The county is looking for about \$8500 to pay for a solar powered radio signal transmitter on Capitan Mountain.

The Lincoln County Commissioners were told Tuesday that plans for an electrically powered unit on Carrizo Mountain were not feasible because of a signal transmitting problem. The

county will have to go along with Rancher Radio and others who are planning the solar powered Capitan Mountain operation.

Bids on the unit will be advertised for this week. Delivery time is up to five months and the county will be pushed to complete work on the station before extreme winter weather sets in next fall.

Phil Embry appeared before the Commission to discuss ambulance service in the Ruidoso area. The Town of Ruidoso and the County have both subsidized the ambulance service in that part of the county. Ruidoso failed to budget for such service in the coming year. Mr. Embry said his company would try to continue service but would have to see how the finances worked out.

Embry also plans to operate an ambulance out of Tinnie. He said that many of the worst wrecks in the area occurred on that stretch of road between Roswell and Capitan and that an ambulance was badly needed.

Discussing the needs in the area, Embry said the Ruidoso ambulance answered 20 calls a month two years ago but that the figure had doubled in the past year.

The commission noted that the town of Ruidoso would be forced to provide funds if ambulance service was discontinued, but, observed Commissioner John Suddeth, "the loss of a single life from lack of ambulance service would certainly be too high a price to pay for this lack of foresight."

"There is no way an ambulance can be located in the Ruidoso area without a subsidy," said Embry. Transients often are unable to pay the service fees for the ambulance but, he said, "we have never asked, and we never will ask, if someone can pay before providing ambulance service."

Carrizozo Marshal Choncho Morales appeared before the commission to ask for a reduction in the \$5 per day fee charged the town for use of the county jail.

Marshal Morales said that the town couldn't afford the \$5 and that he was requesting some kind of adjustment. County Manager said the \$5 was for food and was based on actual cost, the county could not afford to reduce the fee, according to Olson and the commissioner concurred.

Morales said that the town would then be forced to take its violators before the county magistrate, and if a person is ordered incarcerated by the magistrate, there would be no charge involved.

The county passed for advertising an ordinance granting a franchise to Continental telephone company for lines in the county.

Speed limit signs on Gavilan county road Canyon Road were discussed and ordered. The present county road speed limit is over the state limit of 55 mph. Reasonable speed limits will be established at the request of Gavilan road residents.

Educational program set

A program of religious education in the home begins this summer in the parts of Lincoln County served by St. Rita's Catholic Church.

The center of the program will involve the assistance to parents in introducing a religious involvement into family life.

Sister Gail Stockpole who is an experienced teacher will move to Carrizozo in September to lead the program. Sister Edith Dominguez will spend the summer in the area organizing the teaching effort.

Sister Julie Slowick has visited in Lincoln County on a regular basis this year. She initiated a parent teaching program which provided a six weeks instruction course. Participating this spring were Mary Chavez who was a resource coordinator, Joe Chavez, Jane Lucero, Pauline Chavez, Margaret Chavez, Vanessa Osorio, Ida Beltran, Manny Hernandez, Jim Gibson, Ella Chavez, Ramona Ortiz and Aileen Lindamood.

Fund raising activities to provide housing and a salary for the sisters have been the work of the women of the parish.

Still unsolved is the problem of providing an automobile for the sister's use. The educational leader will have Capitan and Lincoln to cover as well as Carrizozo and transportation is a necessity.

Mary Ellen Payne, Ramona Ortiz and Mary Chavez who discussed this problem recently, hope that someone in the area with an extra working vehicle might offer the car for the use of the parish.

When the Carrizozo Catholic elementary school was closed nine years ago the religious education of the children in this area was hampered.

"We were used to our children receiving their religious training at school and we had not been taught to teach our children about their faith," Mary Chavez said.

With the arrival of the teaching sisters in Lincoln County, the Catholic parents in the area believe that the religious involvement of the youth will begin again.

The parish members hope that community support will continue and that assistance in providing transportation will be forthcoming.

County fiesta plans made

An extensive advertising program for the county's bicentennial events was approved by the Lincoln County Bicentennial Committee which also made grants to the Ancho-White Oaks area for informational material.

The \$5000 budget for the county's part in celebrating 200 years in independence is centered around a \$2500 advertising program.

A publicity plan which involved a brochure detailing the events scheduled in the area, radio and newspaper advertising of those events and southwest magazine publicity was approved.

Richard Cothron of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce offered to mail 7000 copies of the brochure to Ruidoso property owners. His offer was accepted and the brochure goes to press this week.

The group also tentatively budgeted \$1000 for a permanent float which will illustrate crafts in Lincoln County. The float will be available to each community and will be used at the state fair and other large events where the county desires representation.

Bud Crenshaw and Lee Straley requested funding for a tourist information program in the White Oaks-Ancho area. Crenshaw said that visitors to the area could not locate points of interest without assistance from residents and that a large permanent sign featuring an area map and showing the location of old homes, mines, buildings and the roads in the area was badly needed.

The group also asked for a booklet to further describe points of interest in the area.

The committee appropriated \$250 for the sign and agreed to assist in planning a booklet for the use of the White Oaks Association and the Ancho area residents.

\$500 will be spent on portable stands and dividers to be used in arts and crafts show.

Ralph Dunlap of the County Extension Service said that the Lincoln artist and craftsmen had found a need for display aids in the coming shows and felt that other towns would also need display help.

The portable stands and folding screens will be constructed of plywood and will be available to all Lincoln County towns.

There was further discussion of the school essay contest. Chairman Bob Scribner said that the five county schools had been notified and the response had been enthusiastic.

The committee is providing \$500 in cash prize money for essays concerning Lincoln County history. The contest will be under the direction of a teacher committee.

The ladies of the association will also be serving hamburgers and hot dogs at the school house during the lunch hour on Memorial Day.

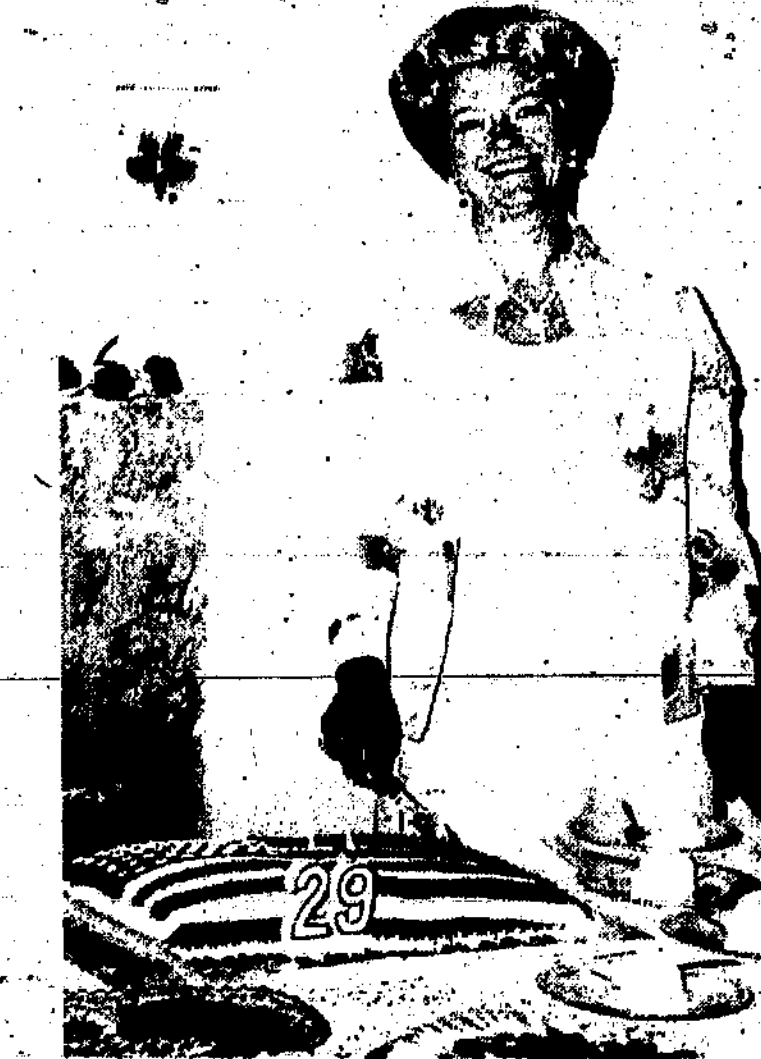

Social security is so often equated with retirement benefits for the older worker that the tremendous protection it provides younger workers, especially those with families, is often overlooked.

Young families often are unaware what the working parents' social security coverage can mean to the family should the parent die or become disabled. Although average payments to the disabled worker and family or to the deceased worker's family amount to about \$475 a month, it is not unusual for payments as high as \$700 to \$800 a month to be paid to families with three or more eligible individuals.

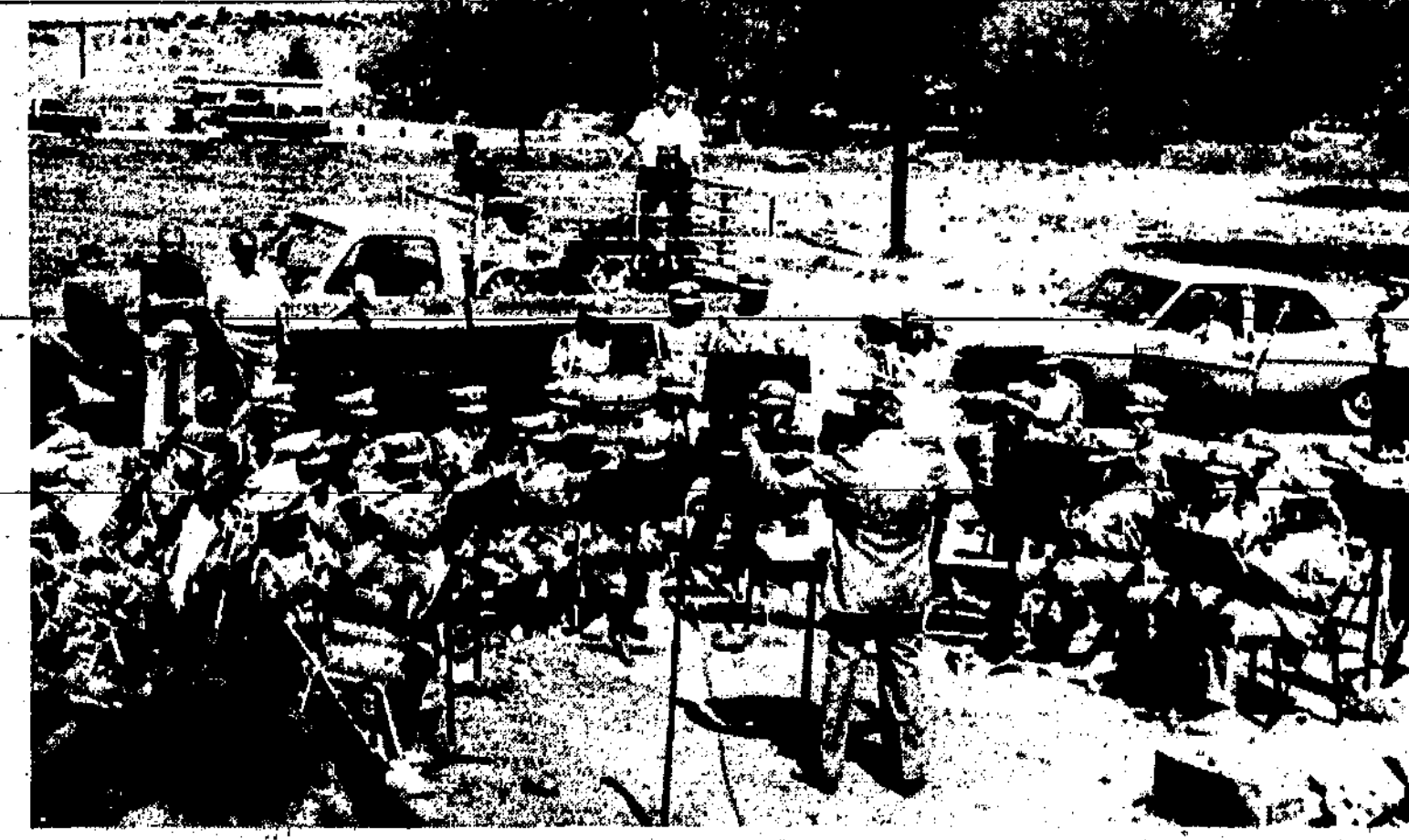

Smokey Bear day perfect

The high country of Capitan, New Mexico experienced perfect weather last Saturday on one of the most important days in the history of Lincoln National Forest. Little wind and a bright New Mexico sun marked the occasion as Smokey's day in Capitan.

It was the day of dedication of Smokey Bear Historical State Park. Smokey Bear's life as the most important animal in our nation, has spanned a quarter of a century. His popular campaign for forest fire prevention and wildlife conservation has been the most successful of all, such public campaigns.

The Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan has been a very popular stopping place for visitors from all over the world. Now it is being enlarged to a park with many important features.

Planning and development of this park goes back a number of years and has included more than a hundred people in the active business of bringing about a major park in Lincoln County. Capitan Woman's Club, the Town Council, U.S. Forest Service, State Park and Recreation Commission, Department of Development, State Department Forestry, State Game & Fish Dept., U.S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, both state and national congressional delegations have contributed to this park along with the many people who personally worked on behalf of Smokey Bear.

Beautiful sounds

The program starting at 11:00 a.m. on May 15 in Capitan was well planned and well carried out. Band made beautiful sounds, youngsters sang a lively song, colors were presented with dignity, speeches were short, many interesting tales were told about Smokey, lots of plaques presented along with the American Sycamore moon tree to be planted.

All in all it was a wonderful day for 'forestry', for Capitan, for people of New Mexico, and for young people all over the world who count Smokey Bear a friend.

In the Bicentennial Year of 1976, Smokey Bear is living in retirement in Washington, D.C. after 25 years of faithful service as the symbol of wildlife conservation and preservation of our natural resources. A young bear, also orphaned in the Lincoln National Forest, now carries on as "Smokey".

Smokey Bear annually receives millions of visitors at his home in the National Zoo, Washington, D.C., more than four million each year. Mail from people, primarily children, throughout the world became so heavy that Smokey was assigned his own ZIP code.

In 1942 the nation recorded more than 200,000 man-made forest fires. In 1973, that number had been cut in half with most of the credit going to Smokey's program and to the children who have grown up with Smokey's slogans of "Only you can prevent forest fires" and "Smokey's friends don't play with matches." Millions of school children have learned Smokey's theme song beginning, "Prowlin' and a growlin' and a sniffin' the air . . ."

Spring of 1950

Smokey Bear's long career began in the Spring of 1950 when he was found clinging to a charred tree by a group of firefighters during a forest fire in the Capitan Gap area that burned off some 17,000 acres. It is estimated that the bear is now well past his 70th birthday in bear years, and someday, when Smokey goes to that big forest in the sky, Smokey Bear's body will be returned to the land of his birth at Capitan where his gravesite will be an honored spot in the Smokey Bear Historical State Park in the center of Capitan.

The park is near the present Smokey Bear Museum. It has been designated as one of the State Park and Recreation Commission's Bicentennial projects. Official dedication was

held May 15 of this Bicentennial Year of 1976.

In September, 1974, the U.S. Congress adopted a concurrent resolution sponsored by U.S. Representative Harold L. Runnels, authorizing the return of Smokey's remains to Capitan. The New Mexico State Legislature authorized state funding. Each phase of the park's construction is expected to cost an estimated \$100,000. At this time, \$50,000 has been appropriated by the Legislature and this has been matched with \$50,000 in federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds. The New Mexico Forestry Department has contributed \$30,000 in federal CM-2 funds for design and interpretative work in the park.

The New Mexico State Park and Recreation Commission is currently implementing this park with final construction plans calling for a completion date of late 1979, provided the Legislature funds the full three phases by that date.

Dedication Day was filled with many memories for the crowd of people assembled from all over New Mexico and from as far away as Washington State.

A small bear

In 1950 Capitan folks were so busy fighting the forest fire in the rugged mountains near town, they did not realize the potential import of the small scorched cub, first known as "Hot Foot Teddy". Game Warden, later State Forester, Ray Bell is reported to have looked at the cub and said, "If he survives the plane trip to Santa Fe, Dr. Smith veterinarian, will fix him up."

The small bear moved in with the Ray Bell family at Santa Fe where he had Judy Bell (about five years old) for a playmate and Mrs. Ray Bell for a nurse. Shortly after, Elliott S. Barker, then New Mexico's State Game Warden, offered Smokey to the chief of the Smokey Bear campaign in Washington to be placed on display at the National Zoo, as the living symbol of fire prevention.

On June 27, 1950, Smokey left Santa Fe headed for fame, and by the way, fortune. Likenesses of Smokey have appeared as dolls and dozens of other items. The federal government has collected hundreds of thousands of dollars in royalties from manufacturers and the money has been used to support the national fire prevention program. Jack Weaver, the voice of Smokey, has never been paid for his many hours of service. He has spoken on Smokey's behalf so many times that the voice of Smokey is as well known as the pictures.

State Park and Recreation Commission Director Sam Graft said, "We are planning this park so that visitors will come away with the message that Smokey has carried to the public so well and for so many years. That message is that fire prevention is everybody's job and that only you can prevent forest fires." The dedication Saturday was a dignified and fitting climax to the long life of such an important figure - Smokey Bear.

The start of the official dedication was a fine musical prelude performed by the Capitan High School Band conducted by Jess Lara. Sam Graft, Director of New Mexico State Park and Recreation Commission, was master of ceremonies. Capitan band played the National Anthem, Boy Scout Troop No. 135 of Lincoln presented the colors. Pastor Hugh Stiles gave the invocation.

Runnels speaks

Capitan Mayor Jay Johnston welcomed all the visitors and gave thanks for the help in the park project. He introduced the Capitan second grade class and teacher, Leota Pfingsten, they sang the Smokey song.

The dedication

A special feature of the dedication was presentation of a Moon Tree, a gift from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, which was grown from seed taken to the moon on the Apollo 14 space flight. Originally, the moon tree was presented by NASA to the N.M. Department of State Forestry which has made the planting possible at the newest state park. Presentation of the tree was made by Jim Freeman, representing State Forestry.

Phil Lovato, chairman of the N.M. State Park and Recreation Commission told of park plans, focal point to be Smokey's gravesite, a more elaborate museum, nature trail, look-out tower, visitor's center, children's play area and group shelter.

Sam Graft started the dedication program with long list of names of people who had contributed in some way to the Smokey Bear story, then added names to his list as the program went along. Following is the list used by Graft:

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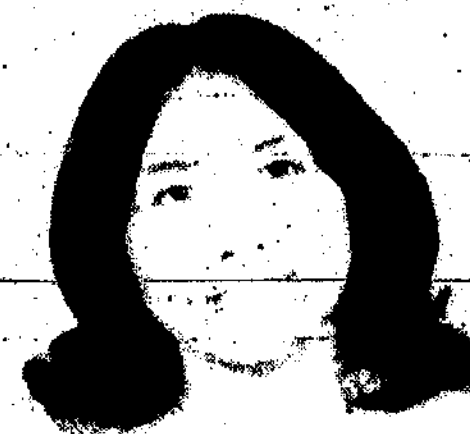

A bowl of activities

A handful of marriage! In May, June and July, and August more marriages take place—so we are going to have an interview with Dr. Carlfred Broderick by Samkeen taken from the Family Circle.

Keen—what about divorce?

Broderick: The divorce rate is going up steadily. But our faith in marriage is so great that 80 percent of those who divorce remarry within four or five years. And even those people who rebel against marriage end up living together—so our culture gives a resounding vote to the practice of living together.

Keen: How well do open marriages or marriages work?

Broderick: Most multiple marriages last only a matter of months. It's hard enough for two adults to make decisions together about money, vacations, children and the like. It seems almost impossible for four or more adults. Open marriages underestimate our need for possessiveness and belonging.

Keen: Why is marriage so enduring?

Broderick: One of the nice things about marriage is that while it calls for a modicum of

investment, it is not all consuming. It leaves us free to do other things because it is scripted and ritualized.

Keen: What is the most common cause of failure in marriage?

Broderick: Not the things that are usually mentioned—sex, money, etc. The partners get locked into a power struggle. A vicious cycle begins, the more she puts him down the more he puts her down—and so on. Other causes of failures. A man expects her to behave in a certain way, which he never makes clear. And she expects him to act in a certain way that she never makes clear.

Keen: How do you teach couples to communicate?

Broderick: Each spouse should FIRST listen!!! and try to understand what the other one is feeling. Then the most important thing is to give each other positive messages—not negative ones.

If you want intimacy and support you have to have a high percentage of positive communications. Attacking people, or giving them only negative feedback, puts them on the defensive—so they only have two alternatives, fighting or running.

Keen: What about affairs? Do they bring excitement back into a marriage?

Broderick: Rarely! Sometimes an affair is creative for an individual who has been locked into a tired marriage because he or she is getting all those positive answers from the other person. Affairs usually shake marriages to their foundations rather than putting tone back in to them.

Keen: What about the future of marriage?

Broderick: As a culture we are oriented toward individual growth. So I expect we will demand that marriage give us more room for individual growth. I think marriage will sur-
