Smokey's Park will open

Smokey Bear Historical State Park in Capitan will be dedicated May 15 at 11 a.m. The park which will someday be the final meeting place of New Mexico's and maybe the nation's most famous living creature is now under construction.

Smokey Bear Historical State Park is the first Bicentennial park to be dedicated in New Mexico this year. Its creation commemorates over a quarter of a century of Smokey Bear's campaign to educate the public to the importance of forest fire prevention and wildlife conservation.

The first phase of park development was the acquisition of approximately 2.5 acres of land for the park site with subsequent construction of a retaining wall and basic earth work to be completed by May 15, 1976. Phase II involves the construction of the Visitor Center and some landscaping.

The Park Department invitation says, "Two years of preparation have passed from the time of conception of the idea to create a Smokey Bear Historical State Park to the dedication ceremony being held today in the midst of this Bicentennial Year."

Capitan, was chosen as the site for this historical park because it was here twenty-five years ago a badly-burned bear cub was found clinging to a smouldering tree and rescued by fire fighters. The black bear cub was taken to Santa Fe, where his burns were treated by a local veterinarian. By the time his injuries had healed, he had become the first living symbol of the forest fire prevention campaign supported by the U.S. Forest Service. In June of 1950, he was flown to Washington, D.C. and officially named Smokey Bear. Since that time, Smokey Bear has become a world renowned symbol of fire prevention and conservation.

"By dedicating Smokey Bear Historical State Park here in Capitan, it is hoped that the ideals of wildlife conservation and the preservation of our natural resources will be fostered for decades to come through the development of the Smokey Bear Museum, Interpretive Trails and the Visitor's Information Center."

Harman quits, blames News

Roy Harman has resigned as a member of the Carrizozo Board of Trustees citing the "hostility of the local press" as the reason.

His letter of resignation reads, "Effective this date (April 15) please accept this as my resignation as a member of the Carrizozo Town

Council. I can no longer tolerate the innuendoes and hostility of the local press."

Presumably Harman's criticism of the NEWS stems from a story concerning the Board's closed meeting in which Town Manager Johnnie Johnson's position was abolished effective August 31.

Area problems to be explored

Are you trying to work with a community group to solve some of the problems in your area? Then the Western Regional Workshop will run from June 21 to July 2 and will be held on the campus of the College of Santa Fe. Although the workshop is specifically designed for community development practitioners in federal, state and private organizations, interested individuals are also welcome. The workshop will provide people-oriented experiences and will explore comparisons with the situations at home.

The NEWS, in the story, questioned the legality of such proceedings. There is some talk about an investigation of the meeting by the state attorney general's office.

Asked about Harman's letter, Mayor Floyd Siegrist said "I feel the local press has been very fair and very true in reporting about us. I don't know of anything that was inaccurate."

Trustee Willie Silva said that he believed that the NEWS had been accurate and had been fair in its support and coverage of town business.

Trustee Manny Hernandez said that he believed it would have been better for the NEWS to have been present but said that as far as he was concerned the NEWS wasn't hostile to the trustees and "it didn't hurt me in any way."

Earlier Robert Luna had said that he had made no pre-election commitment about Johnson and the continuation of his job.

The trustees will have the job of filling the vacancy. Mayor Siegrist will make a nomination at the next meeting.

Last Thursday, the county Democratic precinct conventions mostly voted to send unselected delegations to the County. Only Capitan showed a preference in the coming national presidential selection process. The Capitan delegates are instructed in favor of Jimmy Carter.

Scholarships are offered

Lincoln County graduating seniors are being offered two scholarships in the amount of \$250 each by the Lincoln County Farm Bureau.

A student may be attending any school in Lincoln County to be qualified. The student does not need to be a member of the Farm Bureau but must plan to attend an institution of higher learning in New Mexico.

The student must plan to major in home economics or agriculture upon completion of high school.

Awards will be made by the Farm Bureau of Directors and the decision will be based on need and merit, Billy Stephenson, FB president said. Deadline for making application for a scholarship is May 7 and applications are available at all schools in the county or student may write directly to the Lincoln County Farm Bureau, Box 307, Carrizozo NM 88301.

Hondo dancers perform

The nationally known Hondo Fiesta Dancers will present the 24th Annual Hondo Fiesta Friday and Saturday nights, April 30 and May 1, in the Hondo School Gym.

Forty-seven senior high school students in beautiful costume perform the many and graceful steps of Spanish, Mexican and New Mexican folk dances.

Mr. and Mrs. Fermin S. Montes, founders and instructors of the dance group, have named this year's Fiesta the Fiesta del Recuerdo (Fiesta of Memories.) Many of the 52 dances that they have taught during the years will be performed at this year's colorful performance.

Some of the dances to be performed include El Movillero, the bull fight dance, El Jarabe Pateno, La Varsoviana, Frijolitos Pintos, Jarabe de Valle, El Sliotis Norteno, Jesusita en Chihuahua, the difficult and strenuous Los Matlachnes will be danced by the boys and the always popular El Jarabe Tapatio, Mexican Hat Dance.

These nationally famous dancers have traveled and danced at the Festival of Arts in Tucson, Arizona in 1951, the National Folk Festival in Nashville, Tennessee in 1959, Mexico City and Acapulco in 1965, Disneyland and San Juan Capistrano in 1966, The HemisFair at San Antonio, Texas in 1968, Chihuahua City and Los Mochis in 1970, Mexico City in 1973 in addition to their extensive travels throughout New Mexico and Texas. Bonito bridge rebid asked

Gardner Bridge Co. Friday asked the Santa Fe District Court to order the State Highway Commission and State Engineer to award the Bonito Creek bridge reconstruction bid to the firm.

The court issued an alternative writ of mandamus and set a hearing for May 7 on the writ itself.

The suit said that Gardner Bridge had bid \$131,051.05 in the first alternative for rebuilding the bridge.

Highway officials said the commission had awarded the bid on the project to Armstrong and Armstrong on alternative two. The Armstrong and Armstrong bid was for \$134,146.60.

The petitioner said in the suit that it was "the lowest responsible bidder."

Ladron area planning set

A citizen workshop to identify important planning issues, problems and public concerns on National Resource (public domain) Lands in the Ladron Mountain-Mesa Del Oro area will be sponsored by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) in Belen on May 5.

The workshop will be in the Belen Junior High School Cafeteria (corner of Bernard and Fourth Streets) beginning at 7:00 p.m., and will focus on the Ladron planning unit of the Socorro BLM District. This unit (see attached map) contains approximately 241,000 acres of National Resource Land Extending from the Acoma and Laguna Indian reservations on the north to the Cibola National Forest on the south, and from the Rio Puerco River on the east to approximately five miles west of the Socorro Catron County line on the west.

Information obtained during the workshop will be used in developing a multiple use plan, which will serve as a guide for future management and use of National Resource Land in the Ladron unit. Additional workshops and public meetings will be held later this year to discuss specific land use alternatives and conflicts which arise during development of the multiple use (Management Framework) plan.

Anyone who has information concerning or is interested in future management and use of National Resource Lands in the Ladron unit is encouraged to attend the workshop. "In order to develop a comprehensive plan on the Ladron unit, it is essential that we obtain public involvement and have interested individuals, groups and organizations involved in this planning process," states Arlen P. Kennedy, Socorro BLM District Manager.

Extra income is possible

People who can answer "yes" to five questions may be eligible for supplemental security income payments, according to Walter A. Blea, social security field representative.

- The questions are:
1. Are you 65 or over, or blind, or severely disabled?
 2. Is your income from pensions or social security benefits less than \$178 a month (\$275 for a couple)?
 3. Is your home valued at \$25,000 or less?
 4. Is your car valued at \$1,200 or less?
 5. Are your assets—savings, stocks, or other things convertible to cash—worth less than \$1,500 (\$2,250 for a couple)?

"Based on your answers to the above, if you think you may be eligible for these benefits, you should call or visit or write any social security office for more information about these payments," Blea said.

The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled.

A pinch of planting!
Quickly plant your beets now. They do not grow well in hot weather. Sow seeds 1/2 inch deep, in soil that will not crust. If you have a light soil that dries out rapidly, soak the seeds before planting. It's best to plant a 10 ft. row every week or two through out the growing season.

Also your carrots—they can be planted in a week or so, the seeds must be fresh always sow a few more than you will need. It will help to soak the seeds also. Your recipe this week:

Rainbow Pie

- 1-3 oz. pkg. orange jello
 - 1-3 oz. pkg. black raspberry
 - 1-3 oz. pkg. lime jello
 - 3 cups boiling water
 - 1/2 cup melted butter
 - 2 cups cold water
 - 1 cup pineapple juice
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1-3 oz. pkg. lemon jello
 - 1/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
 - 3 pkg. cream whip
- Prepare the orange, black raspberry, and lime flavors of jello, separately using 1 cup boiling water and 1/2 cup cold water for each. Pour each flavor in to an 8" square pan and chill until firm. Combine pineapple juice and sugar and heat until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat. Add lemon jello and stir until dissolved, add remaining 1/2 cup cold water until slightly thickened. Mix crumbs and butter press on to bottom of 9" springform pan and bake at 350 for 5 min. cool. Cut firm jello into 1/2" cubes, prepare cream whip and fold into slightly thickened lemon jello. Fold in jello cubes and pour mixture into springform pan. Chill until firm, at least 5 hr. or over night. To serve, remove sides of pan and cut desert into wedges—serves 16.

News from the County Agent

Dr. Arlo Richardson, Meteorologist at Utah State University last Friday reviewed the Bloom Delay Demonstration at the A. T. Pflingsten orchard. He felt that the blooms on the demonstration plot had been delayed a full two weeks. The red delicious apple trees have already bloomed where they were not sprinkled, whereas the sprinkled trees were in the green leaf spray. Incidentally the blooms on the unsprinkled red delicious trees have already lost their fruit in the freeze on Easter weekend.

Dr. Richardson noted that many of the trees were slow leafing out and blooming. This is because the apple trees did not have enough cold weather to complete their normal dormant requirement. He also related the growing degree hours needed before the tree will break dormancy and how sprinkling at this time is most beneficial if the grower wants to delay blooms. This same principle will work with any fruit tree.

The disease has no symptoms, say sponsors of National High Blood Pressure Month, until it explodes in to stroke, heart disease or kidney failure. They add that the key to controlling high blood pressure is convincing people to get and stay on treatment.

The first step is getting regular blood pressure checks, and they urge that everyone, even children, start their regular check-ups during May. Check-ups may be obtained free at the Lincoln County Health Dept. located in the Court house annex.
