The county commission is shaping up the budget for Lincoln County for next year-with pruning shears in some cases. Some department heads in county government consider some of the budget action arbitrary.

Money is said to be the root of all evil. It's also the basis for much friction. No one seems to have enough of the stuff.

We can't quite understand a movement afoot to possibly eliminate the sheriff's department sub-office at Ruidoso. Commission chairman Roman Nunez seems to be the main "questioner" of the value of the office. Commissioners Hart and Payne both say they are satisfied with the operation of the office.

Surely law enforcement is needed most acutely in the most populous area of Lincoln County.

The public watches developments with much interest. Any eradication of the sheriff's sub-office, we should think, would have to be justified publicly-with full explanation as to "why" if it is eliminated.

There was more friction at the Monday budget meeting of the Lincoln County Commission than we have seen in any meeting of the governing body the past five months.

Maybe nerves are on edge-but there is much too much partisan politics involved lately.

It's better when governing units rise above partisan politics to better serve the needs of constituents.

This should remain a goal-rising above partisan politics. Enough of a "sermon" for today.

General fund

Lincoln County anticipates general fund resources of \$619,928 for next fiscal year with expenditures expected to run \$449,734, leaving a cash balance at the end of the fiscal year of \$170,194. Revenue sharing funds will bring the resources up to \$496,253.

Balance in the general fund anticipated for June 30 this year will be \$202,950.

An unencumbered balance of \$10,677 is expected at the end of next fiscal year in revenue sharing funds.

Sudden death Roswell mayor barely wins

It was a beautiful day in Nogal, Saturday, National Tennis Day, when the headliner at Sunda Tennis Villa was a match between Fern Sawyer of Nogal, acting mayor of that village for the day, and Jerry Smith mayor of Roswell.

Smith said he hadn't had a tennis racket in his hand for months, but is known as a good player. Fern Sawyer has been taking lessons since last fall-with two months in the hospital interrupting her tennis after an automobile accident out of Nogal before Christmas. She still has a pin in an ankle and is using tennis as therapy for a broken leg.

She gets around on the tennis court beautifully. The match between the two mayors was nip and tuck in the latter minutes with Fern catching up fast.

Final result: Mayor of Roswell Smith 7-6 in Sudden Death.

Fern said she could have beaten Smith if they had played more than one set.

Obviously fatigued from the altitude, Smith was dragging at the end of the match-but still had a big smile on his face.

Both played serious tennis-neither contestant giving or taking any quarter.

A gallery of perhaps 30 people was on hand-plus pupils at the tennis camp-a dozen of them. The mayor of Alamogordo also was on hand for the National Tennis Day event and took free lessons.

Fern Sawyer entertained at her home out of Nogal for the Roswell mayor and party and other tennis villa guests after the match.

After branding on her ranch Monday, Fern was back on the courts Tuesday sharpening up her game for her big opponent.

The first session at Sunda ends this Saturday with a tournament. The next two-week session for youngsters will start a week later.

Budget shears used on sheriff's office

With one commissioner dissenting on most votes, Monday afternoon, the Lincoln County Commission whacked off \$12,000 from the county law enforcement proposed budget of \$118,000 for fiscal 1975-76 and otherwise shaped the total county budget.

Public hearing before Department of Finance representatives is set for July 3 at the Lincoln County courthouse.

Commissioners pared \$1,500 from the county treasurer's proposed budget, cut \$300 from the administrative budget, and agreed that the county road department budget must be reduced by about \$50,000 next fiscal and another \$47,000 the following fiscal year.

The meeting Monday-following a regular commission meeting Friday-was to hear from department heads on budget matters before the final fiscal budget is prepared.

Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. told the Lincoln County News that he will be forced to cut his staff by one deputy and close the Ruidoso sub-sheriff's office at the municipal airport.

"I will have no other choice," Vega said.

Vega said the cut was "politically inspired" and amounts to harassment.

As an elected official, Vega said, the commission has no control over the sheriff's office except in budget matters.

The commission he said, with the exception of Commissioner Bud Payne who opposed the law enforcement budget cut, is using money as a lever "to get at me," Vega said.

Vega said that the deputy position he will have to eliminate will be in Corona.

The sheriff said he would rather the commission would "come at me personally" rather than using the budget as a "weapon" to the "detriment to the citizens of Lincoln County."

"They are trying to use the budget so I won't be able to do my job effectively...the people of the county-a growing county-will have to pay the price," Vega said.

County Treasurer Veta Tadlock Allen took issue with the commission, or part of it.

She had requested that she be allowed to name Flora Vega chief deputy at a salary of \$700 a month.

Commissioner Payne moved that the commission approve Flora Vega as chief deputy.

His motion died for lack of a second.

"You can second the motion," Payne advised Commission Chairman Roman Nunez.

"I can but I didn't," Nunez replied.

Payne said, "That's up to you."

Mrs. Allen asked the commission, "What objection do you have to Flora?"

Nunez said, "That involves personnel...we can't discuss that here."

By law, personnel discussions can be held in closed session-but it is not mandatory.

Mrs. Allen told the News that the law said that "A board of county commissioners may set the salaries of such employees and deputies as it feels necessary to discharge the functions of the county, except that elected county officials have the authority to hire and recommend the salaries of persons employed by them to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the offices to which they are elected."

She quoted section 15-37-16.1 15-37-16.1 of New Mexico statutes.

And, Mrs. Allen said, the law says that in case of disagreement "as to the compensation of such extra clerical force, the matter shall be referred to the court for its determination."

Tempers flared a little when Commissioner Payne said that it is a "possible conflict of interest" for Commissioners Bill Hart and Roman Nunez to be members of the executive board of the Senior Citizens organization in Ruidoso and for them to recommend a budget figure" (\$16,000) for that group.

Payne made the comment when the issue of possibly closing the Ruidoso sheriff's sub-office arose. Commissioner Hart said, "I don't see that this (Senior Citizens) has anything to do with this."

Nunez said, "I think you (Payne) are misrepresenting the facts. You are out of line accusing us of something we didn't do."

Nunez denied that he had ever met with the Senior Citizens board to discuss a budget figure.

Payne said again he believes that the two commissioners being on the board of the Senior Citizens group represents a possible conflict of interest.

Hart at one point moved that the commission adopt a policy of "cutting positions" rather than earmarking revenue sharing funds for salaries within various departments of county government.

Hart said he would rather see revenue sharing funds used to bolster and maintain cash balances.

County Manager Les Olson told the commission it had two choices, to earmark revenue sharing money to help pay salaries or to eliminate positions within county government.

"The county cannot afford to go broke," Olson said.

Hart and Nunez voted to proceed along the line of eliminating jobs rather than using revenue sharing funds to pay salaries.

Olson said that no one knows when Congress may change the revenue sharing picture or when they might eliminate the program.

The commission approved a budget figure of \$52,382 for the administrative branch of county government, cutting \$300 from the budget request. The \$300 will come from the salary of the secretary to the county manager and commission. That vote was unanimous.

The assessor's office will have a budget of \$70,364-as requested. Voting for the figure were Payne and Nunez-Hart voted "No."

Assessor Julia Samora was present at the session.

The treasurer's office expenditures for next fiscal year was pegged at \$31,800-some \$1,500 below the amount recommended by the treasurer. Payne dissented on the vote approving the cut.

In the Buildings and Grounds category, the commission approved a part-time custodian to help the present custodian whose family has been assisting him in maintaining the court house and grounds.

Olson said the county would be liable if one of the family members should be injured while assisting-as unpaid workers.

Total budget for buildings and grounds will be \$13,200 with \$4,800 set aside from the amount for a part-time helper.

The county clerk's office will have a budget of \$34,644 as requested. There was no dissent.

The county road department budget came in for much discussion. Olson informed the commission that to grind road expenditures down to anticipated revenue, drastic cuts must be made.

The commission took no action but decided to let the Department of Finance recommend where to cut-at the July 3 budget hearing in Carrizozo.

Proposed budget for the road department is \$317,838. Olson said it should be reduced by \$50,000 next fiscal year and another \$47,000 the following fiscal year to stay within revenue.

The sheriff's office budget request was \$118,000-compared to \$90,000 this fiscal year.

Hart said the Otero County sheriff's office operates on a \$53,000 budget with six people-that in Lincoln County the budget is \$98,000 with 14 people.

Friday at the regular commission meeting, Sheriff Vega appeared by request of the county manager to explain the operation of the Ruidoso sheriff's sub-office. Vega brought copies of reports which that office handles and explained the function of the office. Three deputies and one radio dispatcher, clerk and typist work in the office.

Commissioner Payne asked, "Is there a move on here to abolish the office at Ruidoso?"

Olson said that a previous meeting the issue arose as to whether or not "we need a dispatcher at Ruidoso."

Payne said Vega's presentation was good that the Ruidoso office is "one of the best things that has happened."

Chairman Nunez said, "I feel we should go over this a little bit more. Nunez said he would not decide then whether the office is needed or not.

Commissioner Hart said, "Until we find evidence otherwise, I am satisfied with the operation as it is."

In other action Friday, the commission agreed to allow a spread of four cents a gallon over costs in its contract for gasoline and diesel fuel with LaMay Distributing Co. Dale LaMay was present to explain gasoline price fluctuations and his pricing policies.

Gene Wilson of Alto Village asked that the commissioners inspect roads in the subdivisions. He requested that the county do work on the roads-which are now county roads.

Monday the commission inspected the roads and agreed to spend \$2,500 on the project.

Joy Dee Simpson was high point individual in the contest as well as the junior division. G.L. Straley won the traveling trophy for the top score of any Junior Angus Association member.

The junior team of Joy Dee Simpson, Scott Nalda, Lisa Ferguson and Marc McKinley took top honors with the score of 925 points. Scott Nalda was also fourth high point individual. Tim Proctor judged as an individual in the junior division.

The team of G.L. Straley, Cully Nalda and Phil Straley placed second in the senior division. G.L. Straley was second high point individual with a score of 322. The top score in the senior division was 323.

That at the election each elector who votes for the organization of the District shall vote for three taxpaying electors of the District, who shall constitute the Board of Directors of the District, and who shall serve in such capacity for the terms as follows: A Director who shall act until the first biennial election; a Director who shall act until the expiration of two years following said first biennial election; a Director who shall act until the expiration of four years following said first biennial election.

5. That the official ballots for said election shall have mimeographed or printed thereon spaces for voting for or against the organization of the District, and in addition, spaces for voting for the first Board of Directors.
6. That only electors residing within the boundaries of the District, as set forth in the petition, shall be entitled to vote at said election, such boundaries being as follows, to-wit: those boundaries as are set forth by metes and bounds in said petition which is on file with the Clerk of this Court.

7. That the Clerk shall give notice of the election by causing a substantial copy of this Order to be published once a week for three consecutive weeks in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Lincoln County, New Mexico, with not less than fourteen days (excluding the day of first publication) intervening between the first publication and the last publication, and such publication shall be complete on the date of last publication.
8. That the election shall be held and conducted as nearly as possible in the same manner as general elections are held and conducted in this State, except as herein modified, but there shall be no primary for the selection of candidates and there shall be nominations of candidates for the office of Director. If a nomination has been duly filed with the Clerk of this Court, not later than June 11, 1975, and not withdrawn before the first day of publication of the notice of election, the name of such nominee shall be printed or mimeographed on the ballot and as to each of the three offices, one blank line shall be left in any event for the writing in of the name of a candidate whose name was not printed on the ballot. Nominations shall be made by any one elector residing within the boundaries of the district, and a person may nominate himself. The form of the nomination petition and the form of ballot have been presented to and approved by this Court.

Projects adopted

Merritt heads development group

Louis Merritt was elected chairman of the South Central Mountain Resource Area RC&D at the annual meeting of the development organization in Carrizozo, Tuesday. Ernest McDaniel was elected vice chairman, while Bill Gallacher of Carrizozo was named secretary and Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo re-elected treasurer.

Members heard reports on projects completed during the year and heard several speakers including Lee Pittard, from the office of Lt. Gov. Bob Ferguson, of Artesia.

Pittard outlined services to the public provided by the lieutenant governor's office. Ferguson's two main interest areas, Pittard said, are economic development and improvement of the quality of life for New Mexicans.

Services generally fall into two categories, he said, service to individuals with problems and service to groups with problems.

Emphasis is placed, Pittard said, on developing and promoting existing industry within New Mexico.

Bob Algood, community development representative, Department of Development, told of five community meetings held throughout the state to determine needs and resources of small communities.

Followup action will be taken, he said. One followup meeting is set for Cloudfroft, July 8.

Another plus factor coming out of the meetings is that a group is working on an organization to set up a marketing system for New Mexico arts and crafts artisans.

Bill Montoya, Game and Fish Department, Roswell, reported on an executive committee meeting.

One development in the meeting was the firming up of an outdoor classroom science-related project for the Malpais.

Stanton beautification and development program, Capitan Community Park beautification, Nogal sanitary landfill, Nogal Bridge across Emerson Canyon, Capitan cemetery, beautification, Nogal Canyon stabilization, Nogal Camp Meeting road and many others.
