.

### Landfill Ground Needed

Land owners in the San Patricio-Hondo area who would be interested in leasing one or two acres to the county are asked to contact a county commissioner or County Manager Les Olson.

The county requires such an area of land for a sanitary landfill in the Hondo or San Patricio areas—not over four or five miles from either village, Olson said.

Olson said the landfill will be a very clean operation with all trash and garbage buried in trenches. No burning is allowed.

He said it is possible some "rough land" could be reclaimed through the landfill operation in that the land could be leveled and restored after use as a landfill.

**Bicentennial notebook**  
 The month of May two hundred years ago proved to be an eventful period. Following the first shots fired at Lexington and Concord on the previous April 19, for some the future seemed clear while others were more uncertain.  
 On May 10, 1775, the Continental Congress reassembled in Philadelphia. Later to become known as the Second Continental Congress, this body proved to be the only national governing agency in the English colonies until the Articles of Confederation went into effect several years later.  
 When the first Congress adjourned in the previous October, plans were made to meet again in May, but probably no one suspected that armed conflict would occur before they met again. However, as we have seen through the intervening months, events moved rapidly.

**Polly's Bulletin Board**  
 The school year is coming to an end and pretty soon 'they' will be saying, "There's nothing to do."  
 Here is a recipe to keep the little hands busy. (Warning: you will enjoy this, so don't plan to do any major housework.)

**Paste for finger painting:** Put 1/2 cup flour into a sauce pan and slowly stir in 1 cup water. Bring to a boil over low heat. Keep stirring until thick and shiny. Store in a jar with a lid.  
 When ready to fingerpaint, take a portion of the prepared paste, mix in a few drops of food coloring and 1 or 2 spoonfuls of soap flakes.  
 Let the children do their painting right on the kitchen table. (The paint will wash off everything except wood.) You can also use shiny paper such as shelf or butcher paper.

First put a few drops of water down, then a dab of paint and 'create' a painting with hands and fingers.  
 Use old shirt for a smock. A sponge will help for erasing a painting to start a different one.





Here is another project for the kids to do when school is over and there's nothing to do. A picture can be composed of many dots with a pencil dipped in acrylic or tempera paints. Here are the instructions:  
The few materials needed are: several new, sharpened, eraser-tipped lead pencils; acrylic or tempera paints; white or colored construction paper. (The pencils must be new, as the eraser is used for the painting of the dots.)  
With a pencil lead, tightly mark your design on the paper. Then paint in the dots, using both ends of the pencil. The eraser makes the big round dot, the sharpened lead point makes the small dot.  
Step away from the painting and view it from various distances to see the results. A child can thus explore color perception while enjoying a simple craft. Adjoining and overlapping dots of different colors create different effects.  
Save the pencils; they can be rinsed and used again.



## Backrest serves hospital need

It's not surprising that Sonny Banning, Church of Christ minister, should be a good carpenter. It goes with the trade. A least, it did in Nazareth. He and his wife Norma Talley Banning are expecting their first child about June 30. They hope that it can be born in Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, where Norma was born. Just recently, doctors have re-discovered a medical fact forgotten since the Middle Ages. It's easier to have a baby sitting up, than lying flat. But even the most modern delivery tables are seldom equipped with backrests. A backrest is available as a factory option costing over \$300. At Dr. Marie Cortelou's suggestion, Sonny made measurements and sketches of the delivery table, and within two weeks had designed and built a wooden backrest that fits under the table mattress. It is quickly adjustable from flat to reclining to sitting position, and is heavily varnished so that it is as easily washable as the rest of the delivery-room furniture. Later, blocks for the mother to brace her feet

against will be added—a real necessity since the leg supports on our 1938-model table "give you the most-awful leg cramps," according to a local ranch wife who has been there twice. But with the modifications, the table will be more comfortable than some 1975 models. Sonny's material costs and the value of his labor came to \$93.50, which will be deducted from Norma's medical bill as "service-in-kind." This is an arrangement encouraged by the National Health Service, which is helping to sponsor the Carrizozo Health Center. The \$93.50 will be deducted from the Health Center's debt to NHS for doctor salaries and initial expenses. And the hospital still gets to keep the backrest. So when the Health Center is paid with a service such as carpentry, painting, sewing or other skills, it's like being paid twice. "It's the oldest way and the newest way to meet the high cost of medical care. People with skills to offer the Health Center don't have to wait until someone in the family needs medical care. Services will be credited to account for medical care, in the future, and new projects are being developed all the time.




