## Screwworms evident in area

MISSION, TEX.—Screwworms are rapidly becoming a serious threat to livestock and pets east of the Continental Divide in New Mexico and in extreme West Texas, warns a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Veterinarian.

Dr. James E. Novy, director of field operations for the Screwworm Eradication Program, says cases are increasing rapidly in this region. He expects summer rains to improve the habitat for this live flesh eating parasite of all warm blooded animals.

The first full week of July saw the year's first screwworm cases confirmed by identification in the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) laboratory from five separate counties within this area.

### Tinnie case

Worms (larvae) from an infested wound near Tinnie, in Lincoln County, and another in the Lake Valley community of Sierra County, New Mexico, proved to be screwworms, in Texas' Big Bend area, new infestations in El Paso, Ward, and Winkler counties joined earlier cases in most adjacent counties.

## Lake Lucero four planned

An auto caravan to Lake Lucero, part of the area that is the source of the White Sands, is scheduled for Saturday, July 19. The caravan will be limited to 30 cars and reservations are required. Interested persons should call monument headquarters—437-1058.

The trip will begin at 9 a.m. at the Small Missile Range Road intersection with U.S. Highway 70. The small missile range road intersection is 25 miles west of monument headquarters. Rangers and Military Police will brief the group on regulations that will apply during the trip.

The caravan will proceed over paved roads through the missile range to Lake Lucero. About two hours will be spent at the lake to allow time for a one mile conducted walk, for photography, sightseeing, and lunch. The caravan will return to Highway 70 by 1 p.m.

Participants are reminded to be at the small missile range gate by 9 a.m. because they cannot enter the gate once the caravan leaves for the lake. All persons should come prepared with enough gasoline, a spare tire, drinking water, stout walking shoes, suitable dress for the weather, insect repellent, and a lunch.

Persons are also reminded, Lake Lucero is a primitive area without sanitary facilities.

## Nogal Mesa Meeting is underway

Campers already were numerous Tuesday at the site of the 1975 Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting—which officially was opened Wednesday with services last night. Services will continue today, Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the site—where a record number of people are expected to participate. Tabernacle services are held at 11 a.m., 3 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. daily. Group prayer meetings are at 4:30 p.m.

A general business meeting will be at 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

The kitchen crew this year is from a church in San Antonio, New Mexico. The kitchen operation was well checked out Tuesday.

The camp meeting this year marks its 35th year of interdenominational services.

Preachers are the Rev. Bill Lytle, former Lincoln County minister and director of camp meeting music, and Rev. Boyce Evans of the

Southwestern Evangelistic Association in Lubbock, Tex.

Lynn and Gene Chappell, the well known music evangelists from Lubbock will be on hand again with special vocal selections. Paul Biggs will return to direct the choir. There will be several youth groups to help from congregations of both preachers, and a group from Mississippi. Rick Steele of Las Cruces is camp manager. Officers include ranchepeople Walt Wilson, Carrizozo, LaMoyné and Opal Peters, Capitán, and Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo.

Improvement to the grounds for 1975 includes colored steel on the walls of the dining hall and kitchen to match that on the tabernacle.

For those attending for the first time, there is camping space available at no charge for those wishing to participate in the services. Bring your own campers, tents, or bedrolls. Chuckwagon meals are also free, but expenses are defrayed by donations of visitors at the registration booth.

The tabernacle and dining halls give roof shelter, but jackets and rainwear are essential for the chill evenings and summer showers. The altitude is 7000 feet. A fenced play area with sponsors is provided for small children.

If camping is not possible, everyone is welcome to attend daily services. Meals are served by the ranchers at 6:30 A.M., 12:30 p.m., and 6:30 p.m. Tabernacle services are held at 11 a.m., 3 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. Group prayer meetings are at 4:30 p.m. The general business meeting is 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

Memorial services for all those who have passed away during the past year will be held Saturday at 1:30 p.m. All those having names to submit for remembrance may leave them at the registration booth.

The grounds can be reached by turning off U.S. 380 about 5 miles west of Capitán and 15 miles east of Carrizozo; or by the turnoff from State Road 37 by Nogal Lake.

## Swiss Itch to race

RUIDOSO DOWNS—Swiss Itch, a two-time winner at the meet, returns to action in Friday's headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The allowance affair enticed 10 three-year-olds into a 5 1/2-furlong spin. The purse is \$2,800. Friday's program also offers two trials for the upcoming \$20,000-added World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic.

On Saturday the top qualifiers from last week's first round eliminations for the \$400,000 (est.)—Rainbow Futurity will battle the traditional 400 yards for one of the 10 berths in the finale.

Weekend activity comes to a head on Sunday when three-year-olds meet in the seven-furlong Billy The Kid Handicap. A \$7,500-added purse is at stake in that one. First post each afternoon is the usual 1:30 p.m.

Swiss Itch will carry 117 pounds in Friday's feature. No rider was named on the Ronnie Ferguson-trained colt at entry time.

The last time out, Swiss Itch handled a group of allowance sprinters with ease over six panels. The colt fell into second place in the early calls and made his move in the turn for home. He crossed the finish in the lead with a 1 1/2-length cushion.

Twice before this year the colt tackled allowance competition. On June 29 he ended up fourth to Gotta Get Lucky and Selah and on June

8 he finished far back in the Aspen Stakes. One other effort netted him a walk-away first in maiden company. He won that one by 12 lengths as the favorite.

I'll Hum, who makes his seasonal debut in the feature, figures to be a big threat. The gelding started 12 times at Sunland Park this year and walked off with three first, two seconds and two thirds.

Included in those was a third to Report Card and a second to The Rage in allowance company. He'll have the talents of Jim Bannowsky aboard at 117.

Here's the rest of the field with weights: Toyah Tillie, 119; Such A Hurry, 110; Kinchloe Prince, 110; Lido Star, 110; Chief Scout, 117; Three Setter, 114; Lookus Up, 112; Rain Boots, 108.

Easy Date was the surprise entry for the Classic trials. The Walter Merrick-owned filly drew into the ninth race with eight other hopefuls.

Last time out Easy Date copped the \$119,177 winner's share of the \$302,659 Rainbow Derby. The length-win boosted her career record to 18 victories and two seconds from 21 starts. It also pushed her lifetime earnings over \$700,000.

Another big one, Chicory Moon, drew into the 10th race. The gelding owned by Betty Shebester has won six straight races—the last four in stakes competition. Most recently he won the 440-yard Jet Deck Stakes at Ruidoso.

## Predator responses requested

All Lincoln county livestock owners are requested to return petitions by July 18—petitions which will keep a predator control program alive within the county.

The program must be renewed each five years, according to Charlie Jones, a member of the Lincoln County Animal Control Board.

Fifty-one per cent of livestock owners must approve the program for it to become effective.

Members of the county control board are Jones, Tony Treat; A.W. Gnatkowski, Billy Stephenson, John A. Cooper and Lee Straley.

Lincoln County was the first county to approve a self-help program under state law allowing the formation of predator control organizations within counties.

Joe Skeen of Picacho pushed legislation through when he was in the New Mexico Senate—authorizing the action.

The letter to livestock owners reads as follows: To: All Lincoln County Livestock Owners. "Our predator control programs in Lincoln county is about to become 10 years old and the time to renew it for another 5 years is here.

"As you all know the money in the predatory control fund is mixed with State and Federal funds to make up a program for Lincoln County. All the local money is used in Lincoln County.

Because we went ahead with the program when we had the opportunity and have gotten extra help from the agencies involved. Our contribution could in no way double the number of trappers we have, but by the extra help we've had, this is about what has happened. The board feels that it is especially important that we renew the program because of the President's ban on poison. The losses in our County have been held down in spite of the fact that all the environmentalists are working against us and have caused a lot of our tools to be banned.

"Inflation is tearing us all up, and the costs of the program is no different from anything else. But in spite of this, we have taken a close look at everything and everyone involved and feel that we can maintain the present program at the same assessment we've had for the last 5 years. Namely 10 cents a head for sheep and 5 cents a head on cows.

"We hope you feel that the program is helping and will you sign the enclosed petition so that the program can continue.

"Please return the petition by July 18 and if you have any questions please contact any member of the board.



News from County Agent

Screwworms have been found in eastern Lincoln County about 10 miles north of Picacho. To keep the screwworm from spreading, ranchers in that area will be encouraged to spray their livestock with an approved insecticide. Also they should put off branding and lamb marking until the problem has been overcome. Sterile screwworm flies were dropped in the area where the screwworms were found.

The time for animal inspection of livestock scales is here again. They started checking scales in Lincoln County this week. Here are a few suggestions to speed up the inspection:

A clean scale last longer and works better. Livestock should not be weighed unless you know the scale pit and the levers, pivots, and bearings are clean and free of debris, and insects. For example, a mud-dauber's nest in the beam-pan will cause significant underweighing if not removed. It is necessary that the scale be clean before the proper inspection can be done, as a number of weighing errors can be traced directly to dirty scale parts.

Accessibility to Livestock scales has improved in the past few years, and we certainly appreciate the cooperation of everyone who has helped in this. We must be able to get our equipment and vehicle to the scale or the testing cannot be performed. Gates and alleys must be wide enough for the 4-ton truck test units. Minimum gate width directly onto the scale must be 42-inches for the test weights and cart.

If any gate to the scale or if the scale itself is locked, please arrange to have it unlocked for testing purposes. If you wish to send me an extra key, it can be returned after the inspection.






The primary objective of the school is to provide the persons involved in the administration of the property tax with technical, legal and administrative skills that will improve the administration and collection of the property tax statewide.

**Texas hunters are fined**

Five Houston, Texas area men have paid \$1,200 in fines, court costs and civil damages in Carrizozo, arising out of charges of making a false statement on license applications and hunting without valid New Mexico licenses.

The convictions came as the result of lengthy investigations into a bear hunt held in the Carrizozo area in October of 1974. Investigating officers were N.M. Game and Fish Department Conservation Officers Rick Flowers, Roy Owens and Steve Harvill.

One of the men, 35-year-old Ronnie Otts, killed a bear and was fined \$150 each on two counts - making a false statement on a license application and thereby illegally purchasing a resident big game hunting license, and on hunting without a valid license.
