Sheriff's Department funds are restored

The Lincoln County sheriff's department sub-office at Ruidoso at the airport, has been reopened with dispatcher Mae Stiles back on duty.

The county commission Monday in a regular meeting approved restoration of funds to the sheriff's budget to allow retention of the dispatcher and a deputy at Corona.

Dave Wheeler, deputy at Corona, has resigned, but the position is open now that the budget cuts have been restored.

The commission recently cut the sheriff's budget by \$12,000; the Ruidoso office was closed a few days. Monday some \$18,000 was added to the sheriff's department budget after a resolution was read by Commissioner Bill Hart lamenting what he said was the way the budget was presented by the county manager.

After the resolution was approved, the commission went into closed session with the county manager Les Olson apparently to discuss the commission-county manager relationship.

Ruffled feathers apparently were smoother during the session. Hart's resolution read as follows:

"While the overall county budget has been approved by the Department of Finance, the integral part of the budget, the departments and line items which are the responsibility of the commissioners are far from balanced. The inconsistency of the budgeting is indicative of a lack of leadership within the commission which is floundering in ignorance of proper parliamentary procedures. Objectives of reducing the budget to meet requirements of a safe cash balance were disregarded in favor of the department requests for more money to hire more people.

"Changes made by the county manager contributed to the dissatisfactions of the budget. Consideration of costs to the taxpayer was thrown in the wastebasket as usual. Due to the inconsistency of the adjustments that were made and the fact that the reductions were of no consequence, I move that cuts be restored to the original requests."

Commission chairman Roman Nunez voted "no" on a motion to use an unbudgeted \$9,000 in revenue sharing funds and \$6,000 in anticipated revenue from the Forest Service plus \$3,000 federal funds toward deputy's salary at Corona to bolster the sheriff's department budget.

Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. had requested \$118,000 from the general fund for this department. Some \$105,000 was approved, but the cut has now been restored.

In other action, the commission:

-Approved Ruby Sanchez' appointment as deputy county treasurer.

-Approved a request by Veta Tadlock Allen, treasurer, that Flora Vega be named chief deputy at a monthly salary of \$700. This request had been turned down by the commission previously.

-Appointed the EDA as authority to administer \$20,000 in hustling subsidy funds from the Federal government.

-Heard a request from the Forest Service that a quarter mile of road leading into Nogal Lake be resurfaced.

-Howard Abercrombie appeared before the commission and reported that a joint agreement is needed to get an access-into hunting areas from SR 48 on the north side of the Capitan mountains. The road has been fenced on both sides by ranchers.

Abercrombie said he will call a meeting of the Forest Service, county commission and Fish and Game Department to discuss the matter.

-Appointed Fred Pfingsten to the planning and zoning commission.

-Southwest Mental Health asked that the Ruidoso-Hospital be given authority to handle its cases. The commission will review the petition making the request.

-Agreed that the apartment in the jail annex formerly occupied by the late Deputy Glenn Bradley and wife be used for storage of files. Deputy Frank (Powder) Knoblock currently is occupying the quarters.

-Heard a request that the rifle range out of Capitan be improved. The range is private apparently operated by a private group; public funds cannot be used.

Salcido aboard Enterprise

He and his shipmates participated in various training exercises while deployed to the Pacific and Indian Oceans. They also took part in the evacuation of South-Vietnamese refugees, and helped provide disaster relief assistance to the people of Mauritius, an island in the Indian Ocean which had been struck by a cyclone.

Salcido visited Mombasa, Kenya; Singapore and Manila.

A 1972 graduate of Hondo High School, he joined the Navy in June 1973.

Nogal Camp Meeting near

In a year when the nation is once again at peace and beginning the Bicentennial celebration of its rights to religious freedom, the Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting is expecting a record turnout. Christians renewing friendships and gathering to count their many American blessings, will make the mountain mesa ring with the sounds of song and good fellowship.

The Camp Meeting in the Lincoln County mountains will open its 35th year of interdenominational services on Wednesday evening, July 16 and continue through Sunday evening, July 20.

This year the preachers will be Rev. Bill Lytle, former Lincoln County minister and director of camp meeting music, and Rev. Boyce Evans of the Southwestern Evangelistic Association in Lubbock, Texas.

Lynn and Gene Chappell, the well known music evangelists from Lubbock will be on hand again with special vocal selections. Paul Biggs will return to direct the choir. There will be several youth groups to help from congregations of both preachers, and a group from Mississippi.

Rick Steele of Las Cruces is camp manager. Officers include ranchpeople Walt Wilson, Carrizozo, LaMoyné and Opal Peters, Capitan, and Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo.

Improvement to the grounds for 1975 includes colored steel on the walls of the dining hall and kitchen to match that on the tabernacle.

For those attending for the first time, there is camping space available at no charge for those wishing to participate in the services. Bring your own campers, tents, or bedrolls, Chuckwagon meals are also free, but expenses are defrayed by donations of visitors at the registration booth.

The tabernacle and dining halls give roof shelter, but jackets and rainwear are essential for the chill evenings and summer showers. The altitude is 7000 feet. A fenced play area with sponsors is provided for small children.

If camping is not possible, everyone is welcome to attend daily services. Meals are served by the ranchers at 6:30 A.M., 12:30 p.m., and 6:30 p.m. Tabernacle services are held at 11 a.m., 3 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. Group prayer meetings are at 4:30 p.m. The general business meeting is 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

Memorial services for all those who have passed away during the past year will be held Saturday at 1:30 p.m. All those having names to submit for remembrance may leave them at the registration booth.

The grounds can be reached by turning off U.S. 380 about 5 miles west of Capitan and 15 miles east of Carrizozo; or by the turnoff from State Road 37 by Nogal Lake. For further information contact Johnson Stearns, Citizens State Bank, Carrizozo, N.M. 88301. The last work day for final preparations will be July 12.

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

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

Social security can make about \$101 million available for vocational rehabilitation services for people getting monthly disability benefits in the fiscal year which started July 1, according to Tim Hassen, social security claims representative.

"That's about \$18 million more than was available in the last fiscal year. It means more disabled people can get rehabilitation training to help them return to jobs," Hassen said.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible workers and their families when the worker is severely disabled and not expected to work for a year or more. In selected cases, social security helps pay for vocational rehabilitation services provided by State agencies.

In fiscal 1974, over 60,000 disabled people in the United States received these rehabilitation services, paid for by social security. Of these, over 13,000 were successfully rehabilitated.


The amount available for rehabilitation services each year is 1 1/2 percent of the total amount of social security disability benefits paid during the previous year. This amount is in addition to other public monies available for rehabilitation.

Trustees purchase police car

Carrizozo town trustees approved the purchase of a new police car at a regular meeting Tuesday night, through the State Police contract with Lloyd McKee Motors in Albuquerque.

McKee has the contract to furnish State Police with all their new vehicles this year.

Cost of the new police car to Carrizozo will be \$4,567—plus some equipment.

Trustees agreed to keep the old police car as an auxiliary vehicle. Some \$7,500 has been budgeted this year for a fully equipped police car.

Mayor Floyd Siegrist said the purchase through the State Police contract with McKee provides a real savings.

Trustees present Tuesday night, Roy Harmon, C.D. (Duff) May and Vernon Petty heard a rundown from Bill Gomez, community planner from New Mexico State University, on Carrizozo projects—water, sewer, Industrial Park and mini-park. Gomez has prepared some preliminary figures showing approximately what monies will be spent on each from the recent water and sewer bond issue (\$85,000) and from state and federal sources.

The sewer project involves construction of a new treatment plant, and a contract has been signed with an engineering firm for Phase I of the project—a feasibility study.

The development of an industrial park near the Carrizozo airport hinges on Federal participation which has not been approved as yet. A total price tag of \$418,290 has been put on this project.

Improvement of the Carrizozo water system is pegged at \$81,250 and is intertwined with Industrial Park plans.

The trustees read a letter from F. Scott MacGillivray, assistant attorney general, regarding a charge by former town clerk Viola Fenter that the trustees held a secret meeting the weekend of May 2-3-4.

Mayor Siegrist and all trustees and town attorney Bill Payne all have sworn in affidavits that no such meeting was held.

Mrs. Fenter had indicated to the council on April 30 at a council meeting that she would be resigning. Mayor Siegrist and Payne said Tuesday night that she resigned verbally on May 1 when Mayor Siegrist was sworn in as mayor.

Mrs. Fenter was sent a letter approved by the trustees asking for a retraction of public charges that the trustees held a secret meeting allegedly to name a new town clerk.

She has replied that if the attorney general determines that no such meeting was held, she would retract the statement but not until.

The letter from Assistant Attorney General Mac Gillivray says:

Long-reaching colt to star

RUIDOSO DOWNS—Bugs Alive in 75, a two-year-old with awesome potential but a difficulty in keeping on a straight course, climbs back into the Ruidoso Downs spotlight on Friday's program.

The long-reaching colt, owned by Ralph Shebester of Wynwood, Okla., goes in the 11th race—which is one of 14 second-day qualifying runs for the upcoming \$350,000 (est) Rainbow Futurity. The elimination heats are slated for 350 yards.

The horses recoding the top 25 clockings will join the top 25 from Thursday's stanza in the final elimination round on July 19. And the top 10 from that runoff will meet in the grand finale before a regional TV audience of some seven million on Aug. 3.

Bugs Alive in 75 kicked off his racing career in impressive style at Sunland Park, winning both a trial heat and the finale of the \$215,775 West Texas Futurity. He got the big one by 1 1/4 lengths at 80 cents on the dollar.

His next objective was Sunland's \$215,000 Sun Country Futurity, and the Bug polished off his trial heat by three lengths as a topheavy favorite. But in the finale, when the blue chips were on the table, the colt got off to a crooked start, triggered a lot of banging, and finished far back.

Bugs Alive was then shipped to Ruidoso to aim at the \$403,646 Kansas Futurity. As expected, he won his initial trial engagement with ease, checking in with a three-length lead. In the final Kansas elimination round, The Bug won by a nose as an odds-on favorite and chalked up the third-best qualifying time.

In the Kansas grand finale, The Bug lapsed back into his chief problem—a crooked jump from the gate. Once again, he was a main cause of some pretty severe chain-reaction bumping. But despite losing about three lengths at the start, he came flying at the end and finished second to Chick's Deck. He earned \$55,342 and pushed his career bankroll up to \$126,000.

In Friday's encounter, The Bug goes against two last-out winners, Go Greg Breeze and Running Indian. Also included in the heat is Sender, a Kansas Futurity Finalist.

Go Fantacia, the recipient of much of that bumping in the Kansas, drew into the 14th race. In five previous outings, the filly accounted for two firsts and a second. Her background also includes a sixth behind Dash For Cash in the Sun Country Futurity.



Hay Fever - You And Your Drippy Nose

Hay fever doesn't cause fever and has very little to do with hay. But if this article were headed Allergic Rhinitis, you probably wouldn't be reading it. At least this way we both know what we're talking about.

Or do we? A lot of people are still calling it "sinus" or a "summer cold" and in fact, it is neither. Sinus and colds are infections; in addition to a runny or clogged nose, your whole body feels bad. With hay fever, you have the suspicion that if you could just trade in your nose, you'd be all right.

Infections have a definite timing of starting out, getting worse for a day or two and then getting better over a longer period. Allergy comes and goes, here one day and gone the next, or here most of the time for many weeks.

To cause an allergic reaction, of which hay fever is the most common type, you need two things: an allergen, which is a protein particle of a type other than human; and an allergic individual who has an inherited family tendency to have bad reactions to allergens.

Pollen, house dust, molds, and the tiny flakes from the skin of a cat are examples of allergens. Most people can inhale these things without a reaction; but the allergic person, after a time of being exposed to them, reacts with swollen, drippy nose lining and often itchy eyes or a scratchy throat. Asthma and skin rashes are other types of allergy but we'll stick to hay fever here.

An allergic nose lining has a very distinctive appearance to a doctor looking at it - quite different from an infected nose. The lining is pale and swollen, and the discharge is almost watery. Sometimes drainage down the throat causes an allergic cough, especially common in children.

Given the problem, what can you do about it? You can get away from the allergens, or keep them away from you, which isn't exactly easy. You can alter your body reactions to the allergens with different types of drugs. Or you can have skin tests and desensitization to the particular things that cause your allergy.

Moving to Canada isn't much of a solution. Once you have developed the allergic tendency, which usually happens in grade school or young adult years, you will become allergic to whatever grows in your new home. Besides, many allergic plants, grasses for instance, are the same all over the continent.

Cutting down the Chinese elm trees in your yard, or grubbing out the tumbleweeds in the lot next door, won't help because pollen's travel for miles on the wind.

Allergens add up to produce a total effect on your body. You can't control the pollen but you can furnish your home, especially your bedroom, for a minimum of house dust, and you can give away the cat if you're not too attached to it. With the dust and the cat gone, you might be able to tolerate the pollen.

You spend one-third of your life in your bedroom. If you can furnish it to be nearly dust-free, you give yourself an eight-hour daily vacation from allergy. Have a smooth floor that can be mopped, washable bedding with plastic covers on the mattress and pillows (even if they are non-allergic they can collect dust and mold), no stored books or out-of-season clothes to collect dust, and tell the cat to sleep somewhere else. That vacation may be all you need

Mr. Bullion worked on ranches when in Lincoln County and at Dutch Reil's old garage.

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

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

Cisneros said the deadline for entries is Tuesday, July 15, for the 1975 fair.

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

Polly's Bulletin Board

Carving is the art of cutting figures, ornaments, or decorative objects by hand from such materials as stone, marble, wood, ivory, bone or shell. The term 'sculpture' designates large carvings in stone, marble or wood. The term 'carving' applies to small sculptures.

Archaeologists have found examples of carved bone and horn which early peoples made during the Stone Age.

This week this household tried their hand at carving. The beginner usually prefers to carve in materials which are easy to cut. Soap is an inexpensive and easily molded material, so go out and buy a bar of soap and carve away!

A beginning soap sculptor should carve a simple blocky form such as an elephant. A side view is the first pattern to be traced on the soap. It is best to use a large bar of soft white soap. A hard soap chips and leaves rough edges.

Serape off all letterings or raised designs on the soap. Then on paper, draw an outline of the shape that will appear on each side of the bar. Transfer the outline onto each side, using carbon paper under the design you drew on paper. (If you are a fairly good artist draw your design directly on the soap.)

Working carefully take a little soap off with each cut, until you reach the outline, molding and shaping the figure as you work.

An orange stick, used in finger nail care, makes a good tool for scraping out small areas and shaping out angles and curves. Set the finished carving aside for several days to dry. Then polish it with a soft paper tissue or napkin and use your fingertips and the palm of your hand to bring out highlights.

Soap sculptures or carvings can take on the lovely look of old ivory. You can preserve the carving with a coat of transparent lacquer, or you may paint it with colors.

The beginner should start off with simple designs and should practice cutting the soap until he or she becomes acquainted with this art medium.

Now, I have a bowl of soap chips and scrapings to recycle plus 1 soap heart, 2 ducks, 2 arrow heads and the head of a horse to show off. "Michelangelo, Da Vinci and Picasso here come a new breed of sculptors!"
