County primary turnout big

Lincoln County party members went to the polls Tuesday and selected their candidates for the November general election. A big 57 percent of the registered democrats voted. Republicans cast 36 percent of their eligible votes.

The republicans and the democrats produced a couple of close ones locally but the big surprise was the strong showing Rich Sims made in his bid for the nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Lincoln County Democrats gave Sims 642 votes to Sen. Joe Montoya's 673. The GOP cast 363 votes for Harrison Schmitt and 187 for Eugene Peirce who were running for the senatorial spot.

The District 12 judicial position produced a close vote with four men seeking the nomination from the democrats. Carrizozo's Bill Payne easily carried Lincoln County but lost to Richard A. Stanley when the Otero County votes were added in. Payne had 866 votes in Lincoln precincts and 1077 in Otero County. Stanley took 471 votes in Lincoln and won with 1844 in Otero. He will face GOP nominee Thomas Sandenaw, Jr. in November.

In the only locally contested Republican race Kenneth Nosker edged out J.N. Snooks McDaniel 311 to 290. Nosker will come up against John Thompson in November.

Bill Elliott easily captured the democratic nomination for sheriff polling 948 votes over Ralph Romero's 403. Elliott opponent will be Ernest Sanchez.

Voters have returned John Sudderth to the county commission in District 3. He carried the

democratic nomination with 706 votes. Leon Farrar drew 234 and Elmer Pirelli had 248. Sudderth has no republican opposition.

Incumbent Commissioner R.C. Nunez was ousted by George (Shorty) Stoneman 730 to 404 votes. Stoneman will be opposed by former commissioner Paul Pacheco in November.

Lee Straley handily carried the democratic nomination to District 2 place on the county commission. He downed Eddie O'Brien 806 to 336. His GOP opponent will be Elias Otero.

Sunny Hirschfeld will be the democratic banner carrier in the county clerk race. She topped Dolly Lueras 698 to 413. She will have Jane McSwane as opposition in the general.

A three way race for the nomination as district magistrate in the Ruidoso area put W.A. Hart on the top with 510 votes. Sam Nunnally drew 423 and Fred Bernard took 314 votes. Hart's November opponent is James R. Wheeler.

In all, 1450 democrats and 667 republicans went to the polls Tuesday. Complete returns by precinct are elsewhere in the NEWS.

Employment problems get district attention

State Planning and Development districts will be changed slightly in the near future but for the meeting held May 24 at the 4 Winds the districts included Lincoln, Otero, Torrance, Valencia, Socorro, Catron and Sierra. The new District V will include Lincoln, Otero, Chaves, Eddy and Lea.

The meeting in Carrizozo was for discussion of employment problems and needs in Lincoln County. R.C. Nunez was chairman with Pete Peterson, ESC of Alamogordo; Mary Ellen Payne, community college and extension; Elinor Olson, GED, president of community college; Elsie Faecke, director of Employment Security Commission; and Mary Crenshaw, welfare director on the agenda.

Chairman Nunez called on the Lincoln representatives for comment. Mrs. Payne said the college had 300 students, 20 courses offered. Transportation was the problem, to get people to the college, for both youths and adults. Julius Fraissenet, Manpower Board Rep., said there were several ways the community college could acquire a bus.

Mrs. Olson said that Mary Ellen Payne and Polly Chavez had headed the drive for adult education. The Community College offered four credit courses, wanted to expand county-wide. Mrs. Faecke said her office in Carrizozo offered all services but counseling and testing. By October this office will operate on its own, and not a part of the Alamogordo office.

Ervin Aldaz, director of Ft. Stanton Training School, said they employed 171 people - year around, the largest employer in the county. The workers come from Carrizozo, Capitán, Ruidoso, Roswell, Lincoln and Ft. Stanton.

Frankie Silva complimented Carlos Beltran on the way he helped with Manpower.

St. Arnaud Nicolas, from Governor's office of Employment and Training Administration discussed CETA objectives for 1977. General objectives are: to assist the under-employed, the disadvantaged, the unemployed. To expand educational and occupational skills. To define the labor market and establish priorities. To acquaint the public with CETA programs.

Mr. Nicholas pointed out that the Employment Security Commission (ESC), Mrs. Faecke's office in Carrizozo, was the place for local people to get answers to their questions about work experience, on-the-job training, classroom training, allowance payments, etc.

Lincoln County has been allotted \$19,385 for 44 slots this summer based on 1.1 percent index of

need. Under the work-experience aspect of the summer program, young people will work 20 hours a week for not more than nine weeks, or a maximum of 100-hours. This program lasts 12 weeks, the federal minimum wage of \$2.30 an hour will be paid. The purpose of the program is to show the students how to work, to train them for a job.

The second aspect of the summer program is on-the-job training which will deal with the private business sector. The employer will be reimbursed for half the employee's wage, or \$1.15 an hour. The student must be paid at least \$2.30 an hour by the employer. The program is intended to bring the trainee up to a level of production where he/she will benefit the employer.

A goal of the summer program - for youth to learn something. Eighty percent return to full-time education.

For comparison: Valencia has been allotted \$90,021 for 206 slots based on 5.2 index of need, Sierra County 16,609 for 38 slots on 1.0, Socorro 27,827 for 64 slots on 1.6, and Torrance County 18,845 for 43 slots on 1.1 percent of need.

The next District Manpower meeting will be held in Estancia on September 20, at 6:00 p.m., location not certain.

Petty moved to Santa Fe from Lincoln County in 1972 to become president of the bank.

Other participants include Jerry A. Henson, Executive vice president and trust officer of the bank, who will continue as executive vice president.

One of New Mexico's most renowned architects, Willard C. Kruger, will bring his many years of experience of serving on bank boards to the new group as a full investor. Charles G. Taylor, well-known horseman and rancher will also serve in the group. Prominent retired Attorney, Georges H. Dapples, who is presently active in investing and ranching activities will also serve on the board. Stewart Harvey, member of the famous Fred Harvey family with restaurant, hotel and shop operations throughout the world is a member of the new group.

Joining the bank as a partner in the new venture and serving as senior vice president and trust officer will be Phillip G. Levitt, a local attorney. Two Albuquerqueans joining the group will be Ben A. Lanford, Sr., chairman of the board of State Distributors, Inc., a wholesale liquor operation with offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Roswell and J. T. McDowell, who is associated with Bo Mur Electric with offices in Santa Fe and Albuquerque. McDowell's wife is an associate in the partnership

and owns and promotes her own real estate development company in Albuquerque.

Bank of Santa Fe, the thro oldest bank in the city, has grown from \$18,033,165 in 1972 to \$27,188,174 in 1976, a 50 percent gain. The growth of the bank under the direction of Mr. Petty has been termed remarkable by local financial circles, as the growth percentage of the bank has exceeded the population growth of Santa Fe.

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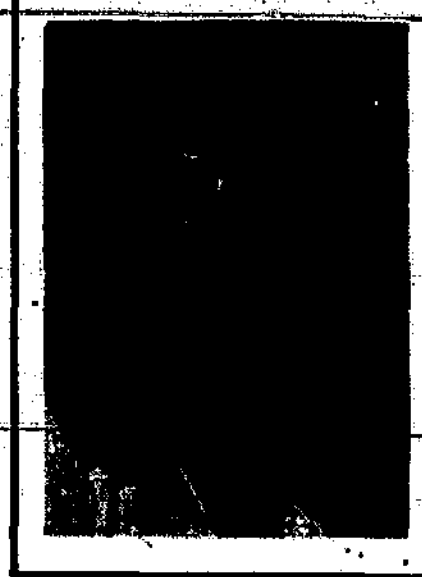
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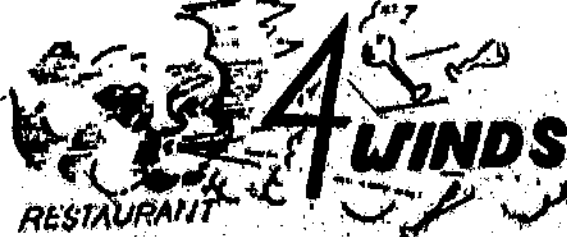

A BIG PINCH OF TOBACCO
The evils of tobacco are ancient indeed. Christopher Columbus is said to have made the first record of the use of tobacco, Nov. 15, 1492. The first cigarettes were made by the ancient Aztecs and Mayas, and the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico. These were hollow reed or corn husks filled with tobacco. Some natives inhaled tobacco through the nostrils from a pipe-like instrument. Many chewed tobacco or used snuff. The cigar was brought to Europe by Columbus. Only the kings and priests of the Yucatan were permitted to have the "magic smoke" of the tobacco. Even in Spain and Portugal the cigar was used only by nobility, partly because it was so expensive. The true cigarette appeared much later. Seventeenth Century Portugal and Spain had "beggar's smokes," throwaway paper wrapped ends of tobacco used like cigars. The first cigarette to be smoked, paper and all, was made in 1832. The Egyptians kept breaking their clay pipes in battle so they rolled the tobacco in gunpowder paper. By 1843, this technique led to commercially made cigarettes in France. It was not until the Civil War that American made cigarettes appeared.

Collectors interest in tobacco antiques dates to the 1870's, when many types of packages and tins appeared. 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

V. KAHN'S BAKERY INCORPORATED, MEAD FOODS INCORPORATED and RAINBO BAKING COMPANY OF EL PASO, Defendants. NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION AND PROPOSED SETTLEMENT IN CONNECTION WITH BREAD PRODUCTS

Pursuant to Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED:

There is now pending in the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, the above styled and numbered cause brought by purchasers of bread products. This action is brought on behalf of persons and entities that have purchased bread products in the "El Paso area" between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. The class, the products, and the geographical areas are defined more fully in Paragraph 3 herein.

The Plaintiffs allege that the Defendants, in violation of the anti-trust laws, engaged in a conspiracy to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices in the sale of bread products to Plaintiffs and to members of the alleged class. The Defendants deny the alleged violations.

The parties have agreed to settle all claims by all persons against any or all of the Defendants for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws relating to sales of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, to any person or entity, whether direct or indirect. You may be a member of the class hereinafter defined and established by this Court for purposes of settlement. If so, your rights may be affected by the pendency of this action and the settlement described herein. This Notice is not to be understood as an expression of any opinion by this Court as to the merits of any of the claims or defenses asserted by either side in this action, but is furnished for the sole purpose of informing you of its pendency and of the settlement described herein so that you may make appropriate decisions as to what steps, if any, you may wish to take in relation to this action and its settlement and your rights therein.

1. This Action. The above numbered action alleges in substance a conspiracy among the Defendants and others to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices and discounts at which bread products were sold by the Defendants bakeries. The Plaintiffs allege that they, and each alleged class member paid higher prices for bread products than they would have paid in the absence of the alleged conspiracy. The conspiracy is alleged to have begun as early as 1954, and its effect is alleged to have continued to at least December 31, 1975. Plaintiffs seek recovery of money damages for three times the amount of alleged overcharges on purchases by the Plaintiffs and by members of the class, together with recovery of counsel fees and costs.

Each Defendant has taken the position that it has not violated any law, has denied any liability whatsoever, continues to deny all allegations of wrongdoing asserted by Plaintiffs, and disclaims any liability with respect thereto. The Defendants contend that there was no illegal conspiracy or agreement concerning prices or discounts of bread products and deny that the Plaintiffs or the members of the alleged class were injured as alleged or are entitled to include damages. Defendants maintain that there is no substance to the charges

made against them and that they have valid defenses thereto. The defenses enumerated by the Defendants include their contention that the claims of Plaintiffs and of members of the alleged class are barred by the applicable statute of limitations, that Plaintiffs lack standing to sue, and that any price stabilization resulted from natural and free market pressures resulting in lower price per unit costs and, as a result, purchasers have not been damaged.

Plaintiffs' attorney has made an investigation of the facts and the law relating to the matters involved in this action, and while discovery has not been entirely completed, Plaintiffs' attorney has inspected full and complete economic data relating to the Defendants' financial condition and operations. This information has been reviewed by expert analysis employed by Plaintiffs' attorney. After such review, Plaintiffs' attorney has considered the many sharply contested issues that will be involved, the risks attending further prosecution of this litigation (including questions concerning whether this suit could be maintained as a class action under Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., the statute of limitations, the problems of proof as against each individual Defendant, and individual Plaintiffs' problems of proving actual damage for the period of the alleged conspiracy) and the likelihood that if a recovery were made in excess of the amount offered in settlement, the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in business would be jeopardized. Jeopardizing the ability of any of the Defendants to operate could result in a reduction of competition, an oligopoly in the business of bread products in the El Paso area and price leadership resulting in increased prices over the long run. As a result, Plaintiffs and their counsel have concluded that the benefits to be received pursuant to the proposed settlement of this case upon the terms provided herein are in the best interests of the Plaintiffs and the proposed class.

Defendants desire to settle and compromise the claims asserted against them in order to avoid the further substantial expenses and burden of protracted litigation, in order to avoid jeopardizing their financial condition, and to put this controversy to an end. The preceding and subsequent description of the litigation and settlement is only a summary set forth in detail sufficient to permit you to decide what steps, if any, you wish to take with reference to this litigation. The pleadings, court orders and other documents regarding the suit are filed at the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court, Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, and are available for your inspection at that office. In addition, the attorney for the Plaintiffs will provide you with further information that you may request.

2. Claims. Unless you elect to be excluded from this action as hereinafter provided, this settlement, if consummated, shall bar any present or potential future claim under the anti-trust laws against Defendants, their assigns, subsidiaries, stockholders, officers, directors, partners, agents and employees, past and present, where such claims are based on sales of bread products made in the El Paso area by any person, directly or indirectly, to any person or entity from January 1, 1954 until January 1, 1976.

UNLESS YOU EXCLUDE YOURSELF FROM THIS SETTLEMENT, ALL CLAIMS BASED ON SALES OF BREAD PRODUCTS BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954, AND JANUARY 1, 1976, WILL BE BARRED. IF YOU ELECT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SETTLEMENT, YOUR RECOVERY WILL BE BASED SOLELY UPON PURCHASES MADE BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954 AND JANUARY 1, 1976.

3. The Class. The Class will include all persons who purchased, directly or indirectly, any

bread product between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976 from any of the Defendants, directly or indirectly, in the El Paso area. The words "person" or "persons" means, refers to and includes individuals, corporations, partnerships, trusts, firms, associations, and any and all other entities of whatever kind or character, and whether public or private, except for the United States of America or any agency of the United States Government. The term "bread products" means bread, rolls, buns, pies, cakes, sweetgoods and all other products produced, sold or distributed by any of the settling Defendants. The "El Paso area" refers to the following Texas counties: El Paso, Hudspeth and Culberson; and the following New Mexico counties: Dona Ana, Otero, Lincoln, Hidalgo, Grant, Sierra and Luna.

4. Settlement. In final settlement of all present and potential claims, including claims for costs and attorney's fees, against the Defendants and related persons (such as the Defendants' subsidiaries, directors, officers and employees) alleging violation of the anti-trust laws relating to sales made directly or indirectly to any person of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, the Defendants have severally agreed, to pay, when judgment becomes final, the total sum of \$510,000.00. That sum is to be paid in four payments as follows:

One-third within thirty (30) days of the date this proposed settlement is approved by a final judgment, and the balance in three successive, equal payments 180 days apart, commencing 180 days from the date of the first payment aforesaid.

Pursuant to the Plan of Distribution conditionally approved heretofore by order of the Court for the purpose of providing notice of the settlement and of the hearing for final approval thereof, the settlement shall be shared by all of the members of the class in the proportion which their claims during the period from January 1, 1954 to January 1, 1976 bear to the total claims of all claimants during this same period. Claims for purchases made between January 1, 1954 and December 31, 1969 and January 1, 1974 through January 1, 1976, will be allocated 40 percent of the value of claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973.

Under the proposed Plan of Distribution, computation of purchases will be upon a "unit" basis, each package of bread products purchased shall constitute one unit, e.g., each loaf of bread, each package of rolls, etc., shall constitute one unit.

Claims may be made by reporting, without duplication, the number of bread product units purchased during each relevant year or by reporting the claimants' dollar purchases of all bread products for each relevant year.

Pursuant to the terms of the Settlement Agreement, the costs of administration of the Settlement Fund, the cost of this Notice, and the fees of Plaintiffs' counsel shall be paid from the Settlement Fund. Arthur Gochman, an attorney at law, is designated class counsel and is responsible for administration of this Settlement Fund, except as otherwise may be provided, and subject to supervision and further orders of this Court. The total amount of costs and attorney's fees is estimated to be approximately \$150,000.00.

Each member who does not elect to be excluded from this action as provided below shall be bound by the Plan of Distribution if it is finally approved by the Court.

5. Advantages and Disadvantages of the Proposed Settlement. As is true of most settlements, this Proposed Settlement has advantages and disadvantages to both the class members and the Defendants.

Among the advantages which accrue to the class members are assured partial recoveries for all valid claims in the claim periods, payment within a reasonably and comparatively short period of time, significantly smaller costs of litigation, and minimum disruption of the

regular business functions of class members for the purpose of proof of damages. The primary disadvantage of participation in this settlement is that class members will forego the opportunity to establish Defendants' liability, if any, at trial and to prove and receive greater monetary damages than would be recovered pursuant to this settlement.

The factors which entered into the decision by Plaintiffs' counsel to recommend this settlement are:

a. The fact that any recovery in excess of the amount agreed upon, \$510,000.00, would jeopardize the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in full operation and to maintain the ability to be competitive in the area. Any reduction of competition in the El Paso area in the bakery industry would likely result in oligopoly, price leadership, and eventual price increases.

b. The difficulties in proving an anti-trust conspiracy action, both as to liability and damage. Counsel for Plaintiffs believe these difficulties of proof for the purchases made from January 1, 1954 to December 31, 1969 and from January 1, 1974 to January 1, 1976, are much more difficult and tenuous than between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973, and have thus recommended that the purchases made during those periods should be valued at 10 percent of the claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973. Furthermore, counsel for Plaintiffs advise that they have no evidence of illegal conspiracy before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976.

c. The time lapse between institution of litigation and final termination.

d. Problems relating to the statute of limitations.

e. Problems relating to proof that any price stabilization action among the Defendants resulted in prices being raised rather than lowered.

f. The fact that any class member not wishing to be bound by the settlement may exclude itself therefrom and, subject to applicable law, proceed on its own behalf.

6. Contingencies. This settlement is subject to the right of any settling Defendant to withdraw from the Settlement Agreement in the event that sufficient class members have requested exclusion and such exclusions are believed substantial by the Defendants. Also, the Court might not approve this settlement whether there are exclusions or not.

7. Hearing. Pursuant to an order of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, dated April 29, 1976, a hearing will be held before the Honorable John H. Wood, Jr., United States District Judge in the United States District Courtroom of the United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas on the 14th day of June, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., at which time the Court will consider whether the Settlement Class should be determined and ordered to be final and whether the Class Representatives shall be as provided in the Settlement Agreement; whether the Plan of Distribution submitted to the Court shall be approved; whether the settlement of this action in the manner and on the terms set forth in the Settlement Agreement shall be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate; whether the applications for attorney's fees and other expenses, which are expected to total approximately \$150,000.00, shall be approved; and whether the final judgments of dismissal with prejudice shall be entered against all settling Plaintiffs and members of the class who have not timely excluded themselves from these actions.

Unless, on or before June 21, 1976, you file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded from this action, you will be bound to look only to the Settlement Fund referred to above for relief as to any claims you may have against the Defendants for anti-trust violations in sales of bread products in the El Paso area by any person between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. Should you decide to participate in the settlement without objection, the amount of your recovery will be based solely upon purchases made by you between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. If you elect to be excluded from this action, you must file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded substantially in the form of the "Election to be Excluded" shown below. If you send such a request, you cannot participate in this settlement, you will be excluded from the classes established, and will not be bound by any judgments entered herein.

2. If you do not elect to be excluded from this action, you will nevertheless be precluded from participating in this settlement unless you mail to the Clerk of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, not later than July 6, 1976, a sworn written statement of your claim using the form of "Statement of Claim" which appears below, or a substantially identical form. If additional copies of the form are desired, they may be obtained upon written request therefor to the Clerk of the Court, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901.

3. If you are a member of the class and either do not (a) elect to be excluded on or before June 21, 1976, or (b) do not file a valid Statement of Claim on or before July 6, 1976, you will be barred from recovery in this settlement, you will be bound by the dismissal of this action if the Court approves this settlement, and you will not receive notice of any future proceedings, hearings, orders or other matters.

4. On June 14, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., a hearing pursuant to Rule 23(d) and (e), Fed. R. Civ. P., will be held before Judge John H. Wood, Jr. in the U.S. Courtroom, United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas, at which time the Court will determine whether final approval of the class should be made and whether the settlement of this case on the terms set forth above should be approved. Any member of the class may, either by appearance or in writing, show cause why:

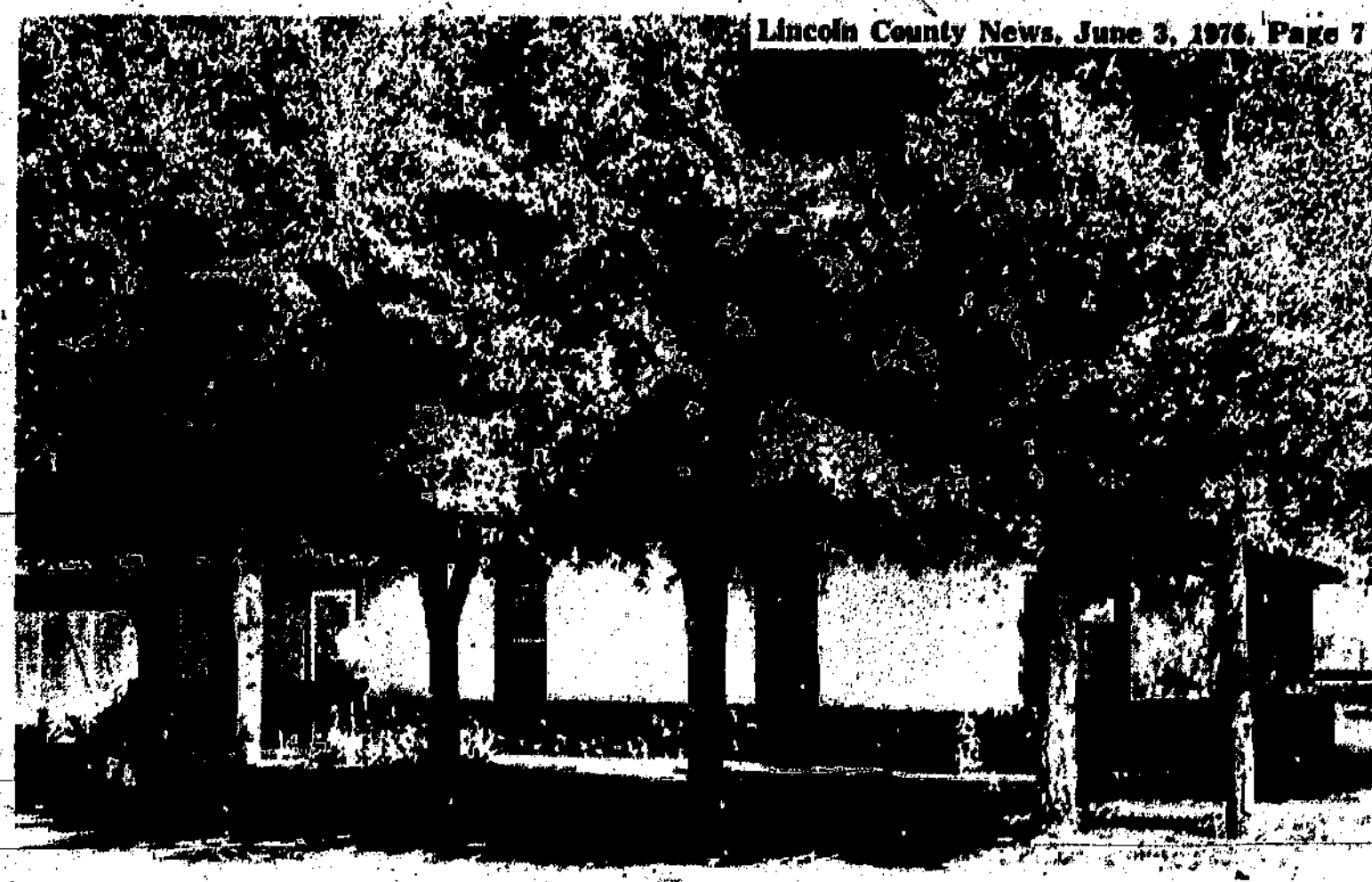

Check losses are serious

"Thefts of social security or supplemental security income checks may not be a major crime category, but for someone whose monthly checks represent the bulk of his or her income, the loss can be shattering. It may take weeks before a stolen check can be replaced," Walter A. Blea, social security field representative, said today.

"a relatively new service makes it possible for people to have their checks deposited directly in their checking or savings account. The check is deposited the same day it ordinarily would be delivered at home.

"The program-called 'direct deposit'- is entirely voluntary. People who don't specifically request direct deposit will continue to get their

checks at their home or other mailing address.

"Those who want to use the direct deposit procedure should contact their bank, savings and loan association, credit union or other financial organization & complete form SF-1199. Completion of this form only authorizes deposit of your check. No one can withdraw from the account unless you authorize them to do so.

"When you go in to complete the SF-1199 you should take one of your social security checks or other documents which show your name and claim number exactly as shown on the monthly check," Blea emphasized.
