Cable TV may be halted

Carrizozo television viewers may be without cable service for a couple of months. Present cable owner Joe West says he has been given until August 16 to take his lines off the Otero Electric Co-op poles.

Arl Cope of Tularosa Cable TV who has been given a cable franchise by the town says the necessary permits from the FCC to begin putting up his lines have not arrived. Monday afternoon in a special meeting Mayor

Bud Payne and the town trustees held an emergency meeting to attempt to solve the problem.

Despite all kinds of rumors around the town, the reason behind the Coop's order to West was, according to the electric company, a business matter growing out of a series of late payments of pole rent bills by West.

Wayne Withers, vice president of the Cooperation said that the board has been forced to hire a lawyer a number of times to collect the pole rental and that the cost of attorney had eaten into the income. He said the board had notified West of this decision some time ago and had given him adequate time to take his lines down by August 16.

Cope told the meeting that he had applied for a certificate from the Federal Communications Commission upon receiving the town franchise to operate but that it might be as much as 60 days before he received it and could commence installation of the 8 channel cable system.

West is operating without a franchise and has never requested one. He says he can operate under a 'grandfather clause' without FCC approval, however, he said, if he were to continue after March 1977, he would need a franchise and a FCC certificate.

Asked if the city could secure a 6 months extension from the electric company, if he would continue in business that long, West said no, that unless he could have a full five year contract he was taking his lines down.

He was asked by several people if, as a public service to his customers and in consideration of the 6 months cable fees, if he would reconsider. West said he was not interested. He did agree to postpone taking down the lines for another week, with the agreement of the Cooperative, while the town studies the problem.

Mayor Payne attempted to negotiate a sale of the West equipment to Arl Cope but the difference in the \$12,000 asking price and the \$1200 offer seemed insurmountable. Cope said that while he would prefer to have West's operation continue, he could only use the present tower in his planned operation and he was willing to pay the \$1200 for that.

He said the other equipment would not be satisfactory for his system, and that he had already purchased new equipment.

The town then asked West if he would consider renting the system to the town for six months while Cope put up his lines. West seemed doubtful but said he would take it under consideration.

In the meantime pending next Monday's regular meeting, the town may appeal to the FCC to expedite the Cope application and to the Coop for a September extension of the West deadline for line removal.

Capitan annexes areas

It took two meetings in five days to get the work done but the Capitan Board of Trustees may have set something of a record when they passed three annexation ordinances, repealed one and voted on two other major ordinances in one week.

In a special meeting Thursday the town governing body adopted an additional town gross receipts tax which will be used only for law enforcement in the village. The promise of funding this year for a town marshal and a fully equipped patrol car seems almost a certainty for the additional tax will be needed for a 'law budget' next year.

Three areas were annexed at the regular meeting Monday and the way was paved for still a fourth one hundred sixty acres south of town and east of the Big Country development in Mesa Verde were added to the town. The annexation came after a vote of the residents which gave 15 for and 2 against.

The Hammons annexation of 3.5 acres south of town on the old state road was passed as was an annexation of 30 acres in Thunderbird Hills. The petitions had an all yes vote and was made by Johnny Neilson.

The trustees repealed the annexation of 250.70 acres in Mesa Verde and prepared to reannex the area. The deannexation was a result of a recent court ruling by Judge Vernon Payne who

decided the method of annexation used was unconstitutional. A vote of all property owners is being taken and thus far the vote in gives 12 for and two against.

The town also adopted a 10 p.m. limited curfew for people under 18 years old.

A check for 1/2 of the year's occupational license was returned to Hollins Cummins, owner of Cummins Food Market. In a previous meeting Cummins had protested the \$1 per \$1000 gross revenue business license fee. A survey of surrounding towns show that the fee was in line.

Cummins sent a check to the city with a notation on the back that the check was to complete payment of 1/2 year license fee. In December, he said, the store would either be sold, closed or a decision to continue would be made.

Mayor Jay Johnston told the group that all other businesses had paid the full year fee and there was no provision for partial payment. The trustees voted to return the check as unacceptable and to turn the matter over to Town Attorney Archie Witham.

In other business Charlie Engleking was named to replace Howard Abercrombie on the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas board. Abercrombie's term has expired.

Mayor Jay Johnston was reappointed to the Water Board.

Bank to open in Zozo

The Ruidoso State Banks has announced plans for an early opening of a bank in Carrizozo after receiving approval of the State Banking Department and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Making the announcement were Kenneth G. Cox, president, Mike Capps, vice president in charge of branch banking and Richard D. Browning, vice president and cashier.

The bank will be operated from temporary quarters. While a new building is constructed, construction should be completed by spring of 1977.

The temporary offices will be adjacent to the Outpost on Central & the new building will be on Central where the Pizza King is presently located. The Bank recently purchased that property.

President Cox said "We have been doing the banking of a number of Carrizozo area

customers and we are happy to bring more convenient service to these people as well as new customers."

Mike Capps who will be in charge of the new facility said, "This new bank will give us five facilities in Lincoln County and will allow us to have a broader base of investments in the county."

Announcement of the exact opening date is expected this month.

I almost got to like the music of the year while Mark was here. Never before could I understand the words and the heavy beat just sounded repetitious, throbbing.

We drove to Colorado and back with the radio on some station that only plays the top twenty tunes. After several hours we had heard the top twenty number of times and Mark had translated often enough so that I knew they were saying "I love you, I love you I love you....." or "Let em in, Let em in, Let em in".

It does add something to be able to understand the music. It sounds loud, and unmelodic now but I can learn. After all, twenty million young people can't be wrong, can they?

These are my reactions (and I use that word advisedly) on the 1976 Olympic Games in our neighbor to the north.

In this world of acceleration (this refers to a fairly well proven theory that technological and political development on the earth have accelerated and will continue to move faster than would be expected if the pace of development remained the same as it was in the years 1200-1500) it is comforting to those of us of advanced years to find something that is constant.

Olympic records are broken every four years and the youth of this world seems to get braver and stronger and more beautiful each Olympiad but the Olympics do take place and the pagentry and personal effort and the pride remains. I love it all. Some day I am going to go to the Olympics.

There was talk this weekend of stopping the Olympics. The New York Times even had an editorial recommending an end to the international competition.

New York readers are welcome to disagree with the following statements and may write letters of protest to the editor.

Attitudes, aspirations, ideals and responses of metropolitan dwellers are different from those of village and rural dwellers.

It would be ridiculous to argue that one is better, more pertinent, than the other. The problem and the needs are so different as to defy comparison on any national level.

I prefer to live in the country and next to that I like a very small town. But remember that \$25,000 a year is probably the top Carrizozo wage. There are ranchers that have a million or more dollars in capital investment who make a net income of less than \$20,000 in goods years (one rancher talking about the Capitan bank hold-up, said that's hardly news, Johnson Stearns says I've been robbing his bank for the last twelve years.)

We have talked about this before but remember if that rancher sold his \$1,000,000 property and invested the money he could be taking home about \$60,000 a year and not be out on cold morning breaking the ice on tanks.

Well, he is not a total idiot. There are a lot of city millionaires, trying to accumulate enough cash to buy one of these ranches before high blood pressure makes enjoyment of life impossible.

City dwellers are accustomed to big, big productions—Rodeos?—In NYC a rodeo is a Madison Square production that features the BIG game entertainers and draws heaven only knows how many entries and spectators.

I don't know what those people would think about our rodeo last weekend at Corona. No admission and a bunch of kids having a lot of fun. Even our super-rodeo-in-Capitan wouldn't rate a notice in the New York Times. We like it.

Something goes wrong at the Olympics two sessions and there are calls for cancellation and/or major revisions in the games.

I believe that the games are a delightful way of putting international relations on a person to

person basis. Any attempt to use them as a political weapon should heap discredit on the country that attempts that misuse.

A demand that a country be ousted because it does not conform to the moral standards of another country comes under such a category.

It is to be hoped that the treatment by Nazi Germany of the Jews, political dissidents, and Christians deserved the world's greatest reaction. We finally used the most extreme measure, war, to express our disapproval.

We have disapproved of the political, economic systems of many nations but we have still gone to the Olympics with them. I believe that any nation, or area calling itself a nation, that wants to send a team to the games and is willing to abide by the rules of the game should be welcomed.

Any nation that refuses to come if another nation is admitted should be left out. I do not think it is proper to blame the killing of the Israeli team on the Olympics. The blame should fall on the criminals who did the killing and great credit should go to the Israel for continuing to send a team and for remaining in the international community.

Please remember that those same bandits have killed other people, have taken whole planes full of people, have massacred innocents in the streets who were not at the Olympics.

I doubt there is a country on the face of the earth that has not outrageously bloodied itself from time to time. We certainly did in our Indian wars, in our civil war, in our slave trade, in our labor fights and according to Mexico, in our Mexican War.

If you want to go back to that birth place of the games, Greece was not always been covered with honor.

We have the United Nations as a forum for expressing political disapproval. We have the use of trade sanctions to put pressure on nations that abuse human rights—if we are really so

perturbed as to pay the economic price for the salvation of our conscience.

It is a shortsight person; a person unable to see the glory in the opening and closing of the games; a blindness to the examples of discipline and courage recorded in the games who would say "close the games. They cause trouble."

From Lincoln County News, August 3, 1956.
