Looking back in Lincoln County

From the files of newspaper, published in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

In the first half of this century most small town newspapers bought their newsprint (paper) already printed on one side in Wichita, Kansas City or elsewhere. These pre-printed pages included news stories such as Women sufferers need swamp-root, American Bluejackets refuse to wear pajamas, Lad runs big farm, and others with little relation to the home town. These pages also carried ads such as Calumet baking powder, Castoria, Doan's, Carter's, Blackleg and other patent medicines.

60 YEARS AGO
Carrizozo News dated Nov. 5, 1915. Grand jury investigated 95 cases, 127 witnesses examined, 280 days attendance and 7168 miles traveled by witnesses.

"It has come to our notice that a very large number of prisoners have been allowed to escape. Toilet should have screen, thin calico in use does not secure privacy. In past months many public roads have been fenced up and roads obstructed. Public school building in Carrizozo is very unsafe."

O.S. Stearns was riding on the footboard of the switch engine, No. 93 was coming into the yards and two pedestrians dodging No. 93 jumped in front of switch engine. The moving engine caught them, threw them against Mr. Stearns, and hurled both to one side, clear of the rails, but the impact drove Stearns against the cross bar so hard that he has since been hors de combat.

Lincoln County News dated Nov. 5, 1926. County elects 6 Democrats and 4 Republicans. New Mexico has elected R.C. Dillon, Republican, governor, the majority yet unknown. (Four pages red-print, four local)

The Carrizozo teachers left for Santa Fe yesterday to attend the state meeting. The Fort Stanton basketball team played Carrizozo Friday, winning by score of 25 to 28. Prof. Zumwalt and Miss Brooksie Skinner came up from Malaga Saturday and stopped over with home folks at Nogal. W.M. Ferguson spent the weekend with his family on the Mesa, remained over to vote and returned Wednesday to his road camp at Organ Pass.

40 YEARS AGO
From Lincoln County News dated Nov. 1, 1935. Benjamin H. Roberts and Wm. M. Bagley, with other citizens of Corona, presented a petition for the incorporation of the Village of Corona, with 114 signatures to said petition. The board appointed Jess Weaver to take the census of Corona. Mr. L.M. Pickering and other residents of Capitan presented a petition to the board of county commissioners requesting the incorporation of the Village of Capitan. Mr. Geo.

100 new houses coming to area

The first of 100 houses planned in this area will be arriving to Carrizozo today. Southwestern Development Company announced.

The houses are built in Albuquerque by Albuquerque Western Industries. Bill Seelbach and Bill Walizer, of Lincoln and Ruidoso, were in Carrizozo Wednesday to make arrangements for the move.

The houses are pre-built and need only foundation and connections upon arrival. The exterior is subject to, modification according to the owners taste. Approximately 1056 square feet in size, the turnkey job which includes cabinets and carpeting will run around \$22,500 for a house and lot.

This first house will be located on B Avenue at F Street. Another 4 houses are scheduled for Carrizozo. The company plans at least 42 houses for Capitan in the immediate future. The balance will go in the Tularosa area, Seelbach indicated.

"My House of Old Things" Tribute to Jackie

It's a bit off the beaten path but historians and collectors have discovered the Lincoln County village of Ancho to be a treasure chest of Western antiquity.

"My House of Old Things" which is about 20 miles north and east of Carrizozo was initially a home with well cared for family heirlooms. Jackie Silvers, though, was an instinctive collector and probably collected more items of New Mexico than any other single individual.

Her museum, which is open to the public in the summer, has been continued with the same loving care by her daughter, Sally Jackson, since her death.

Ancho, the Spanish word for "wide", is now somewhat isolated, and is certainly a quiet place. But it wasn't always that way.

At one time Ancho was not only right on the main highway, but also was an active railway station, as well. Two main industries besides the railroad made Ancho a bustling community, beginning about 1902. These were both related to mineral deposits in the nearby foothills.

One was a rich deposit of gypsum, leading to the establishment of The Gypsum Products Company, which produced a fine grade of plaster and related products.

The other industry stemmed from an excellent source of fire clay, from which high quality "Ancho No. 1" brick was made. The plaster, brick, lumber, and railroad industries provided employment and income for the thriving community. Although it is now idle, the Ancho school-made of Ancho brick-once had an enrollment of 140 students.

The Gypsum Products Company shipped thousands of tons of plaster material to San Francisco after a disastrous earthquake and fire practically leveled that city in 1906.

Two brick companies operated in Ancho. The first one made the fine quality product that saw the Ancho trademark become part of structures all over the southwest. They had only a few kilns and these were fired by wood.

Later, another firm Phelps Dodge, came in and built 16 kilns of more modern design, which were coke fired, but that firm reportedly did not produce the same high quality brick that the former one had, and after a few years it failed. The new kilns stood for quite some time, and in fact were used as habitations during the

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The building will now be submitted to the federal government for consideration as a national monument. This might mean funds for the restoration of the building, Mrs. Petty said. She has also applied to the National Arts Foundation for assistance on the restoration.

New subjects planned at Zozo

The Carrizozo Continuing Education Committee met this past week to discuss proposed classes for a spring session for the new community college program now in operation.

Ms. Pat Baca, Director of Community College, New Mexico Institute of Mining Technology, Socorro, gave her division's approval and support to the Carrizozo group to work on a second session that would get underway in early spring of 1976.

She also complimented the Carrizozo Post Office for its efficient distribution of the program's announcement flyers. This cooperation was not true of Post Offices in some of the other communities participating in a community college program with NMIMT.

Presently, there are over 100 persons enrolled in eight courses being offered in session one. This includes the Adult Learning Program which offers basic education skills and a GED individualized instruction format.

The committee would like to expand the course offerings and invite comments and suggestions from the community at large for possible courses and recommendations for instructors to teach them. Anyone in Lincoln County may contact a Continuing Education Committee member with such comments and, indeed, are encourage to do so.


Members of this committee are Ralph Dunlap, County Extension Agent, Lincoln County Court House; Elinor Olson, Coordinator, Adult Learning Program; Ralph Garcia, Assessor, Court House; Hazel English, Health Nurse, Court House; Nick Serna, Postmaster, and Emma Lawson, Home Economics, Carrizozo Schools.

The Community non-credit courses are open to all area residents. The next continuing education committee meeting will be at 3:30 p.m. on December 4 in the Carrizozo School Library unless otherwise notified.

Some courses now being considered for the next session in the community college are the following: Spanish II, Accounting II, Welding II, Guitar II, flower design, wood working, jewelry design, macrame, creative writing, Yoga, square dancing, quilting, boxing technique, Practical Law: what every potential defendant should know about the law and how it applies to you, tennis and golf.

Also included will be the Adult Learning Program's basic education skills, such as English, Reading, Math and a complete program designed to help a student obtain his high school diploma.

These courses are only the beginning and the committee welcomes all other course suggestions you may be interested in having as part of the community college non-credit offerings. The list will be tentative with those courses failing to enroll a sufficient number being cancelled and perhaps being offered again at another session.

BLM Public meeting set

The Bureau of Land Management has scheduled a public meeting November 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the Roswell Inn. The purpose of this meeting is to explain the preparation of grazing management plans for a given grazing area. The plans are called Allotment Management Plans (AMP) and are developed in cooperation with individual livestock operators within each unit. Each AMP will deal with the specifics of livestock management within the allotment as well as other resources that will be affected or may have an effect on livestock grazing. These AMP's will deal with the type and number of animals that can be grazed, periods of use, and management facilities such as fences; water developments, brush control, etc. After completion of the AMP's an environmental impact statement (EIS) will be developed. In the preparation of the grazing EIS the BLM will consider all possible impacts from grazing as well as all known alternatives. The meeting will deal specifically with all of the national resource lands east of the Pecos River in Chaves, Lea and Eddy counties. Completion of grazing EIS for this area is scheduled for March 30, 1979.

Special ed. teachers meet

The Western Skies Motor Hotel in Albuquerque was the setting for a presentation given by Dr. Phyllis Kaplan, Department of Educational Psychology, California State University, Hayward. 

Hunters should show landowners the same kind of courtesy they themselves expect. If hunters expect to continue using private property, they must show courtesy and consideration to the landowner. This is true not only of the hunter, but also of fishermen, backpackers, hikers, campers and picnickers. As permission before you enter private property. Find out where you may and may not go on the property.

Respect the condition of gates. If they are open, leave them open. If they're shut, close them behind you. Be careful of livestock and don't litter the property. And a final consideration: Always thank the landowner for the use of his land.

Delaying bloom of apple trees by evaporative cooling was discussed at the meeting I attended last week in Espanola.

In Utah and Washington, full bloom on fruit trees has been delayed 14 days by overhead sprinkling when the spring temperatures are over 43 degrees F. In tests conducted trees were sprinkled for two minutes and then let dry for two minutes. Other trees were sprinkled for one minute and let dry for five minutes. The trees sprinkled for two minutes bloomed 14 days later and the trees sprinkled one minute bloomed six days later.

Before considering delaying bloom you need to look at several factors. First, is that fruit tree going to require a certain amount of cold temperatures before it completes its winter rest period. There will be no bud development until the cold requirement is met. After the cold

Beer may be cheaper Water problem is hard in Alamogordo

The Alamogordo city commission was checking its water situation last week and had a five-volume water study for guidance. Besides the need for money like some \$10 million in the next 20 years, the city is also looking for water that is drinkable without too much mixing with something to cut the caliche and hard-rock flavor.

Alamogordo has five sources of water at present: Bonito Lake, which water comes down Highway 381 to Carrizozo before heading down US 54 to Alamogordo - a real long haul. Carrizozo has a prior right to this water but the freight cost charged by Alamogordo has been too much for Carrizozo water users in past years.

Other sources include Alamo Canyon, LaLuz Spring, LaLuz Wells and Fresnal Canyon. Alamogordo's best water comes from Alamo Canyon and Bonito Lake. The engineering firm working for Alamo, suggests that water users refrain from using Fresnal water since the mineral count is exceptionally high - and dangerous if not sent through a highly sophisticated treatment facility.

City Engineer Tom Longley says Bonito Lake water is long on quality, but short on supply. Alamo Canyon water is good and affords some expansion possibilities but can't be developed to its full potential, says Longley. Bad pipeline from canyon to city is major reason.

A report from Alamogordo is that most residents who've had washing machines or dishwasher literally ruined by caliche-laden water, or who haven't become used to the abnormal taste, agree the problem needs to be tackled now.

The commissioners are looking at a general obligation bond issue which may come to a vote in the next few months. Revenue bonds will not raise enough money, said Commissioner Charles Herrell. He figures rates can't be raised without raising public ire as well.

Mayor Mike Glover said at recent water meeting: "The water's the same as it was 15 years ago - it's still red, it still smells and it's still hard. Something has to be done."

NMSU granted Mor-Lean

LAS CRUCES—The Board of Regents of New Mexico State University is the assignee of a patent, effective October 28, on Mor-Lean, a technique for producing an average of 48 pounds more lean meat per beef animal. The technique was developed by Earl Ray, professor of animal science with NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station.

"We expect that the new technique will be used as a means of increasing the gain of male calves in the feedlot," Ray says, "because Mor-Lean animals gain more efficiently—that is, they put on a pound of gain with less feed—and Mor-Lean beef suits today's consumer. It contains less fat than beef from a steer."

The patent, No. 3915150, is the culmination of eight years of research in which Ray refined and tested the technique, working with University and commercial animals. At first, he worked with University sheep, because they were available, he explains. Those early tests show that the technique can also be used on lambs destined for the feedlot.

In the cattle feedlot tests, Mor-Lean calves required 10 per cent less feed than bulls or steers needed for a pound of gain. Ray conducted three feedlot tests at the University and two in commercial feedlots.

At slaughter, Mor-Lean animals outweighed steers by an average of 50 pounds. In the carcasses, this amounted to an advantage of 40 to 52 pounds, averaging about 48 pounds.

To test the quality of Mor-Lean beef, Ray first used consumer questionnaire panels. When the tasters' response was favorable, he moved the testing into commercial meat markets, with questionnaires in beef packages bought by consumers. Here, he compared bullock, steer, and Mor-Lean beef. The questionnaire replies indicate that consumers have a slight preference for Mor-Lean and steer meat over bullock, but they liked steer beef and Mor-Lean equally well; 92 per cent said they would buy beef of that quality again.

By the Mor-Lean technique, one uses an elastator and a rubber band to shorten the scrotum of a calf when it is three days to three months old. The testicles develop near the abdominal wall, so that the animal is infertile. "A Mor-Lean calf gains like a bull—fast without much fat," Ray says, "but the beef is only slightly less tender than that from a steer."

Feedlot managers may be looking for large numbers of Mor-Lean animals, especially if Congress decides to prohibit the use of DES. Without the synthetic hormone that encourages gain, feeders would need animals that are naturally much faster gaining.
