School officials change the report

Funds should go for teaching

A report entitled "Needs Assessment Program...1976" concerning the Carrizozo Municipal School District has been compiled and sent to the Department of Education in Santa Fe.

A requirement by the state of all school districts, the survey is a result of several months of meeting and studies by a group of citizens, teachers and students working under the direction of School Principal Larry Wilkinson, who prepared the final draft of the report, and Jim Steinepreis, superintendent of schools.

There were some changes by Wilkinson in the reports submitted by the committees prior to the final typing. For instance, the high school committee report said that no additional counseling was needed. But the final report said that there was a need for additional career counseling.

After the initial meeting committee members, the main committee divided itself into three sections. Victor Cisneros chaired the elementary school committee. Terry Salgado was chairman of the mid-school committee; Paul Salgado was chosen as leader of the high school group.

Each school study crew decided on the areas that needed study and reported back to the main group as to the committee's opinion on needs of the school in the coming year.

The high school sub-committee divided itself further into small groups to study aspects of high school education: the physical plant, teacher-student relations, vocational education, counseling, and the quality of education.

All groups gave high priority to a need to return to an emphasis on basic education; reading, writing, arithmetic.

The general feeling of the members was that school funds should be spent on teaching before going to other educational aids, building, athletics, etc.

It was felt that in Carrizozo as else where in the nation, education in these basic subjects was somehow less than it should be and that the school should re-emphasize those primary functions.

The complete report as finally submitted to the state education department is printed here for the benefit of member of the committee and student and parents who did not serve on the committee.

II Elementary school needs assessment program

This report reflects assessment of needs in the elementary school as perceived by the Elementary School Needs Assessment subcommittee. In terms of priority, item 1.1 was considered as most important, items 2.1 and 2.2 next most important and of equal priority, and items 2.3, 1.2, and 1.3 in descending order of priority.

1. Recommendations...Personnel
1.1 Emphasis on student-teacher ratio, particularly as it relates to Grades 1 and 4 during 1976-77.

1.2 Given the ethnic mix of the community, that emphasis be placed on staff recognition of the values and culture of students as individuals with varying backgrounds and by participating in the community, staff familiarity with students in terms of their total environment.

1.3 Additional administrative time in the elementary school...presently there is one (1) principal for grades K-12.

2. Recommendations...Academic
2.1 Revision of math program to reflect more emphasis on "basic" math, i.e., concentration on arithmetical functions.

2.2 Additional supplementary reading materials in classrooms.

2.3 Physical Education in elementary grades
2.3.1 rhythms, organized games, physical coordination skills suitable to age level.

3. Recommendations...Physical plant
3.1 Additional attention to minor, routine, maintenance functions
3.2 Improved lighting for better use of audio-visual equipment and to reduce glare on chalkboards.

3.2.1 Skylights create lighting problems in rooms, particularly in relation to use of chalkboards.

3.3 Installation of stall doors in elementary building.

4. Recommendations... Equipment and supply

4.1 Continued purchasing of group reading and teaching tables.

This report reflects assessment of needs in the mid-school as perceived by the mid-school needs Assessment subcommittee. Needs are listed according to priority under main headings. Main headings were also prioritized.

1. Recommendations...Academic

1.1 Emphasis on following subjects: reading, math (arithmetical functions), spelling, science.

1.2 Expansion of Spanish and art classes.

1.3 Expansion of present Title I Reading program into grades 5 and 6.

1.4 Exploration of feasibility of bilingual programs, K-8.

2. Recommendations...Physical plant

2.1 Installation of improved heating and ventilation system in mid-school building.

2.2 larger playground area for grades 5 and 6.

Recommendations...Physical plant

4.1 expanded access to library

3.2 larger collection of easy-read paperback books

4. Recommendations...Activity program

4.1 continuation and expansion of present mini-course program

4.2 continuation and expansion of present intramural program

5. Recommendations...Equipment and supply

5.1 purchase of desks, due to wide variation in size of students in grades 5-8.

IV. High School...Needs Assessment Program...1975-76

This report reflects assessment of needs in the high school as perceived by the High School Needs Assessment subcommittee. Needs are listed according to priority under main headings. Main headings are also priorities.

1. Recommendations...Quality of education

1.1 General concern was expressed by several of the subcommittees and individuals with regard to what was defined as a need to emphasize "basic" skills, particularly in traditional "academic" areas such as spelling, reading, writing, and arithmetic functions. A specific concern was expressed in terms of what was perceived to be a local, state, and national downturn in the acquisition by students of knowledge and skills critical to their functioning adequately in an increasingly complex and technical world.

While the committee recognized that education was a joint venture of home, community, student, and governmental institutions including the schools, specific recommendations for the school were as follows:

1.1.1 That the local Board of Education adopt an affirmative policy statement that here be an emphasis on "basic" education in 1976-77 and ensuing years.

1.1.2 That school funds be budgeted towards this objective on a priority basis relative to other areas such as physical plant, extra activities, sports, etc.

1.1.3 That teachers insist on performance in "basic" skills regardless of subject taught.

2. Recommendations...Advisory committees

2.1 That advisory committees be formed on a continuing basis to facilitate and improve school-community communication and awareness.

2.1.1 That the advisory committees continue to express perceived needs and to explore such specific areas as an exit test for seniors (competency test), a definition of the high school role as desired by the community, student rights and responsibilities, and other areas as determined by the committees.

IV. High School...Needs Assessment Program...1975-76

3. Recommendations...Physical plant

3.1 Continued modernization of school plant, including chalkboard refinishing, tables for rooms, desks, improvement of windows, new lockers.

3.2 Recognition that in the event Carrizozo has physically handicapped students, there will be a need for extra ramps, hand railings, etc.

4. Recommendations...Personnel

4.1 Enlarged or expanded contact with counselor, particularly in area of career counseling.

5. Recommendations...Vocational program

5.1 Additional equipment in present vocational program, especially in Vocational Agriculture, to afford students a wider introduction to manual skills, including those of a leisure-time or home-improvement nature.

5.2 Consideration of future expansion of vocational offerings.

Meat team first at Tech

Carrizozo FFA meat judging team of Rex Wilson, Ray Hernandez and Billy Bob Shafer won first place at the New Mexico Invitational judging contest held at Texas Tech at Lubbock the past weekend.

There were 14 teams in the contest, including all of New Mexico.

The team judged a class of pork and beef carcasses, hams, beef loin, beef ribs, did yield grading on beef carcasses, and identified 25 wholesale cuts of meat. Contest took about two hours.

The Carrizozo meat team won the contest at Hatch this year, and scored 2nd in the district contest at Deming.

At Lubbock the livestock judging team of Phil Straley, Billy Bob and Rex scored 4th. The wool team of Sammy Roper, Gary Lovelace and Phil Straley scored 6th. Stanley Steinepreis attended the dairy judging.

FFA Sponsor Dan Ware said he would take 20 FFA members to the state contest at Las Cruces this weekend.

Turkey hunt starts April 17

Recent snows may prevent high fire danger from interfering with the spring turkey hunt-but they are no guarantees.

Walt Snyder, chief of the Game and Fish Department's Game Management Division, advised turkey hunters to wait to buy their licenses until shortly before the season opens, so that they will know for sure whether the area they plan to hunt is open.

The nine-day hunt opens April 17; if fire danger is too high, the department can close down the hunt in any or all parts of the state, Snyder said.

This year, hunters will not have to make special applications for turkey licenses, and their licenses are good statewide, rather than limited to any specific area.

Hunters have best success if they wear camouflage or neutral colored clothing, judiciously use a turkey call, and "hold real still," Snyder said.

Forums on education scheduled

Volunteers in Corona, Hondo and Ruidoso will be conducting People's Forums on Education April 12 at 7 p.m. in their various communities.

These town hall meetings are a part of a statewide effort to establish educational goals which will wrap-up in Albuquerque on May 21-22. Beverly Merritt and Suzanne Surratt will serve as coordinators in Corona. Adeline Kimbrell is Hondo coordinator and in Ruidoso Billy Don Knox, Neva Garcia and Perrell Peet will chair the session.

Volunteers for the program competed a training program and all the Lincoln County coordinators are non-educators.

Lincoln County coordinator Mickey McGuire said that the volunteer leaders should not be expected to answer questions on education. Nor, he said, are the meetings expected to come up with educational problem solutions rather the purpose is to find desirable educational standards.

All members of the communities are invited to attend and to participate in the discussion of education in the community.

Carrizozo and Capitan are not having meetings because Mr. McGuire was unable to find volunteers who could attend the training sessions. If members of the communities would like to participate, he will attempt to schedule a session using the people from another community.

Questionnaires will be distributed to all of the schools for students to have their parents

complete. These questionnaires will be collected at county and state forums.

They may be returned to the school or mailed directly to M.B. McGuire, Box 3158, Hol. Sta. Ruidoso.

The Forum, initiated by Governor Jerry Apodaca, is designed to give all New Mexicans, particularly those who traditionally have not been involved in educational planning, an opportunity to help establish goals for education.

Two University of New Mexico professors, Dr. Lawrence B. Rosenfeld and Dr. Paul C. Feingold, both of whom specialize in small group, interpersonal and nonverbal communication, conducted the eight regional training workshops.

The workshops were planned to help the coordinators and facilitators make sure that at the local Forums every participant has an ample opportunity to offer opinions and suggestions about education in New Mexico.

Feingold and Rosenfeld said that in their travels around the state they found the level of interest and enthusiasm for the project, one of the most ambitious educational programs ever attempted in the U.S., was very high.

Training sessions were conducted in Albuquerque, Espanola, Las Vegas, Raton, Silver City, Las Cruces, Roswell, Clovis and Ruidoso for those and neighboring areas.

More than 300 people, most of whom are not educators or in education have volunteered to serve as county coordinators, facilitators and in other capacities to help with the project.

Dear Miss Ward:
Thank you for sending me a copy of your letter of March 26, to Mr. Thomas M. Tierney in which you express your concerns over the very real difficulties facing rural hospitals.

I want you to know that I share your concern over this very important matter. You would be interested to learn that I am presently in the process of conducting a survey of hospital administrators in New Mexico in which I ask them to expound upon the difficulties they encounter in implementing certain federal programs. I have contacted a sizeable number of these hospital administrators, both urban and rural, and asked them to outline for me the difficulties they experience with programs such as OSHA, Life Safety Code, PSRO, Medicare and Medicaid and a host of other potential problem areas. With the results of this survey my colleagues and I hope to formulate effective legislation designed to alleviate some of these difficulties.

Please be assured of my ongoing concern with this very pressing matter. If ever in the future I can be of assistance to you, please feel free to call upon me.

Thank you for your letter of March 9 requesting sources of Federal support that may be available to the Carrizozo Health Center in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

I share your concern about the plight of rural health care institutions as they strive to comply with State and Federal regulatory requirements and to provide quality health care during an inflationary economic period. The specific situation you describe at the Center is complex and will require indepth programmatic response. Therefore, I asked Mr. Stuart H. Clarke, the Regional Director in Dallas, to carefully review your letter and to provide the information you requested. You may be assured that the Regional Director will give all possible attention to your concerns and that you will receive a full response from him within two weeks.

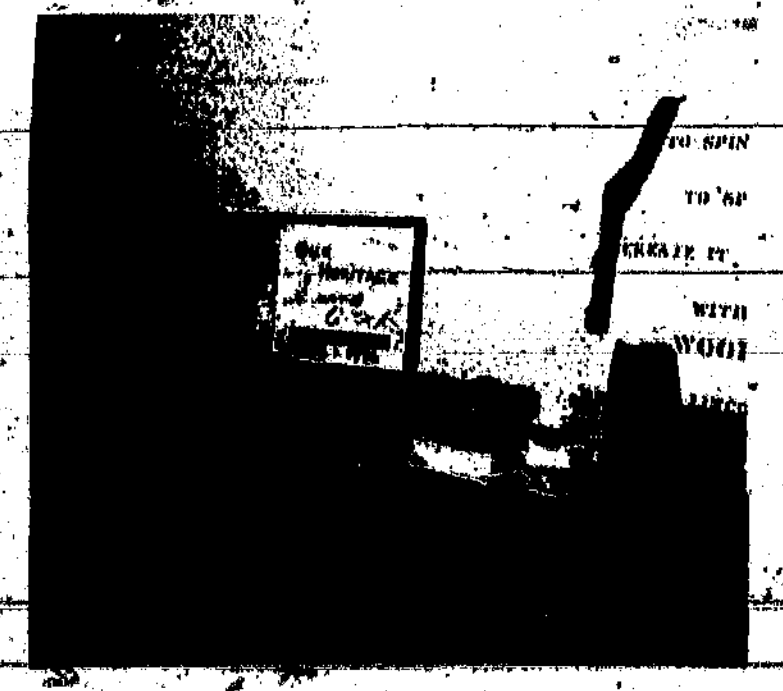

Brenda and Tom lived way up on the north slope of Carrizozo mountain.

They were building their house, planting a garden, and doing leather work to make a little cash crop.

Now Brenda, Tom and Sonya Marie live near the top of Carrizozo mountain. Brenda and Tom carry water and wash diapers and carry water and wash Sonya. Sonya eats and sleeps.

Sonya Marie arrived before the water system was completed and it looks like it will be quite a while before Tom can take enough time off from carrying water to laying a pipe line.

The young people have discovered a truth about a return to basic living—it is just plain hard work. I discovered it long ago.

When my husband and I were first married we were students and very very poor. But it doesn't take much money to live richly when you are twenty and attending a university. At least it didn't then.

It didn't until Mary Claire, a violet-eyed bundle of unceasing noise, arrived. Just like Tom's water line, our timing was a little off. We were still very very poor and students but we quickly discovered we were poor.

It is a lot of work to wash diapers by hand, boil them in a soup pot, hang them on a line to freeze in the wet Austin cold.

It is not much fun to study to the music of a crying colicky baby. And it is hard work to walk two miles carrying a baby and two sacks of groceries containing six boxes of Kraft dinner (the cheapest food then available) and a ton of baby food.

A few years and another baby later, I discovered it is less work and more fun to have a washing machine and dryer, a car, a vac, a mixer. I loved letting electricity work for me.

But twenty years later, there I was, by choice, on the side of a mountain, lighting kerosene lamps, heating a flat iron, washing by hand and great jumping Jehoshaphet, sweeping with a thing that had straws tied to the end of a stick.

But, my friends, the baby was a glorious eighteen year old and able to carry the wood in.

If you are young and strong with clear vision and a love of the land, then have at the pioneer life and do-it yourself energy. I suggest however, you wait until you have running water to the house to install a crib.

The following page from a letter published in the Farmer Stockman shows what life was like for a wife and mother three quarters of a century ago.

Electricity literally liberated these farm and ranch wives from a can't work load, inadequate rest, lack of medical care at child birth had sent many to an early grave.

My grandfather, a teacher and a farmer, had fourteen children but it took him three wives to do it.

When I was visiting the Hightowers gathering information for a story about their ranch, Bryan Hightower talked about trips to town from Ancho to Carrizozo in a wagon.

"We seemed to have more time then," he said, "we would get into town and spend several days before coming home."

Then we all laughed a little because we remembered that it took all day to get to town and certainly a family wasn't going to let that trip go to waste. Now, the Hightowers sometimes make several trips to town in the same day.

I think a return to growing your garden, cutting your wood and walking up your road is good for the soul and good for the body. But it is wise to remember that beauty is often a matter of perspective and pleasure a self created quality in life. Or, in short, what is wine to one is poison to another.

The letter that started all this retrospecting:

January 14, 1911... It was so cold when I awoke this morning that ice had formed on the inside of the windows. Pulled the quilt up over my head and tried to pretend it was summer, but it didn't work. After counting to 100 I leaped from the bed and quickly dressed. Heard the baby stirring in the next room.

Downstairs in the kitchen I built a fire in the wood stove and fixed pancakes and sausage. The old stove was smoking worse than usual. It just doesn't draw any more. Made a mental note to talk to Frank this evening about getting a new one. A necessity!

After breakfast I milked the cows, strained the milk, and put it in pans. Skimmed the cream from last night's milking—cock's nearly full. Must churn tomorrow.

The morning's chores passed quickly. Washed the dishes. Made the beds, plumping up the feathers. Emptied the chamber pots. Did the laundry and hung it out to dry.

The new puppy succeeded in dragging Frank's good trousers from the line. When I finally reached them, complete with a tear in the right leg, I had to do them all over again.

Before I knew it, it was time to start dinner. Freshened some pork, peeled potatoes, and fixed cabbage. Wanned up last night's apple pie and made a big pot of coffee. Rang the bell for the men to become and eat.

After dinner I washed the dishes. Seems like I spend half my life in the kitchen. Had to prime the cistern pump before I could get water. Filled the lamps and washed the chimneys. Got the clothes from the line—everything was stiff from the cold.

Had the children fill the wood box when they got home from school. Hardly had a chance to pay attention to the baby all day.

After feeding the chickens and gathering eggs, it was time to start supper. Cold ham, warmed up potatoes from dinner, applesauce and cookies. Supper was a little late; the men went out cutting wood.

Washed dishes for the last time today and prepared dough for baking tomorrow. Helped the children with their studies before they went to bed. I must talk to Frank about that new stove, but maybe I'll let that wait till tomorrow.

drivers drive too fast, pedestrians walk in middle of the street. There is a movement on foot now, I understand, for incorporation, and many people seem to think if this carries, that motor traffic as well as many other things, can be easily controlled."

What is a reasonable standard for rural schools in New Mexico? For the present the requirements can not be fixed too high. Suggestions: 1. Ground of one-half acre with fence; 2. trees and shrubs; 3. two well-kept, widely separated outhouses; 4. Convenient fuel shed; 5. School house well built; 6. Good blackboards; 7. Clean interior with pictures; flags; 8. Desks suitable for all ages; 9. Good teacher's desk and chair; 10. List of 20 books well selected; 11. Six maps including New Mexico; 12. Teacher should be urged to secure at least a second grade certificate. She should know both languages; 13. School should be well organized; 14. Term, at least seven months; 15. Enrollment approx. 70 per cent of school census; 16. Average daily attendance 90 per cent of enrollment; 17. Board of school directors who are intelligent; 18. School sentiment among parents that will insist on proper administration and management of schools.

First, a local option election three precincts, White Oaks, Carrizozo and Oscura, to determine whether or not liquor may be sold in the territory named. Other petition was question of incorporation for Carrizozo, containing more than the required 200 signatures. The sheriff was directed to immediately take a census of the town and report as soon as work is completed. If 1500 inhabitants are found living within the prescribed limits the board will order an election.
