

Way of the West is rough

Along with being a public service the NEWS is also a business that pays taxes, supports a number of families, is supposed to show a profit. It must cope with the usual problems of modern business and a few special problems that harrass those of us who hang up our signs way out here in the west.

Our customers expect the same timely service that folks in the city get. Since we are not too big and live-cosy-like-our-customers-are-neighbors and friends we see everyday. Thus, those of us who deal in goods and services are reminded everyday about any delay in performance.

All of us know this. It may be three hours to get to either coast but it is three weeks or three months distance in delivery time. When you order something special sometimes it takes a while to convince a supplier to send it all the way to Carrizozo.

We all know this. Certainly I know this and Paul knows this. But when it comes to my little car being fixed, well, I'm in a hurry. I know it is a foreign car and parts come across the ocean but anyway...

So I said to Paul, "You know I'm really getting mad at Bob Means for taking so long on my car."

Paul patted me on the shoulder and said, "I wouldn't do that. There is just no satisfaction in getting mad at Bob. He'll never get mad back."

Yes, neighbors, there lives among us one of those truly sweet people who manage a benevolent outlook on the world.

I was telling that story to my banker buddy and mentioned a couple of our friends who did know how to get mad, they have quit speaking.

"I told her she just might as well start speaking. There aren't enough of us in this town to go around if we keep our mads up to date."

It is like the publishing business. You are going to leave something out, put the wrong thing in, or spell someone's name wrong almost every week. If you spend all your time apologizing or regretting, you'll never get the next paper out. There is no way to go back and do it again.

The governor might apply some of this philosophy to Lincoln County. We have to live with each other for the next few years and it appears to a lot of people down here (some are the Gov's loyal supporters) that there is a chill wind if not a barrage of arrows coming this way from Santa Fe.

It all started in the last election. The Gov was not pleased about the votes he received in Lincoln County. The Democratic party didn't turn out in the number he expected.

Fern Sawyer, the County Democratic chairman, took the blame for that. She was accused of supporting the Republican nominee Joe Skeen.

Now Joe is a Lincoln County lad and probably got a lot of across the fence votes. Joe had hoped for more. In 1972, the Republican candidate for president drew 2,528 votes from Lincoln County. Joe only got 2,049 in 1974.

Be that as it may, Fern did not campaign for Skeen. She may not have gone gung ho for Jerry but she was out pushing the Democratic ticket.

Fern and her mother, Dessie Sawyer (National Democratic Committee woman) have stuck by the Democratic party through some lean years. They have put a lot of money into the war chest, and in Lincoln County, Fern has not only been the chairman, she has been the treasury.

Fern and Dessie do a lot of other things in New Mexico. They are big buyers at the county and state fairs. Fern, until this year, has always been a state fair board member. She was more than generous in her support of that event which certainly benefits our agricultural industry and our young people.

The Gov decided that he didn't want Fern on the Board of the fair. That's his privilege.

Fern got a lot of request to attend from the cowboys who ride at the rodeo, so she did go. She led the parade and has worked the rodeo every performance.

But this year, she and Dessie did their bidding at the fair in Roswell. The state fair totals show their absence.

Dessie is a member of the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission. She and Fern have put love, time and money into building Old Lincoln into a genuine reflection of our past. This is not to say that a lot of other people have not contributed. They have and will continue to do so. This takes nothing away from the Sawyer enthusiasm and service to the project.

The historical monument is administered by a commission composed of people in the counties that formerly made up old Lincoln County. Dessie is a member of the commission.

The governor decided to abolish the Old Lincoln Commission and put it under state Parks and Recreation. The bill went to the house

committee changed to a merger of the commission with the New Mexico Museum Regents.

Most of the people in this area concerned with the project felt that local control best served the monument and they let their voices be heard in Santa Fe. The measure was turned down by the committee.

Hopeful this will end that little skirmish. Back here in the carrizos, Fern is still a county Democratic leader and most of the party workers are friends of hers. The last election is over, the Gov is in office and it is hard to see why he wants to stay mad—there just aren't enough people in the state who really care about what happens to go around feuding for very long.

Fern and Dessie can hold their own and the Governor has big clout. It seems sad that he would choose fairs and museums for battle grounds when there are some real juicy political conventions coming up.

Some day I will write about Pat Dunning. My friend not only raises quarter horses, she does research in several fields, writes, explores and we will tell it all later. Not too long she told me about a magazine of the 50's called Western Horse News.

I asked for and she responded with some clips from her old copies. Here are a few with more next week.

Schmitt does not evade issues Senate candidate visits Carrizozo

Harrison Schmitt, born in Santa Rita in 1935, is a native New Mexican best known for the ten years he spent as an astronaut. During December, 1972, he became one of the 12 Americans who have worked on the moon.

He seeks election to the United States Senate. Schmitt was speaker at a luncheon meeting at the 4 Winds, Tuesday. He said he had visited most counties of the state and soon will have

covered them all. He is enthusiastic about this election, had enjoyed a good reception at the many stops he has made around New Mexico, and believes in facing up to some of the tough issues of the present time.

Schmitt said it would have been easy to continue as a geologist after achieving a doctorate in geology from Harvard. That the challenge of being in the space program came at a good time in his life and kept him from getting in a rut. He feels that he really postponed some of his plans during the ten years as an astronaut. His folks had been in politics and that was one of his goals.

During the past year and a half spent in Washington as director of NASA's energy research and development program, he saw a lot of problems. There is no management within the congress, according to Schmitt. He spoke of the repeated instance where people would be hired, but they had nothing to do, but being energetic types they would look for and find a problem—and bureaucracy continued to grow.

Schmitt's advice to young people is, "Get involved". During the past six months he has seen a lot of Republican conservative activity. The big question is, can we get 18 to 25 year olds to vote.

During Schmitt's time in Washington he thought a lot about needs and problems of his native state. Energy is close to top of the list, our legal system needs overhauling, culture and arts could stand more emphasis, advanced research needs a boost, education is a long-term problem that needs attention.

He found two issues of importance as he toured the state. 1.) A great discomfort with the incumbent senator, who is not being helped by public exposure. 2.) The realization by people in every walk of life, that government is there with you. The BLM is getting harder and harder to deal with, miners have the same problems as ranchers. Forest lands for grazing an equal problem for ranchers, and the small business man also has severe problems coping with government regulations.

Schmitt spent some time in Rio Arriba County with Sen. Pete Domenici. There is a strong Republican organization in that county, 150 to 250

people turning out for their meetings. Schmitt said he was quite encouraged by response in that northern county.

A.N. Spencer said he thought people in Washington were out of touch. Schmitt said it was an unreal world back there, that he felt we were giving up responsibility to government too often.

Bill Gallacher, Sr., asked about incumbent senator's tax matters being hushed up. Schmitt did not know the answer but said we probably have not heard the last of that.

Gallacher then asked about feeling in Silver City, where Schmitt grew up. Answer was that unions are unhappy with the incumbent senator, that in Eddy County an economic fear of the incumbent exists among the people at Carlsbad.

When asked about the possible new veteran hospital in Albuquerque, Schmitt said he thought that veterans could be benefitted more by other use of the money than being spent on a hospital.

When asked about education he said that money is not the answer. It's more how we are implementing the standards. We should re-examine what we mean by bilingual education. He thought the 1-2-3 graders ought to learn English-Spanish as a means of continuing the learning process and keeping up with their grade, but that learning Spanish in upper grades is not when its most needed. Schmitt thought of himself as a modified bilingualist.

Folks at the meeting were interested in Schmitt's comments concerning imbalance in Congress. There are way too many lawyers, insurance agents and business men in congress, and hardly any congressmen with technical knowledge. When a congressman wants technical advice he goes to the lowest rank of employees for advice. "You're being governed by the staff" was Schmitt's way of putting the matter. He said he had spent an hour or less with congressmen briefing them on energy a number of times, but that an hour was not near enough to cover the subject.

Schmitt said that the upper level of the administration was just the same as upper level of congress—those people know little about the technical side of energy or other technical fields.

He thinks the seniority system is on the way out. Incumbents in congress are on their way out, that a lot of young people have been elected and they want change in the system that has controlled congress for so long.

People at the meeting were impressed by Schmitt's knowledge of affairs of New Mexico and problems faced in this state, and by his sincerity of purpose. He will be back in Lincoln County at a later date when people will have another chance to meet this active candidate for the United States Senate.

A reluctant burglar and shotgun blast that missed gave Carrizozo a happily unsuccessful crime wave this past weekend.

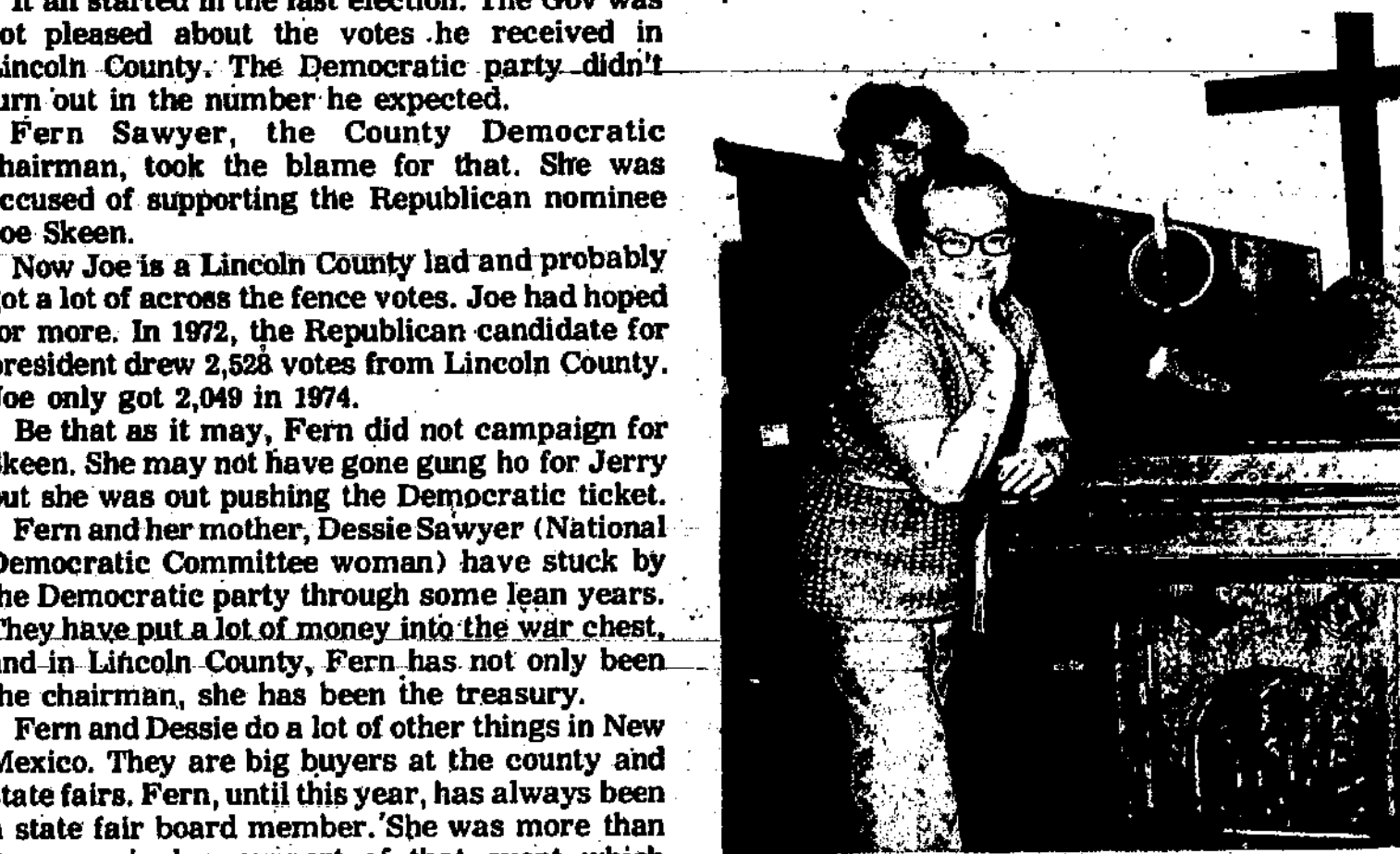

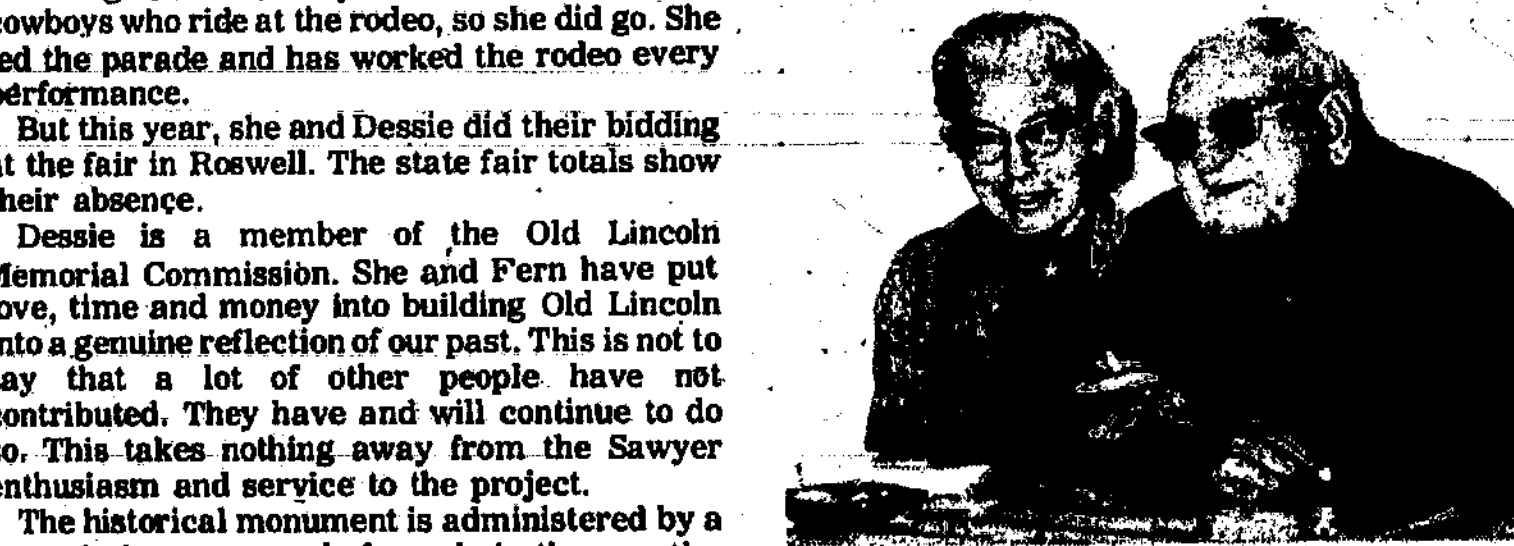

Lincoln wins

The proposed merger of the Lincoln County Memorial Commission with the State of New Mexico Museum Regents got thumbs down from the Public Affairs Committee last week on a 4-3 vote.

The measure, recommended by Gov. Jerry Apodaca, originally called for the Lincoln Commission to be placed under the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Dessie Sawyer, a Democratic Party leader, and Louise Coe, the first woman to serve in the New Mexico Legislature have been active members of the Lincoln Commission.

Members represent the counties that formed the original Lincoln County: In 1880 Lincoln County contained 27,000 square miles and was probably the largest county in the United States. Its area was greater than that of Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Vermont combined.

It included all of the present counties of Lincoln, Chaves, Lea and Eddy, half of DeBaca, most of Otero and Roosevelt and parts of Socorro, Torrance and Curry counties.

The town of Lincoln was the county seat until 1913 when the court house was moved to Carrizozo and the old Lincoln County Courthouse became a community center for the village.

In 1937 the state took over the building and major restoration was done by the Museum of New Mexico. In 1949 the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission was created by the legislature. The commission was given the task of maintaining a museum, researching the history of the county, preserving historic building and reconstructing those that are important in history.

In voting against the proposed merger, Rep. Art Aiello, R-Chavez, said, "These people (the commission) have done a fine job maintaining buildings at almost no cost to the taxpayer and I don't see why we need to control it. It seems there is no reason for this particular abolishment."

We citizens organized singing classes around the neighborhood. If some person died and you couldn't get these ministers, just whoever was capable of reading the Bible was all we had. Ancho - Orris Smith reports a 24-inch snowfall at the ranch.

From 40 to 60 miles away people came by wagons and teams to fish fries on the south fork of the Bonito in the early days. The custom began in the 1890s and continued until about 1910. The fries were held on June 1 each year. Mrs. Maggie

Polly Chavez was receptionist and greeted the guests as they arrived.

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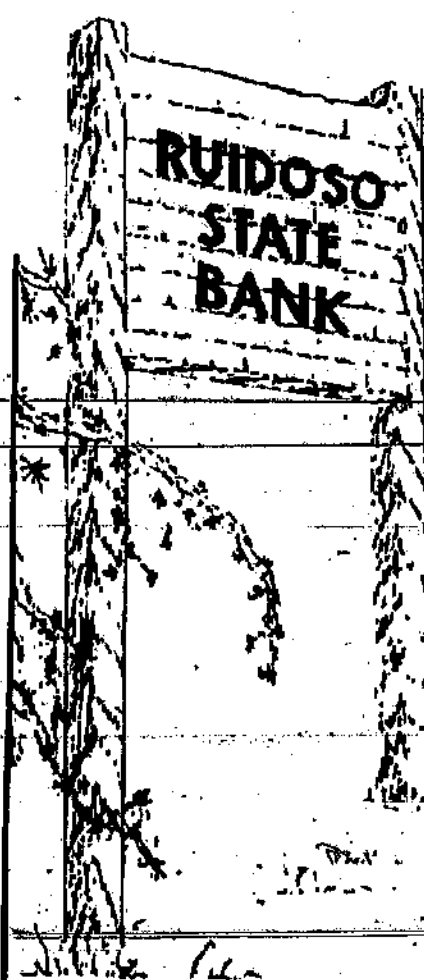


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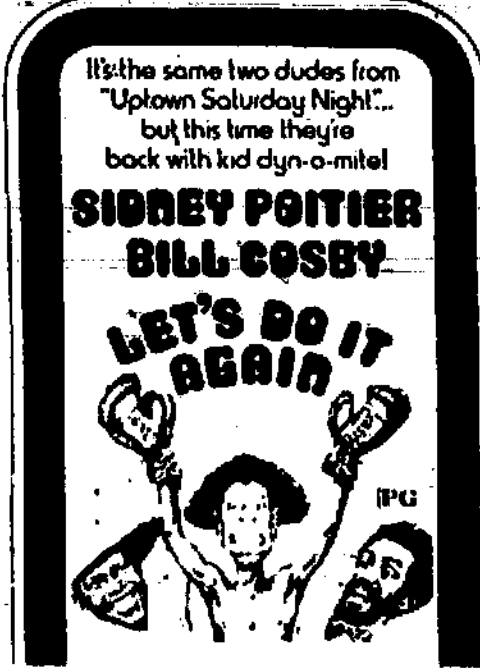

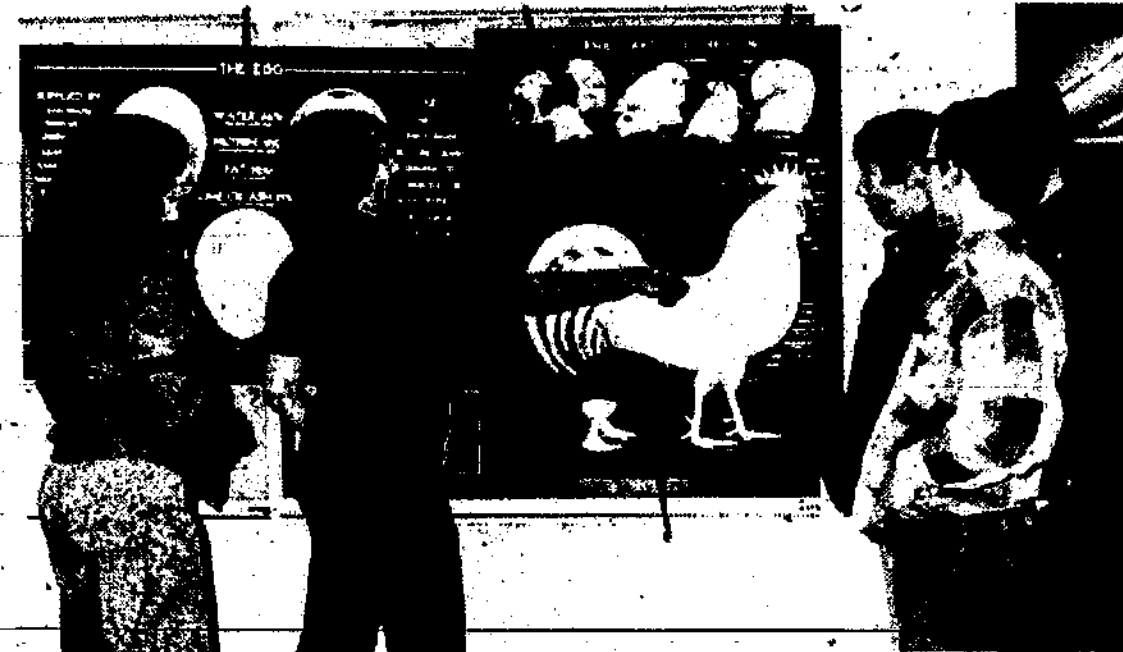

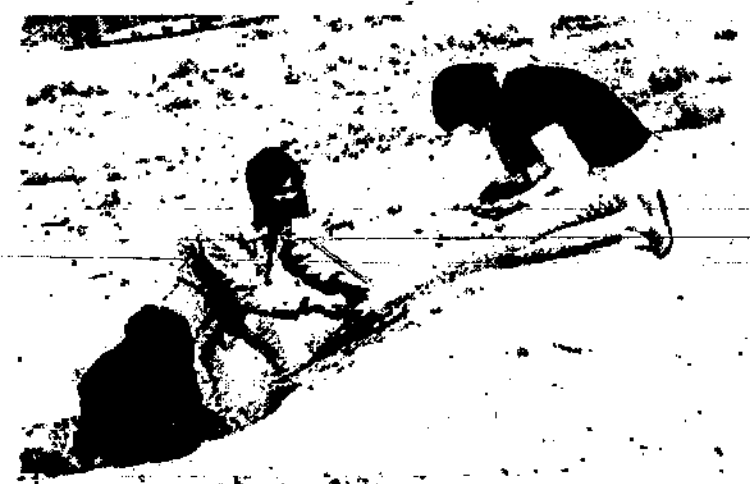

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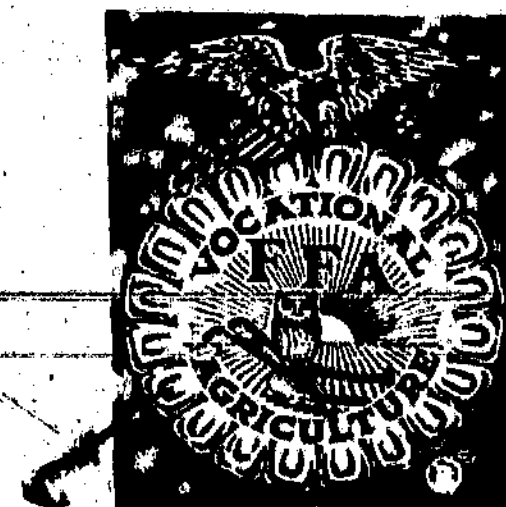
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Around Corona

Look for visitors on your trees

Check your trees for insects as you prune. You can often find insects and other pests if you look closely. Clover mites over winter as eggs on the bark of the fruit tree. They can readily be found if you look closely. Rub the bark of the tree if you suspect mites, you hand will be stained red if there are a large number of clover mite eggs scale insects, can also be found upon close inspection.

If you find mites or scale insects plan on applying delayed dormant oil-insecticide spray as soon as night-time temperatures begin to remain above 32 degrees F. After a week or more of warm days check for Aphid buildups on ornamentals and evergreens. Choose a warm day to spray. For more information stop by the County Extension Office in Carrizozo or phone 648-2471.

Some rose varieties resistant to mildew: Rose lovers who don't like to spray for mildew should consider planting resistant varieties. This white, powdery fungus disease can best be controlled by selecting resistant varieties. Resistant climbing varieties include Summer Bruner, Blaze, Paul's Scarlet, Bonfire, Cecile Brunner, Red Radiance, Golden Emblem, American Beauty and Santa Anita. Resistant bush roses include Buccanera, Capistrano, Comanche, Golden Slippers, Montezuma, Saratoga, Spartan and Tropicana.

Most seed catalogues list varieties resistant to mildew. These resistant varieties should definitely be planted in areas of the garden where the disease has been severe. Most gardeners know that this disease is most troublesome in areas that are partially shaded and where plants are crowded. Disease development is also favored by warm days and cool nights.

Powdery mildew, which is spread by wind-borne spores, is the most common disease of roses in New Mexico. This fungus disease appears as gray, moldy or powdery patches on leaves, stems and buds. The mildew spots may enlarge until they cover the whole leaf. Many leaves curl and become distorted.

When do I start sprinkling my apple trees? This is the question I'm asked most frequently: It is related to the new "Bud Delay Program" that we are trying. Research has shown that a fruit tree needs a rest period-the apple tree needs about 1200 chill units, the peach about 950 and the apricot about 800. Using the 30 year weather record at Picacho, the apple starts its rest period on October 18 and ends it March 3. There is no visible bud development until about March 18 normally.

If the fruit tree is sprinkled anytime the day time temperature gets above 50 degrees F. after its rest period is complete, the bud development can be delayed. This in turn can delay the bloom for up to two weeks.

A demonstration on bud delay is being set up on the A.T. Pfingsten orchard behind the Spring Ranch Trout Farm on the Bonita River about two miles west of Hondo on U.S. 380. He plans to have an automatic thermostat turn the sprinklers on when it reaches 50 degrees F. and sprinkle each tree only one minute out of six minutes.

The computer at Utah State University predicts that the apples will bloom at Picacho in late April rather than mid April. This is because the apple trees started their rest period about three weeks late on about November 9.

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

Doc Dean is NACD delegate

Doc Dean, N.M. state Natural Resource Conservation District president, Claunch, N.M. was among 4,000 Conservation District officials participating in the National Association of Conservation District (NACD) convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, Feb. 1-5.

Included among the resolutions passed by NACD were: strong support for the Land and Water Conservation Act which is currently before Congress; recommendations to alter Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act; and a call for better guidelines to define acceptable kinds of stream channel changes.

NACD members feel that passage of the Land and Water Resources Conservation Act would provide the necessary framework to analyze the nation's soil and water conservation needs; and would update and consolidate conservation authorities carried out through Conservation Districts during the past 38 years.

The Conservation District officials, representing nearly 3,000 local Conservation Districts, expressed their deep concern with the Federal Water Pollution Control Act's Section 404 which they labeled "ambiguous and complex." As it reads now, it is virtually impossible for a landowner to know with any assurance whether or not a permit will be required for any earthmoving activity he needs to perform. NACD resolved for amendments, or repeal, of Section 404; and NACD will also initiate discussions with USDA, Environmental Protection Agency and the Corps of Engineers to determine content of the legislation and responsibility for assuring compliance.

Navy wants you ladies

Women midshipmen, under a new law passed by Congress this year, will be admitted to the Naval Academy for the first time with the new Flebe Class which reports to Annapolis in July, 1976.

For information on the types of nominations available, answers to questions about admission and to initiate a file at the Naval Academy, write to: The Director of Candidate Guidance, U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md. 21402. For immediate information, contact Senator John Conway, the Blue and Gold Officer for this area, at 307 11th St., phone 437-1840. As the local representative of the Naval Academy, he is familiar with all admissions requirements for the Academy.

Women will face the same admission standards as men, with some adjustments made because of physiological difference between men and women. Academic achievement, physical capabilities and demonstrated leadership potential are all incorporated in the selection process.

The Naval Academy is planning to implement a program structured under the same basic criteria used to train male officers as line officers of the Navy. No changes in the academic program are anticipated due to admission of women at the Academy and women will select majors under the same ground rules that apply to men.

While the same professional education, training and development programs will be applied to women midshipmen, some adjustments to the summer training will be required in light of the statutory prohibition against assigning women to combatant ships and aircraft. Alternatives for extended assignment of women midshipmen to ships for the summer cruises are being explored.

Dolly to run for county clerk

Lincoln County Democrats came close to filling their state of candidates with the announcement of Dolly Lueras for the position of County Clerk Tuesday night.

An special meeting of party members gathered in the Capitan School cafeteria to discuss the coming county races and make plans for precinct and county conventions.

County Chairman Roy Jones said that the Democratic party was determined not to let positions go by default. Jans McSwains, the deputy county clerk has announced for election for the G.O.P. and County Treasurer Veda Allen is running for re-election. Thus far the Republicans have not made announcements for County Commission but the filing deadline is still more than a month away.

In a two hours battle with rattlers late in the fall, Mrs. Slaughterback killed 182 of the deadly reptiles. Mrs. Slaughterback is the wife of a rancher and was attacked by the rattlesnakes when she inadvertently came near the den in which they were preparing to go into winter quarters. They surrounded her and she had to fight for her life. Her weapon was a stick.

The legislature began the final 10 days of its regular 30-day session with the state spending level versus a tax cut holding top billing.

Sens. Ray Leger, D-DeBaca-Guadalupe-San Miguel, and Matt Chacon, D-Espanola, said they voted against a \$23.5 million income tax cut because more and better services are needed in New Mexico. The Senate passed tax-cut and other tax decreases were pending in the House Taxation-Revenue Committee. A HTRC hearing was not set on the Senate bill.

But a hearing was set Wednesday by the HTRC on a bill by Rep. Colin McMillan, R-DeBaca-Chaves, to allow federal income tax as a deduction on state income tax. Tax relief would total \$20 million.

The Senate Education Committee reported without recommendation Sen. Leger's school capital improvements bill with amendments. Among proposed school capital outlay projects: Espanola, high school gymnasium, \$900,000; Belen, multiple improvements, \$850,000; Pojoaque, classroom and high school cafeteria, \$425,000, and Pecos, all-purpose school room, \$600,000.

Sen. Chacon proposed \$90,000 for El Mirador Retirement Home; Alcalde - \$50,000 for capital outlay and \$40,000 for operations. The Senate Finance Committee held a hearing on the bill and tabled it temporarily. Similar action was accorded all spending bills by the SFC.

Sen. Chacon's bill, introduced for the interim Legislative School Study Committee for \$6 million for emergency public school capital improvements, received a unanimous "do pass" from the SEC and went to the SFC. A \$363,000 appropriation for Northern New Mexico State School, El Rito, was in a pending higher education capital improvements bill in the House. Reps. Nick Salazar, D-San Juan Pueblo, and Ray Medina, D-Rio Arriba-Taos, were among co-sponsors.

The Senate Judiciary Committee endorsed a bill suspending until July 1, 1977, a 1975 law allowing subdivisions in one or more counties to create their own water and sanitation districts. Sen. I. M. Smalley, D-Sierra-Hidalgo-Luna, sponsored the 1975 law and the pending suspension measure. Smalley is also SJC chairman.

Sen. Smalley said a problem in the 1975 law was caused because districts could extend beyond county lines that are not contiguous. Lakeshore Sanitation District in Sierra County tried to use the 1975 law last year. Sen. Smalley said implications that he had a partial interest in the 1975 law were false.

A House Appropriations-Finance Committee hearing was set Monday on a bill by Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Sierra-Grant, to appropriate \$470,000 for mechanical and electrical improvements at Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children. Truth or Consequences. The SEC endorsed a bill by Sen. George Pennington, D-Bloomfield, appropriating \$400,000 in emergency money for Central Consolidated Schools, Kirtland, to buy school transportation equipment. Pennington told the committee Red Rock Transportation Co., the district's school bus contractor, offered to relinquish control of the school bus operation. The HAFEC voted approval of a bill by Rep. Jerry Sandel, D-Farmingington, appropriating \$177,000 for training for middle management jobs in the Navajo Irrigation Project. The newest legislator, Rep. D. Polk Brown, D-San Juan, favors a cut in Gov. Jerry Apodaca's proposed budget. The HAFEC reported a general appropriations bill \$2.28 million below Apodaca's \$504.4 million proposal. The HAFEC removed from the bill \$200,000 for a study of Northern New Mexico Spanish land grants over Rep. Medina's objections.

The HAFEC endorsed and amended a bill by Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, for \$5 million in state severance tax bonds for highway maintenance and construction. The HAFEC tabled the controversial bill temporarily.

Rep. Bobby Duran, D-Taos, favors a tax cut. A HTRC member, Duran said he would study the \$23.5 million tax cut bill co-sponsored by his senator, C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos. Duran won approval of a \$50,000 state appropriation for Taos Resident Center of New Mexico Highlands University in the general appropriations bill.

Sen. Pennington said: "The Senate will make all the spending judgments this session." He said the HAFEC "is hitting all the appropriations on the high bounce and the Senate will take the fat out of it."

Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, said the New Mexico Petroleum Recovery Research Center at Socorro will exert great potential for major economic development in Southeastern New Mexico via a study of tertiary oil recovery. A \$1.7 million appropriation for the center was moving through the legislature. Lee says 30 to 40 percent of oil is left in place after present primary and secondary oil recovery.

A bill by Rep. Von Rue Crawford, R-Hidalgo-Luna, to extend 2 percent lodgers' tax authority to counties cleared the HTRC with no opposition witnesses. Crawford is on the HTRC. Crawford is deeply interested in a 3-bill package by Rep. John Mershon, D-Lincoln-Otero, intended to assure adequate gas supplies for New Mexico.

An attempt by Sen. Kenneth Schlienz, R-Curry-Quay, to override Gov. Apodaca's 1975 veto of a Schlienz bill stiffening marijuana possession penalties failed 14-27 in the Senate. The HAFEC adopted a provision making available \$72,327 for Eunice Schools and \$56,865 for Jal Schools in 1976-77.

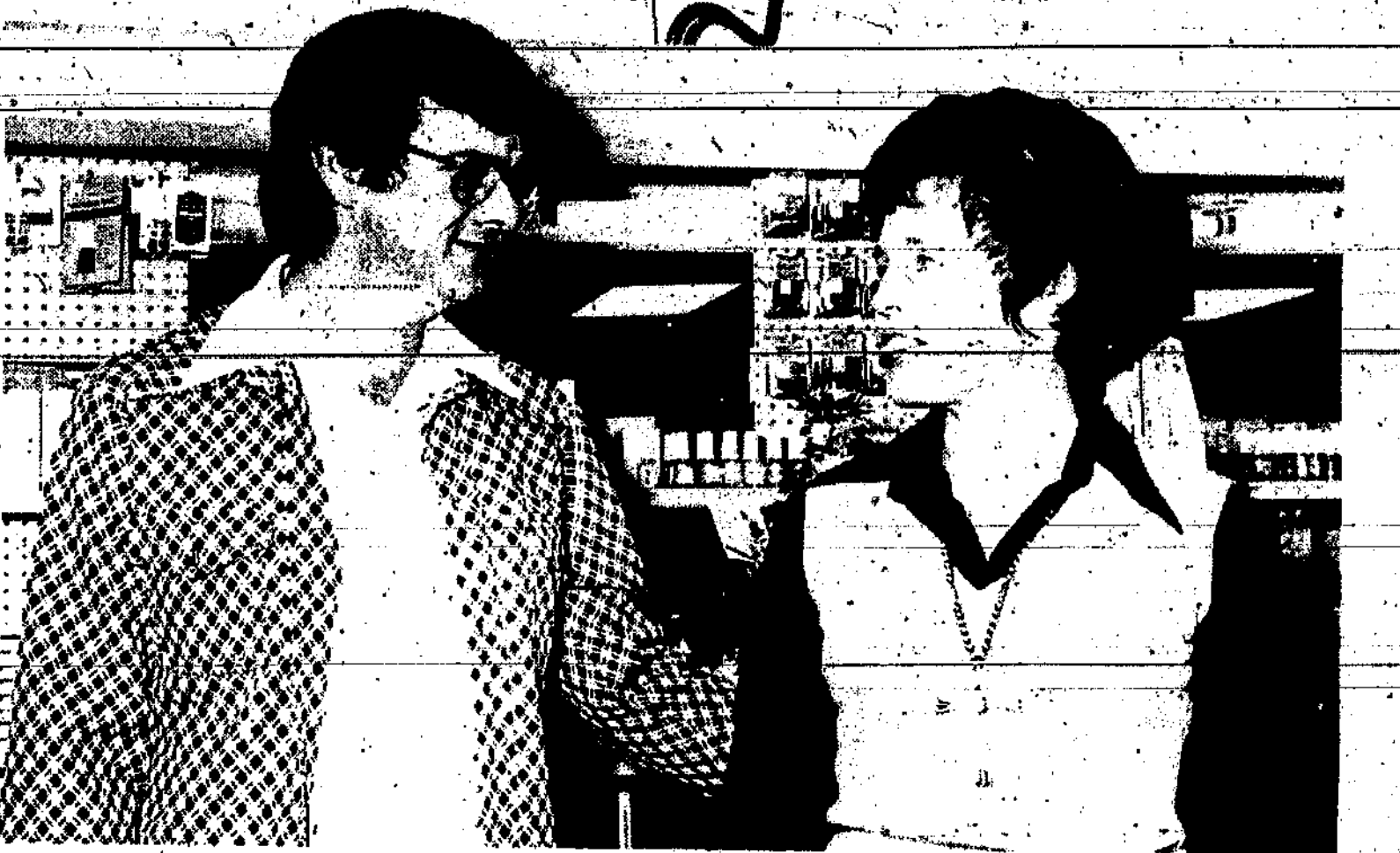
