

Fair officials apparently were still tabulating hundreds of add-ons this week—with no final sales figures immediately available. Huge gun collection stolen

To find your house filled with dense smoke and everything smoke-blackened and with some \$5,800 in guns missing—this sort of puts a damper on the Lincoln County Fair spirit. It did put a damper on the fair for the Pete Ponder family Friday morning when Mrs. Ponder returned from the fair about 8:30 a.m. and found the house smoking and the gun collection missing. Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. said Tuesday no arrests have been made, but that the sheriff's department has leads in the case. The burglary and fire occurred within an hour Friday morning from the time the Ponders left their ranch home 30 miles north of Capitan at 7:30 until Mrs. Ponder returned an hour or so later. Several of the stolen guns are considered antiques and are quite valuable individually. All

of the stolen guns were rifles. Fires were started in a couch and in two bean bag styrofoam chairs. The chairs when they burned yielded a heavy almost oily smoke which permeated the house.

Six juveniles charged

Six Carrizozo juveniles will appear in children's court to answer charges that they rifled lockers at the Capitan school—the football locker room—of some \$90 in cash last Thursday afternoon. The six have been charged with allowing themselves to be served, with larceny under \$100 and with accessory to larceny under \$100. They apparently were out of school because they refused to have their hair cut.



Newton will lead post parade

RUIDOSO DOWNS—Wayne Newton, the famed entertainer, will lead the post parade for the \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs on Labor Day. Newton will fly to Ruidoso from Las Vegas, where he is currently appearing at Caesar's Palace, according to Ruidoso General Manager Al Rosa.

Newton, no stranger to horses, owns a ranch near Las Vegas and is a prominent owner of Arabians. His appearance on the lead horse in the All-American post parade will be included in the coast-to-coast telecast of the race.

Master Salls, a superstar who can handle almost any distance, takes an 870-yard trip in Friday's renewal of the Brigand Handicap. The event is open to three-year-olds and up and sports a \$8,750 purse. Ten quarter horses and thoroughbreds will make up the field.

The long Labor Day weekend continues at a brisk pace, offering a stakes event on each of the final four days of the season. On Saturday the \$60,000 (est.) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity for two-year-olds will be decided at six furlongs. Sunday's program pits the \$154,000-added Ruidoso Mile up for grabs.

The seasonal caper comes Monday (Labor Day) when 10 finalists make the 440-yard dash for a \$330,000 winner's prize in the \$1 million All-American Futurity. As a backup, three-year-olds and up will settle the \$6,500-added 350 Championship Flat post parade as the usual

1:30 p.m. On Saturday, Sunday and Monday action gets off the ground at an early 12 noon. Master Salls is looking for his ninth win of the meet in the Brigand.

Trainer George Cosper's five-year-old has already accounted for two victories at 870 yards, both of them in allowance company. On August 10 he streaked the distance in 45.60 seconds for a two-length victory. Big Badger Bar, Two Copies and Bailey Oak—all in Friday's lineup—finished second, third and fifth respectively.

On July 26 Master Salls outdistanced the field by 1 1/4 lengths as the odds-on favorite. But there's one drawback. Master Salls suffered his only defeat this season at 870 yards. Norgor, his main adversary Friday, clipped him by one-half length in the Flying Charm Stakes.

Master Salls' other credits include the Mescalero-Apache Handicap, Governor's Handicap, The Billy the Kid Handicap, the Ruidoso Speed Handicap, and, most recently, the Ruidoso Sprint Championship.

County will get grazing income

Lincoln County will realize considerable revenue from its share of grazing fees on 518,640 acres of National Resources (Taylor Grazing) lands, according to James S. Morrison, area manager, Roswell resource area.
In a letter to the county commission Morrison reports 347,353 acres have grazing authorized through grazing privileges in Lincoln County.

All such lands are classified as suitable for grazing only.
Grazing fee on these lands was 1974-75 fiscal year was \$1 per animal unit per month.
Lincoln County gets 50 percent of the fees collected for leased lands.
Some \$19,110 should be returned to the county on these lands. Fees are figured differently on fee lands within grazing districts.

Some return will accrue to Lincoln County from these lands, also, Morrison reported.






